AN ACT

STRENGTHENING PROTECTIONS AGAINST TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS, AMENDING FOR THIS PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 9208, AS AMENDED BY REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10364, ENTITLED "AN ACT TO INSTITUTE POLICIES TO ELIMINATE TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS ESPECIALLY WOMEN AND/OR CHILDREN, PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR ITS VIOLATIONS AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES"

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Republic Act No. 10364 or the Expanded Anti Trafficking in Persons Act was enacted into law only 2022. Despite its fairly recent passage, rapid and alarming developments in trafficking in persons demand immediate updates to the Philippines' anti trafficking law.

This bill seeks to introduce the following important reforms:

Firstly, it expands the definition of human trafficking to include the act of *forcing* the commission of illegai or fraudulent activities. This captures the phenomenon of "scam hubs" — large compounds that operate technology-facilitated fraudulent activities using human trafficking victims from developing countries — and the specific challenge of identifying TIP victims, recognizing their victimization and need for redress, and distinguishing them from scammers/ fraud operators.

Secondly, it imposes a penalty on the specific act of allowing the use of one's license, permit or franchise for the commission of TIP activities, a modus that surfaced during the senate investigations on the scam hubs where it became apparent that these illegal operations were taking advantage of the regulatory cover provided by licensed and registered online gambling facilities

Secondly, it introduces the crime of "human smuggling", which is the consensual facilitation of the entry or continued presence of a person without lawful status or documentation in a country where he or she is not a citizen or a resident. Human smuggling networks are usually large, cross-border criminal syndicates offering, for

large amounts of money, dangerous and illegal exit and entry routes to individuals who do not have the options to migrate legally.

Finally, the bill introduces the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) model which provides for a formal, comprehensive, integrated and multidisciplinary response to the investigation and disposition of cases involving child trafficking, with a view to reducing the number of times children are questioned and examined in courts or through legal processes, and coordinating therapeutic interventions and services for child victims.

The immediate passage of this bill is respectfully sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

Section 1. Short title. This Act shail be known as the "Expanded Anti-Trafficking" 1 Act of 2023. 2 Sec. 2. - (a) To recruit, obtain, hire, provide, offer, transport, transfer, maintain, harbor, or receive a person by any means, including those done under the pretext of domestic or overseas employment or training or apprenticeship, for the purpose of prostitution, pornography, sexual abuse or exploitation, production, creation or distribution of CSAEM or CSAM, forced labor, slavery, involuntary servitude, or debt bondage, OR FORCED COMMISSION OF ILLEGAL OR FRAUDULENT ACTIVITIES;

Sec. 3. Section 5 of Republic Act No. 9208 is hereby amended to read as follows: "SECTION 5. Acts that Promote Trafficking in Persons. – The following acts which promote or facilitate trafficking in persons shall be unlawful:

(A) To knowingly lease or sublease, use or allow to be used any house, building or establishment; or any vehicles or carriers by land, sea and air; and any of their online or digital platforms and applications, for the purpose of promoting trafficking in persons; PROVIDED, THAT IF THE VEHICLE IS OPERATING BY WAY OF A FRANCHISE, THE FRANCHISE SHALL BE CANCELLED;

(B) TO ALLOW THE USE OF THEIR LEGALLY-OBTAINED
REGULATORY LICENSE, PERMIT, OR FRANCHISE FOR THE
COMMISSION OF ACTS OF TRAFFICKING; PROVIDED THAT,
WHEN THE LICENSE OR PERMIT HOLDER IS A JURIDICAL
PERSON, THE PENALTY SHALL BE IMPOSED UPON THE OWNER,

5	Sec. 4. A new Section shall be introduced as follows:

10	CITY LEVEL SHALL, THROUGH THEIR LOCAL SOCIAL WELFARE
11	DEVELOPMENT OFFICES, ESTABLISH CHILD ADVOCACY CENTERS
12	(CACs) TO PROVIDE A FORMAL, COMPREHENSIVE, INTEGRATED AND
13	MULTIDISCIPLINARY RESPONSE TO THE INVESTIGATION AND

23	SUPPORT, MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHO-SOCIAL
24	SUPPORT, PROTECTION AND CUSTODY WHERE RELEVANT;
25	B. A VICTIM ADVOCATE THAT WILL SERVE AS THE PRIMARY
26	CONTACT AND LIAISON BETWEEN THE CHILD-VICTIM AND
27	GOVERNMENT AGENCIES, THE PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE AND
28	THE COURTS;
29	C. FORENSIC INTERVIEWS IN A CHILD-CENTERED, TRAUMA-

1	WHEN THE OFFENSE INVOLVES ONLINE SEXUAL ABUSE AND
2	EXPLOITATION OF CHILDREN (OSAEC), OR THE PRODUCTION AND
3	DISTRIBUTION OF CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE AND EXPLOITATION
4	MATERIALS (CSAEM), THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE CACS SHALL BE
5	IN COORDINATION WITH THE NATIONAL COORDINATING CENTER
6	AGAINST OSAEC (NCC-OSAEC).

8	THE CAC'S SHALL PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO ALL INDIVIDUALS WHO
9	WERE MINORS AT THE TIME OF COMMISSION OF THE CRIME

11	ACCORDANCE WITH EXISTING LAWS AND SUPREME COURT
12	CIRCULARS.

14	THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE CACS MAY BE FUNDED THROUGH
15	GRANTS AND DONATIONS FROM FOREIGN AND LOCAL SOURCES,
16	AND MAY ALSO BE SOURCED FROM THE GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT
17	(GAD) BUDGET IF THE CHILD VICTIM IS A GIRL.

19	Sec. 6. Section 24 of Republic Act No. 9208 is hereby amended to read as
20	follows:
21	"Section 24. Other Services for Trafficked Persons
22	(a) Legal Assistance Trafficked persons FILIPINOS OVERSEAS shall
23	be considered under the category "Overseas Filipino in Distress" and
24	may avail of the legal assistance created by Republic Act No. 8042,
25	subject to the guidelines as provided by law.
26	(b) Overseas Filipino Resource Centers The services available to
27	overseas Filipinos as provided for by Republic Act No. 8042 shall also be
28	extended to trafficked persons regardless of their immigration status in
29	the host country.
30	(c) The Country Team Approach The country team approach under
31	Executive Order No. 74 of 1993, shall be the operational scheme under
32	which Philippine embassies abroad shall provide protection to trafficked

1	persons insofar as the promotion of their welfare, dignity and
2	fundamental rights are concerned.
3	(D) FOR TRAFFICKED FOREIGNERS IN THE PHILIPPINES, THE
4	DSWD SHALL PROVIDE THE APPROPRIATE SERVICES IN
5	ACCORDANCE WITH PHILIPPINE OBLIGATIONS UNDER
6	INTERNATIONAL LAW, SUCH AS THE ASEAN CONVENTION
7	AGAINST TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS (ACTIP). WHERE AN
8	INTERPRETER IS NECESSARY, INTERPRETATION SERVICES
9	SHALL BE PROVIDED BY THE DSWD, IN COORDINATION WITH
10	THE EMBASSIES OF THE TIP VICTIM-SURVIVOR.

13	Sec. 6. Effectivity. – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after publication
14	in the Official Gazette or in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
