AN ACT

INSTITUTIONALIZING THE PHILIPPINE BAMBOO INDUSTRY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM, APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

With somewhere between 44,000 to 53,000 hectares of bamboo stand across our islands, the bamboo industry is one of the biggest areas of agricultural potential for the country. Even now, without a dedicated institution and development plan to guide the growth of the industry. Bamboo has somehow managed to weather the storm—like the grass itself, the industry has proven itself resilient in the face of many challenges. It has kept its relevance as one of our most defining cultural signifiers, bringing a uniquely Filipino stamp to such things as the humble bahay kubo, or the 200 year-old Bamboo Organ of Las Piñas, or the innovative works of celebrated architects and designers like Bobby Mañosa or Kenneth Cobonpue. But we cannot let the future of the bamboo plant lie entirely on its cultural cachet.

Right now, we are the fifth biggest bamboo industry in the world, but our numbers pale in comparison to the billion-dollars bamboo industries of China and Vietnam. This industry has so much more potential and there is such a great demand for it in the local and international markets, especially in architecture and design, in chemical and medical industries, and in the culinary industry. The growth of the bamboo industry will mark a huge win for the nation—economically, culturally, and even environmentally.

Despite the bamboo's importance and potential, statistics on its resources, production, and trade in the Philippines remain scarce and inconsistent. The lack of reliable and comprehensive data on Philippine bamboo resources and utilization hinders its sustainable development, and limits bamboo's potential to contribute to the Philippine economy.

To remedy the issues involved in the current implementation of related activities and programs, this bill seeks to strengthen the Philippine Bamboo Industry Development Council, and create the Bamboo Industry Research and Development Center as the onestop shop for all bamboo industry related activities such as training and education, marketing and promotion, and research and development.

In view of the foregoing, the passage of this bill is earnestly sought.

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AN ACT INSTITUTIONALIZING THE PHILIPPINE BAMBOO INDUSTRY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM, APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

Section 1. *Title*. – This Act shall be known as the "Philippine Bamboo Industry
 Development Act of 2022".

Sec. 2. *Declaration of Policy.* – The State shall provide for a self-reliant and independent economy to its people. It shall support indigenous, scientific and technological capabilities, and skills. It shall establish a program to conserve, propagate and promote bamboo to be used as medium for furniture, food, construction materials and other uses. It shall promote the bamboo industry for poverty reduction, inclusive growth, environmental conservation and protection, agricultural productivity enhancement climate change mitigation and adaptation.

Sec. 3. *Objectives of this Act.* – This Act aims to make the Philippine bamboo
 industry competitive in the local and global markets while providing opportunities
 for local employment and establishing bamboo-based community enterprises by:

a) Ensuring that the bamboo industry has sufficient supply of quality raw materials
 through the establishment of nurseries and bamboo plantations;

- b) Ensuring that the bamboo industry continuously receives from the research and
 development sector relevant technologies and new products;
- c) Ensuring that the industry receives pertinent and accurate data from the center
 created under Section 8 of this Act, and other relevant sources upon which the
 industry can make business decisions;
- d) Promoting investments in the bamboo industry by providing substantial incentives
 to investors;

12	:	Sec. 4. The Philippine Bamboo Industry Development Roadmap To be
13	able to	attain the policy and objectives set forth in this Act, there shall be established a
14	Bambo	o Industry Development Roadmap which shall include but not be limited to

16	development, and commercialization of Philippine bamboo and bamboo products. The

Philippine Bamboo Industry Development Council. - There is 4 hereby created a Philippine Bamboo Industry Development Council (PBIDC), herein 5 referred to as the Council, which shall provide the overall policy and program directions 6 and coordinate the activities of various agencies and instrumentalities to ensure the 7 accomplishment, implementation and enhancement of the Roadmap. 8 The Council shall be administratively attached to the Department of Trade and 9 Industry (DTI). 10 Sec. 6. Powers and Functions of the Council. - The Council shall have the 11 following powers and functions: 12 a) Formulate the Philippine Bamboo Industry Development Roadmap; 13 b) Identify specific programs and projects in support and in line with the 14 Philippine Bamboo Industry Development Roadmap; 15 c) Promote and encourage the establishment of nurseries, bamboo plantations 16 and processing facilities that would accelerate the production and 17 commercialization of bamboo and various bamboo products; 18 d) Identify sources of financing to expand bamboo industry development; 19 e) Monitor and evaluate the performance of bamboo industry development 20 programs and projects; 21 f) Coordinate government agencies to carry out and implement bamboo industry 22 development programs and projects; 23 q) Coordinate with the private sector, people's organizations and non-government 24 organizations, and the academe to provide assistance on matters pertaining to 25 bamboo industry development; 26 h) Promote the commercialization and market access of appropriate, innovative 27 and viable bamboo industry development technologies and products; 28 i) Accept grants, donations and contributions from local and international donors 29 and such similar sources for the implementation of this Act, subject to the 30 usual budget, accounting and auditing rules and regulations. 31 j) Submit annual reports to the Office of the President, the Senate Committee on 32 Trade, Commerce and Entrepreneurship, and the House of Representatives 33 Committee on Trade and Industry on the status of bamboo industry 34 development in the country; and 35

Promulgate such rules and regulations and exercise such other powers and
 functions as may be necessary to carry out effectively the purposes and objectives of this
 Act.

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Sec. 7. Composition. – The Council shall be composed of the following:

e) Secretary of the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG); and

- a) Secretary of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) as the Chairperson;
- b) Secretary of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR);
- 7 c) Secretary of the Department of Agriculture (DA);
- 8 d) Secretary of the Department of Science and Technology (DOST);

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f) Two (2) representatives from the bamboo sector.

11 The DTI Secretary may designate the Undersecretary for Regional Operations 12 Group (DTI-ROG) as his/her alternate and shall have the same powers as his/her principal 13 and his/her acts shall be considered the acts of his/her principal.

- The Council members from the different departments may designate their respective alternates who shall be at least Assistant Secretary in rank and whose designation shall be on a permanent capacity and their acts shall be considered the acts of their principals.
- The Council shall regularly meet quarterly and may hold special meetings whenever the need arises to consider urgent matters upon the call of the Chairman or any four (4) Council members.

Sec 8. *Bamboo Industry Research And Development Center.* – The Bamboo Industry Research and Development Center, hereinafter referred to as the Center, shall be created to serve as the secretariat of the Council, headed by an Executive Director. The Executive Director, in addition to his/her duties in the Center, shall have the following powers and functions:

- a) Assist the Council in the performance of its tasks;
- b) Provide technical and administrative support to the Council;
- c) Oversee the day-to-day operations of the Center;
- d) Supervise the implementation of the plan and programs of the Council;
- e) Conduct capability-building initiatives for farmers, processors, designers, and
 other stakeholders;
- f) Conduct research and development in partnership with appropriate
 government agencies to advance sustainable bamboo industry development
 practices ;
- g) Submit periodic reports to the Council on the progress and accomplishment of
 programs and projects;

- h) Coordinate and tap other national government agencies, local government 1 units, academe, private industry associations, NGOs and civil society 2 organizations in the implementation of this Act; 3
- 4 5
- i) Perform such other functions, duties and responsibilities as may be necessary to implement this Act.

Sec. 9. Establishment of Local Bamboo Industry Development Council. -6 Provinces, cities and municipalities, when applicable, shall establish their respective local 7 Bamboo Industry Development Council. Local government units shall conduct a survey 8 of existing bamboo clumps and bamboo processing enterprises in their respective 9 localities. 10

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Sec. 10. Provision of Incentives to Investors in Plantation Development and Bamboo Processing Factories. - The following incentives shall be provided to 12 investors in plantation development and bamboo processing factories: 13

- a) Commercial production of bamboo, production of seedlings, establishment of 14 nurseries, and processing of bamboo-based products may qualify for incentives 15 under the National Internal Revenue Code, as amended, subject the criteria set 16 by the Fiscal Incentives Review Board, the Board of Investments (BOI), or the 17 appropriate investment promotion agency, as the case may be; 18
- b) Plantation shall be accepted as among the collateral for loans in government-19 owned or controlled banks; 20
- c) The plantation developer and bamboo processors shall be given priority to access 21 credit assistance and guarantee schemes being granted by government-owned, 22 controlled and/ or --supported financial institutions; 23
- d) Bamboo plantations shall not require a cutting permit for harvesting nor shall it 24 need a transport permit. Provided, That such plantation is registered with the 25 Community Environment and Natural Resources office (CENRO) of the DENR. 26
- Sec. 11. Appropriations. The amount necessary to carry out the provisions of 27 this Act shall be sourced from the unexpended contingency fund of the Office of the 28 President, and the existing budget for bamboo industry development and research under 29 the DTI and DENR. Thereafter, such amount as may be necessary shall be included in 30 the annual General Appropriations Act. 31
- Sec. 12. Implementing Rules and Regulations. Within six (6) months from 32 the effectivity of this Act, the DTI, in consultation with other concerned government 33 agencies, the academe, the private sector, and non-government organizations, shall 34 promulgate the necessary implementing rules and regulations for the effective 35 implementation of this Act. 36

Sec. 13. Separability Clause. – Should any provision herein be declared
 unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of the other provisions of this Act.

Sec. 14. *Repealing Clause*. – All laws, decrees, orders, rules, and regulations
 or other issuances or parts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed
 or modified accordingly.

Sec. 15. *Effectivity.* – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days following its full
 publication in the Official Gazette or two (2) newspapers of general circulation in the
 Philippines.
