

RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE TO LOOK INTO THE FINANCIAL REQUIREMENT IN ACHIEVING THE DESIRED RATIO OF HEALTHCARE WORKERS TO THE GENERAL POPULATION WITH THE END IN VIEW OF ENSURING THAT ALL PRACTICING HEALTHCARE WORKERS IN THE COUNTRY WILL BE EMPLOYED, UTILIZED AND COMPENSATED COMPETITIVELY

WHEREAS, along with the rest of the world, the Philippines continues to grapple with the COVID-19 pandemic with the number of confirmed cases already breaking the 200,000 threshold and the number of deaths already over 3,500 since President Rodrigo Roa Duterte declared a State of Public Health Emergency throughout the Philippines on 8 March 2020;

WHEREAS, our healthcare workers continue to bear the brunt of this health crisis resulting to around 7,000 of our medical professionals contracting COVID-19 — with 40 of them unfortunately succumbing to the disease. Recently, over 80 medical societies have issued their strong position stressing that the country's healthcare system has been overwhelmed¹ which led to the President imposing the Modified Enhanced Community Quarantine (MECQ) in the National Capital Region (NCR) and other parts of the country;

WHEREAS, to address the shortage of healthcare workers responding to the threat of COVID-19, the Department of Health (DOH) implemented emergency hiring for Human Resources for Health (HRH) which includes physicians, nurses, medical technologists, radiologic technologists, medical officers, etc. As of 21 September 2020

data, DOH was able to hire 8,427 healthcare workers – with bulk of the augmentation assigned in the NCR where the disease hit the hardest;

WHEREAS, on 2 April 2020, the Philippine Overseas Employment Administration (POEA) also issued Governing Board Resolution No. 09-2020 imposing a temporary suspension in the deployment of identified healthcare workers citing the need "to prioritize the human resource allocation for the national healthcare system at the time of the national state of emergency";

WHEREAS, this resolution was met with strong opposition from healthcare workers - particularly nurses with employment obligations overseas - which resulted in the relaxation of the temporary suspension to allow healthcare workers with existing contracts and Overseas Employment Certificates (OEC) as of 8 March 2020 to leave²;

WHEREAS, the Inter-Agency Task Force for the Management of Emerging Infectious Diseases (IATF-EID), in light of the temporary suspension of deployment of healthcare workers, urged DOH and other government hospitals to "hire these medical and allied health workers to supplement their current workforce"3;

WHEREAS, despite the call from the IATF-EID, DOH Secretary Francisco Duque III reported that the department only received 25 applications from thousands of healthcare workers seeking employment abroad which led to Duque appealing to their "sense of nationalism" and "sense of patriotism"4;

WHEREAS, this poor number of applications can be interpreted as a cautious approach of our healthcare workers as they have experienced years of being meagerly paid, overworked, and unnoticed even by their own government – especially with the ongoing health crisis, many of them are expecting to be overly stretched once hired. In addition, healthcare workers who have found gainful employment abroad have already realized the true value of their service and experience;

WHEREAS, even with the compensation and other incentives for healthcare workers during the pandemic, the government should address the root of this longstanding problem of our healthcare workers being underappreciated here in the country by determining how the thousands of healthcare workers in the country can

be utilized and employed with competitive compensation in order to provide them with an option to stay in the country and help bring the much-needed improvement in our healthcare system;

WHEREAS, according to the data from the Health Human Resource Development Bureau of DOH, there are around 860,000 registered medical professionals in the country; however, the total number of healthcare workers in the country both in private and public institutions is only at 189,204 – not even half of the total registered which could mean that over 600,000 could be non-practicing medical professionals or could have found jobs abroad;

WHEREAS, as we further improve our healthcare system especially with the soon-to-be fully implemented Universal Health Care Law, there is an urgent need for us to utilize what many consider to be one of our best resource — our healthcare workers; hence, it is only vital that the government examine how we can fully utilize and appreciate their value to the country by first determining the needed cost to provide a competitive compensation to these healthcare workers in the long run. This could finally address the desired ratio of healthcare workers to the general population;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, for the Senate of the Philippines to direct the Senate Committee on Finance to look into the financial requirement in achieving the desired ratio of healthcare workers to the general population with the end in view of ensuring that all practicing healthcare workers in the country will be employed, utilized and compensated competitively.
