S E N A T E Proposed Senate Resolution No477

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Introduced by Senator Aquilino "Koko" Pimentel III

A RESOLUTION DIRECTING THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON ACCOUNTABILITY OF PUBLIC OFFICERS AND INVESTIGATIONS (BLUE RIBBON) TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE RAMPANT AND UNABATED AGRICULTURAL SMUGGLING IN THE PHILIPPINES

WHEREAS, Section 2 of Republic Act No. 10845, otherwise known as the "Anti-Agricultural Smuggling Act of 2016", provides that it is the policy of the State to promote the productivity of the agriculture sector and to protect farmers from unscrupulous traders and importers, who by their illegal importation of agricultural products, especially rice, significantly affect the production, availability of supply and stability of prices, and the food security of the State;

9 WHEREAS, the issue of smuggling has been a decade-long 10 problem that has continued to be a burden in the country's agricultural 11 market. Unfortunately, up until now, smuggling persists, if not worse 12 than before. The government has not successfully eradicated or even 13 countered smuggling, which has greatly affected our farmers and the 14 consumers as well with the soaring prices of food commodities;

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WHEREAS, in September 2021, acting on to the Proposed Senate Resolution No. 992 of Senator Francis N. Pangilinan and the privilege speech of Senate President Vicente Sotto III regarding the
smuggling of agriculture products in the country, the Committee of the
Whole was convened to discuss the same;

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5 WHEREAS, the Committee of the Whole found that the amount 6 of technically smuggled agri-fishery commodities for the years 2019 to 7 2022 is estimated at P667.5 million. During that time, 31 smuggling 8 cases were pending from May 28, 2021 with the total amount of 9 smuggled goods estimated at P848,327,873.31;

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WHEREAS, the Committee also revealed a list of 22 "persons of interest" involved in large-scale agricultural smuggling, yet until now no smuggler has been sent to jail and agricultural smuggling remains rampant in the country;

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WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 10845 took effect on June 2016 and was supposed to protect the local farmers. However, seven years after its enactment, smuggled agricultural products are still hurting local food producers;

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WHEREAS, this year, at least P19 million worth of illegal sugar were discovered at the Manila International Container Port on January 11, 2023, and an estimated P20 million worth of red onions were reportedly seized in the Port of Zamboanga last January 22, 2023;

25 WHEREAS, none other than President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. 26 admits that smuggling is "absolutely rampant" and the systems 27 designed to address it are "ineffective".¹ He even called for the private 28 sector to help win the fight against rampant smuggling in the country². 29 In response, various agricultural stakeholders have offered to help the 30 government stop the chronic smuggling of food products that has 31 depressed local production and kept food prices high;³ 32 33

1 WHEREAS, to make matters worse, the DA has warned 2 consumers against patronizing white onions smuggled into the country. 3 According to DA, these smuggled agricultural products do not comply 4 with sanitary measures. In fact, some 100,000 kilos of smuggled onions 5 recently intercepted at the port of manila contained chemical residue 6 and traces of E. coli;⁴

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8 WHEREAS, all these are indicative that acts of malfeasance, 9 misfeasance and nonfeasance are still prevalent within concerned 10 government agencies such as the Department of Agriculture and 11 Bureau of Customs, causing agricultural smuggling to thrive;

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NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as it is hereby 13 resolved to direct the Senate Committee on Accountability of Public 14 Officers and Investigations (Blue Ribbon) to conduct an inquiry, in aid 15 of legislation, on the rampant and unabated agricultural smuggling in 16 the Philippines, which negatively impact our local farmers and 17 fisherfolks, pose great risks to the health of the Filipino consumers, and 18 deprive the government of its much-needed revenues, with the end in 19 view of identifying accountability and making changes to our anti-20 smuggling laws and processes, if found necessary. 21
