

# AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR RESEARCH WITH RESPECT TO LYME DISEASE AND OTHER TICK-BORNE DISEASES

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

The Constitution, Article 3, Section 15 provides:

The State shall protect and promote the right to health of the people and instill health consciousness among them.

Lyme disease is an inflammatory disorder that is transmitted by ticks. The disease causes fatigue and malaise, and in worse cases, arthritis, neurologic abnormalities, and heart block.<sup>1</sup>

In April 2014, the World Health Organization (WHO) issued an alert that more than half of the world's population was at risk of getting vector-borne diseases such as Lyme disease, malaria, dengue, leishmaniasis, schistosomiasis and yellow fever transmitted by insects such as mosquitoes, flies, and ticks and other vectors such as water snails.

The WHO called for a renewed focus on vector control and provision of safe water, sanitation, and hygiene tools, which were among the key strategies for the control, elimination, and eradication of neglected tropical diseases.

Vector-borne diseases, such as Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases, affect the poorest populations, particularly in areas where there is a lack of adequate housing, safe drinking water, and sanitation. Malnourished people and those with weak immune system are susceptible to these diseases.

According to the WHO, within the past two decades, many vector-borne diseases reemerged or spread to other parts of the world. This was attributed to environmental changes,

increase in international travel and trade, changes in agricultural practices, and rapid unplanned urbanization.<sup>2</sup>

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This bill provides for government research for Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases to control and prevent these diseases.

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# Introduced by Senator Miriam Defensor Santiago

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress Assembled:

# 1AN ACT2TO PROVIDE FOR RESEARCH WITH RESPECT TO LYME DISEASE3AND OTHER TICK-BORNE DISEASES

SECTION 1. *Short Title.* – This Act may be cited as the "Tick-Borne Disease Research
Accountability and Transparency Act."

6 SECTION 2. *Research.* – The Secretary of Health shall conduct or support 7 epidemiological, basic, translational, and clinical research regarding Lyme disease and other 8 tick-borne diseases.

9 SECTION 3. *Working Group.* – (a) Establishment. – The Secretary of Health shall 10 establish a permanent working group, to be known as the Interagency Lyme and Tick-Borne 11 Disease Working Group (hereinafter referred to as "Working Group"), to review all efforts 12 within the Department of Health concerning Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases to 13 ensure interagency coordination, minimize overlap, and examine research priorities.

- (b) Responsibilities. The Working Group shall—
- 15(1) not later than 24 months after the date of enactment of this Act, and every1624 months thereafter, develop or update a summary of—
- 17 (A) ongoing Lyme disease and other tick-borne disease research
  18 related to causes, prevention, treatment, surveillance, diagnosis,
  19 diagnostics, duration of illness, intervention, and access to services

5 SECTION 4. *Strategic Plan.* – Not later than three (3) years after the date of enactment of 6 this Act, and every five (5) years thereafter, the Secretary shall submit to Congress a strategic 7 plan, informed by the most recent summary under this Act, for the conduct and support of Lyme 8 disease and tick-borne disease research, including—

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(a) proposed budgetary requirements;

10 (b) a plan for improving outcomes of Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases, 11 including progress related to chronic or persistent symptoms and chronic or persistent infection 12 and co-infections;

13 (c) a plan for improving diagnosis, treatment, and prevention;

14 (d) appropriate benchmarks to measure progress on achieving the improvements15 described in paragraphs (b) and (c); and

(e) a plan to disseminate each summary under this Act and other relevant information
developed by the Working Group to the public, including health care providers, public health
departments, and other relevant medical groups.

19 SECTION 5. *Implementing Rules and Regulations.* – Within sixty (60) days from 20 effectivity of this Act, the Secretary of Health shall promulgate the necessary rules and 21 regulations to implement this Act.

SECTION 6. *Appropriations*. – The funds needed to implement this Act shall be sourced
 from the regular appropriations of the Department of Health.

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SECTION 7. Separability Clause. – If any provision, or part hereof, is held invalid or
 unconstitutional, the remainder of the law or the provision not otherwise affected shall remain
 valid and subsisting.

SECTION 8. *Repealing Clause.* – Any law, presidential decree or issuance, executive order, letter of instruction, administrative order, rule, or regulation contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this Act is hereby repealed, modified, or amended accordingly.

7 SECTION 9. *Effectivity*. – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication
8 in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
