RESOLUTION

URGING THE APPROPRIATE SENATE COMMITTEE TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE ALLEGED PRECIPITOUS AND HASTY IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PRIVATE MOTOR VEHICLE INSPECTION CENTER (PMVIC) PROJECT OF THE LAND TRANSPORTATION OFFICE (LTO) AND DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (DOTR) FOLLOWING CRITICISMS AND ALLEGATIONS OF LACK OF TRANSPARENCY AND APPROPRIATE CONSULTATION OF ITS MAJOR STAKEHOLDERS IN ITS PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION LEADING TO FEARS OF OUR CITIZENS BEING DEPRIVED OF THEIR RIGHT TO USE THEIR VEHICLES WITHOUT DUE PROCESS

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 28 of the 1987 Constitution declares, in part, that the State shall adopt and implement "a policy of full public disclosure of all its transactions involving public interest";

WHEREAS, Book II, Chapter 1, Section 1(7) of the Administrative Code of 1987
declares, in part, that "[t]he right of the people and their organizations to effective and
reasonable participation at all levels of social, political, and economic decision-making
shall not be abridged";

WHEREAS, in 2020, the Land Transportation Office (LTO), along with the
Department of Transportation (DOTr), saw an opportunity to overhaul the country's
Motor Vehicle Inspection System (MVIS) despite the reduced vehicular traffic due to
the restrictions to mobility caused by the COVID-19 pandemic;¹

WHEREAS, the MVIS program now requires all motorized vehicles to undergo and pass a more stringent series of tests as a requirement for registration. It consists of a 70-point series of roadworthiness tests based on international standards which includes visual testing, such as checking the operability of the wipers, brake lights, side mirrors, among others, as well as tests that can only be done with the proper equipment, technology and trained personnel;²

WHEREAS, in a press release on 4 August 2020, the DOTr announced that it would be fast tracking the operationalization of private motor vehicle inspection centers (PMVICs) under the MVIS program to cater to the vehicle inspection needs of owners as a requirement for registration;³

WHEREAS, DOTr Secretary Arthur Tugade endorsed the project by stating that an automated system of vehicle inspection for roadworthiness would effectively address two problems, namely, human error and opportunities for corruption;⁴

WHEREAS, in September 2020, the DOTr officially recognized the first PMVICs in the country by issuing certificates to 32 newly established centers. It was also reported that the DOTr is targeting a total of 138 PMVICs to be operational in the country once the program is fully implemented;⁵

WHEREAS, in December 2020, it was reported that Private Emission Testing Centers (PETCs) were gradually being phased out to make way for PMVICs.⁶ Unlike a PETC, which only checks for a vehicle's emissions levels in compliance with the Clean Air Act, a PMVIC also checks for a vehicle's roadworthiness. This includes checking of 62 individual vehicle parts through visual and computer-aided testing;⁷

WHEREAS, various advocacy groups, which include the Clean Air Movement and the Volunteers Against Crime and Corruption (VACC), among others, have questioned the "arbitrary" implementation of the program and have criticized it for pushing through without public consultation and transparency among major stakeholders. They also argue that the "exorbitant" fees that motorists would have to shell out for the inspection fee would be an additional burden passed on to motorists considering the severe impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic;8

WHEREAS, the VACC has gone a step further by indicating that it would petition the Supreme Court (SC) to suspend the implementation of the PMVICs in order to conduct public consultations with majority stakeholders beforehand;9

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the State to secure and safeguard its citizenry, particularly the passengers and drivers of private and public motor vehicles. Towards this end, the State is mandated to pursue a more proactive and preventive approach in order to secure the safety of drivers, passengers, and pedestrians at all times by implementing responsive programs and policies that genuinely promote the welfare of the riding public;

WHEREAS, however, this right must also be balanced with the right to property as well as the right of the people to participate in the policymaking-processes;

WHEREAS, due to the lack of transparency and sufficient consultations among stakeholders, critics of the program expressed their distrust on the stated goal of the new inspection program and suspect that the project is yet another ploy of the government towards phasing out older vehicles which could severely impact a majority of private car owners and public utility vehicle operators nationwide;¹⁰

WHEREAS, the timing of the rollout of this project is also problematic as it would operate to deprive our many countrymen of the use of their vehicles even as we limit the access to public transportation due to quarantine restrictions;

WHEREAS, outsourcing government programs and services to private corporations is no longer a novel way of doing business. Due to a lack of government funds, these arrangements have practically become common practice in the planning and implementation of government programs and projects;

WHEREAS, while the government, with help from the private sector, should strive to modernize the transport sector in order to ensure the safety of motorists and pedestrians alike, due process demands that all programs should not deprive our citizens and all the stakeholders the opportunity to participate in the policymaking process;

WHEREAS, our Constitution states in Art. III, Sec. 1 that "[n]o person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law...";

WHEREAS, any government program, especially ones which tend to deprive our citizens of their right to enjoy and utilize their own property should be subject to extensive public consultation lest it violates our fundamental rights enshrined in our Constitution;

WHEREAS, as long as the government refuses to open up the MVIS program to extensive public scrutiny, questions will linger over its perceived irregularities and true intentions;

WHEREAS, the LTO and DOTr should listen to its constituents and seriously consider suspending the implementation of its PMVIC project and make its processes more transparent and accessible to the general public;

WHEREAS, there is need to ensure that the implementation of this program will afford our citizens sufficient time to understand the process, learn what is required, and prepare for compliance with the law;

WHEREAS, while the PMVIC project is well-intentioned, it should not deprive our people practical means and sufficient opportunity to comply with the law;

WHEREAS, there is a need to conduct an investigation into these allegations in order for the Senate to serve its essential function as a check and balance to promote and uphold good governance and transparency between government agencies and the general public;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE, to urge the 1 appropriate Senate Committee to conduct an inquiry, in aid of legislation, on the 2 alleged precipitous and hasty implementation of the Private Motor Vehicle Inspection 3 Center (PMVIC) project of the Land Transportation Office (LTO) and Department of 4 Transportation (DOTr) following criticisms and allegations of lack of transparency and 5 appropriate consultation of its major stakeholders in its planning and implementation 6 leading to fears of our citizens being deprived of their right to use their vehicles without 7 due process. 8
