

RESOLUTION

CONGRATULATING RAPPLER FOUNDER AND CEO, MARIA RESSA, FOR BEING THE FIRST FILIPINO RECIPIENT OF THE NOBEL PEACE PRIZE OWING TO HER EXTRAORDINARY COURAGE AND UNWAVERING EFFORTS IN FIGHTING FOR TRUTH, DEMOCRACY, FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION AND OF THE PRESS

WHEREAS, the Philippine Senate has always honored remarkable Filipinos for their outstanding legacy and service to the people;

WHEREAS, on Friday, 8 October 2021, it was announced that Rappler's Founder and CEO, Maria Ressa, was one of two media workers – and the first ever Filipino individual – to win the 2021 Nobel Peace Prize for their work to protect freedom of the press and freedom of expression;

WHEREAS, back in February 2021, Norwegian labor leader and parliamentary representative Jonas Gahr Støre nominated Ressa, Reporters Without Borders, and the Committee to Protect Journalists for the 2021 Prize. In his nomination, Støre stated that "She [Ressa] is thus both a symbol and a representative of thousands of journalists around the world. The nomination fulfills key aspects of what is emphasized as peace-promoting in Alfred Nobel's will. A free and independent press can inform about and help to limit and stop a development that leads to armed conflict and war";²

WHEREAS, in its announcement, the Norwegian Nobel Committee said that it has decided to award the prize for 2021 to Maria Ressa and Dmitry Muratov "for their efforts to safeguard freedom of expression, which is a precondition for democracy and lasting peace." It added that Maria Ressa is receiving the award for her "courageous fight for freedom of expression in the Philippines", and for being a representative of all journalists "who stand up for this ideal in a world in which democracy and freedom of the press face increasingly adverse conditions";³

WHEREAS, the Committee highlighted the fact that Maria Ressa "uses freedom of expression to expose abuse of power, use of violence and growing authoritarianism in her native country, the Philippines." As a journalist and Rappler's CEO, the Committee affirmed that Maria Ressa "has shown herself to be a fearless defender of freedom of expression";

WHEREAS, Ressa and Rappler have been the target of attacks for her media organization's critical coverage of President Rodrigo Duterte's administration and a key leader in the global fight against disinformation;⁵

WHEREAS, the attacks against Ressa and Rappler have reached the world stage when Rappler cast a harsh but truthful light on the extrajudicial killings attributed to President Duterte's bloody drug war upon assuming office in 2016;6

WHEREAS, in June 2020, Ressa and former Rappler researcher Reynaldo Santos Jr. were convicted of cyber libel — a judgment Rappler regards as a failure of justice and democracy. Ressa and Santos are out on bail, and have filed their appeal with the Court of Appeals. This is one of at least seven active cases pending in court against Rappler as of 10 August 2021;7

WHEREAS, prior to her Nobel Peace Prize award, Maria Ressa has also received international acclaim for her courage and work on disinformation and "fake news". In 2018, she was named Time Magazine's Person of the Year, was among its 100 Most Influential People of 2019, and has also been named one of Time's Most Influential Women of the Century. She was also part of the BBC's 100 most inspiring

WHEREAS, among many awards for her principled stance, she received the 5 prestigious Golden Pen of Freedom Award from the World Association of 6 Newspapers and News Publishers, the Knight International Journalism Award from 7 the International Center for Journalists, the Gwen Ifill Press Freedom Award from 8 the Committee to Protect Journalists, the Shorenstein Journalism Award from 9 Stanford University, the Columbia Journalism Award, the Free Media Pioneer Award from the International Press Institute, and the Sergei Magnitsky Award for Investigative Journalism;9 12

WHEREAS, Ressa has been a dedicated journalist in Asia for over 35 years. Prior to founding Rappler, Ressa focused on investigating terrorism in Southeast Asia. She opened and ran CNN's Manila Bureau for nearly a decade before opening the network's Jakarta bureau, which she ran from 1995 to 2005. She wrote Seeds of Terror: An Eyewitness Account of al-Qaeda's Newest Center of Operations in Southeast Asia and From Bin Laden to Facebook: 10 Days of Abduction, 10 Years of Terrorism;10

WHEREAS, Maria Ressa's historic feat is definitive proof that press freedom is still universally recognized as a critical component in any functional democracy, and a monumental slap in the face of oppressive and tyrannical regimes, both past and present;

WHEREAS, as the Norwegian Nobel Committee has declared in its 2021 announcement, "[f]ree independent and fact-based journalism serves to protect against abuse of power, lies and war propaganda" and that "freedom of expression

and freedom of information help to ensure an informed public. These rights are crucial prerequisites for democracy and protect against war and conflict";¹¹

WHEREAS, her win is as remarkable as it is symbolic, especially under severe oppressive circumstances surrounding those who speak truth to power. At a crucial time for journalists in the Philippines, Maria Ressa's victory sends a message loud and clear: the world is watching and democracy overcomes even the strongest forces to subdue it;

WHEREAS, in congratulating and honoring Maria Ressa for her unwavering efforts in fighting for the freedom of expression and of the press, this would signify to the Filipino people that the Senate remains true to its principles as a bastion of democracy, freedom, truth, justice and independence;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE, to congratulate Rappler founder and CEO, Maria Ressa, for being the first Filipino recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize owing to her extraordinary courage and unwavering efforts in fighting for truth, democracy, freedom of expression and of the press.
