- AN ACT PROVIDING FOR COVID-19 RESPONSE AND RECOVERY INTERVENTIONS AND PROVIDING MECHANISMS TO ACCELERATE THE RECOVERY AND BOLSTER THE RESILIENCY OF THE PHILIPPINE ECONOMY, PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- 1 SECTION 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known and
- 2 cited as "Bayanihan to Recover As One Act".
- 3 SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy. It is hereby declared
- 4 the policy of the State to promote a just and dynamic social

order that will ensure the prosperity and independence of 1 the nation and free the people from poverty, particularly in 2 the aftermath of natural and man-made disasters, through 3 policies that provide adequate social services, promote full 4 employment, a rising standard of living, and an improved 5 quality of life for all. Towards this end, and in cognizance 6 of the adverse impact of the 2019 Coronavirus Disease 7 (COVID-19) pandemic to the Philippine economy and 8 society, the State shall likewise establish mechanisms to 9 achieve the following objectives: 10

(a) Reduce the adverse impact of COVID-19 on the
socioeconomic well-being of Filipinos through the provision
of assistance, subsidies and other forms of socioeconomic
relief;

(b) Sustain efforts to test, trace, isolate and treat
COVID-19 cases to mitigate the transmission of the
disease and prevent further loss of lives;

(c) Enhance the capacity of the Philippine health care
system to eliminate, prevent and control disease outbreaks
and pandemics and mitigate the effects of other health or

| 12 | city and municipality, for the people who may opt to use |
| 13 | the bicycle as an alternative mode of transportation to |
| 14 | address health, environment, and traffic concerns; |
| 15 | (h) Promote and protect the collective interests of all |
| 16 | Filipinos in these challenging times; |
| 17 | (i) Optimize the use of science, technology and |
| 18 | innovation in government's response measures; and |

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- (j) Enhance public trust in science and incorporate
 the use of scientific research and technological expertise in
 policy-making process.
- SEC. 3. COVID-19 Response and Recovery Interventions. –
 The following shall be undertaken and implemented as
 COVID-19 response and recovery interventions:

(a) Following World Health Organization (WHO) 7 guidelines and best practices. adoption 8 and implementation of measures to prevent or suppress further 9 transmission and spread of COVID-19 through effective 10 education, detection, protection, and treatment: Provided, 11 That the percentage of the population that will undergo 12 COVID-19 testing shall be in accordance with WHO 13 standards and global benchmark, in areas identified by the 14 Department of Health (DOH) and the Department of the 15 Interior and Local Government (DILG) as epicenters of 16 COVID-19 infections, starting in the National Capital 17 Region, Central Visayas, CALABARZON, and Central 18 Luzon and in other areas where higher possibility of 19 20 transmission of COVID-19 may occur or have occurred.

The DOH shall adopt a COVID-19 disease surveillance 1 protocol that shall define minimum health standards for 2 workplaces and business activities which shall include 3 COVID-19 testing and the establishment of a contact 4 tracing system including personal contact tracing whereby 5 a person maintains a record of the places that he/she had 6 been to and the people he/she had contact with: Provided, 7 That any individual who tested positive for COVID-19 8 through laboratory confirmation at the national reference 9 laboratory, sub-national reference laboratory, or a DOH 10 certified laboratory testing facility shall be automatically 11 treated and if necessary, isolated in a DOH quarantine and 12 isolation facility: *Provided*, *further*, That the Inter-Agency 13 Task Force for the Management of Emerging Infectious 14 Diseases (IATF-EID) shall identify and prioritize the areas 15 and business activities critically impacted and severely 16 affected by COVID-19 and with high probability of COVID-17 19 transmission, and coordinate with the relevant Local 18 Government Units (LGUs) and government agencies for 19 the implementation of the COVID-19 surveillance protocol: 20

Provided, finally, That the DILG, in coordination with the
 LGUs and other government agencies, shall distribute the
 testing kits to DOH-accredited government hospitals that
 can perform testing;

(b) Implementation of an expedited and streamlined 5 accreditation of Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) testing 6 kits and facilitation of prompt testing by public and 7 designated private institutions of suspected and probable 8 COVID-19 cases and those with no symptoms but with 9 relevant travel history, or may have been exposed due to 10 11 the nature of their work or due to their living conditions or had contact with a confirmed, suspected or probable case, 12 compulsory and immediate isolation and 13 and the treatment of confirmed, suspected and probable COVID-19 14 15 patients: Provided. That the cost of testing and treatment 16 for COVID-19 patients shall be covered under the National Health Insurance Program of the Philippine Health 17 Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth): Provided, further, 18 That in addition to testing, isolation and treatment of 19 these patients, the contacts of these patients shall also be 20

immediately and properly traced through the use of 1 efficient technology for data collection and analysis, and by 2 engaging contact tracers from the existing network of 3 workers, parent-leaders 4 barangay health from the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps), and members 5 of duly accredited Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) by 6 7 the respective national government agency;

8 (c) Adoption of a protocol on the conduct of PCR 9 testing for COVID-19. For this purpose, the IATF-EID, in 10 full cooperation with the DOH, the DILG, the Department 11 of Labor and Employment (DOLE), the Department of 12 Trade and Industry (DTI), and the Bureau of Immigration 13 (BI), shall ensure the following:

(1) Adequate number of COVID-19 testing centers 14 that provide available, affordable and accessible testing to 15 the public, subject to reimbursement by PhilHealth under 16 17 existing guidelines: Provided, That people in geographically isolated or highly populated and depressed 18 areas shall be provided the same level of access to COVID-19 19 testing: 20

(2) Hiring of skilled medical technologists, molecular 1 biologists, and other skilled laboratory technicians to 2 conduct COVID-19 testing to achieve an ideal personnel-to-3 laboratory ratio taking into consideration DOH targets. To 4 address the COVID-19 pandemic and in preparation for 5 6 future public health emergencies, biomedical research, 7 training, and programs for skilled medical technologists, molecular biologists and other skilled 8 laboratory technicians shall be implemented starting with the 9 molecular laboratory infrastructure; and 10

(3) Procurement and distribution of supplies for
COVID-19 PCR testing based on, among others, the
current levels and projections of the following:

(i) number of patients and healthcare workers with
severe or critical symptoms and history of travel or
exposure; and

(ii) number of patients and healthcare workers with
mild symptoms, relevant history of travel or exposure, and
considered vulnerable: *Provided*, That LGUs may
implement their own procurement, distribution and

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monitoring program consistent with the overall provisions
 of this Act and the guidelines of the DOH.

3 (d) Delivery of uninterrupted immunization program
4 against vaccine preventable diseases especially on children
5 amidst the COVID-19 pandemic;

6 (e) Adoption by the DOH of a uniform and consistent
7 reporting standard in a language understandable by the
8 general public;

(f) Provision of an emergency subsidy to affected low 9 income households in areas under Enhanced Community 10 Quarantine (ECQ) and to households with recently 11 returned Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs): Provided, 12 That the subsidy shall be computed based on the 13 prevailing regional minimum wage rates: Provided, further, 14 That the subsidy received from the current conditional 15 cash transfer program and rice subsidy shall be taken into 16 consideration in the computation of the emergency subsidy 17 as provided for in this Act: Provided, furthermore, That the 18 vetting and validation of beneficiaries of the Social 19 Amelioration Program (SAP), and the related liquidation 20

report thereto shall be simplified to expedite the
 distribution of the subsidy: *Provided, finally,* That a
 definite list of beneficiaries of the SAP shall be submitted
 to Congress;

5 (g) Provision of one (1) month emergency subsidy to 6 low income households who are qualified but were not 7 granted such subsidy as mandated under Section 4c of 8 Republic Act No. 11469;

(h) Provision of unemployment or involuntary 9 separation assistance for displaced workers or employees, 10 including probationary, project, seasonal, contractual and 11 casual employees in private health institutions, tourism, 12 culture and arts, creative industries, including, but not 13 limited to, film and audiovisual workers, construction, 14 15 public transportation, trade industries, and other sectors of the economy as may be identified by the DOLE, in 16 coordination with the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR), 17 and Social Security System (SSS); freelancers, the self-18 employed and repatriated OFWs, including OFWs whose 19 deployment were suspended due to a government-imposed 20

deployment ban: Provided, That any assistance given to 1 OFWs shall be separate and distinct from the benefits or 2 assistance, if any, they receive as members of the Overseas 3 Welfare Administration (OWWA): Provided, 4 Workers *further*, That any subsidy previously received under 5 6 Republic Act No. 11469 does not preclude the displaced worker or employee, the freelancers, self-employed, and 7 repatriated OFWs from receiving the unemployment or 8 involuntary separation assistance provided herein: 9 Provided, further, That, members of the SSS who have 10 received the unemployment benefit under Section 14(b) 11 (unemployment, insurance, or involuntary separation 12 benefits) of Republic Act No. 11199, or the Social Security 13 Act of 2018, during the Covid-19 pandemic shall no longer 14 be eligible to avail of the benefits under this subsection: 15 *Provided, finally*. That the SSS shall take proactive steps 16 to ensure all qualified members be given unemployment 17 benefits under Republic Act No. 11199 (Social Security Act 18 of 2018); 19

(i) Access to livelihood assistance, skills and training
 programs, loan assistance, and employment opportunities
 for repatriated and returning OFWs to ensure proper
 reintegration and the full utilization of their skills for
 national development;

6 (j) Provision of a "COVID-19 special risk allowance" 7 for all public health workers on a monthly basis for every 8 month that they are serving in the duration of the COVID-9 19 pandemic, in addition to the hazard pay granted under 10 the Magna Carta of Public Health Workers or Republic Act 11 No. 7305;

12 (k) Implementation of mandatory COVID-19 testing
13 of public and private health workers every fifteen (15) days
14 to ensure their protection;

(l) Assumption of all medical expenses of public and
private health workers in case of exposure to COVID-19 or
any work-related injury or disease during the duration of
the pandemic;

(m) Provision of compensation of One hundredthousand pesos (P100,000.00) to public and private health

workers who have contracted or who may contract severe 1 COVID-19 infection while in the line of duty: Provided, 2 That a compensation of One million pesos (P1,000,000.00) 3 shall be given to public and private health workers, who 4 have died or may die while fighting the COVID-19 5 pandemic: Provided, further, That this shall have 6 retroactive application from February 1, 2020: Provided, 7 furthermore, That the compensation provided herein shall 8 be exempt from the applicable taxes under the National 9 Internal Revenue Code of 1997, as amended: Provided, 10 *finally*, That the compensation provided herein shall be 11 given to the beneficiaries not later than three (3) months 12 after the date of confinement or death: 13

(n) Provision of opportunity to Agrarian Reform
Beneficiaries to enhanced access to credit facilities after
the disruption of the food supply chain by the COVID-19
pandemic;

(o) The pertinent provisions of Republic Act No.
10931 otherwise known as the "Universal Access to Quality
Tertiary Education Act", Republic Act No. 8545 otherwise

known as the "Expanded Government Assistance to 1 Students and Teachers in Private Education Act" or the "E-2 GASTPE Act", and Republic Act No. 10533 otherwise 3 known as the "Enhanced Basic Education Act of 2013" or 4 the "K to 12 Law", to the contrary notwithstanding, 5 provision of tuition subsidy to students who are currently 6 not receiving any assistance from government educational 7 subsidy or voucher programs but are now facing financial 8 difficulties brought about by work stoppage and closure of 9 establishments due to the Community Quarantine (CQ) as 10 follows: 11

(1) Qualified students in Private Tertiary Education 12 who are neither part of the Listahanan of the Department 13 of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) nor covered 14 15 under the Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES) as provided in Republic Act No. 10931 shall receive a tuition subsidy: 16 *Provided*, That the geographic prioritization of areas where 17 there are no State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) and 18 Local Universities and Colleges (LUCs) under Republic Act 19

No. 10931 shall be suspended to make qualified students
 under this subsection eligible; and

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3 (2) Qualified students in private elementary and 4 junior high school, and senior high school who are 5 currently not receiving assistance under the Education 6 Service Contracting (ESC) as provided in Republic Act No. 7 8545, or Senior High School Voucher Program (SHS VP) as 8 provided in Republic Act No. 10533, as may be applicable, 9 shall receive a tuition subsidy.

Education subsidies granted under this subsection 10 shall be released directly to the Private Tertiary Education 11 Institutions Private Basic Education 12 or Schools. respectively, for the purpose of applying the subsidy for 13 unpaid tuition in School Year (SY) 2019-2020 or for 14 payment of tuition fee for school year SY 2020-2021: 15 Provided, That the subsidy shall be released prior to the 16 opening of SY 2020-2021 or within a reasonable period 17 after school opening but in no case later than September 18 2020, in a manner similar to the Tertiary Education 19

Subsidy (TES), Educational Service Contracting (ESC), 1 and Senior High School Voucher Program (SHS VP). 2 (p) Provision of a one-time cash assistance to affected 3 teaching and non-teaching personnel, including part-time 4 faculty, in Private Basic Education Schools and Tertiary 5 6 Education Institutions and part-time faculty in SUCs due to the deferred opening or reduced offering of classes 7 during the CQ; 8 (q) Ensure that all LGUs are acting within the letter 9 and spirit of all the rules, regulations and directives issued 10 by the National Government pursuant to this Act; and 11 implementing standards of CQ consistent with what the 12 National Government has laid down for the subject area, 13 to continue exercising their 14 while allowing LGUs 15 autonomy in matters undefined by the National Government or are within the parameters it has set; and 16 are fully cooperating towards a unified, cohesive and 17 orderly implementation of the national policy to address 18 COVID-19: Provided, That all LGUs shall be authorized to 19 utilize more than five percent (5%) of the amount allocated 20

for their calamity fund subject to additional funding and 1 support from the National Government; 2

(r) Enforcement of measures to protect the people 3 profiteering, injurious 4 from hoarding. speculations. manipulation of prices, product deceptions, and cartels, 5 monopolies or other combinations in restraint of trade, or 6 other pernicious practices affecting the supply, distribution 7 and movement of food, clothing, hygiene and sanitation 8 products, medicine and medical supplies, fuel, fertilizers, 9 chemicals, building materials, implements, machinery 10 equipment and spare parts required in agriculture, 11 industry and other essential services, and other articles of 12 prime necessity, whether imported or locally produced or 13 manufactured; 14

(s) Ensure that donation, acceptance and distribution 15 of health products intended to address the COVID-19 16 pandemic are not unnecessarily delayed and that health 17 products for donation duly certified by the regulatory 18 agency or their accredited third party from countries with 19 established regulation shall automatically be cleared: 20

Provided, That this shall not apply to health products
 which do not require a certification or clearance from the
 Food and Drug Administration (FDA);

4 (t) Procurement of the following as the need arises, in the most judicious, economical and expeditious manner, as 5 exemptions from the provisions on bidding process 6 required under Republic Act No. 9184 or the "Government 7 Procurement Reform Act" and other relevant laws: 8 Provided, That the following information and documents 9 related to the procurement shall be published in the 10 Government Procurement Policy Board (GPPB) online 11 portal, the website of the procuring entity concerned, if 12 available, and at any conspicuous place reserved for this 13 purpose in the premises of the procuring entity within 14 seven (7) working days from the date of acceptance of the 15 16 award:

- 17 (i) Project name;
- 18 (ii) Approved budget for contract;
- 19 (iii) Contract period;

sodium hydrochloride, cleaning materials, povidone iodine, 1 medicines (e.g., paracetamol 2 common tablet and mefenamic acid, 3 suspension, vitamins tablet and 4 suspension, hyoscine tablet and suspension, oral rehydration solution, and cetirizine tablet and suspension); 5 testing kits, and such other supplies or equipment as may 6 be determined by the DOH and other relevant government 7 agencies: Provided, That the DOH shall prioritize the 8 allocation and distribution of the aforesaid goods, supplies 9 and other resources to the following: 10 (i) Public health facilities in the regions, provinces, or 11

cities, that are designated as COVID-19 referral hospitals,
such as, but not limited to, Philippine General Hospital
(PGH), Lung Center of the Philippines (LCP), and Dr. Jose
N. Rodriguez Memorial Hospital;

(ii) Private hospitals which have existing capacities to
provide support care and treatment to COVID-19 patients;
and

(iii) Public and private laboratories that have existingcapacities to test suspected COVID-19 patients.

(2) Goods and services for social amelioration 1 measures in favor of affected communities: 2 (3) Lease of real property or venue for use to house 3 health workers or serve as quarantine centers, medical 4 relief and aid distribution locations, or temporary medical 5 6 facilities: (4) Establishment, construction, and operation of 7 temporary medical facilities; 8 9 (5) Utilities, telecommunications, and other critical services in relation to operation of quarantine centers, 10 medical relief and aid distribution centers and temporary 11 medical facilities; and 12 (6) Ancillary services related to the foregoing. 13 Provided, That to ensure adequate and responsive 14 15 supply of critical medical products, the government shall promote and encourage the local manufacturer of such 16 products, and whenever locally available, procure from 17 manufacturers and suppliers in the Philippines. For this 18 purpose, the DTI shall issue a certification that the 19 products, materials, or supplies are produced, made or 20

manufactured in the Philippines: *Provided, further,* That
other qualification and documentary requirements for local
manufacturers and suppliers shall be prioritized and
expedited by the DOH, FDA and other concerned
departments and agencies.

6 (u) Partner with the Philippine Red Cross, as the 7 primary humanitarian agency that is auxiliary to the 8 government in giving aid to the people, subject to 9 reimbursement, in the distribution of goods and services 10 incidental in the fight against COVID-19;

(v) Engage temporary Human Resources for Health 11 (HRH) such as medical and allied medical staff to 12 complement or supplement the current health workforce or 13 to man the temporary medical facilities to be established in 14 accordance with Section 3(t)(4) of this Act: Provided, That 15 HRH to be hired on temporary basis shall receive the 16 appropriate compensation and allowances: Provided, 17 further, That all HRH serving in the front line during the 18 state of calamity due to COVID-19, shall receive an actual 19 20 hazard duty pay from the government: Provided, finally,

1 That DOH, the DOLE and its attached agencies shall 2 closely coordinate to ensure that returning OFW-health 3 care workers, or those whose deployments were suspended 4 due to COVID-19, shall be properly referred to the ongoing 5 hiring of temporary HRH by DOH;

(w) Ensure the availability of credit to the productive 6 sectors of the economy especially in the countryside 7 through measures such as, but not limited to, lowering the 8 effective lending rates of interest and reserve requirements 9 lending institutions: Provided, That 10 of credit 11 accommodation to the Micro. Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs), as well as those who are self-12 employed, shall be imposed a low interest, payable within 13 three (3) years and shall not require any collateral if the 14 15 loan does not exceed Three million pesos (P3,000,000.00);

16 (x) Development of a loan program of appropriate 17 Government Financial Institutions (GFIs) for institutions 18 of learning that have been affected by the decrease in 19 enrollment due to the CQ or to enable these institutions to 20 adequately prepare to implement blended learning: Provided, That the terms of the loan shall be more
 reasonable than the prevailing market terms: Provided,
 further, That the availment of such loan shall be
 conditioned on the non-implementation of an increase in
 tuition and other fees for the next school or academic year;

(y) Direct the Small Business Corporation (SBC) to 6 expand its existing loan programs for MSMEs through a 7 combination of increasing available loanable funds, 8 reducing documentary requirements, increasing maximum 9 loan amounts per borrower, reducing interest rates, 10 extending loan terms, utilization of financial technologies 11 to expand reach and increase access and set fast turn-12 around loan processing time; and allow the use of the loan 13 proceeds for payroll costs, materials and suppliers, 14 mortgage payments, rent, utilities, including fuel and 15 storage, creation of new supportive businesses, re-16 purposing of existing business capital, any other business 17 debt obligations that were incurred before the covered 18 period or acquisition of new technologies and systems to 19 adjust business processes for resiliency: 20

(z) Direct the Land Bank of the Philippines (LBP) and 1 the Development Bank of the Philippines (DBP) to 2 introduce a low interest loan program available to non-3 essential businesses to assist and encourage them to 4 continue investing in their businesses: Provided, That 5 priority shall be given to agri-fishery businesses and non-6 7 essential businesses that are small and medium enterprises, including start-ups; 8

(aa) Direct the Philippine Guarantee Corporation 9 (PhilGuarantee) to issue 10 an expanded government guarantee program for non-essential businesses, to ease 11 current rules and regulations and give preference to 12 critically impacted businesses, MSMEs, and activities that 13 support DOH initiatives towards ensuring an adequate 14 and responsive supply of health care services, and to 15 the loan portfolio 16 guarantee of partner financial institutions of eligible MSME loans; 17

(bb) Liberalization of the grant of incentives for the
manufacture or importation of critical or needed
equipment or supplies or essential goods for the carrying-

out of the policy declared herein, including healthcare 1 equipment and supplies: Provided, That importation 2 and/or local sale of these equipment and supplies shall be 3 exempt from import duties, taxes and other fees. For this 4 purpose, critical products, equipment or supplies or 5 essential goods shall include the following: (1) goods 6 referred to in Section 3(t)(1) hereof; (2) equipment for 7 waste management, including, but not limited to, waste 8 segregation, storage, collection, sorting, treatment and 9 disposal services: *Provided*, That these said equipment and 10 technologies and services are approved by the Department 11 of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), DOH or 12 other concerned regulatory agencies; (3) inputs, raw 13 materials and equipment necessary for the manufacture or 14 production of food and essential goods referred to in 15 16 Section 3(t)(1) hereof:

(cc) Ensure the availability of essential goods, in
particular, food and medicine, by adopting measures as
may reasonably be necessary to facilitate and/or minimize
disruption to the supply chain and/or improve the national

end-to-end supply chain, including measures to reduce
 logistics costs and regulate and waive, as necessary, extra
 shipping charges imposed by international shipping lines,
 especially for basic commodities and services to the
 maximum extent possible;

6 (dd) Requiring businesses to prioritize and accept
7 contracts, subject to fair and reasonable terms, for
8 materials and services necessary to promote the herein

(pp) Any unutilized or unreleased balance in a special
fund, as of March 2020 declaring a public health crisis of

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3 (h) Three billion pesos (P3,000,000,000.00) to assist 4 SUCs in the development of smart campuses through 5 investments in ICT infrastructure, acquisition of learning 6 management systems and other appropriate equipment to 7 fully implement the flexible learning modality; and

8 (i) One billion pesos (P1,000,000,000.00) as additional 9 scholarship funds of TESDA under its training for work 10 scholarship program and special training for employment 11 program or (STEP) for the retooling, retraining, and 12 upskilling of displaced workers including returning OFWs, 13 as well as provision of tool kits under the STEP.

14 Provided, That the Department of Budget and 15 Management (DBM) shall submit reports on the releases 16 made pursuant to this section as part of the weekly report 17 as mandated in Section 6 of this Act.

18 SEC. 5. Sources of Funding. – The enumerated
19 subsidy and stimulus measures, as well as all other

measures to address the COVID-19 pandemic shall be
 funded from the following:

(a) 2020 General Appropriations Act (GAA): Provided, 3 That funds for the herein authorized programs and 4 primarily shall be sourced from 5 projects the unprogrammed funds and savings realized from modified, 6 realigned, or reprogrammed allocations for operational 7 expense of any government agency or instrumentality 8 under the Executive Department, including, but not 9 limited to, travelling expenses, supplies and materials 10 professional 11 expenses, services. general services. advertising expenses, printing and publication expenses, 12 and other maintenance and operating expenses in the 2020 13 GAA; 14

(b) Savings pooled pursuant to Republic Act No.
11469 or the "Bayanihan to Heal as One Act" and Section 3
paragraphs (oo), (pp), (qq), and (rr) of this Act;

(c) Excess revenue collections in any one of the
identified tax or non-tax revenue sources from its
corresponding revenue collection target, as provided in the

FY 2020 Budget of Expenditures and Sources of Financing
 (BESF);

3 (d) New revenue collections or those arising from new
4 tax or non-tax sources which are not part of nor included in
5 the original sources included in the FY 2020 BESF;

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(e) Proceeds from loans and other foreign borrowings;

7 (f) All amounts derived from the cash, funds, and
8 investments held by any GOCC or any national
9 government agency;

(g) Amounts derived from the five percent (5%)
franchise tax on all gaming receipts/earnings or the agreed
pre-determined minimum monthly revenues from gaming
operations, whichever is higher, earned by offshore gaming
licensees, including gaming operators, gaming agent,
service providers and gaming support providers; and

(h) Income tax, VAT, and other applicable taxes on
income from non-gaming operations earned by offshore
gaming licensees, operators, agents, service providers and
support providers.

| 1 | After two (2) years or upon a determination that the |
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| 2 | threat of COVID-19 has been successfully contained or |
| 3 | abated, whichever comes first, the revenues derived under |
| 4 | paragraphs (g) and (h) shall accrue to the General Fund of |

| 9 | SEC. 6. Reports to Congress and Creation of an |
| 10 | Oversight Committee The President, during Monday of |
| 11 | every week, shall submit a weekly report to Congress of all |

| 13 | immediately preceding week including a report on the |
| 14 | targets and actual accomplishments of government |

5 For this purpose, the Congress shall establish a Joint 6 Congressional Oversight Committee composed of four (4) 7 Members of each House to be appointed by the Senate 8 President and the House Speaker, respectively. This 9 Committee shall determine whether such acts, orders, 10 rules and regulations are within the restrictions provided 11 herein.

12 SEC. 7. Construction or Interpretation. – Nothing 13 herein shall be construed as an impairment, restriction or 14 modification of the provisions of the Constitution. In case 15 the exercise of the powers herein granted conflicts with 16 other statutes, orders, rules or regulations, the provisions 17 of this Act shall prevail.

18 SEC. 8. Separability. – If any provision of this Act or 19 the application of such provision to any person or 20 circumstance is declared invalid, the remainder of this Act or the application of such provision to any other person or
 circumstance shall not be affected by such declaration.

SEC. 9. Repealing Clause. - Republic Act No. 11469 is 3 hereby repealed upon the adjournment of the First Regular 4 Session of the Eighteenth Congress, in accordance with 5 Article VI, Section 23 (2) of the Constitution. All laws, acts, 6 7 decrees, executive orders, issuances, and rules and regulations or parts thereof which are contrary to and 8 inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed, amended or 9 modified accordingly. 10

11 SEC. 10. *Effectivity*. – This Act shall take effect upon 12 its publication in the *Official Gazette* and one (1) 13 newspaper of general circulation and shall be in full force 14 and effect until September 30, 2020, unless otherwise 15 provided for in this Act or extended by Congress.
