RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE PROPER SENATE COMMITTEE TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE REPORT THAT UNMONITORED TOURISM-RELATED ACTIVITIES CONTINUE TO DAMAGE BORACAY CORAL REEFS

WHEREAS, the Constitution, Article 2, Section 16 provides: "The State shall protect and advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology in accord with the rhythm and harmony of nature";

WHEREAS, the *Philippine Daily Inquirer* on 9 June 2015 reported that unmonitored tourism-related activities such as diving and snorkeling caused coral reef cover in Boracay to decline by 70.5 percent from 1988 to 2011;

WHEREAS, the Inquirer was quoting the Coastal Ecosystem Conservation and Adaptive Management (CECAM), which includes data from 2010 to 2015, gathered by researchers and scientists from Japanese International Cooperation Agency (JICA), the Tokyo Institute of Technology, and the University of the Philippines;

WHEREAS, the highest decrease in the 23-year period was recorded in recent years, from 2008 to 2011, when tourist arrivals reportedly went up by 38.4 percent;

WHEREAS, the study said corals play an important role in protecting the beach from erosion by reducing the impact of the waves;

WHEREAS, the Inquirer also quoted Filipino scientist Miguel Fortes, saying that the discharge of untreated water along the shore may have contributed to coral reef deterioration;

WHEREAS, Congress should take into account the findings of the study in crafting legislation that will mitigate the environmental impact of tourism activities;

WHEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE PHILIPPINE SENATE to direct the proper Senate committee to conduct an inquiry, in aid of legislation, on the report that unmonitored tourism-related activities continue to damage Boracay coral reefs.
