

AN ACT

CREATING A SECOND CONGRESSIONAL COMMISSION ON EDUCATION TO ASSESS AND EVALUATE THE STATE OF PHILIPPINE EDUCATION AND RECOMMEND INNOVATIVE AND TARGETED REFORMS IN EDUCATION, PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

Section 1. Short Title. – This Act shall be known as the "Second Congressional"
Commission on Education Act (EDCOM 2)".

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Sec. 2. *Declaration of Policy.* – It is hereby declared the policy of the State to make education as a critical component of human capital development, socioeconomic equality, inclusive growth, sustainable development, and fulfillment of human rights. Pursuant to Article XIV of the Constitution which mandates the State to protect and promote the right of all citizens to quality education at all levels, take appropriate steps to make such education accessible to all, and establish, maintain, and support a complete, adequate, and integrated system of education relevant to the needs of the people and society, and in consonance with the Sustainable Development Goals, the State hereby adopts the following policies:

- a. The State shall place education at the center of its development policies, guided by a national vision on education, to be strategically fulfilled through a set of specific, targeted, measurable and time-bound solutions that is a product of a comprehensive assessment and evaluation, effective planning, and strategic investments in education;
- b. The State shall develop a more harmonized and coordinated education ecosystem that will lead to the achievement of the goal of developing the country's human capital as an essential factor to national development, through a review of the mandates of the three sub-sectors of education, namely the Department of Education (DepEd), the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), and the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA); and
- c. The State recognizes the role of digital transformation in education, and shall give priority to the use of science, technology and innovation for the sector to evolve into an effective, efficient and disruptive force in society.

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Sec. 3. *Objectives.* – It is the objective of this Act to jointly create with the House of Representatives an EDCOM 2, to undertake a comprehensive national assessment and evaluation of the performance of the Philippine education sector for the purpose of recommending transformative, concrete and targeted reforms in the sector.

The national assessment and evaluation shall include the following:

- review of the observance of the mandates of the laws that created the three education sub-sectors, namely the DepEd, the CHED and the TESDA;
- determination of factors that have contributed to the continuing failure in learner performance on identified subject areas to meet the desired international and local standards;

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13	Sec. 5. Duration of EDCOM 2 The Commission shall accomplish its mandate	
14	within two (2) years from its organization.	
15	A Technical Secretariat shall co-exist with the Commission during the said two-	
16	year period to provide technical and administrative support to the Commission in the	
17	exercise of its powers and performance of its functions under Section 4 of this Act.	
18	For purposes of administrative oversight on the implementation of the short-	
19	term and long-term policy and program recommendations of the Commission, the	
20	Technical Secretariat shall exist for another two-year period which shall immediately	
21	commence after the duration of EDCOM 2.	
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23	Sec. 6. Composition The Commission shall be composed of ten (10)	
24	members, with five (5) members from the Senate and five (5) members from the	
25	House of Representatives.	
26	The members from the Senate shall be composed of the Chairpersons of the	
27	following committees:	
28	1. Committee on Basic Education, Arts and Culture;	
29	2. Committee on Higher, Technical and Vocational Education;

3	The members from the House of Representatives shall be composed of the

10	The Chairpersons of the Senate Committees on Basic Education, Arts and

13	Education shall serve as Co-Chairpersons of the Commission.		
14	The members of the Commission may establish standing committees from		
15	among its members and use resource persons from the public and private sectors as		
16	may be needed.		
17	The members of the Commission shall receive no compensation, but travelling		
18	communications, and other necessary expenses shall be allowed.		
19	The Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS) shall serve as the		
20	research arm of the Commission. During the course of the Commission's existence, it		
21	shall produce data-based research and provide analysis to contribute to the		
22	formulation of education policy recommendations. Payment for the goods and		
23	compensation for services to be entailed by the PIDS for the necessary fulfillment o		
24	this function shall be included in the amount to be appropriated for the Commission		
25	under this Act.

27	Sec. 7. Joint Congressional Oversight Committee (JCOC) on EDCOM 2		
28	Immediately after the two-year duration of EDCOM 2, there is hereby created a JCOC		
29	to oversee, monitor, and evaluate the implementation of the recommendations of the

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Commission. The JCOC shall be composed of five (5) members each from the Senate

- and the House of Representatives, with two (2) Co-Chairpersons and two (2) Co-Vice Chairpersons. Each chamber shall elect a Chairperson and a Vice Chairperson to be voted upon by the members of the JCOC who chair the following committees:
 - 1. Committee on Basic Education, Arts and Culture of the Senate;
 - 2. Committee on Higher, Technical and Vocational Education of the Senate;
 - 3. Committee on Basic Education and Culture of the House of Representatives; and
 - 4. Committee on Higher and Technical Education of the House of Representatives.

The Senate President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate the other three (3) members of the JCOC of the Senate and the House of Representatives, respectively, from among the members of the aforementioned committees, one (1) member of each chamber shall be from the minority.

Sec. 8. *Appropriations.* – The amount necessary for the implementation of this Act shall be sourced from the appropriations of the Senate and the House of Representatives under the General Appropriations Act.

Twenty Million Pesos (PhP20,000,000.00) shall be charged annually against the budget of the Senate, and another Twenty Million Pesos (PhP20,000,000.00) shall be charged annually against the budget of the House of Representatives, both for a period of two (2) years, to commence on the Fiscal Year 2022, and subject to authorized increases that may be made by Congress.

Sec. 9. *Separability Clause.* – If any provision or part of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining parts not affected shall remain in full force and effect.

Sec. 10. Repealing Clause. – All other laws, executive orders, presidential decrees, administrative orders, rules and regulations, issuances, or parts thereof inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed,

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Sec. 11. *Effectivity.* – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation.
