EXPLANATORY NOTE

This bill seeks to declare the Mountains of Banahaw and San Cristobal in Laguna and Quezon as a protected area.

The Mountains of Banahaw and San Cristobal are one of the biggest forest parks in the Southern Tagalog Region, covering 10,900 hectares of land area. Abundant in flora and fauna, the mountains provide a habitat for 14 endangered species. The Mountains of Banahaw and San Cristobal consist of different habitat types namely mossy forest, mid-montane forest, lowland dipterocarp tropical forest, parang and pioneer secondary growth forest and shrubland, and ricefield and plantation area. Identified as a crucial watershed, the mountains also serve as a tourism center. Similarly, considered as a sacred ground, the park is frequented by various religious sects.

Recognizing the value of this area, the Mountains of Banahaw and San Cristobal was established by virtue of Presidential Proclamation No. 411 dated June 25, 2003 as protected area.

This bill, therefore, seeks to declare the Mountains of Banahaw and San Cristobal as protected in order to protect it from indiscriminate exploitation and to be able to maintain its ecological balance and preserve its source of water supply.

Given the importance of biodiversity, it is deemed crucial that we act on these now to ensure that our children and the succeeding generations will inherit a living earth with all of its bountiful natural resources and vibrant wildlife.


In view of the foregoing, the passage of this measure is earnestly urged.

**AN ACT
ESTABLISHING THE MOUNTAINS OF BANAHAW AND SAN CRISTOBAL IN THE
PROVINCES OF LAGUNA AND QUEZON AS A PROTECTED AREA, UNDER THE
CATEGORY OF PROTECTED LANDSCAPE PROVIDING FOR ITS MANAGEMENT
AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES**

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in
Congress assembled:*

1 SECTION 1. *Title.* – This Act shall be known as the “Mts. Banahaw-San
2 Cristobal Protected Landscape (MBSCPL) Act of 2007”.

3 SEC. 2. *Land Classification.* – All lands of the public domain comprising the Mts.
4 Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape (MBSCPL) shall fall under the
5 classification of National Park as provided for in the Philippine Constitution.

6 SEC. 3. *Scope and Coverage.* – The boundaries of the Mts. Banahaw-San Cristobal
7 Protected Landscape (MBSCPL), which falls under the category of protected landscape
8 as defined herein, within the Municipalities of Sariaya, Candelaria, Dolores, Lucban, and
9 Tayabas in the Province of Quezon and the Municipalities of Rizal, Nagcarlan, Liliw,
10 Majayjay and the City of San Pablo in the Province of Laguna, are as follows:

9 Parcels I & II contains a total area of eleven thousand one hundred seventy-seven
 10 and 81/100 (11,177.81) hectares.

11 The technical descriptions provided in this Act will be subject to ground survey and
 12 verification to be conducted by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources.
 13 Any modification of the coverage of this Act due to such factors as changing ecological
 14 situations, new scientific or archeological findings, or discovery of traditional boundaries
 15 not previously taken into account shall be made through an act of Congress, after
 16 consultation with the affected public and concerned government agencies.

17 **SEC. 4. *Definition of Terms.*** – For purposes of this Act, the following terms are
 18 defined as follows:

19 (a) “Biodiversity” refers to variety and variability among living organisms and the
 20 ecological complexes in which said organisms occur.

21 (b) “Biological resources” includes genetic resources, organisms or parts thereof,
 22 population, or any other biotic component of ecosystems with actual or potential use or
 23 value for humanity.

24 (c) “Bioprospecting” means the research, collection and utilization of biological and
 25 genetic resources for purposes of applying the knowledge derived therefrom solely for
 26 commercial purposes.

27 (d) “Buffer Zones” refers to identified areas outside the boundaries of and
 28 immediately adjacent to designated protected areas that need special development
 29 control in order to avoid or minimize harm to the protected area.

30 (e) “By-products or derivatives” means any part taken or substance extracted from
 31 wildlife, in raw or in processed form. This includes stuffed animals and herbarium
 32 specimens.

33 (f) “Collection or collecting” is the act of gathering or harvesting wildlife, its by-
 34 products or derivatives.

35 (g) “Conservation” means preservation and sustainable utilization of wildlife, and/or
 36 maintenance, restoration and enhancement of the habitat.

37 (h) “Ecosystem” means the dynamic complex of plant, animal and micro-organism
 38 communities and their non-living environment interacting as a functional unit.

1 (i) "Endangered species" refers to species or subspecies that is not critically
2 endangered but whose survival in the wild is unlikely if the causal factors continue
3 operating.

4 (j) "Endemic species" means species or subspecies of flora and fauna which is
5 naturally occurring and found only within specific areas in the country.

6 (k) "Exotic species" means species or subspecies of flora and fauna which do not
7 naturally occur within the protected area at present or in historical time.

8 (l) "Habitat" means a place or type of environment where species or subspecies
9 naturally occurs or has naturally established its population.

10 (m) "Hunting" refers to collection of wild fauna for food and/or recreational purposes
11 with the use of weapons such as guns, bow and arrow, spear and the like.

12 (n) "Management Plan" refers to the fundamental plan, strategy and/or scheme
13 which shall guide all activities relating to the MBSCPL in order to attain the objectives of
14 this Act.

15 (o) "Mineral" refers to all naturally occurring inorganic substance in solid, gas, liquid,
16 or any intermediate state including energy materials such as coal, petroleum, natural
17 gas, radioactive materials, and geothermal energy.

18 (p) "Multiple-Use Zone" refers to an area where settlement, traditional and/or
19 sustainable land use, including agriculture, agro-forestry, extraction activities and other
20 income generating or livelihood activities, may be allowed to the extent prescribed in the
21 management plan.

22 (q) "National Integrated Protected Areas System (NIPAS)" is the classification and
23 administration of all designated protected areas to maintain essential ecological
24 processes and life-support systems, to preserve genetic diversity, to ensure sustainable
25 use of resources found therein, and to maintain their natural conditions to the greatest
26 extent possible.

27 (r) "NIPAS Act" refers to the National Integrated Protected Areas System Act
28 (NIPAS) of 1992 or Republic Act No. 7586, and its Implementing Rules and Regulations.

29 (s) "National Park" refers to the land of the public domain classified as such in the
30 1987 Constitution which include all areas under the National Integrated Protected Areas
31 System (NIPAS) pursuant to R.A. 7586 primarily designated for the conservation of
32 native plants and animals, their associated habitats and cultural diversity.

33 (t) "Non-Governmental Organization (NGO)" refers to an agency, institution,
34 foundation or a group of persons whose purpose is to assist peoples
35 organizations/associations in various ways including, but not limited to, organizing,
36 education, training, research and/or resource accessing.

37 (u) "People's Organization (PO)" refers to a group of organized migrant
38 communities and/or interested indigenous peoples which may be an association,

1 cooperative, federation, or other legal entity, established to undertake collective action to
2 address community concerns and needs, and mutually share the benefits of the
3 endeavor.

4 (v) "Protected Area" refers to identified portions of land and/or water set aside by
5 reasons of their unique physical and biological significance, managed to enhance
6 biological diversity and protected against destructive human exploitation.

7 (w) "Protected Area Management Board (PAMB)" refers to a multi-sectoral policy-
8 making body created in accordance with RA 7586 or the NIPAS Act of 1992.

9 (x) "Protected Landscape" refers to an area of national significance which is
10 characterized by the harmonious interaction of man and land while providing
11 opportunities for public enjoyment through recreation and tourism within the normal
12 lifestyle and economic activity of the area.

13 (y) "Quarrying" means the process of extracting, removing and disposing quarry
14 resources found on or underneath the surface of private or public land.

15 (z) "Special use zone" is an area containing existing installations of national
16 significance, such as telecommunication facilities, irrigation canals or electric power
17 lines.

18 (aa) "Strict protection zone" is a natural area with high biodiversity value which shall
19 be closed to all human activity except for scientific studies and/or ceremonial or religious
20 use by the indigenous cultural communities/indigenous peoples; may include habitats of
21 threatened species, or degraded areas that have been designated for restoration and
22 subsequent protection, even if these areas are still in various stages of regeneration.

23 (bb) "Tenured Migrants" refers to forest occupants who have actually and
24 continuously occupied a portion of the protected area and is solely dependent therein for
25 subsistence. A protected area occupant is understood to be "solely dependent for
26 subsistence" when everything indispensable for survival for the household, including
27 food, clothing, shelter and health, comes only from the utilization of resources from the
28 protected area.

29 (cc) "Wildlife" means wild forms and varieties of flora and fauna, in all
30 developmental stages, including those which are in captivity or are being bred or
31 propagated.

32 *SEC. 5. Management of the Mt. Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape*
33 *(MBSCPL) – There is hereby created a PAMB which shall have jurisdiction, power and*
34 *authority over the MBSCPL for all matters that may affect biodiversity conservation,*
35 *protection and sustainable development. It shall be composed of:*

36 (1) The Regional Executive Director (RED) of DENR Region IV-A as, chairperson;

37 (2) The Provincial Planning and Development Officer (PPDO) of the Province of
38 Quezon;

1 (3) The Provincial Planning and Development Officer (PPDO) of the Province of
2 Laguna;

3 (4) The Municipal Mayors of Sariaya, Candelaria, Dolores, Lucban and Tayabas in
4 the Province of Quezon, or their duly designated representatives;

5 (5) The Municipal Mayors of Rizal, Nagcarlan, Liliw, Majayjay, and City Mayor of
6 San Pablo City in the Province of Laguna, or their duly designated representatives;

7 (6) One representative from each barangay covering the MBSCPL;

8 (7) One representative from each departments or national government agency
9 directly involved in the MBSCPL or has long term projects or permanent facility located
10 therein;

11 (8) At least three (3) representatives from accredited NGOs operating in the
12 MBSCPL, chosen from among themselves;

13 (9) At least two (2) representatives from accredited POs operating in the MBSCPL,
14 chosen from among themselves;

15 (9) One representative from academic institutions directly involved in the
16 conservation of MBSCPL.

17 Each member of the PAMB shall serve for a term of five (5) years and shall be
18 considered to represent his or her sector and deemed to carry the vote of such sector in
19 all matters. In the case of members who are government officials, their appointment shall
20 be co terminus with their term of office.

21 The members of the PAMB shall be appointed by the Secretary of the DENR in
22 conformity with the provisions of the NIPAS Act. As a transitory provision, the initial
23 members of the PAMB shall be nominated from the current members of the interim
24 PAMB of the MBSCPL. Their nominations shall be conducted in a joint meeting of the
25 current members of the interim PAMB duly called for the purpose: *Provided*, That the
26 members shall include a number of women.

27 In the selection of the representatives of POs and NGOs, preference shall be
28 accorded to those organizations that are involved in the conservation, protection and
29 development of the MBSCPL. Representation shall be by institution and shall aim to
30 achieve balance in representation by geographic location or areas.

31 The representatives from the Local Government Units (LGUs) and national
32 agencies in the PAMB shall include among their duty to inform their respective
33 constituents, office or sector, of PAMB approved or other relevant policies, rules,
34 regulations, programs and projects, and to ensure that the provisions of this Act are
35 observed, complied with, and used as reference and framework in their respective plans,
36 policies, programs and projects. Failure to comply with the foregoing shall subject such
37 representative to disciplinary action as the PAMB may provide.

38 The members of the Board shall not receive any salary but shall be entitled to

1 reimbursements for actual and necessary expenses incurred, either in their attendance in
2 meetings of the Board or in connection with other official business authorized by a
3 resolution of the Board, subject to existing rules and regulations.

4 SEC. 6. *Powers and Functions of the PAMB* - The PAMB of the Mts. Banahaw-San
5 Cristobal Protected Landscape (MBSCPL), which shall decide by consensus or majority
6 vote, shall have the following powers and functions in addition to those provided under
7 RA 7586 or the NIPAS Act of 1992 and its implementing rules and regulations:

8 (1) Issue rules and regulations to prohibit acts that may be prejudicial to the
9 MBSCPL and to the declaration of policy set forth under the NIPAS;

10 (2) Issue rules and regulations for the resolution of conflicts through appropriate and
11 effective means;

12 (3) Adopt rules and procedures in the conduct of business, including the creation of
13 committees to which its powers may be delegated;

14 (4) Approve the management plan and oversee the office of the Protected Area
15 Superintendent (PASu);

16 (5) Establish criteria and set fees for the issuance of permits for activities regulated
17 by this Act or the management plan;

18 (6) Recommend the deputation of appropriate individuals for the enforcement of
19 the laws, rules and regulations governing the conduct or management of the MBSCPL;

20 (7) Approve fees and charges in accordance with DAO 51, Series of 2000 and raise
21 funds for the MBSCPL;

22 (8) Manage the allocation of the Mt. Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape
23 Fund, and other funds for the MBSCPL, ensure their proper administration and render
24 accounting; and

25 (9) Recommend appropriate policy changes to the DENR and other government
26 authorities.

27 The DENR, through the RED, shall ensure that the PAMB acts within the scope of
28 its powers and functions. In case of a conflict between administrative orders of national
29 application issued by the DENR pursuant to the NIPAS Act and the resolutions issued by
30 the PAMB, the PAMB shall notify the DENR Secretary who shall decide whether to apply
31 the rule or withdraw its application in MBSCPL.

32 SEC. 7. *The Protected Area Superintendent (PASu) Office*. –The Protected Area
33 Superintendent (PASu) Office is hereby created within the DENR regional office to be
34 headed by the PASu who shall serve as the Chief Operating DENR Officer of the entire
35 MBSCPL. The PASu shall report directly to the RED of the DENR-Region IV A and shall
36 be accountable to the PAMB. The PASu and the PASu staff shall reside within the
37 MBSCPL and establish an office and sub-offices within the MBSCPL in order to
38 implement this Act.

1 The PASu shall have full responsibility for the protection of land, water, wildlife and
2 other natural physical and biological resources within the MBSCPL. As such, the PASu
3 shall have the following duties and responsibilities in addition to those provided under
4 the NIPAS and its Implementing Rules and Regulations:

5 (1) Establish, operate and maintain a database management system as decision
6 support tool;

7 (2) Prepare the management plans as herein defined;

8 (3) Provide a secretariat for the PAMB and supply the PAMB with all the necessary
9 information to make appropriate decisions for the implementation of this Act;

10 (4) Enforce the laws, rules and regulations relevant to the MBSCPL, institute and
11 file legal action independently or in collaboration with other government agencies or
12 organizations and assist in the prosecution of offenses committed in violation of this Act;

13 (5) Monitor all activities within the MBSCPL to ensure its conformity with the
14 management plan;

15 (6) Recommend the issuance of permits based on terms, conditions and criteria
16 established by the PAMB;

17 (7) Ensure the integration of the MBSCPL management policies, regulations,
18 programs and projects at all the concerned national and Local Government Unit levels;
19 and

20 (8) Perform such other functions as the PAMB may delegate.

21 The PASu shall be supported by sufficient number of personnel who shall be
22 performing day to day management, protection and administration of the MBSCPL. Upon
23 the recommendation of the PAMB, the DENR Regional Director shall deputize local
24 community leaders and environment and natural resource officers.

25 SEC. 8. *Mt. Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape Fund.* – There is hereby
26 established a trust fund to be known as the Mt. Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected
27 Landscape Fund for purposes of financing projects of the MBSCPL. Seventy-five percent
28 (75%) of the income generated from the operation of the MBSCPL and/or management
29 of wild flora and fauna in the MBSCPL shall accrue to the Mt. Banahaw-San Cristobal
30 Protected Landscape Fund. The remaining twenty-five percent (25%) shall go to the
31 Integrated Protected Areas Fund (IPAF) as established in the NIPAS Act of 1992.

32 Income shall be derived from visitors/tourists fees, fees from permitted sale and
33 export of flora and fauna and other resources from the MBSCPL, proceeds from the
34 registration and lease of multiple-use areas, including tourism concessions, fees,
35 proceeds, and contributions from industries and facilities directly benefiting from the
36 MBSCPL, and such other fees and income derived from the operation of the MBSCPL.

37 The Mt. Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape Fund may be augmented by
38 grants, donations, endowment from various sources, domestic or foreign, for purposes

1 related to their functions: *Provided*, That disbursements therefrom shall be made solely
2 for the protection, maintenance, administration and management of the system, and duly
3 approved projects endorsed by the PAMB in accordance with existing accounting and
4 budgeting rules and regulations: *Provided, Further*, That the Fund shall not be used to
5 cover personal services expenditures.

6 The LGUs shall continue to impose and collect all other fees not enumerated herein
7 which they have traditionally collected, such as business permits and rentals of LGUs'
8 facilities. *Provided*, That the LGUs shall not impose property tax and issue tax
9 declaration for areas or properties located in timberland areas or areas previously
10 classified as national parks. Furthermore, LGUs may charge add-ons to fees imposed
11 by the PAMB: *Provided*, That such add-ons shall be determined based on the
12 contribution of the LGUs in the maintenance and protection of the MBSCPL.

13 **SEC. 9. Tenured Migrants and Other MBSCPL Occupants.** – Tenured migrants
14 shall be eligible to become stewards of portions of lands within allowable zones. The
15 PAMB shall identify, verify and review all tenurial instruments, land claims, and
16 issuances of permits for resource use within the MBSCPL and recommend the issuance
17 of the appropriate tenure instrument consistent with the zoning provided in the
18 management plan.

19 Should areas occupied by tenured migrants be designated as zones in which no
20 occupation or other activities are allowed pursuant to the attainment of sustainable
21 development, provision for the transfer of said tenured migrants to multiple use zones or
22 buffer zones shall be accomplished through just and humane means.

23 In the event of termination of a tenurial instrument for cause or by voluntary
24 surrender of rights, the PASu shall take immediate steps to rehabilitate the area in order
25 to return it to its natural state prior to the cultivation or other act by the tenured migrant.

26 **SEC. 10. Existing Facilities Within the MBSCPL.** – Within sixty (60) days from the
27 effectivity of this Act, existing facilities such as roads, buildings, water systems,
28 transmission lines, communication facilities, heavy equipment, and irrigation facilities
29 existing within the boundaries of the MBSCPL shall submit project description to the
30 PAMB through the PASu.

31 The PAMB, with the assistance of the DENR, shall determine whether the existence
32 of such facility and its future plan and operations will be detrimental to the MBSCPL or
33 whether conditions for its operation shall be imposed. If any such conditions are violated,
34 the owner of the facility shall be liable to pay a fine of Five Thousand Pesos (P5,000.00)
35 for every violation. Upon reaching a total fine of Five Hundred Thousand Pesos
36 (P500,000.00), the PAMB through the PASu and deputizing other government entities,
37 shall cause the cessation and demolition of the facility at the cost of its owner.

38 Existing facilities allowed to remain within the MBSCPL may be charged a

1 reasonable royalty by the PAMB. All income from such royalty shall accrue to the Mts.
2 Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape Fund.

3 SEC. 11. *Utilization of Resources.* – Any exploitation of or utilization of
4 nonrenewable resources within the MBSCPL shall not be allowed. Energy projects within
5 the MBSCPL shall be permitted only through an act of Congress except energy from
6 wind, sun and water sources and not more than one (1) megawatt capacity for mini-
7 hydro power: *Provided*, That these renewable energy projects are outside the strict
8 protection zone, adopt reduced impact technologies, and undergo the Environmental
9 Impact Assessment (EIA) system as provided by law and: *Provided, Further*, that the
10 PAMB has endorsed the project.

11 SEC. 12. *Special Prosecutor and Retained Counsel.* – Within thirty (30) days from
12 the effectivity of this Act, the Department of Justice (DOJ) shall appoint a special
13 prosecutor to whom all cases of violation of laws, rules and regulations in the MBSCPL
14 shall be assigned. Such Special Prosecutor shall coordinate with the PAMB and the
15 PASu in the performance of his/her duties and assist in the training of wardens and
16 rangers in arrest and criminal procedures. The PAMB may retain the services of a
17 counsel to prosecute and/or assist in the prosecution of cases under the direct control
18 and supervision of the regular or special prosecutor and to defend the members of the
19 PAMB, the PASu and the staff, or any person assisting in the protection, conservation
20 and sustainable development of the MBSCPL, against any legal action related to their
21 powers, functions and responsibilities as provided in this Act or as delegated or tasked
22 by the PAMB.

23 SEC. 13. *Prohibited Acts and Penalties.* – The following shall be the prohibitions
24 and penalties applicable to the Mts. Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape, in
25 addition to the prohibited acts as provided in the NIPAS Act and its Implementing Rules
26 and Regulations:

27 (A) The penalties and qualifications prescribed in Articles 309 and 310 of the
28 Revised Penal Code, depending on the value of the resources involved in connection
29 with the prohibited act shall be imposed upon any person who:

30 (1) Takes, destroys, collects, disturbs or possesses any wild terrestrial or aquatic
31 plants or animals, flora or fauna, sand, rocks or by-products derived therefrom, within
32 particularly identified regulated or prohibited areas zones in the MBSCPL including
33 private lands without the necessary permit, authorization or exemption: *Provided*, That
34 hunting of animals shall be absolutely prohibited except for scientific research;

35 (2) Cuts, gathers, removes or collects timber or any forest products, within
36 particularly identified regulated or prohibited areas or zones in the MBSCPL including
37 private lands without the necessary permit, authorization or exemption;

1 (3) Possesses or transports, within or outside the MBSCPL any timber, forest
2 products, wild terrestrial or aquatic plants, animals, or by-products derived therefrom
3 which is ascertained to have been taken from the MBSCPL;

4 (4) Undertakes mineral exploration or extraction within the MBSCPL;

5 (5) Engages in quarrying of sand, gravel, guano, limestone or any material within
6 the MBSCPL;

7 (6) Hunts, collects, removes or destroys any endangered or protected species,
8 except when collection or removal is for scientific research and exempted from the
9 prohibition by the PAMB;

10 (7) Conducts bioprospecting within the MBSCPL without prior PAMB approval in
11 accordance with existing guidelines; or

12 (8) Establishes or introduces any exotic species, within the MBSCPL, which are
13 detrimental to endemic and the ecosystem therein.

14 (B) A fine of not less than Five Thousand Pesos (P5,000.00) nor more than Five
15 Hundred Thousand Pesos (P500,000.00) and/or imprisonment from one (1) year but not
16 more than six (6) years shall be imposed upon any person who:

17 (1) Violates any rules and regulations in the management plan or by the PAMB or
18 *agreements reached before the PAMB* in the exercise of adjudicative functions;

19 (2) Erects any structure on land or on water for any purposes outside management
20 plan, duly allowed by the PAMB: *Provided, that large-scale private infrastructure and*
21 *other projects such as medium to high density residential subdivisions, medium to large*
22 *commercial and industrial establishments, golf-courses, heavily mechanized commercial*
23 *and non-traditional farming, and other activities that cause increased in-migration and*
24 *resource degradation are absolutely prohibited;*

25 (3) Possesses a chainsaw, hacksaw and other mechanized equipment within the
26 MBSCPL without a permit;

27 (4) Throws, dumps or causes to be dumped into the MBSCPL any non-
28 biodegradable material or waste whether liquid, solid or gas;

29 (5) Uses, dumps, places or causes to be placed into the MBSCPL toxic chemicals,
30 including pesticides and other hazardous substances, unless the same is expressly
31 allowed in the management plan;

32 (6) Prospects, hunts or otherwise locates hidden treasures within the MBSCPL;

33 (7) Informally occupies or dwells in any land within the MBSCPL *without clearance*
34 *from the PAMB;*

35 (8) Possesses or uses blasting caps or explosives anywhere within the MBSCPL;

36 (9) Destroys, excavates, vandalizes or, in any manner, damages any natural
37 formation on land, religious, spiritual, historical sites, artifacts and other objects of natural
38 or scenic value;

1 (10) Alters, removes or destroys boundary marks or signs; or

2 (11) Engages in *kaingin*, or, in any manner, causing forest fires inside the MBSCPL.

3 (12) Purchases, or sells, mortgages or leases lands or other portions of the
4 MBSCPL which are covered by any tenurial instrument.

5 Valuation of the damage for this Act shall take into account biodiversity and
6 conservation considerations as well as aesthetic and scenic value. Valuation assessed
7 by the DENR or the concerned government agency shall be presumed correct unless
8 otherwise proven by preponderant evidence.

9 Any person who shall induce another or conspire to commit any of the illegal acts
10 prohibited in this Act or suffer their workers to commit any of the same shall be liable in
11 the same manner as the one actually performing the act.

12 All conveyances, vessels, equipments, paraphernalia, implements, gears, tools and
13 similar devices shall be subject to immediate and administrative confiscation,
14 independent of the judicial proceedings by the PASu Office upon apprehension, subject
15 however to due process and substantial evidence requirements. When legal action is
16 however filed in the regular courts, the said conveyances, vessels, equipments,
17 paraphernalia, implements, gears, tools and similar devices, independent of the
18 administrative proceedings, shall not be released until after judgment has been rendered.
19 Proceeds of the sale of all objects administratively or judicially confiscated pursuant
20 hereto shall accrue to the Mt. Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape Fund.
21 Procedure for the sale thereof shall be promulgated by the PAMB. However, in no case
22 shall any confiscated or rescued protected animal species be sold or in any manner
23 disposed of but shall be immediately turned over to the PASu Office for release in its
24 natural habitat, subject to existing regulations.

25 The penalties specified in this Section will be in addition to the penalties contained
26 in RA 9072 (National Caves and Cave Resources Management and Protection Act), RA
27 9147 (Wildlife Resources Conservation and Protection Act), and other related laws.

28 Conviction for any offense under this Act, of a public officer or officer of the law shall
29 carry the accessory penalty of perpetual disqualification from public office.

30 SEC. 14. *Reporting Responsibility.* – The PASu, through the PAMB, shall submit an
31 annual accomplishment report to the Secretary of the DENR on the activities undertaken
32 in the MBSCPL.

33 SEC. 15. *Appropriations.* – The Secretary of the DENR shall immediately include in
34 the DENR's program the implementation of this Act, the funding of which shall be
35 included in the annual General Appropriations Act.

36 SEC. 16. *Construction and Suppletory Application of Existing Laws.* The provisions
37 of this Act shall be construed liberally in favor of achieving biodiversity conservation,
38 protection and sustainable development Provisions of Republic Act No. 7586, otherwise

1 known as the National Integrated Protected Areas Management Act of 1992 and existing
2 forestry laws, and their corresponding rules and regulations not inconsistent hereto shall
3 have the suppletory effect in the implementation of this Act.

4 *SEC. 17. Transitory Provision.* – In order to ensure the recovery and restoration of
5 biological diversity and to develop sustainable livelihood opportunities for tenured
6 migrants, the DENR shall henceforth cease to issue concessions, licenses, permits,
7 clearances, *compliance documents or any other instrument* that allows exploitation and
8 utilization of resources within the MBSPL until the management plan shall have been put
9 into effect.

10 All existing land use and resource use permits within the MBSCPL shall be
11 reviewed and shall not be renewed upon their expiration unless consistent with the
12 management plan and approved by the PAMB.

13 *SEC. 18. Repealing Clause.* – For the purpose of this Act, the provisions of
14 Republic Act No. 7586 or the NIPAS Act are hereby modified in accordance with the
15 provisions herein. All other laws, rules and regulations inconsistent with this Act are
16 hereby repealed or modified accordingly. The prohibitions and penalties under the
17 NIPAS Act are hereby superseded for the entire area covered by this Act.

18 *SEC. 19. Separability Clause.* – If any part or section of this Act is declared by the
19 courts as unconstitutional, such declaration shall not affect the other parts or sections
20 hereof.

21 *SEC. 20. Effectivity Clause.* This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its
22 complete publication in the *Official Gazette* or in a national newspaper of general
23 circulation available in the MBSCPL.
