AN ACT IMPROVING THE MENTAL AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES IN COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY CAMPUSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Constitution, Article 2, Section 15, provides:

The State shall protect and promote the right to health of the people and instill health consciousness among them.

This bill seeks to authorize the Chair of the Commission on Higher Education to award competitive grants to eligible entities to improve mental and behavioral health services and outreach in college and university campuses.

It further aims to increase access to, and reduce the stigma associated with, mental health services so as to ensure that college students have the support necessary to successfully complete their studies.

The bill also directs the Secretary of Health to establish a College Campus Task

Force, under the National Center for Mental Health, to discuss mental and behavioral
health concerns in college and university campuses.

AN ACT IMPROVING THE MENTAL AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES IN COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY CAMPUSES

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as the "Mental Health on 1 Campus Improvement Act." 2 3 SECTION 2. Grants to Improve Mental and Behavioral Health in College Campuses. -4 5 (A) Purpose. - The purposes of this Act, with respect to college and university 6 settings, are to: (1) Increase access to mental and behavioral health services; 7 8 (2) Foster and improve the prevention of mental and behavioral health disorders, and the promotion of mental health; 9 10 (3) Improve the identification and treatment for students at risk; (4) Improve collaboration and the development of appropriate levels of 11 12 mental and behavioral health care; 13 (5) Reduce the stigma for students with mental health disorders and 14 enhance their access to mental health services; and

(6) Improve the efficacy of outreach efforts.

1	(B) Grants The Chair of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) shall
2	award competitive grants to eligible entities to improve mental and behavioral health
3	services and outreach in college and university campuses.
4	(C) Eligibility To be eligible to receive a grant, an entity shall:
5	(1) Be an institution of higher education; and
6	(2) Submit to the Chair an application at such time, in such manner, and
7	containing such information as the Chair may require, including the information
8	required under paragraph (D).
9	(D) Application An application for a grant under this Act shall include:
10	(1) A description of the population to be targeted by the program carried
11	out under the grant, the particular mental and behavioral health needs of the
12	students involved, and the private and public institutional resources available for
13	meeting the needs of such students at the time the application is submitted;
14	(2) An outline of the objectives of the program carried out under the grant;
15	(3) A description of activities, services, and training to be provided under
16	the program, including planned outreach strategies to reach students not currently
17	seeking services;
18	(4) A plan to seek input from community mental health providers, when
19	available, community groups, and other public and private entities in carrying out
20	the program;
21	(5) A plan, when applicable, to meet the specific mental and behavioral
22	health needs of veterans attending institutions of higher education;
23	(6) A description of the methods to be used to evaluate the outcomes and

effectiveness of the program; and

1	(7) An assurance that grant funds will be used to supplement, and not
2	supplant, any other government funds available to carry out activities of the type
3	carried out under the grant.
4	(E) Special Considerations In awarding grants under this Act, the Chair shall
5	give special consideration to applications that describe programs to be carried out under
6	the grant that:
7	(1) Demonstrate the greatest need for new or additional mental and
8	behavioral health services, in part by providing information on current ratios of
9	students to mental and behavioral health professionals;
0	(2) Propose effective approaches for initiating or expanding campus
1	services and supports using evidence-based practices;
2	(3) Target traditionally underserved populations and populations most at
13	risk;
14	(4) Where possible, demonstrate an awareness of, and a willingness to,
15	coordinate with a community mental health center or other mental health resource
16	in the community, to support screening and referral of students requiring intensive
17	services;
18	(5) Identify how the college or university will address psychiatric
19	emergencies, including how information will be communicated with families or
20	other appropriate parties; and
21	(6) Demonstrate the greatest potential for replication and dissemination.
22	(F) Use of Funds Amounts received under a grant may be used to:
23	(1) Provide mental and behavioral health services to students, including
24	prevention, promotion of mental health, screening, early intervention, assessment,
25	treatment, management, and education services relating to the mental and

behavioral health of students;

1	(2) Provide outreach services to notify students about the existence of
2	mental and behavioral health services;
3	(3) Educate families, peers, faculty, staff, and communities to increase
4	awareness of mental health issues;
5	(4) Support student groups on campus that engage in activities to educate
6	students, reduce stigma surrounding mental and behavioral disorders, and promote
7	mental health wellness;
8	(5) Employ appropriately trained staff;
9	(6) Expand mental health training through internship, post-doctorate, and
10	residency programs;
11	(7) Develop and support evidence-based and emerging best practices,
12	including a focus on culturally- and linguistically-appropriate best practices; and
13	(8) Evaluate and disseminate best practices to other colleges and
14	universities.
15	(G) Duration of Grants A grant shall be awarded for a period not to exceed
16	three years.
17	(H) Evaluation and Reporting. –
18	(1) Evaluation Not later than 18 months after the date on which a grant
19	is received, the eligible entity involved shall submit to the Chair the results of the
20	evaluation conducted by the entity concerning the effectiveness of the activities
21	carried out under the grant and plans for the sustainability of such efforts.
22	(2) Report Not later than two years after the date of the effectivity of
23	this Act, the Chair shall submit to the appropriate committees of Congress a report
24	concerning the results of:
25	(i) The evaluations conducted under paragraph (1), and

1	(ii) All evaluation conducted by the Chair to analyze the
2	effectiveness and efficacy of the activities conducted with grants under this
3	Act.
4	(I) Technical Assistance The Chair may provide technical assistance to
5	grantees in carrying out this Section.
6	SECTION 3. Mental and Behavioral Health Outreach and Education in College
7	Campuses. –
8	(A) Purpose It is the purpose of this Section to increase access to, and reduce
9	the stigma associated with, mental health services so as to ensure that college students
10	have the support necessary to successfully complete their studies.
11	(B) National Public Education Campaign The Chair shall convene an
12	interagency, public-private sector working group to plan, establish, and begin
13	coordinating and evaluating a targeted public education campaign that is designed to
14	focus on mental and behavioral health in college campuses. Such campaign shall be
15	designed to:
16	(1) Improve the general understanding of mental health and mental health
17	
	disorders;
18	(2) Encourage help-seeking behaviors relating to the promotion of mental
19	health, prevention of mental health disorders, and treatment of such disorders;
20	(3) Make the connection between mental and behavioral health and
21	academic success; and
22	(4) Assist the general public in identifying the early warning signs and
23	reducing the stigma of mental illness.
24	(C) Composition. – The working group under paragraph (B) shall include:
25	(1) Mental health consumers, including students and family members.

1	(2) Representatives of colleges and universities;
2	(3) Representatives of national mental and behavioral health and college
3	associations;
4	(4) Representatives of college health promotion and prevention
5	organizations;
6	(5) Representatives of mental health providers, including community
7	mental health centers; and
8	(6) Representatives of private- and public-sector groups with experience in
9	the development of effective public health education campaigns.
10	(D) Plan The working group under paragraph (B) shall develop a plan that
11	shall:
12	(1) Target promotional and educational efforts to the college age
13	population and individuals who are employed in college and university settings,
14	including the use of roundtables;
15	(2) Develop and propose the implementation of research-based public
16	health messages and activities;
17	(3) Provide support for local efforts to reduce stigma by using the National
18	Center for Mental Health as a primary point of contact for information,
19	publications, and service program referrals; and
20	(4) Develop and propose the implementation of a social marketing
21	campaign that is targeted at the college population and individuals who are
22	employed in college and university settings.

1	SECTION 4. Interagency Working Group on College Mental Health
2	(A) Establishment The Secretary of Health shall establish a College Campus
3	Task Force, under the National Center for Mental Health, to discuss mental and
4	behavioral health concerns in college and university campuses.
5	(B) Membership The Task Force shall be composed of a representative from
6	each department that has jurisdiction over, or is affected by, mental health and education
7	policies and projects, including the Commission on Higher Education and the Department
8	of Health.
9	(C) Duties The Task Force shall:
10	(1) Serve as a centralized mechanism to coordinate a national effort to:
11	(i) Discuss and evaluate evidence and knowledge on mental and
12	behavioral health services available to, and the prevalence of mental health
13	illness among, the college age population of the Philippines;
14	(ii) Determine the range of effective, feasible, and comprehensive
15	actions to improve mental and behavioral health in college and university
16	campuses;
17	(iii) Examine and better address the needs of the college age
18	population dealing with mental illness;
19	(iv) Survey government agencies to determine which policies are
20	effective in encouraging, and how best to facilitate outreach without
21	duplicating, efforts relating to mental and behavioral health promotion;
22	(v) To establish specific goals within and across Federal agencies
23	for mental health promotion, including determinations of accountability for
24	reaching those goals;

- 3 SECTION 5. Appropriations. The funds needed for the initial implementation of
- 4 this Act shall be charged against the appropriations of the Commission on Higher
- 5 Education. Thereafter, such amount as may be necessary for its full implementation shall
- 6 be included in the annual General Appropriations Act as a distinct and separate item.
- 7 SECTION 6. Separability Clause. If any provision of this Act is held invalid or
- 8 unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity and effectivity of the other
- 9 provisions hereof.
- SECTION 7. Repealing Clause. All laws, decrees, orders, and issuances, or
- 11 portions thereof, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, are hereby
- 12 repealed, amended or modified accordingly.
- SECTION 8. Effectivity Clause. This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after
- its publication in the Official Gazette or in two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
