AN ACT

ENHANCING ACCESSIBILITY IN THE VOTING OF SENIOR CITIZENS, PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES, PREGNANT WOMEN, AND INDIGENOUS PEOPLES, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10366, PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Casting one's vote is a basic right in any democracy. Thus, the State must devise every possible way to make voting accessible to all. Senior citizens, persons with disabilities (PWDs), pregnant women, and indigenous peoples are among the sectors who, in one way or another, find it particularly more challenging and difficult to exercise suffrage on election day. The Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA), in its 2021 Philippine Statistics Population Projection, pegs the number of senior citizens at 9,863,192; registered PWDs at 1,732,296; and indigenous peoples at 9,229,762. The University of the Philippines Population Institute (UPPI) estimates the number of pregnant women at an average of 2 million at any given time. Clearly, these numbers are significant especially in elections.

Upholding the fundamental principle of social justice which is espouse by the no less than the Constitution, this bill seeks to provide these sectors an option for early voting. This will somehow alleviate the difficulties that they usually encounter on the actual election day when polling precincts are deluged with thousands of voters. The long queues under the scorching heat of the sun, poses a heavier burden on them who are already mostly physically challenged. They have vulnerabilities which make

it imperative that the State protect them and help them so that such they would not be the cause of their disenfranchisement.

Along with the option of early voting, this bill also seeks to enhance the existing Accessible Polling Places (APPs) and Emergency Accessible Polling Places (EAPPs).

In this light, consideration of this bill is earnestly sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Congress assembled:

Section 1. *Declaration of Policy.* – The State shall ensure that senior citizens, persons with disabilities (PWDs), pregnant women, and indigenous peoples (IPs) are able to exercise their right to political participation without restrictions. The State shall devise systems and procedures that will enhance accessibility in their voting process.

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Sec. 2. *Definition of Terms.* – As used in this Act, the term:

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- a. "Commission" refers to the Commission on Elections;
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b. "Senior Citizens" refer to qualified voters who are sixty (60) years or older:

- c. "Persons with Disabilities" or "PWDs" refer to qualified voters who have
- long term physical, mental, intellectual, or sensory impairments which, in
- interaction with various barriers, may hinder their full effective participation in
- society on an equal basis with others;

- d. "Pregnant women" refer to qualified voters who are pregnant at the time of the period for early voting and during election day regardless of the number of trimester;
- "Indigenous peoples" refer to qualified voters who belong to a group of e. people or homogenous societies identified by self-ascription and by others, who have continuously lived as organized community on communally bounded and defined territory, and who have, under claims of ownership since time immemorial, occupied, possessed and utilized such territories, sharing common bonds of language, customs, traditions and other distinctive cultural traits, or who have, through resistance to political, social and cultural inroads of colonization, non-indigenous religions and cultures, social and cultural inroads of colonization, non-indigenous religions and cultures, became historically differentiated from the majority of Filipinos. IPs shall likewise include peoples who are regarded as indigenous on account of their descent from the populations which inhabited the country, at the time of conquest or colonization, or at the time of inroads of non-indigenous religions and cultures, or the establishment of present state boundaries, who retain some or all of their own social, economic, cultural and political institutions, but who may have been displaced from their traditional domains or who may have resettled outside their ancestral domains;

Sec. 3. *Early Voting*. – For national and local elections, there shall be early voting where senior citizens, PWDs, pregnant women, and IPs qualified to vote early may choose to cast their ballot for a period of not less than two (2) days within thirty (30) calendar days before election day at accessible establishments designated by the Commission.

For this purpose, accessible establishments shall be located at the ground floor, preferably near the entrance of a building, shall be readily accessible to public transportation, and shall be free of any physical barriers and provided with necessary infrastructure and disability support services, including assistive devices, transport

wheelchairs, ramps, railings, sidewalk, adequate lighting, ventilation, and other features for the senior citizens, PWDs, and pregnant women.

Aside from structural accessibility, the Commission shall provide live assistance for PWDs such as sign language interpreters.

There shall be nationwide registration of senior citizens, PWDs, pregnant women, and IPs who may wish to avail of their early voting privileges to qualify them for early voting. Only those who are not registered under the early voting system shall vote on election day.

Sec. 4. *Option for Postal Early Voting.* – Senior citizens, PWDs, pregnant women, and IPs who registered for early voting shall have the option to cast their ballot via post in designated precincts: *Provided,* That voters who wish to vote via post must first be registered to do so with the Commission.

The Commission shall provide rules, necessary safeguards, and confirmation procedures to properly implement this provision.

Sec. 5. Emergency Accessible Polling Places (EAPP). – During election day, the Commission shall designate a room or a makeshift or temporary polling place established at the ground of a voting center or outside of it but in close proximity thereto, where senior citizens, PWDs and pregnant women voters may vote on election day.

The Commission shall ensure that the voting procedure in the EAPP, including the facilities, materials, and a voting machine in the event of automated elections, are adequate, appropriate, accessible, and easy to understand and use, and that reasonable accommodation shall be granted to PWDs, senior citizens, and pregnant women in order that they may fully exercise their right of suffrage. The Commission shall provide live assistance for PWDs such as sign language interpreters.

Sec. 8. *Implementing Rules and Regulations.* – Within ninety (90) days from approval of this Act, the Commission shall, in consultation with other relevant government agencies, non-governmental organizations, and civil society organizations, promulgate the rules and regulations necessary to implement this Act.

Sec. 9. *Appropriations.* – The initial appropriation to carry out the provisions of this Act shall be charged against the current appropriations of the Commission. Thereafter, the amount necessary for the continued implementation of this Act shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act.

Sec. 10. *Separability Clause.* – Should any provision of this Act or part hereof be declared unconstitutional, the other provisions or parts not affected thereby shall remain valid and effective.

Sec. 11. Repealing Clause. – All laws, decrees, orders, and issuances or portions thereof, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, are hereby repealed, amended, or modified accordingly.

Sec. 12. *Effectivity.* This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
