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### INTRODUCED BY SENATOR RONALD "BATO" DELA ROSA

### **AN ACT**

AMENDING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10845, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE ANTI-AGRICULTURAL SMUGGLING ACT OF 2016, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

Agricultural smuggling poses a significant threat to the economic stability of the Philippines, making a strong case for its classification as economic sabotage. This is precisely why the passage of the Anti-Agricultural Smuggling Act of 2016 was a step in the right direction. After all, behind the seemingly abstract concept of economic stability are real farmers with real livelihoods, as well as real Filipinos with real need for food and sustenance. Criminalizing and ultimately preventing agricultural smuggling is therefore a piece of legislation whose impact ought to be felt on all levels of society.

And yet, we find that agricultural smuggling still persists in the country. Early this year, the Bureau of Customs (BOC) was able to seize illegally imported agricultural products worth PHP2 billion<sup>1</sup> at various Philippine ports. Although this may be noted as an achievement on the part of the BOC, it is still alarming that such attempts are being made all over the country. It appears that the legislative safeguards set in place

by R.A. 10845 are not sufficient to deter smugglers, hence the need for this law to be amended.

First, under this amendment, smuggling will mean more than just smuggling. We take smuggling not just for what it is, but for what it has the potential to cause – economic sabotage. Second, we widen the scope of what is to be understood as agricultural economic sabotage, including hoarding, profiteering, cartel organization and/or participation, and other acts of market abuses. Third, this measure also proposes the establishment of an Inter-Agency Council on Economic Intelligence, for the purpose of more effectively combatting the evils of agricultural economic sabotage.

In the end, understanding agricultural smuggling as economic sabotage, and decisively acting in accordance to this understanding, are imperative for the Philippines to safeguard its economy and ensure sustainable development. By doing so, the government can send a clear message that it is committed to protecting its farmers, preserving food security, and maintaining a fair and transparent trade environment. This measure would not only deter potential smugglers but also reinforce the country's economic resilience and potential for growth.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

Section 1. The title of Republic Act No. 10845 is hereby amended to read as:

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FURTHERMORE, IT IS ALSO THE POLICY OF THE STATE TO THE AFFORDABILITY OF FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL COMMODITIES FOR FILIPINO CONSUMERS BY PREVENTING LARGE-SCALE ABUSE OF MARKET HOARDING AND OTHER PRACTICES TO MANIPULATE PRICES AND **UNDULY RESTRAIN SUPPLY.** 

The State shall impose higher sanctions for large-scale smuggling of agricultural products AND OTHER ABUSES OF MARKET POWER as selfpreservation measure to shield itself from the manipulative scheme of economic saboteurs, and to protect the livelihood of our farmers and to ensure their economic well-being AND THAT OF CONSUMERS."

Sec. 4. Section 3 is hereby amended to read as:

- "SEC. 3. Large-Scale Agricultural Smuggling As Economic Sabotage. The crime of large-scale agricultural smuggling as economic sabotage, involving sugar, corn, pork, poultry, garlic, onion, carrots, fish, and cruciferous vegetables, in its raw state, or which have undergone the simple processes of preparation or preservation for the market with a minimum amount of One Million Pesos (P1,000,000.00), or rice, with a minimum amount of Ten Million Pesos (P10,000,000.00), OR TOBACCO INCLUDING ITS FINISHED PRODUCTS, WITH A MINIMUM EXCISE TAX AND VALUE-ADDED TAX PAYABLE OF ONE MILLION PESOS (P1,000,000.00), as valued by the Bureau of Customs (BOC), is committed through nay of the following acts:

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(b) The penalty of imprisonment of not less than seventeen (17) years but not more than twenty (20) years, and a fine of twice the fair value of the smuggled, PROFITEERED, HOARDED, OR CARTELLED agricultural product and the aggregate amount of the taxes, duties and other charges avoided shall be imposed on the officers of dummy corporations, nongovernment organizations, associations, cooperatives, or single proprietorships who knowingly sell, lend, lease, assign, consent or allow the unauthorized use of their import permits for purposes of smuggling, PROFITEERING, HOARDING, OR CARTELLING.

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(c) The penalty of imprisonment of not less than fourteen (14) years but not more than seventeen (17) years, and a fine of twice the fair value of the smuggled, PROFITEERED, HOARDED, OR CARTELLED agricultural product and the aggregate amount of the taxes, duties and other charges avoided shall be imposed on the following:

(3) The registered owner and lessee of a warehouse, or any property,

who knowingly stores the smuggled, PROFITEERED, HOARDED,

(4) The registered owner, lessee, president or chief executive officer

of the private port, fish port, fish landing sites, resorts, and airports

who knowingly allows the agricultural product to be smuggled into

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Sec. 7. A new Section 6 shall be inserted after Section 5 of Republic Act. No. 10845 to read as:

"SEC. 6. INTER-AGENCY COUNCIL ON ECONOMIC INTELIGENCE. — THERE IS HEREBY CREATED AN INTER-AGENCY COUNCIL ON ECONOMIC INTELLIGENCE, HEREINAFTER REFERRED TO AS COUNCIL, WHICH IS MANDATED TO ENFORCE THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT AND TO PRINCIPALLY COMBAT SMUGGLING, HOARDING, PROFITEERING, AND CARTEL ORGANIZATION AND/OR PARTICIPATION: PROVIDED, THAT, THE TASK FORCE SHALL BE CO-CHAIRED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (DA), DEPARTMENT OF TRADE AND INDUSTRY (DTI) AND THE BUREAU OF CUSTOMS (BOC), AND SHALL INCLUDE AS MEMBERS THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE (DOJ), NATIONAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION (NBI), DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT (DILG), PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE (PNP), PHILIPPINE COMPETITION COMMISSION (PCC), NATIONAL SECURITY COUNCIL (NSC), AND NATIONAL INTELLIGENCE COORDINATING AGENCY (NICA)."

Sec. 8. Section 7 of Republic Act No. 10845 is hereby amended to read as:

"Section. 7. Prescription of Crimes. -The crime**S** punishable under this Act shall prescribe in twenty (20) years."

Sec. 9. *Implementing Rules and Regulations*. – The DA, DTI, AND BOC, in consultation with concerned agencies, shall promulgate the implementing rules and regulations of this Act within thirty (30) days upon its effectivity.

Sec. 10. Separability Clause. - If any portion of this Act is declared unconstitutional or invalid, the portions or provisions which are not affected shall continue to be in full force and effect.

Sec. 11. *Repealing Clause*. - All laws, decrees, executive issuances, rules and regulations inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed and/or modified accordingly.

Sec. 12. *Effectivity Clause.* - This Act shall take effect after fifteen (15) days
