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## Introduced by Senator Miriam Defensor Santiago

## **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

The Philippines is said to be vulnerable to a variety of natural hazards, such as typhoons, periodic droughts, earthquakes, and floods. Further, an ongoing conflict in the southern Philippines has displaced hundreds of thousands of people over the last three decades. <sup>1</sup>

According to Citizen's Disaster Response Center (CDRC), the Philippines is ranked second to China in the top ten list of countries most affected by natural disasters in 2009.<sup>2</sup>

There is an immediate need for comprehensive and coordinated emergency preparedness planning support for public schools nationwide. Historically, public schools have:

- 1. had limited roles in the emergency preparedness planning process administered by other government agencies;
- 2. not received priority consideration in that process; and
- 3. had minimal access to funds allocated to emergency preparedness.

The grants made under this bill will enable public schools to take an active role in emergency planning and give them access to the broad range of skills and expertise of the many other government agencies involved in emergency planning and preparedness.<sup>3</sup>
