

## Introduced by Senator Joseph Victor G. Ejercito

## RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE PROPER SENATE COMMITTEE, TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY IN AID OF LEGISLATION OVER THE ISSUE ON THE DUMPING OF TOXIC AND HAZARDOUS WASTE FROM CANADA

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 15 of the 1987 Philippine Constitution states that, "the State shall protect and promote the right to health of the people and instill health consciousness among them."

**WHEREAS,** Article II, Section 16 of the 1987 Philippine Constitution further states that, "the State shall protect and advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology in accord with the rhythm and harmony of nature."

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WHEREAS, the Basel Convention on the Control of Transboundary Movements of Hazardous Wastes and their Disposal (Basel Convention) requires prior informed consent before any export or import is allowed to or from another party. The Exporting State is obliged to get the written approval of the Importing state for such a movement to be legal. In that way, each party has the right to ban any import or export of hazardous or other wastes;<sup>1</sup>

WHEREAS, Canada and the Philippines are among the one hundred eighty (180) signatories in the Basel Convention;<sup>2</sup>

WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 6969 or the Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990, provides the legal framework for the country's program to control and manage the importation, manufacture, processing, distribution, use, transport, treatment and disposal of toxic substances and hazardous and nuclear wastes;<sup>3</sup>

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WHEREAS, furthermore, Republic Act 9003 or the Philippine Ecological Solid
Waste Management Act of 2000 provides the legal framework for the country's
systematic, comprehensive, and ecological solid waste management program
that shall ensure protection of public health and the environment;<sup>4</sup>

- 1 WHEREAS, fifty (50) container vans from Canada arrived in six (6) batches last
- 2 June to August 2013. Chronic Inc., a company based in Whitby, Ontario,
- 3 Canada declared that it contained "scrap plastic materials for recycling" but
- 4 turned out, upon inspection, to be toxic and hazardous waste stuffed in
- 5 household waste, including adult diapers and kitchen waste;5
- 6 WHEREAS, moreover, another forty eight (48) container vans at the Manila
- 7 International Container Port (MICP) were inspected by the Bureau of Customs
- 8 (BOC) and appears to contain waste plastic materials imported by Live Green
- 9 Enterprise, from Ontario, Canada which arrived in four (4) batches last
- 10 December 2013-January 2014;6
- 11 WHEREAS, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR)
- 12 had initially asked the Canadian government to take back their trash citing the
- 13 Basel Convention. However, the demand was dropped "for the sake of
- 14 diplomatic relations"7.
- 15 WHEREAS, under the Basel Convention, it is the obligation of the Exporting
- 16 State, in this case Canada, to take back the garbage thirty (30) days from the
- time it has been informed about the "illegal traffic";
- 18 WHEREAS, no less than the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) Assistant
- 19 Secretary Charles Jose said that "re-exporting the trash is no longer part of the
- 20 solution since Canada has no obligation to take it back. It is purely a
- 21 commercial transaction."8
- 22 WHEREAS, despite the clear violation of international and domestic laws of the
- 23 Philippines, the toxic and hazardous waste is still rotting in the Philippine soil,
- 24 thereby endangering the lives and health of the public;
- 25 WHEREAS, the importation of the said wastes through Chronic Plastics,
- 26 Philippines-based importer of the fifty (50) container vans, raises doubt as to
- 27 the procedures and measures carried out by the Bureau of Customs (BOC);
- 28 WHEREAS, since the illegal dumping involves public interest, the government
- 29 should give utmost consideration to this issue in order to protect our country
- 30 from being a dumpsite of hazardous waste;
- 31 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as it is hereby resolved, for the Senate
- 32 to direct the proper committee TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY IN AID OF
- 33 LEGISLATION ON THE ILLEGAL DUMPING OF TOXIC WASTE FROM
- 34 CANADA.
