RESOLUTION

COMMENDING ANA PATRICIA NON AND THE VOLUNTEERS OF HUNDREDS OF COMMUNITY PANTRIES ALL OVER THE COUNTRY FOR IGNITING THE TRUE BAYANIHAN SPIRIT OF FILIPINOS AMID THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

1 WHEREAS, more than a year into the COVID-19 pandemic, and with the total 2 number of cases at 1,067,892 and total number deaths at 17,622¹, many livelihoods 3 and businesses were affected causing an unmitigated hunger crisis among the more 4 vulnerable sectors of Filipino society;

5 WHEREAS, as of September 2020, at least 90,000 businesses remain closed 6 after the lockdown was first imposed last March 2020²;

WHEREAS, on January 2021, the unemployment rate in the country reached an
alarming rate of 8.7% which translates to around four (4) million Filipinos. This is
higher than the 3.8 million unemployed in October 2020 and the 2.4 million in January
2020³;

11 WHEREAS, with businesses closing down and unemployment going up, 12 involuntary hunger in the Philippines reached 16%, which roughly translates to around 13 four (4) million families having experienced involuntary hunger at least once in the 14 past three (3) months – double the 8.8% figure in December 2019⁴;

1 WHEREAS, this scenario is expected to be further exacerbated by the unabated 2 rise in the number of new infections per day and the continued imposition of 3 community quarantines in Metro Manila and nearby provinces;

WHEREAS, even with the implementation of the Special Amelioration Program (SAP) and the numerous livelihood assistance programs of various government agencies, help seems scarce and hardly enough to provide food on the table of every Juan;

8 WHEREAS, this propelled 26-year old, University of the Philippines alumnae Ana 9 Patricia Non, to address hunger in her community by parking her bamboo cart filled 10 with food items beside a tree in Maginhawa St., Quezon City bearing the now famous 11 slogan "*Magbigay ayon sa kakayahan, kumuha batay sa pangangailangan.*";⁵

WHEREAS, Non posted this initiative on Facebook and it instantly went viral leading to the influx of donations and hordes of people lining up to get much needed commodities;

WHEREAS, aside from giving food and nourishment to thousands, the first community pantry encouraged kindness and compassion, re-awakened the sense of solidarity among Filipinos, and inspired many more to do the same;

WHEREAS, the more than 6,700 community pantries⁶ now in existence across
the country show that one's act of generosity can spark a movement and set in motion
a phenomenon of giving and sharing;

21 WHEREAS, the proliferation of community pantries all over the country is proof 22 that the Filipino *bayanihan* spirit is alive and many Filipinos remain willing to help 23 despite experiencing hardships themselves;

24 WHEREAS, this spirited moment of selflessness amid the pandemic must be 25 encouraged and aided by the government to ensure the implementation of health and 26 safety protocols instead of closing it down or subjecting it to red-tagging;
