EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Constitution, Article 2, Section 18 provides: "The State affirms labor as a primary social economic force. It shall protect the rights of workers and promote their welfare."

In its 22-point labor and employment agenda, the government is prioritizing investments in the country's no. 1 resource, its human resource, in an atmosphere of industrial peace and social justice.

Hence, this bill seeks to direct the Secretary of Labor and Employment, subject to the availability of appropriations, to make grants to local government units to carry out employment training programs to aid unemployed individuals in securing employment in a new area of expertise, particularly in emerging markets and industries (such as green technologies).

- 7 (c) Conditions. As a condition of receiving a grant under this Act, a grant recipient
 8 shall allocate not less than eighty percent (80%) of the funding allocated under the grant to
 9 wages, benefits, and support activities, including child care services to individuals receiving
 10 compensated training under such a grant; and institute a program to aid newly trained
 11 participants in securing employment in their new area of expertise.
 - SECTION 3. *Authorization of Appropriations*. There are authorized to be appropriated such sums as may be necessary to carry out this Act.
- SECTION 4. Separability Clause. If any provision of this Act shall be declared unconstitutional or invalid, any other provision not affected thereby shall remain in full force and effect.
- SECTION 5. Repealing Clause. All laws, decrees, orders, rules and regulations, or parts thereof inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed or amended accordingly.
- SECTION 6. *Effectivity*. This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
