## RESOLUTION

## URGING THE APPROPRIATE SENATE COMMITTEE, TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON POSSIBLE POLICY INTERVENTIONS FOR THE REVITALIZATION OF OUR GARMENTS AND TEXTILES INDUSTRIES, IN VIEW OF ITS POTENTIAL AS LOW-COST, LABOR-INTENSIVE INDUSTRIES WHICH CAN PROVIDE EMPLOYMENT IN THE COUNTRYSIDE AND CONTRIBUTE TO NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

1	WHEREAS, Section 19, Article 2 of the 1987 Philippine Constitution directs the
2	State to develop a self-reliant and independent national economy effectively controlled
3	by Filipinos;
4	WHEREAS, Section 1, Article 12 of the Constitution further urges the State to
5	promote industries that make full of efficient use of human and natural resources, and
6	which are competitive in both domestic and foreign markets;
7	WHEREAS, the Philippines was one of the pioneers of producing garments and
8	industries in Southeast Asia <sup>1</sup> ;
9	WHEREAS, the garments industry was one of our country's original export-
10	oriented industries, accounting for 20% of total Philippine exports and bringing in
11	around two billion dollars in foreign exchange at its peak;
12	WHEREAS, further, the garments industry employed up to 300,000 workers in
13	factories and 800,000 home-based individuals;
14	WHEREAS, on the other hand, the textiles industry was a complementary

15 industry which employed as many as 200,000 individuals under 200 firms;

WHEREAS, both the textiles and garment industries have fallen by the wayside
 due to bad policy decisions and unfortunate economic circumstances;

WHEREAS, 1996 was the last year that garments as a share of Philippine
exports reached double digits;

5 WHEREAS, according to data from the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA), the 6 share of garments in our exports has steadily fallen, eventually hitting an all-time low 7 of 1.38% in 2018<sup>2</sup>;

8 WHEREAS, our domestic garments and textiles industries are also facing stiff 9 competition in the country, as imports of clothing and fabrics averaged \$4.25 billion 10 annually<sup>3</sup>;

WHEREAS, as a result, the garments and textiles industries accounted for only
2.05% of Gross Value Added (GVA) in the past decade;

WHEREAS, the garments and textiles industries have great potential to expand,
provide employment, and eventually become export-oriented enterprises;

WHEREAS, according to a policy brief by Arangkada Philippines<sup>4</sup>, the textile and
 garment industries are low-cost, labor-intensive intensive industries which can
 generate employment in rural areas;

18 WHEREAS, according to the same policy brief, low-cost, labor-intensive 19 industries need the following elements to prosper:

- 20 (1) Low-rent standard factory buildings;
- 21 (2) Low-cost long-term land leases;

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- 22 (3) Programs to increase labor productivity;
- (4) Relaxed polices on hiring and firing;
- 24 (5) Targeted government training programs; *and*
- 25 (6) Special or low electricity rates;
- 26 WHEREAS, government agencies<sup>5</sup> have also identified garments and textiles as

a strategic industry which can contribute to national development, and have prepared
