

AN ACT PROVIDING MEASURES TO PROTECT INIDIVDUALS EMGAGED IN FOOD, GROCERY AND PHARMACY DELIVERY SERVICES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The COVID-19 pandemic has forced most of us to stay at home as much as possible and avoid crowded places, such as but not limited to, restaurants, fast food outlets, supermarkets, and groceries. The delivery riders or drivers took so much risk and continued to work and provide for our needs during the pandemic, especially during the time of community quarantine and lockdown.

Unfortunately, the rights of these delivery riders or drivers had not been given much attention and the service providers had not been made accountable, as exposure to unjustified cancellation of orders or even instances of "no-show" customers continues, even though the delivery riders or drivers have already advanced or paid the ordered items. These fraudulent acts result in a waste of time, effort, and money on the part of the delivery riders or drivers. What aggravates the situation is that some of these canceling customers cannot be traced and be held accountable for collection as they use fake names, contact numbers, and/or addresses.

The said acts are very alarming and adequate protection to delivery riders or drivers must be provided. Thus, this proposed measure aims to ascertain whether the rights of the delivery riders or drivers are respected and whether the obligations imposed to food, grocery and pharmacy delivery service providers are fulfilled. This

bill mandates that the service providers cannot require delivery riders or drivers to advance any monetary amount for the fulfillment of orders, and in case of cancellation of confirmed orders, the service provider shall pay the delivery riders or drivers for the service fee due them. It is the service provider which has the duty to pursue claims for collection from its canceling customers, and must be responsible for and in charge of the registration and verification of identity of the customer. Further, for better protection of the delivery riders or drivers, this measure includes prohibition against cancellation of confirmed orders, placing of hoax orders, refusal to receive the unpaid orders, and using another person's personal information.

In view of this, early passage of this bill is sought.

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AN ACT PROVIDING MEASURES TO PROTECT INIDIVDUALS ENGAGED IN FOOD, GROCERY AND PHARMACY DELIVERY SERVICES

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- SECTION 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as "Food, Grocery, and Pharmacy Delivery Services Protection Act".
 - SECTION 2. *Definition of Terms.* For purposes of this Act, these terms are defined as follows:
 - (a) Food, Grocery, and Pharmacy Delivery Service—a form of courier or delivery service where a person through a mobile phone application, internet website or any other similar platform orders food, grocery or pharmaceutical items from a third-party seller and engages the service of a rider or driver for the delivery of said order for a fee;
 - (b) Food, Grocery, and Pharmacy Delivery Service Providers or Service Providers these are persons or entities who are engaged in the business of providing food, grocery and pharmacy delivery services by way of mobile phone applications, internet websites or other similar platforms;
 - (c) *Delivery Riders or Drivers* regardless of the existing contractual relationship with the service providers, these are persons who perform the delivery services by picking up the ordered items from the third-party seller,

1	and delivering the items to the customers who avail of the service;
2	(d) Confirmed Order - there shall be a confirmed order once the customer
3	sends his confirmation to the delivery or driver with respect to the order for
4	the purchase of food, grocery and/or pharmaceutical items.

6	SECTION 3. Prohibition Against Advance Payment. – It shall be prohibited for
7	any food, grocery, and pharmacy delivery service provider to require delivery riders
8	or drivers to advance any monetary amount for the fulfillment of orders.
9	In case of cancellation of confirmed orders, the food, grocery, and pharmacy
10	delivery service provider shall still pay the delivery riders or drivers for the service fee
11	due them as if the transaction was successful.
12	In turn, it shall be the duty of service providers to pursue claims for collection
13	from its cancelling customers.
14	Any investigation or inquiry conducted by the service providers on the propriety
15	or validity of the cancellation shall not affect the right of the riders/drivers to collect
16	their respective service fee as provided under this section.
17	Any food, grocery, and pharmacy delivery service provider who shall be found
18	to be in violation of the prohibition on requiring monetary advances from delivery
19	riders or drivers shall, upon conviction, be subject to the penalty of arresto mayor
20	and/or fine of an amount not exceeding One hundred thousand pesos (P100,000.00)
21	and the licenses and permits of said violators shall be revoked. This is without
22	prejudice to any other available remedies under existing laws.

If the violation is committed by a corporation, partnership, association, or any other kind of business entity that may be created by operation of law, the penalty provided in the next preceding paragraph shall be imposed upon its president, director, partner or any responsible officer that authorized monetary advances to be required.

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SECTION 4. *Know-Your-Customer Rules for Food, Grocery and Pharmacy Delivery Service.* – The service providers shall require its customers, prior to the registration with their mobile phone applications, internet websites or other similar platforms, to submit a valid proof of identity and residential address. Procedures for verification of identity shall likewise be implemented by the service providers. The processing of personal information done in accordance with this section shall be fully compliant with the requirements of Republic Act No. 10173, or the "Data Privacy Act of 2012."

SECTION 5. Prohibited Acts. -

- (a) *Using Another Person's Personal Information* It shall be unlawful for any person to use the personal information of another such as, but not limited to, name, address, and contact number when registering for any food, grocery, and pharmacy delivery service;
- (b) Cancellation of Confirmed Orders It shall be unlawful for any person to cancel a confirmed order unless such option is specifically allowed by the food, grocery, and pharmacy service hired;
- (c) Placing of Hoax Order It shall be unlawful for any person to: (1) place an order under the name of another unless the latter consented to the same;(2) place an order using a fictitious name, address, or both; and
- (d) Refusal to Receive Unpaid Order It shall be unlawful for any person to unjustly refuse to receive an order when such order has been placed by him personally or if the order is placed by virtue of his authority.

Any person who shall commit any of the prohibited acts as provided for in this section shall, upon conviction, be subject to the penalty of *arresto mayor* and/or fine of an amount not exceeding One hundred thousand pesos (Php100,000.00) without prejudice to any other available remedies under existing laws.

SECTION 6. *Repealing Clause.* – All laws, presidential decrees, executive orders, proclamations, rules and regulations, or any part thereof, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

- SECTION 7. Separability Clause. If any provision or part of this Act, or the application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held unconstitutional or invalid, the remained of this Act shall not be affected thereby.
- SECTION 8. *Effectivity.* This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days from its publication in the *Official Gazette* or in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
