

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REPORT TO THE JOINT CONGRESSIONAL OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

MONDAY, 27 APRIL 2020

As we approach 30 April 2020, or the 44th day of implementation of the Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ) for the entire Luzon, upon thorough consultations with medical experts and former Secretaries of Health, I have decided to approve the recommendation of the Inter-Agency Task Force for the Management of Emerging Infectious Disease (IATF) to extend until 15 May 2020 the implementation of ECQ in high-risk areas in Luzon, including the National Capital Region (NCR), and place under ECQ other high-risk areas throughout the country. For low-risk areas in Luzon and some moderate-risk areas in Visayas and Mindanao, a General Community Quarantine (GCQ) shall be implemented, subject to further assessment. The pertinent guidelines for the implementation of GCQ shall be laid down this week.

A prudent and cautious approach is imperative to stem the spread of COVID-19, and effectively supplement continuous efforts to strengthen the capacity of our hospitals and healthcare facilities. In the spirit of *bayanihan*, the entire Executive department has long been directed to render full assistance and cooperation to achieve these objectives, and to mobilize the necessary resources to alleviate the conditions of all those affected by this crisis.

Through this report, in compliance with Section 5 of Republic Act (RA) No. 11469 or the "*Bayanihan* to Heal as One Act," I respectfully submit updates and developments during the fifth week of our whole-of-government approach in overcoming the COVID-19 pandemic. This summarizes the programs, activities, and accomplishments of 82 departments, agencies, and instrumentalities of the Executive branch of government, reported to this Office through the Executive Secretary. Most of the reports were received on **24 April 2020 (Friday)**.

I acknowledge and sincerely welcome the comments and observations given to us by the members of the Senate, including its representatives in the Joint Congressional Oversight Committee on the implementation of RA No. 11469. These valuable inputs have been cascaded to the concerned agencies for appropriate study and consideration, with the commitment to report on them accordingly. Meanwhile, consistent with previous reports, I have incorporated herein those proposals which are either already being implemented or integrated to existing programs. Likewise, I have cited herein those concerns which are already being addressed.

I continue to highlight the existing and newly-initiated measures of our various agencies under the four (4) major objectives of: (1) Providing Emergency Assistance to all Affected Sectors; (2) Securing Facilities and Resources for the Health Sector and Other Frontliners; (3) Establishing Sound Fiscal and Monetary Actions that are Responsive to all Stakeholders; and (4) Formulating a Responsive and Sustainable Recovery Plan.

I. Providing Emergency Assistance to All Affected Sectors

Update on the Social Amelioration Programs (SAPs)

Updates on the implementation of the Emergency Subsidy Program (ESP) pursuant to Section 4 (c)¹ and (cc)² of RA No. 11469, through (1) the Assistance to Individuals in Crisis Program (AICS) of the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD); (2) the COVID-19 Adjustment Measures Program (CAMP) for Affected Formal Workers, CAMP *Abot-Kamay and Pagtulong* (AKAP) for Displaced Overseas Filipinos Workers (OFWs), and *Tulong Panghanapbuhay para sa Ating Disadvantaged/Displaced Workers* (TUPAD) of the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE); and (3) the Financial Subsidy for Rice Farmers (FSRF) Program of the Department of Agriculture (DA), are summarized in **Table 1** below:

The DSWD has standby funds amounting to PhP450 Million (inclusive of the available Quick Response Fund of PhP416.4 Million) and stockpiles of the following: 368,391 Family Food Packs (FFPs) amounting to PhP147.1 Million; Other Food Items amounting to PhP262.5 Million; and Non-Food Items amounting to PhP459.6 Million. In addition to the SAPs, the DSWD, through its regular AICS, has catered to 22,459 clients for COVID-related concerns, such as requests for medical or burial assistance, including 2,388 stranded individuals, in the total amount of PhP104.4 Million.

Aside from the ESP, the National Government also released PhP6 Billion and PhP36 Billion in additional support for LGUs under the *Bayanihan* Grant to Provinces, and *Bayanihan* Grant to Cities and Municipalities, respectively, giving LGUs a grant equivalent to their respective one (1) month Fiscal Year (FY) 2020 Internal Revenue Allotment, to boost their capacity to immediately respond to the COVID-19 emergency. The Department of Finance (DOF) is also monitoring the DSWD's pilot implementation of *Relief Agad*, a computer-based application to fast-track the distribution of the ESP.

Meanwhile, the Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR) is in the process of rolling out a project entitled, "*PaSSOver: ARBold Move for Deliverance of our Farmers from the COVID-19 Pandemic*," which seeks to consolidate the efforts of the DAR in addressing the problems brought about by COVID-19. As of 24 April 2020, a total of 77,119 agrarian reform beneficiary (ARB) identification cards have been distributed by the DAR under its ARB ID System to identify ARBs who are in dire need of assistance and facilitate access to the SAPs, and such other financial and livelihood assistance(e.g., farm productivity, seedlings), especially to those who are not entitled to the existing SAPs.

Implementation of the SAP for Small Businesses

As of 22 April 2020, the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) has notified 199,377 small business employers that they are pre-qualified for the Small Business Wage Subsidy (SBWS) Program.⁵ To date, 6,403 employers have completed the application process on behalf of 130,188 employees. Actual payouts are scheduled on 01 to 15 May 2020 for the 1st tranche, and 16 to 31 May 2020 for the 2nd tranche. The SBWS Program has an estimated 3.4 Million target eligible employees.

The government is also studying a proposal to Congress to amend the National Internal Revenue Code to stretch the net operating loss carry-over period from three (3) years to five (5) years to help small-sized enterprises cope with losses, and a credit guarantee program to cover loans worth PhP120 Billion to grant easier access to bank financing even during crisis situations.

Continued Transportation, Repatriation, and Mobility Assistance to Health Workers, Frontliners, OFWs, Stranded Passengers, Foreign Nationals in the Country, and Other Entities or Individuals

The Department of Transportation (DOTr), the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA), the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), the Metro Manila Development Authority (MMDA), the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG), the Maritime Industry Authority (MARINA), the Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board (LTFRB), the Toll Regulatory Board (TRB), the Bases Conversion and Development Authority (BCDA), the Clark International Airport Corporation (CIAC), and the Clark Development Corporation (CDC), in partnership with other government agencies or with the support of private sector partners, continue to provide: (1) transportation assistance to ferry health workers, frontliners, OFWs, and other persons in need [e.g., DOTr's Free Bus Ride Program, *Malasakit* Help Desks, Emergency Operations Center (EOC),⁶ *Libreng Sakay* Program, MMDA's Bicycle-Lending Program]; (2) logistical assistance in the distribution of medical supplies and food relief; (3) emergency response to vehicles, passengers, and stranded seafarers; and (4) repatriation services for OFWs and foreigners.

Protection of Consumers and Related Measures

The Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) has intensified the *Diskwento Caravan*, a program which aims to provide consumers easier access to basic necessities and prime commodities at reduced prices by bringing them closer to manufacturers, distributors and local producers. This program has significantly benefitted 930 micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs) and 31,637 households in 346 barangays across 11 regions of the country, since its launch in January.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) continues to monitor prices of essential health products and medical devices. It received a total of 3,635 reports through covidresponse@fda.gov.ph, of which 3,457 involve reports on the price freeze. These reports are then processed and coordinated with the Department of Health (DOH) and LGUs for proper action. The FDA has issued an Advisory to the general public on the proper selection and use of household cleaners and disinfectant products,⁷ and a Circular

on interim measures to ensure access to vitamin drug products during the COVID-19 pandemic.⁸

As part of ongoing efforts in enforcing trade and consumer laws, the DTI reported a 95% compliance rate in price freeze directives on basic necessities and prime commodities in 15 regions outside the NCR. A summary of the law enforcement measures to protect consumers is shown in **Table 3**.

Meanwhile, the DOH, the DTI, the DA, the Department of Justice (DOJ), the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), and the Bureau of Customs (BOC) issued Joint Circular No. 001 (s. 2020), which establishes guidelines for the seizure, forfeiture, and disposition of goods which are held, hoarded, manipulated, sold or otherwise disposed of in violation of RA No. 7581 or the "Price Act," and RA No. 10863 or the "Customs Modernization and Tariff Act," pending preliminary investigation or trial. The Joint Circular gives the State preferential right to purchase, at the suggested retail price, such seized goods to address COVID-19.

Other Assistance to MSMEs and Productive Sectors⁹

In support of our MSMEs, the DA continues to reach out to marginalized and small farmers and fisherfolk (MSFFs) and agri-based micro and small enterprises (MSEs), and offers a zero-interest loan program under its Expanded SURE Aid and Recovery Project:

Access to Agri-Fishery Products and Ensuring an Uninterrupted Supply Chain¹⁰

Since the imposition of the ECQ, the *DA Kadiwa ni Ani at Kita* (KAK) project, which seeks to provide communities convenient access to agri-fishery products, has served 63 barangays and 13 subdivisions within the NCR and 31 provinces in CAR, Regions I, II, III, IV-A, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VIII, IX, X, XI and XIII, specifically through the *KAK On Wheels*, and sold 10,812 kg. of fish and fishery products at affordable prices, benefitting 160,055 individuals through the *KAK-IsDA on the Go* of the Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (PFDA). The project has also facilitated the delivery of 22,760.27 MT of commodities from Benguet, Nueva Vizcaya, and Oriental Mindoro to Metro Manila through *KAK-On Express* last week. Further, the PFDA facilitated the unloading of 59,025 MT of fish nationwide since the start of the ECQ.

The DILG has released an Advisory enjoining LGUs to implement innovative measures to bring the market/goods closer to people, such as: (i) marketing and delivery of goods through the use of various online platforms; (ii) community markets in subdivisions implemented through Home Owners Associations; and (iii) market on wheels or mobile *palengke*. The same Advisory also instructed LGUs to discontinue the imposition of “narrow or limited window period” for public and private establishments selling essential goods.

The DA has also provided assorted vegetable seeds, starter kits, and livestock to individuals and communities for the promotion of local backyard gardening amounting to PhP248.66 Million since the implementation of its Urban Agriculture Program, while the Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources has provided fingerlings, seedstock, and seaweed propagules to fish farmers amounting to PhP14.71 Million to support fish production.

Meanwhile, the Sugar Regulatory Administration sees no shortage of sugar supply in traders’ warehouses in Luzon and has monitored the retail and whole prices of sugar within the NCR, and the retail prices of raw and refined sugar in Bacolod City to ensure that the same are within the suggested retail price.

As of 22 April 2020, the Philippine Ports Authority (PPA) has issued 8,001 IATF IDs to ensure assistance in the unhampered movement of cargo.

The IATF has approved the prototype of the Supply Chain Analysis dashboard application to address bottlenecks to the supply, distribution, and movement of essential goods and services. Said application is currently being polished by the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) Regional Development Group and the University of the Philippines (UP) Public Administration - Regulatory Reform Support Program for National Development to ensure compliance with the guidelines set forth by the Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) on functionality, reliability, data privacy, and mandatory anti-cybercrime features.

The DOST-assisted agriculture-based Technology Business Incubators and Regional Research and Development Consortia distributed agri-based products, such as fruits, vegetables, duck eggs, slaughtered native chickens and seeds to households, frontliners, and farmers in rural communities.

The DAR is continually assisting the marketing and sale of farm products of ARBs. As of 24 April 2020, the DAR has assisted 673 ARB Organizations (ARBOs), thereby generating a total gross sale of PhP152 Million. In order to ensure the delivery of farm products to critical areas affected by the ECQ, the DAR has issued a total of 629 Quarantine Accreditation Passes to ARBs, ARBOs, and agrarian reform communities and cooperatives. The DOST-CAR, in coordination with the Tublay Municipal Agriculture Office, has assisted Benguet farmers in selling their vegetable products in the NCR.

Protection of Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDLs)

To decongest prison facilities, the DOJ has approved Board of Pardons and Parole Resolution No. OT-04-15-2020,¹¹ which simplifies the requirements and procedures for

the processing of applications for parole or executive clemency. Executive clemency is made available to those over 65 years old who have served at least five (5) years of their sentence, or those whose continued imprisonment is certified to be inimical to their health.

The Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP) has noted that out of 3,384 elderly PDLs who are 60 years old and above and charged with light offenses or those punishable with *arresto menor* and *arresto mayor*, 1,927 have existing medical conditions and only 804 are non-recidivists, who may qualify for the proposed early release.

The BJMP has declared a total lockdown on all of its 468 supervised jail facilities nationwide. The BJMP likewise identified 222 Isolation Areas and established four (4) Regional Isolation Centers. The BJMP added that all probable and confirmed cases were either brought to COVID-19 isolation centers or hospitals for proper medication and health monitoring. In the Correctional Institution for Women, 18 COVID-19 positive PDLs have been identified and transferred to Site HARRY.

Ensuring Water and Energy Supply¹²

To ensure the adequate supply of clean water in the NCR, Cavite, Rizal, and Bulacan, the Metropolitan Waterworks and Sewerage System, in coordination with the Inter-agency Technical Working Group (TWG) for the Angat Dam Operation and Management, has retained the current water allocation of 46 cubic meters per second from the Angat Dam until 30 June 2020.

Due to this allocation, the water availability at 24 hours supply in the west zone covered by the Maynilad Water Services, Inc. (MWSI) increased from 36% prior to the ECQ to 89% as of date. The water availability at 24 hours supply in the east zone covered by the Manila Water Company, Inc. (MWCI) is now almost 100%.

The MWSI and the MWCI commit to provide, at no cost, water supply to the temporary quarantine facilities built at the World Trade Center, Ninoy Aquino Stadium, Rizal Memorial Stadium, North and South Towers of the Football Stadium 1 & 3 of the Philippine Sports Commission, and the Philippine International Convention Center (PICC). A total of 27 shower facilities were installed at the World Trade Center for COVID-19 patients. An additional 10 facilities for frontliners and medical workers were completed on 11 April 2020. Line boosters were also installed in six (6) hospitals¹³ in Quezon City to improve water supply in the area.

As of 23 April 2020, the available power capacity stood at 11,478 MW while peak demand was recorded at 8,228 MW in Luzon. The power supply had an excess of 3,250 MW which is 28% above the peak demand. The country's inventory of crude oil and petroleum products was measured at 49.3 days as of 20 April 2020.

The new power development projects of the National Power Corporation have been completed and are already operational.

Assistance to Other Sectors and Partnership with LGUs

From the first week of April to 22 April 2020, the DICT has provided free WiFi to 31 public health facilities nationwide and 110 quarantine centers.

The DOF has allowed the electronic processing and issuance of LGU net debt service ceiling and borrowing capacity certificates to make it easier for LGUs tied up with quarantine enforcement to borrow money.¹⁴ These transactions will ensure immediate assistance to LGUs availing of credit financing for provision of goods and services in response to COVID-19.

As part of the assistance to LGUs, the DILG, in coordination with the DSWD, has issued an advisory authorizing the inclusion of barangay frontliners, consisting of barangay *tanods*, barangay health care and daycare workers, as among the target beneficiaries of the SAP.

The National Government is continuously monitoring LGUs as regards their compliance with the rules and guidelines enforced during the ECQ. The DILG has issued Show Cause Orders against officials of LGUs that were found to have violated the aforesaid rules and guidelines.

In line with the synchronization of local policies with the declared national policy in RA No. 11469, the DILG has also issued advisories on: (1) the implementation of appropriate safety protocols in the collection and management of waste from designated isolation or quarantine areas (e.g., wearing of appropriate protective equipment by collectors; use of disinfecting agents or solutions before and after transport; and further disinfection in landfills); (2) social distancing and basic infection prevention measures; and (3) provision of markets for municipal fisherfolk and small farmers.

Assistance to Students, Educators and Educational Institutions

The Commission on Higher Education (CHED) is coordinating with the DICT with the goal of enhancing the accessibility in internet connectivity of students and higher educational institutions (HEIs) especially during the period of ECQ. This includes getting special or reduced rates for internet services, free access and downloading of educational resources in the internet, and interconnectivity among state universities and colleges (SUCs).

Meanwhile, the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) postponed 17 licensure examinations scheduled from March to June due to the ECQ. These examinations will be rescheduled later this year. The CHED and the PRC are closely working to ease the disruption of the scheduled licensure examinations.

Continuing Efforts on Information Dissemination

The Presidential Communications Operations Office (PCOO) and its attached agencies further intensified the government's information drive on COVID-19 through the website, www.covid19.gov.ph, virtual pressers, including those by the IATF, the National Task Force on COVID-19, and the Office of the Presidential Spokesperson, alongside the President's Talk to the Nation.

II. Securing Facilities and Resources for the Health Sector and Other Frontliners

Human Resources for Health (HRH)

To boost the number of healthcare frontliners, the DBM has approved the request of the DOH for the engagement of an additional 15,757 healthcare professionals under contract of service for a period of three (3) months, with a total budget of PhP2.7 Billion, chargeable against available released allotment of the DOH under the FY 2020 General Appropriations Act (GAA). As of 22 April 2020, the DOH has received requests from seven (7) hospitals for emergency hiring of HRH and has approved 701 slots for hiring in five (5) hospitals.¹⁵ The DOH reports that under its HRH Deployment Program, it has redeployed a total of 639 nurses¹⁶ (192 in Luzon and 447 in Visayas and Mindanao) to DOH and local hospitals handling COVID-19 cases. As of 20 April 2020, 130 HRH were trained to collect and encode case data, 14 of whom were deployed to 12 hospitals in the NCR. This number is expected to increase as 97 HRH were scheduled for deployment to 51 hospitals last 24 April 2020.

Pursuant to RA No. 7160 or the "Local Government Code," as amended, LGUs are empowered to employ emergency or casual employees or laborers in the implementation of programs, activities or projects as part of local responses to COVID-19 pandemic. Compensation for this set of short-term employees or laborers may be charged against their general fund instead of their respective allocations from the *Bayanihan* Grant.

Referral Hospitals and Equipment by the Numbers

As of 23 April 2020, a total of 1,101 COVID-referral hospitals have been designated across the country, with every region having at least one (1) hospital. The total number of dedicated beds for COVID-19 is 7,732 while the total number of mechanical ventilators for both private and public hospitals is 1,381.¹⁷

Provision of Healthcare Resources, Supplies, and Equipment

The entire government continues to mobilize its resources to provide health and medical supplies and equipment to our frontliners. **Table 6** below is a summary of contributions, either procured from the respective agency budgets of various agencies and instrumentalities of the Executive Department or through distribution of donations from the private sector, based on available data.

Relative to the issuance of a license to operate, the FDA inspected a total of 44 new manufacturing facilities for alcohol - fourteen (14) are located in the NCR, four (4) in North Luzon, 13 in South Luzon, ten (10) in Visayas, and three (3) in Mindanao. Other manufacturing facilities inspected include: three (3) hand sanitizer manufacturing facilities in Mindanao, three (3) personal protective equipment (PPE) (face masks) manufacturing facilities in Region III, XI, and XII, and one (1) COVID-19 test kit manufacturing facility in the NCR.

As of 22 April 2020, the Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth), through its Interim Reimbursement Mechanism, has released PhP10.075 Billion to 317 PhilHealth-accredited Health Care Institutions, either hospitals or medical clinics, to enable them to quickly respond to the COVID-19 threat.

The DBM, through its Procurement Service, has approved and issued a Special Allotment Release Order (SARO) dated 23 April 2020 in the amount of PhP45.717 Billion to cover the funding requirements for the efficient implementation of programs and projects of the DOH under RA No. 11469. The SARO includes the allotment of PhP1.35 Billion for the purchase of 1,500 units of mechanical ventilators to serve the needs of DOH hospitals, selected LGU hospitals, military hospitals, and the UP-Philippine General Hospital (PGH).

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) – Environment Management Bureau (EMB) continues to ensure the proper transport and disposal of healthcare wastes for further treatment. It has issued a total of 424 Special Permits to Transport, wherein 11,723.04 metric tons of healthcare wastes are permitted for transport for further treatment. As of date, a total of 1,364.31 metric tons of healthcare wastes were transported for treatment while 766.72 metric tons of healthcare wastes have already undergone treatment in EMB-accredited Treatment, Sanitation, and Disposal (TSD) facilities. The DENR has been directed to address in its subsequent reports the concerns raised on the need for guidelines to the public on the proper disposal of used medical

supplies and other similar personal hygiene products, and to elaborate how TSD facilities ensure the safe and sanitary disposal of infectious healthcare wastes.

Update on Test Kits, Testing Centers and Expanded Testing

Pursuant to Section 4(b)³⁴ of RA No. 11469, the FDA continues to process and approve applications for test kits and other licenses in relation to COVID-19. **Tables 7, 8, and 9** below summarize the applications and approved test kits, as of available data.

On 18 and 20 April 2020, the FDA released an issuance on the varying specifications and use of COVID-19 Rapid Antibody Test Kits³⁸ and performance testing of Antibody Test Kits with issued special certification, respectively.³⁹

As of 24 April 2020, from 16 testing facilities as previously reported, the DOH has activated a total of 19 laboratories and hospitals for COVID-19 testing with maximum testing capacity of 6,220 a day. The DOH also reports that a new COVID-19 laboratory equipment capable of up to 45,000 tests a day arrived on 22 April 2020 and is currently lodged and being set-up at Jose B. Lingad Memorial General Hospital. In addition, 9,000 pieces of Cepheid Xpert Xpress SARS COV-2 kits which are RT-PCR based kits are expected to arrive in the Philippines from 27 April to 28 April 2020.

The DOST deployed two (2) PCR machines to the Research Institute for Tropical Medicine and one (1) PCR machine to the San Lazaro Hospital to increase their capacities for COVID-19 testing.

COVID-19 Bed Capacity and Quarantine Facilities

To augment the capacity of health facilities, the government has been constantly expanding its capacity and preparedness to address COVID-19 related cases through the conversion of facilities and properties into quarantine centers.

The DPWH and other agencies continue to prepare evacuation centers to be utilized as health/quarantine facilities, emergency operation centers, food hubs, and quarters for health workers. One (1) additional evacuation center has been converted for use in Region IX, while a total of nine (9) evacuation centers are now being used as health/quarantine facilities in Regions I, II, IV-A, V, VII, and XI, and one (1) as food hub in Region XI.

The foregoing health/quarantine facilities have served a total of 684 persons so far, from 575 that was reported on 20 April 2020. These numbers are distributed per region as shown in **Table 10** below:

For the period of 20 to 24 April 2020, two (2) additional SUCs used their facilities as quarantine facilities/crisis intervention units (CIUs). The total number of SUC facilities used as quarantine facilities/CIUs is now at 16, while 18 local universities and colleges were also converted as quarantine areas/isolation centers for suspected cases.

Strengthening Contact Tracing Measures

The DOH continues to roll out interventions in improving contact tracing efforts. It has revised its contact tracing strategy and simplified its training modules in coordination with the World Health Organization (WHO). The DOH, with technical assistance from the WHO and a private enterprise, has deployed the enhanced COVID-19 Information System which involves an application using smartphones and tablets for case and contact tracing. This is set to undergo pilot testing in the Davao Region and Parañaque City by 27 April 2020.

The DOST has briefed Regional IATF (for COVID-19) units and Regional Development Councils for the deployment of *FASSSTER*⁴⁴ and *TanodCOVID*. The *FASSSTER* is the web-based disease surveillance platform that covers COVID-19. On the other hand, the *TanodCOVID* is a self-reporting application, which will enable LGUs to access report summaries, visualization, and mobile numbers and addresses of those who reported symptoms. When used by an LGU, the *TanodCOVID* will help the local officials and the DOH in the contact tracing of possible and suspected COVID-19 cases and decide on areas where mass testing must be administered.

For its part, the DICT is in the process of continuing its review and system deployment of *StaySafe.ph*, a community-driven social distancing system that enables COVID-19 case mapping and monitoring, symptoms reporting, medical consultation, and contact tracing.

The Commission on Population and Development's Demographic Vulnerabilities Tool (DVT) is now available on its website to guide national and local agencies in planning and implementing effective pandemic response at the local and community levels.⁴⁵ The DILG, the DOH, and the NEDA have drafted a Joint Memorandum Circular (JMC) to operationalize the DVT.

Clinical Trials

The DOST will now start clinical trials to test the efficacy of virgin coconut oil in improving the condition of confirmed and probable COVID-19 patients. It also approved and allocated funds for the project that would allow UP Manila and 22 cooperating hospitals to participate in a multicenter trial that will provide data on the efficacy of candidate anti-viral drugs to Filipino populations infected with COVID-19.

III. Establishing Sound Fiscal and Monetary Actions that are Responsive to All Stakeholders

Moratoriums and other Relief Measures

Pursuant to Section 4(aa)⁴⁶ of RA No. 11469, the Development Bank of the Philippines (DBP) has continued implementing a moratorium on repayment of salary loans of 53,533 government employees. Under its RESPONSE Program,⁴⁷ the DBP has extended a moratorium on loan repayments for 111 borrower accounts, an increase from last week's 47 accounts, with offering tickets for payment moratorium.

Since the commencement of the ECQ period, the National Home Mortgage Finance Corporation has validated 1,054 online applications for moratorium on housing loan payments.

The PhilHealth issued an advisory on the moratorium on contribution payments for February to April 2020 and extended the premium payment period for said months until 31 May 2020, without interest for all direct contributors.

Within the 3rd week of April,⁴⁸ the DA has sent notices to 190 partner lending conduits to grant a one (1)-year loan payment moratorium to MSFF-borrowers under the DA's Survival and Recovery (SURE) Assistance Program.

The Presidential Agrarian Reform Council Executive Committee has approved the one (1) year moratorium for the payment of land amortization of ARBs, and the one (1) year extension of the Credit Assistance Program for Program Beneficiaries Development Window III, which provides continuous provision of credit assistance and capacity development to ARBOs and ARBs nationwide.

In line with the extension of the grace period for payment of premiums from 60 to 90 days for non-life insurance policies and premiums due for payment within the ECQ period, the Government Service Insurance System (GSIS) has adopted the provision on "cover notes" under the Insurance Code, which allows the extension of expiring policies during the ECQ, in order to prevent any gap in insurance coverage. As of 13 April 2020, a total of 224 cover notes have been issued to the beneficiaries. Moreover, the GSIS has granted a total of Php400.30 Million in emergency loans to a total of 24,924 active

members and old-age pensioners nationwide since it started rolling out its assistance program last 13 April 2020.

As of 23 April 2020, the Local Water Utilities Administration has approved the requests for suspension of loan amortization of a total of 16 water districts nationwide.

Extension of Submission of Documents, Deadlines, and Renewal of Permits

Pursuant to Section 4(z)⁴⁹ of RA No. 11469, various government agencies have extended the deadline for application for renewal of licenses and permits and offered new modes to file documents within their respective regulatory jurisdictions, as shown in Table 12 below.

The DOF-Bureau of Local Government Finance monitored that 198 out of 1,715 LGUs have voluntarily extended their deadlines⁵⁰ for payment of taxes, fees, and charges.

Further, the DOF and the DILG are currently finalizing a JMC on the adoption of temporary emergency measures which include moving statutory deadlines and timelines for the filing and submission of documents, payment of taxes, fees, and other charges at the LGU level. In the meantime, the DILG is continuously monitoring compliance of LGUs with the directive concerning the Provision of Temporary Economic Relief to Individuals and Businesses in LGUs which includes the relaxation of the imposition of fines and extension of statutory deadlines and timelines for payment of, among others, real property tax, business tax, and other charges set by law or local ordinances due and demandable by the end of the first quarter of the year.

Fiscal Measures of the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP)

The BSP waived transaction fees for participants of the Philippine Payment and Settlement System (PhilPaSS) from 13 to 30 April 2020.⁵¹ The BSP also recognized loans granted to MSMEs as alternative compliance with the reserve requirement imposed

on banks, quasi-banks, and trust departments.⁵² This will allow banks to tap into their funds with the BSP for targeted lending to the MSME sector.

Budgetary Measures to Fund COVID-19 Effort

Pursuant to Section 4(v)⁵³ of RA No. 11469, out of the PhP246.283 Billion total pooled savings from discontinued programs, activities and projects (P/A/Ps) and abandoned Special Purpose Funds reported by the DBM last week, the following allotments and cash allocations have already been released as of 23 April 2020 to the following agencies:

To prevent unnecessary expenses in these trying times, the DBM also issued National Budget Circular No. 580 last 22 April 2020 on the adoption of austerity measures by the government, wherein national government agencies, including SUCs and government-owned or -controlled corporations (GOCCs), receiving budgetary appropriations under the FY 2020 GAA and the FY 2019 Continuing Appropriations, shall discontinue at least 10% of the total released allotments for Maintenance and Other

Operating Expenses and Capital Outlays earmarked for certain items, effective 01 April 2020.

As of 23 April 2020, the DOF has collected PhP128.72 Billion in dividends, fees, returns of unutilized subsidies, and other remittances from various GOCCs. Of these, PhP90.67 Billion has been remitted to the Bureau of the Treasury since 24 March 2020. This is the highest amount ever collected in a span of one (1) month.

IV. Responsive and Sustainable Recovery Plan

The Final Report of the TWG on Anticipatory and Forward Planning (TWG Report) was submitted to the IATF on 22 April 2020. Said report outlines the three (3) phases of the government's response against the threat of COVID-19, namely: (1) response, (2) mitigation, and (3) transition to the new normal.

In the response phase, the strategies focus on strengthening the health system by increasing the number of COVID-19 testing, contact tracing, quarantine facilities, hospital beds, and medical equipment to curb the transmission of COVID-19. The mitigation phase provides strategies to ensure food security and reduce financial losses. Said strategies seek to define conditions that will allow social and economic activities to proceed while observing the rules set forth by the IATF and the DOH to limit the transmission of COVID-19. The transition to the new normal phase directly responds to the comments of some Senators to engage a whole-of-government approach in formulating programs under the new normal scenario, provide an Economic Risk Assessment Plan, and to study the possible resumption of high-value sectors with a low risk of spreading the virus.

Aligned with adopting a whole-of-nation approach, the NEDA is set to convene inter-agency committees wherein departments, agencies, offices, LGUs, and local development councils shall submit their priority programs and projects and identify their respective budget priorities for FY 2021 in line with the strategies defined in said TWG Report.

The Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) shared with the Board of Investments (BOI), data⁵⁵ from its establishment-based survey to assist the BOI in formulating measures to mitigate the adverse economic impact of the ECQ on investments. It is likewise currently conducting its Labor Force Survey (LFS) to provide policy makers with relevant information on the impact of COVID-19 on employment and number of hours of work during the ECQ period. The LFS also included questions for NEDA's Rapid Assessment Survey on the impact of COVID-19 on consumers to enable policymakers to adopt responsive measures to aid consumers and boost the economy.

To be able to adapt to a "new normal" in carrying out its mandate of providing skills, employment and livelihood to Filipinos after the pandemic, the TESDA espouses *OPLAN TESDA Abot Lahat: TVET Towards a New Normal*, which is consistent with the NEDA's three-phase program of intervention proposal for the mitigation of the social and economic impact of COVID-19. The Operational Plan is anchored on the three (3) phases of possible quarantine restrictions and periods: Survival (during ECQ), Transition (modified community quarantine after the lifting of ECQ), and Structural (barangay community quarantine).

The CHED is also in discussion with SUCs and private HEIs on flexible learning plans and arrangements in preparation for possible post-ECQ scenarios.

To aid in the development of LGU post-rehabilitation plans, the DILG has undertaken the consolidation of directives and issuances pertaining to COVID-19 and the mapping out of provisions for interventions to enable LGUs to address the adverse effects of the pandemic. Additionally, the Local Government Academy has undertaken the conduct of a focus group discussion with the DILG central and regional officials and Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Officers, guided by the UP Resilience Institute, on the formulation of a proposed Protocol for COVID Rehabilitation and Recovery Framework.

¹ **Section 4(c).** Provide an emergency subsidy to around eighteen (18) million low income households: *Provided, That* the subsidy shall amount to a minimum of Five thousand pesos (P5,000) to a maximum of Eight thousand pesos (P8,000) a month for two (2) months: *Provided, further, That* the subsidy shall be computed based on the prevailing regional minimum wage rates: *Provided, finally, That* the subsidy received from the current conditional cash transfer program and rice subsidy shall be taken into consideration in the computation of the emergency subsidy as provided for in this Act.

² **Section 4(cc).** Implement an expanded and enhanced Pantawid Pamilya Pilipino Program, responsive to the need posed by the crisis, and provision of an assistance program, whether in cash or non-cash, whichever is more practicable, where the Secretary of Social Welfare and Development, or the Secretary of Labor and Employment, when relevant, shall transfer cash, cash voucher, or goods through the LGUs or directly to households who have no incomes or savings to draw from, including households working in the informal economy and those who are not currently recipients of the current Pantawid Pamilya Pilipino Program, of an amount adequate to restore capacity to purchase basic food and other essential items during the duration of the quarantine. To carry out this subsection, the Secretary of the Department of Social Welfare and Development and the Secretary of the Department of Labor and Employment may approve the temporary emergency standards of eligibility and level of benefits.
