AN ACT

PROVIDING FOR THE PROTECTION AND ADVANCING THE WELFARE OF MEDICAL FRONTLINERS IN THE PHILIPPINES, APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

It has been over 170 days since the Philippines reported the country's first case of COVID-19.¹ Since then, our frontline health workers have been sacrificing both their time and their lives in order to serve as the last line of defense against this new and contagious disease which has rendered most of our country immobile.

Due to the unenviable responsibility of mitigating the spread of this unseen and fast-moving enemy as well as treating those who have contracted it, our medical frontliners have long been subjected to physical, mental and emotional stress. Worse, many of our frontline health workers have also been sidelined because they were infected by the virus. Latest data from the Department of Health (DOH) situationer reported that close to 4,000 health care workers tested positive for COVID-19 — and of that number, 35 have died. Now, more than ever, the State must reciprocate the sacrifices that our medical frontliners have made to curb the transmission of this disease.

The proposed measure, which is a counterpart version to a bill filed by Representative Janette Loreto-Garin in the House of Representatives, will introduce additional benefits for our frontline health workers such as additional allowances, free mandatory Continuing Medical Education (CME) program, and free vaccinations for

them and their dependents. The proposed measure will also provide a mental health leave for these frontline health workers in addition to a range of responsive mental health services.

As an act of solidarity and support to our present heroes, it is necessary to advance their welfare by instituting a policy that will safeguard them and their families. In these especially trying times — which have kept our frontline health workers in a constant state of worry and anxiety — they deserve the highest form of protection that the government can provide for them.

In view of the foregoing, the immediate passage of the bill is earnestly sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representative of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION. 1. *Short Title.* — This Act shall be known as the "Frontline Health Workers Welfare Act of 2020".

SEC. 2. *Declaration of Policy.* —It is hereby declared the policy of the State to uphold the welfare of frontline health workers and assume the responsibility for the protection, respect, and improvement of the sector by instituting measures towards competent and relevant practice for the health and safety of the public, just and human condition of work, and promotion of professional growth. Thus, the State recognizes frontline health workers as prime movers of national government

SEC. 3. *Coverage.* —The provisions and benefits provided for in this Act shall be given to public and private frontline health workers. For the purpose of this Act, frontline health workers shall mean all persons who are engaged in health and health-related work in health facilities, regardless of employment status, whether salaried, contracted, or volunteers.

This shall include all persons employed in all hospitals, sanitaria, health infirmaries, health centers, rural health units, barangay health station, clinics, duly-registered nursing homes, and other health-related establishments.

SEC. 4. *Additional Benefits for Frontline Health Workers.* — The following incentives and benefits shall be provided to medical frontliners:

a. In times of a pandemic or a public health emergency, frontline health workers shall be entitled to a one-time allowance of not less than Five Thousand Pesos (Php 5,000.00) at the start of the pandemic or public health emergency;

- b. Free mandatory Continuing Medical Education (CME) program, equivalent to two (2) Continuing Professional Development (CPD) units, for frontline health workers to enhance and upgrade the competencies and qualifications of frontline health workers in times of a pandemic or a public health emergency;
- c. Free annual influenza and pneumococcal vaccination and other vaccines for frontline health workers; and,
- d. Free annual influenza for the qualified dependents of frontline health workers.

Provided, That upon the availability of new vaccines and breakthrough drugs, priority access shall be given to the frontline health workers and their immediate family. *Provided further,* That the benefit stated under Sec. 4(a) shall be applicable only to future pandemics or public health emergencies and not to the current COVID-19 pandemic as the actual hazard pay and special risk allowance for COVID-19 for frontliners are already provided for under Republic Act No. 11494 or the Bayanihan to Recover as One Act.

The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) is hereby tasked to ensure the effective delivery of appropriate social welfare mechanisms for our frontline health workers, one that is adaptive to the prevailing pandemic context to carry out the purposes of this Act.

SEC. 5. Mental Health of Frontline Health Workers. — Every frontline health worker shall be entitled to a yearly mental health leave of five (5) days with pay. Provided, that responsive mental health services shall be developed and integrated as part of the medical health benefits of the frontline health workers. Provided, further, That mental health therapy, consultations, and medications shall be made available to all frontline health workers until three (3) years after the end of their service.

SEC. 6. Appropriations. —The amount necessary to carry out the provisions regarding vaccines and breakthrough drugs shall be sourced from the Department of Health while the provision on allowances shall be sourced from the Department of Social Welfare and Development.

Thereafter, such sums as may be necessary for the continued implementation of this Act shall be included in the succeeding General Appropriations Act (GAA) under the emergency fund

- **SEC. 7.** *Implementing Rules and Regulations.* Within sixty (60) days from the effectivity of this Act, the DOH, DSWD and the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), in coordination with other concerned government agencies and interest groups, shall formulate and adopt amendments to the existing rules and regulations of this Act.
- **SEC. 8.** *Separability Clause.* If any provision of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional, the other provisions not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.
- **SEC. 9.** *Repealing Clause.* All other laws, decrees, orders, rules and regulations, other issuances, or parts thereof inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.
- **SEC. 10.** *Effectivity.* This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation.
