



AN ACT

PROVIDING PROTECTION FROM LIABILITY TO VOLUNTEERS FOR ACTS OR OMISSIONS COMMITTED IN THE PERFORMANCE OF THEIR DUTIES DURING EMERGENCIES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The spirit of volunteerism is innate to the Filipinos. In fact, we have a unique term for it — "bayanihan" — that embodies our strong sense of community, selflessness, and genuine heart for humanity.

Volunteers expand the reach and defy the limitations of our emergency response infrastructure. Volunteers sign up and show up quickly upon the onslaught of typhoons, after the ruin of earthquakes, and grief over natural disasters to aid the relief operations. Today, as the country and the whole world face the unprecedented threat of the novel Coronavirus, armies of volunteers offer support, assistance and compassion to their fellow men, overcoming their own fears and reservations.

This bill recognizes the crucial role of voluntary endeavors in nation building. In conjunction to the Republic Act 9418 or the "Volunteer Act of 2007," the bill creates an "enabling and conducive environment for volunteer work" by protecting them from liabilities for acts committed in the performance of their duties during emergency situations. This measure was already approved on Third Reading by the House of Representatives during the Second Regular Session of the Seventeenth Congress.

However, in this version, we introduced several incentives for volunteers such as insurance coverage, access to training, leave privileges, and employment merits that may encourage more to be involved in worthwhile civic work.

In this light, the immediate passage of this bill is highly recommended.

PROVIDING PROTECTION FROM LIABILITY TO VOLUNTEERS FOR ACTS OR OMISSIONS COMMITTED IN THE PERFORMANCE OF THEIR DUTIES DURING EMERGENCIES

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- Section 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "Emergency Volunteer 1 Protection Act". 2 Sec. 2. Declaration of Policy. - It is a policy of the State to promote the 3 participation of Filipino citizens in public and civic affairs, and harness and strengthen 4 the practice of volunteerism as a strategy toward national development. The 5 inculcation of volunteerism as a way of life rekindles in every Filipino the time-honored 6 tradition of bayanihan to foster social justice, solidarity and sustainable development. 7 Towards this end, the State shall encourage individuals to volunteer and provide 8 reasonable assistance during emergencies by protecting them from liability. 9 Sec. 3. Definition of Terms. - As used in this Act: 10 11
 - (a) Volunteer refers to an individual or group who provides reasonable assistance and contributes time, service and resources in an emergency situation and who does not receive compensation for rendering volunteer

14 service;

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(b) Emergency refers to a situation requiring immediate attention and remedial 1 action involving an unforeseen occurrence, sudden, and impending threat 2 or danger to life, health or safety of a person; 3 (c) Volunteer Sectors refers to those sectors that organize themselves into 4 volunteers, to take advocacy and action primarily for local and national 5 development as well as international cooperation and understanding; 6 (d) Spontaneous Volunteer refers to an individual who may either be a trained 7 volunteer whose trainings may be from a volunteer service organization 8 (VSO), or volunteer or volunteer sector, or an untrained volunteer who 9 perform volunteering as necessitated by an emergency situation and 10 without the supervision and management of the VSO or the voluntary 11 sector. 12 Sec. 4. Liability Protection for Volunteers. – No volunteer shall be liable for harm 13 caused by an act or omission if: 14 (a) The volunteer was acting in an emergency situation at the scene of an 15 accident; 16 (b) The volunteer was properly licensed, certified or authorized by the 17 appropriate authorities, either government entities or nongovernment 18 organizations, for the activities undertaken in an emergency at the time of 19 the act of omission; and 20 (c) The harm was not caused by willful or criminal misconduct, gross 21 negligence, reckless misconduct, or a conscious, flagrant indifference to the 22 rights and safety of the individual harmed by the volunteer. 23 Sec. 5. Exceptions. - The liability protection for volunteers under this Act shall 24 not apply to the following conditions: 25 (a) If the misconduct constitutes a crime under the Revised Penal Code or an 26 offense in any special penal law; 27 (b) If the misconduct was performed by the volunteer under the influence of 28 intoxicating liquor or any dangerous drug at the time of the act or omission; 29 (c) If the volunteers are from business organizations that employ volunteers 30

for pecuniary purposes; and

- (d) If volunteers receive compensation for volunteering at a nonprofit organization. However, the nonprofit organization shall not be liable if it exercised due diligence in the selection and supervision of the volunteer.
 - Sec. 6. *Accreditation of Volunteers.* Unless properly licensed, certified or authorized by the proper appropriate government authorities, other government entities, and nongovernment organizations, volunteers must be accredited by and registered with the Philippine National Volunteer Service Coordinating Agency (PNVSCA) prior to deployment to be exempted from liability.
- Sec. 7. Additional Incentives for Volunteers. The PNVSCA shall sponsor and/or facilitate the provision of the following incentives for volunteers, upon consultation and in coordination with relevant government agencies and nongovernment organizations:
 - (a) Insurance coverage;
 - (1) Disability benefit
 - (2) Hospitalization, medical treatment and rehabilitation therapy
 - (3) Death benefit

- (b) Trainings, seminars and similar avenues for further education and skills improvement;
- (c) Additional special privilege leave benefits;
- (d) Employment merits commensurate to the length, kind and quality of volunteer work and service rendered that may translate to appointment, promotion, salary increase, regularization, or similar career and professional advancement.
- Sec. 8. *Nationwide Public Information Campaign.* The PNVSCA, in consultation with relevant government entities and nonprofit organizations, shall undertake a nationwide information education and communication campaign for the attainment of the objectives of this Act.
- Sec. 9. *Implementing Rules and Regulations* The PNVSCA, in consultation with relevant government entities and nonprofit organizations, shall promulgate rules and regulations to implement the provisions of this Act within ninety (90) days from its effectivity.

Sec. 10. *Separability Clause.* – If any provision or part hereof is held invalid or unconstitutional, the remainder of the law or the provision or part not otherwise affected shall remain valid and subsisting.

Sec. 11. *Repealing Clause.* – Any law, presidential decree or issuance, executive

order, letter of instruction, administrative order, rule, or regulation contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed, modified, or amended accordingly.

Sec. 12. *Effectivity.* – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the *Official Gazette* or in a newspaper of general circulation.
