AN ACT AMENDING EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 209, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE FAMILY CODE OF THE PHILIPPINES, ARTICLES 221 AND 236

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Family Code of the Philippines does not extend the liability to children or wards between eighteen and twenty one years of age. It merely provides for the civil liability of the parents and other persons, exercising parental authority, for the injuries and damages caused by the acts or omissions of their unemancipated children.

Hence, this bill seeks to amend Executive Order No. 209, otherwise known as The Family Code of the Philippines, Articles 221 and 236.

This bill is a product of the public hearings conducted by the Committee on Constitutional Amendments, Revision of Codes and Laws during the Tenth Congress.¹

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AN ACT AMENDING EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 209, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE FAMILY CODE OF THE PHILIPPINES, ARTICLES 221 AND 236

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1	SECTION 1. The Family Code, Article 221, is hereby amended to read as follows:
2	Art. 221. Parents and other persons exercising parental authority
3	shall be civilly liable for [the-injuries-and-damages] DELICT AND
4	QUASI-DELICT caused by [the acts or omissions of] their unemancipated
5	children living in their company and under their parental authority subject
6	to the appropriate defenses provided by law.
7	THE SAME LIABILITY EXTENDS TO CHILDREN OR
8	WARDS BETWEEN EIGHTEEN AND TWENTY-ONE YEARS OF
9	AGE; PROVDED THAT THEY CONTINUE TO LIVE WITH THEIR
10	PARENTS OR REMAIN IN THE COMPANY AND UNDER THE
11	AUTHORITY OF THEIR GUARDIANS, AS THE CASE MAY BE.

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SHALL ONLY BE SUBSIDIARY.

1	SECTION 2. Article 236 of the same Code is also hereby amended to read as
2	follows:
3	Art. 236. Emancipation shall terminate parental authority over the
4	person and property of the child who shall then be qualified and responsible
5	for all acts of civil life, save the exceptions established by existing laws in
6	special cases.
7	Contracting marriage shall require parental consent until the age of
8	twenty-one.
9	[Nothing-in-this-Code shall-be construed to derogate from the duty or
10	responsibility-of-parents-and-guardians-for-children-and-wards-below
11	twenty-one-years-of-age-mentioned-in-the-second-and-third-paragraphs-of
12	Article 2180 of the Civil Code.]
13	SECTION 3. Repealing Clause All laws, decrees, orders, and issuances, or
14	portions thereof, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, are hereby
15	repealed, amended or modified accordingly.
16	SECTION 4. Effectivity Clause. – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after
17	its publication in the Official Gazette or in two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
