AN ACT

ENHANCING ACCESSIBILITY IN THE VOTING OF SENIOR CITIZENS, PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES, PREGNANT WOMEN, AND INDIGENOUS **PEOPLES, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10366,** OTHERWISE KNOWN AS "AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE COMMISSION ON **ELECTIONS TO ESTABLISH PRECINCTS ASSIGNED TO ACCESSIBLE** POLLING PLACES EXCLUSIVELY FOR PERSONS WITH DISABLITIES AND SENIOR CITIZENS", PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER **PURPOSES**

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The recently conducted 2022 National and Local Elections demonstrates the pressing and urgent need to focus on the voting populations of senior citizens, persons with disabilities and indigenous peoples, as percentages of those who exercised their right to vote, in relation to the number of registered voters from these sectors, had been very lackluster.

According to latest data from the Philippine Statistics Authority, there are 12,336,355 Filipinos aged 60 years old and above as of May 2020. The total number of senior citizens is 11.31 percent of the country's estimated total population of 109,035,343¹. The Commission on Elections (Comelec) reported that senior citizens

comprise the biggest proportion of voters among all age groups, with almost 10.1 million voters ages 60 years and older.² However, Comelec data as of May 14, 2022 showed that only 50,068 senior citizens voted during the 2022 election out of the 10,085,956 registered voters under this sector,³ or only a shockingly 0.5 percent of the total registered senior citizen voters.

Moreover, the Comelec's Vulnerable Sectors Office's (VSO) data provides that there are almost 512,000 registered voters who are persons with disabilities in 2022, up from just 348,000 in 2019. Of this number, 109,299 has physical disabilities while 75,941 has visual disabilities.⁴ However, according to the Comelec data as of May 14, 2022, only 2,293 out of the 511,612 persons with disabilities had cast their votes,⁵ or only a very dismal 0.4% of said voters.

In addition, as per the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples, there are approximately 11.3 million indigenous people in the Philippines, amounting to 11- 12 per cent of the population.⁶ Based on Comelec data as of May 14, 2022, a total of 40,319 indigenous people participated in the 2022 general elections. The figure represents only 6.05 percent of the total number of registered voters among the said sector which was at 666,308.⁷

Although the pandemic had a significant role for these low suffrage numbers, the issue of accessibility and efficiency in voting, to avoid long queues or additional health risks such as heatstroke or fatigue, are likewise major voting considerations for these vulnerable sectors.

To address these issues, this Bill amends Republic Act No. 10366, otherwise known as "An Act Authorizing the Commission on Elections to Establish Precincts Assigned to Accessible Polling Places Exclusively for Persons with Disabilities and Senior Citizens," to allow early voting, provide an option for postal early voting, and designate accessible precincts exclusively for these identified vulnerable sectors, which are significant steps towards suffrage inclusiveness. This bill likewise includes additional vulnerable sectors of our society - the indigenous peoples and pregnant women, so that they can also enjoy these priority features for easier and faster voting.

In view of the foregoing considerations, the urgent passage of this measure is earnestly sought.

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ENHANCING ACCESSIBILITY IN THE VOTING OF SENIOR CITIZENS, PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES, PREGNANT WOMEN, AND INDIGENOUS PEOPLES, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10366, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS "AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE COMMISSION ON ELECTIONS TO ESTABLISH PRECINCTS ASSIGNED TO ACCESSIBLE POLLING PLACES EXCLUSIVELY FOR PERSONS WITH DISABLITIES AND SENIOR CITIZENS", PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1	SECTION 1. Short Title. – This Act shall be known as the "Better Voting
2	Accessibility for Seniors, PWDs, Pregnant Women, and IPs Act."
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4	SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy The State shall ensure that senior citizens,
5	persons with disabilities (PWDs), pregnant women, and indigenous peoples
6	(IPs) are able to exercise their right to political participation without restrictions.
7	The State shall devise systems and procedures that will enhance accessibility
8	in their voting process.
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10	SEC. 3. Definition of Terms As used in this Act, the term:
11	(a) Commission - refers to the Commission on Elections.

(b) Senior citizens - refer to qualified voters who are sixty (60) years or
 older.

3 (c) *Persons with disabilities* or *PWDs* - refer to qualified voters who have 4 long term physical, mental, intellectual, or sensory impairments which, in 5 interaction with various barriers, may hinder their full and effective participation 6 in society on an equal basis with others.

7 (d) *Pregnant women* - refer to qualified voters who are pregnant at the
8 time of the period for early voting and during election day regardless of the
9 number of trimester.

10 (e) *Indigenous peoples* - refer to qualified voters who belong to a group 11 of people or homogenous societies identified by self-ascription and ascription 12 by others, who have continuously lived as organized community on communally 13 bounded and defined territory, and who have, under claims of ownership since time immemorial, occupied, possessed and utilized such territories, sharing 14 15 common bonds of language, customs, traditions and other distinctive cultural 16 traits, or who have, through resistance to political, social and cultural inroads 17 of colonization, non-indigenous religions and cultures, became historically differentiated from the majority of Filipinos. IPs shall likewise include peoples 18 19 who are regarded as indigenous on account of their descent from the 20 populations which inhabited the country, at the time of conquest or 21 colonization, or at the time of inroads of non-indigenous religions and cultures, or the establishment of present state boundaries, who retain some or all of 22 23 their own social, economic, cultural and political institutions, but who may have been displaced from their traditional domains or who may have resettled 24 25 outside their ancestral domains.

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SEC. 4. *Early Voting.* - For national and local elections, there shall be early voting where senior citizens, PWDs, pregnant women, and IPs qualified to vote early may choose to cast their ballot for a period of not less than two (2) days within thirty (30) calendar days before election day at accessible establishments designated by the Commission. For this purpose, accessible establishments shall be located at the ground floor, preferably near the

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1 entrance of a building, shall be readily accessible to public transportation, and 2 shall be free of any physical barriers and provided with necessary infrastructure 3 and disability support services, including assistive devices, transport 4 wheelchairs, ramps, railings, sidewalk, adequate lighting, ventilation, and other 5 features for the senior citizens, PWDs, and pregnant women. Aside from 6 structural accessibility, the Commission shall provide live assistance for PWDs 7 such as sign language interpreters. There shall be a nationwide registration of 8 senior citizens, PWDs, pregnant women, and IPs who may wish to avail of their 9 early voting privileges to qualify them for early voting. Only those who are not 10 registered under the early voting system shall vote on election day.

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SEC. 5. *Option for Postal Early Voting*. - Senior citizens, PWDs, pregnant women, and IPs who registered for early voting shall have the option to cast their ballot via post in designated precincts: *Provided*, That voters who wish to vote via post must first be registered to do so with the Commission. The Commission shall provide rules, necessary safeguards, and confirmation procedures to properly implement this provision.

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19 SEC. 6. Emergency Accessible Polling Places (EAPP). - During election day, the Commission shall designate a room or a makeshift or temporary polling 20 place established at the ground of a voting center or outside of it but in close 21 22 proximity thereto, where senior citizens, PWDs, pregnant women or IP voters 23 may vote on election day. The Commission shall ensure that the voting procedure in the EAPP, including the facilities, materials, and a voting machine 24 25 in the event of automated elections, are adequate, appropriate, accessible, and easy to understand and use, and that reasonable accommodation shall be 26 27 granted to PWDs, senior citizens, pregnant women and IPs in order that they may fully exercise their right of suffrage. The Commission shall provide live 28 29 assistance for PWDs such as sign language interpreters.

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31 SEC. 7. Section 2(j) of Republic Act No. 10366 is hereby amended to 32 read as follows:

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1 "SEC. 2. Definition of Terms, -xxx

2 (a) xxx.

3 (j) Accessible polling piece refers to the venue where the Board of Election Inspectors (BEIs) conducts election-4 related proceedings and where the voters cast their 5 votes. The accessible polling place shall be located at the 6 7 ground floor, preferably near the entrance of the 8 building, SHALL BE READILY ACCESSIBLE TO 9 PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION, and [is] SHALL BE free of any physical barriers and provided with necessary 10 **INFRASTRUCTURE AND** services, including assistive 11 12 devices, TRANSPORT WHEELCHAIRS, RAMPS, RAILINGS, SIDEWALKS, ADEQUATE LIGHTING, 13 VENTILATION, AND OTHER FEATURES FOR 14 15 PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES, SENIOR CITIZENS, AND 16 PREGNANT WOMEN 17 **INDIGENOUS PEOPLES.**"

SEC. 8. Section 9 of Republic Act No. 10366 is hereby amended to read as follows:

21 "SEC. 9. [Creation of] Precincts for Persons with Disabilities and Senior Citizens, - The Commission is 22 hereby authorized to [establish] DESIGNATE precincts 23 [of a nonterritorial nature,] IN ACCESSIBLE POLLING 24 PLACES FOR THE exclusive [ly for] USE OF persons 25 with disabilities and senior citizens [who-in-their 26 registration records manifest their intent to avail of their 27 28 right to a separate precinct under this section. Pursuant 29 thereto, the Commission shall establish at least one (1) such precinct assigned to accessible polling places for 30 every voting center.], SUCH AS IN PUBLIC 31 SCHOOLS, TOWN HALLS OR PLAZAS, CIVIC 32

1 CENTERS, COMMUNITY CENTERS, OR OTHER 2 SIMILARLY DESIGNATED SPECIAL VENUES OR 3 AREAS, WITH PREFERENCE FOR VENUES 4 **DESIGNED WITH SPECIAL FEATURES TO ENSURE** 5 THEIR SAFETY AND COMFORT. Such precincts shall 6 be provided with assistive devices **PURSUANT TO THE** 7 PROVISIONS OF SECTION 2(J) OF THIS ACT as 8 well as the services of experts in assisting persons with 9 AS disabilities, SUCH SIGN LANGUAGE 10 INTERPRETERS.

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SEC. 9. *Implementing Rules and Regulations.* - Within ninety (90) days from approval of this Act, the Commission shall, in consultation with other relevant government agencies, non-governmental organizations, and civil society organizations, promulgate the rules and regulations necessary to implement this Act.

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18 SEC. 10. *Appropriations.* -The initial appropriation to carry out the 19 provisions of this Act shall be charged against the current appropriations of the 20 Commission. Thereafter, the amount necessary for the continued 21 implementation of this Act shall be included in the annual General 22 Appropriations Act.

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SEC. 11. *Separability Clause.* - If any provision of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional, the provisions not affected thereby shall remain in full force and effect.

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SEC. 12. *Repealing Clause.* - All laws, presidential decrees, executive orders, presidential proclamations, rules and regulations or parts thereof contrary to or inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

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- 1 SEC. 13. *Effectivity.* This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its
