EXPLANATORY NOTE

As of 2005, the prevalence of underweight Filipino Children age 0 to 5 years old reached 24.6%. Although this is lower than year 2003's 26.9%, data shows that wide disparities exist across regions ranging from a low of 16.2% in the National Capital Region (NCR) and a high of 38% for the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM). In the long-term, these children are more susceptible to infection and disease, and usually with more serious outcomes due to the effects of malnutrition. Consequently too, they absent themselves from school more frequently and have lower scholastic performance.

The most effective means to target childhood malnutrition is through the public school network. Unfortunately, although there are current school feeding programs administered by the Department of Education, these programs rely heavily on allocations from budgets of senators or congressmen, or donations from private individuals and corporations. There is therefore an urgent need to immediately provide for an institutionalized and legislated child nutrition program targeting public elementary schools throughout the country.

Through the Child Nutrition Act, a budgetary allocation shall be made to institutionalize a School Feeding Program throughout the public elementary school network, incentives shall also be given to private companies donating milk, juices, food and the like to the School Feeding Program.

For the abovementioned reasons, the immediate approval of this bill is earnestly sought.

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13 AN ACT
14 PROVIDING FOR A SCHOOL NUTRITION PROGRAM
15 AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES
16

17 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in*
18 *Congress assembled:*
19

20 SECTION 1. **Short Title.** This Act shall be known as the "**Child Nutrition Act of the**
21 **Philippines.**"
22

23 SEC. 2. **Purpose.** In recognition of the demonstrated relationship between food and
24 good nutrition and the capacity of children to develop and learn, school feeding and other child
25 nutrition programs shall be extended, expanded, and strengthened under the authority of the
26 Secretary of Agriculture as a measure to safeguard the health and well-being of the nation's
27 children, and to encourage the domestic consumption of agricultural and other foods in order to
28 meet more effectively the nutritional needs of our children.
29

30 SEC. 3. **School Feeding Program.** A school nutrition program (the "Program") is hereby
31 established, where the National Nutrition Council ("NNC"), the Department of Education,
32 ("DepED") and the Department of Health ("DOH") shall initiate, maintain and expand a system of
33 distribution of milk and fortified snack foods to public elementary school entrants for a minimum
34 of one hundred twenty (120) feeding days, five (5) times a week and vitamin supplements for a
35 period and in such dosages as may be determined by the DOH. The Program shall be
36 administered inside the classroom. The Program likewise aims to make school entrants aware
37 of the importance of good nutrition by providing relevant and user-friendly nutrition information
38 and education materials. Provided, that the Program shall begin within the first two weeks of the
39 school year.

40 For purposes of this act, a school entrant is defined as a student enrolled in the first
41 grade.
42

43 SEC. 4. **Objectives of the Program.** The Program shall:

- 44 a) Provide fresh milk to public elementary schools through the cooperation of local
45 cooperatives and dairy corporations;
46 b) Provide vitamin supplements in such dosages and for such a duration as the DOH
47 may determine most beneficial to the child's health and nutritional well-being;

- 1 c) Target all public school entrants regardless of their nutritional status;
- 2 d) Each school entrant will receive milk and fortified snacks, based on a menu
3 determined by the NNC in conjunction with the Department of Science and
4 Technology to consist of a combination of foods meeting the minimum nutritional
5 requirements on the basis of tested nutritional research, except that the minimum
6 nutritional requirements shall be measured by not less than the weekly average of
7 the nutrient content of the meals;
- 8 e) Beneficiaries shall eat their snack inside the classroom during recess time and shall
9 not be allowed to bring home his ration; Provided, that if a school child was absent,
10 the school feeding coordinator in the school shall insure that his share for that day
11 shall be added to his share the next feeding day when he reports back to class;
12 Provided, further, that only twice the usual serving portion shall be allowed to an
13 absentee school child; Provided, finally, that in case of prolonged absence, both the
14 milk and/or snack food shall be given on a staggered basis, doubling his share every
15 feeding day until the school child catches up with the others;
- 16 f) Beneficiaries shall take their vitamin supplements inside the classroom
17 simultaneously with the fortified snack.
- 18

19 **SEC. 5. Incentives to Private Companies.** Local dairy cooperatives, private agricultural
20 companies and other companies donating food, milk, juices, vitamin supplements or other
21 similar products (the "Product"), are hereby allowed to deduct from its gross income earned
22 two hundred percent (200%) of the value of the Product, provided that:

- 23 a) the donation is duly approved by the Secretary of Education upon recommendation
24 of the Director of the NNC, in case of food products, and the Secretary of Health, in
25 case of vitamin products; and
- 26 b) the deduction shall not exceed twenty percent (20%) of gross income earned.
- 27

28 **SEC. 6. Social Mobilization and Preparation.** Orientation-training shall be held among
29 DepED health and nutrition unit personnel at the regional and division levels, in order to orient
30 them on the Program's objectives and mechanics and generate support to the Program.

31 An orientation-workshop shall be conducted at the district and school levels for district
32 and school level heads. The output shall be the school plan of action containing the roles and
33 responsibilities of the concerned school personnel.

34 Training and orientation shall be conducted by the DepED core of trainers, with
35 personnel trained at the schools division level being responsible for training staff at the district
36 and municipal level; and those trained at the municipal level training the implementers and
37 feeding coordinators at the school level.

38 The feeding coordinator shall conduct the briefing among parents and children, including
39 determining the baseline knowledge of the children and their parents on nutrition through a pre-
40 test and delineating the roles among parents during the duration of the feeding.

41 Feeding paraphernalia consisting of placemats, napkin, spoon and fork, small bowl,
42 saucer, mugs and drinking glass should be brought by the pupils.

1 **SEC. 7. Simultaneous Examination.** A simultaneous health and dental examination
2 and deworming of the participating children shall be done during the meeting-orientation of
3 parents. These shall be conducted by the division/district medical staff and nurses or the Rural
4 Health Unit in the community. Pupils found with defects/ailments shall be given proper treatment
5 or referred to hospitals. Classroom advisers shall note observations regarding the pupils' health
6 condition. Height and weight of pupils shall be taken before the Program and every month after
7 the start thereof.

8
9 **SEC. 8. Procurement, Storage and Handling of Food Items and Vitamin**
10 **Supplements.** Procurement of the fortified snack foods shall be done by DepED in coordination
11 with the NNC, and in cases where rice or sugar will be distributed, in coordination with the
12 National Food Authority (NFA), while that of fresh milk shall be procured by the National Dairy
13 Authority (NDA). Vitamin supplements shall be procured by the DOH.

14 All public elementary schools shall submit to DepED the number of school entrants
15 expected by April 15 of each year. The list shall be consolidated by DepED and used as a basis
16 for procuring fortified snack foods. DepED shall insure the food commodities arrive on time to
17 the schools through the district schools, which shall be the designated pick-up point. Public
18 elementary schools shall pick up the commodities after the fifth day of each month even without
19 notice from the district school.

20 DepED shall furnish the DOH with the number of school entrants per district by April 30
21 of each year. The list shall be used by the DOH as a basis for procuring vitamin supplements.
22 DOH shall insure delivery to the district school of vitamin supplements needed for that district
23 within the first five (5) days of each month.

24 For the fresh milk, DepED shall furnish the NDA with the number of children per school
25 located in the twelve (12) key dairy development areas of the country, with local dairy
26 cooperatives delivering fresh milk daily to schools to insure freshness and safety. The NDA shall
27 make payment upon the local dairy cooperative upon submission of a certification issued by the
28 public elementary school stating that fresh milk was received in good condition. The fresh milk
29 should be individually packed in sealed plastic, provided with straw and properly packed in ice
30 to avoid spoilage during transport. Provided, that the local dairy cooperative shall be responsible
31 to insure the safety of the fresh milk before it reaches the school.

32
33 **SEC. 9. Role of the Secretary of Agriculture.** The Secretary of Agriculture shall
34 provide technical assistance and training, including technical assistance and training in the
35 preparation of foods high in complex carbohydrates and lower-fat versions of foods commonly
36 used in the Program, to schools participating in the Program to assist the schools in complying
37 with the nutritional requirements prescribed by the NNC in coordination with the DOST and in
38 providing appropriate meals to children with medically certified special dietary needs.

39
40 **SEC. 10. Use in Program of Food in Abundance or Donated.** Each school
41 participating under the Program shall, insofar as practicable, utilize in its Program foods
42 designated from time to time by the Secretary of Agriculture as being in abundance, either

1 nationally or in the school area, or foods donated by private entities with the consent of the
2 DepED and NNC. Provided, that smuggled agricultural products which have been seized by the
3 proper authorities and which are certified by the DOH as fit for consumption may be donated by
4 the proper authorities for this Program.

5
6 **SEC. 11. Local Government Participation.** Local Government Units where school
7 districts are located shall provide a counterpart fund of at least twenty percent (20%) of the cost
8 incurred for Programs implemented within their jurisdiction.

9
10 **SEC. 12. Priority Areas.** In case of shortage of funds, the implementation of the
11 Program shall first be undertaken in provinces where malnutrition rates are most severe, as may
12 be determined by the NNC.

13
14 **SEC. 13. Rules and Regulations.** The DepED, NNC and DOST shall draw the
15 implementing rules and regulations of this Act within thirty (30) days from the effectivity of this
16 Act.

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18 **SEC. 14. Appropriations.** An initial sum of One Hundred Million Pesos
19 (P100,000,000.00) is hereby appropriated for the first year of implementation of the Program.
20 Thereafter, all appropriations shall be taken from the annual appropriations of the NNC.
21 Provided, that all administrative expenses of the Program shall be taken from the DepED annual
22 appropriations.

23
24 **SEC. 15. Effectivity.** This law shall take effect within fifteen (15) days from publication in
25 a newspaper of general circulation.
