- AN ACT SEPARATING THE CAMARINES SUR POLYTECHNIC COLLEGE-NAGA CITY CAMPUS (FORMERLY BICOL COLLEGE OF ARTS AND TRADES) IN THE CITY OF NAGA, PROVINCE OF CAMARINES SUR FROM THE CAMARINES SUR POLYTECHNIC COLLEGE IN NABUA, CAMARINES SUR, CONVERTING IT INTO A STATE COLLEGE TO BE KNOWN AS THE BICOL STATE COLLEGE OF APPLIED SCIENCES AND TECHNOLOGY AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1 SECTION 1. Separation/Conversion. – The Camarines Sur Polytechnic 2 College-Naga City Campus (formerly Bicol College of Arts and Trades 3 {BCAT}) in the City of Naga, Province of Camarines Sur is hereby separated 4 from the Camarines Sur Polytechnic College in Nabua, Camarines Sur, and 5 converted into a state college to be known as the Bicol State College of 6 Applied Sciences and Technology (BISCAST), hereinafter referred to as the 7 College. 1 SEC. 2. General Mandate. – The College shall primarily provide 2 advanced education, higher technological, professional and vocational 3 instruction and training in the sciences, arts, education, entrepreneurship, 4 engineering and related courses. It shall also undertake research and extension 5 services, and provide progressive leadership in its areas of specialization.

6 SEC. 3. *Curricular Offerings.* - The College shall offer undergraduate 7 and graduate studies in the fields of industrial technology, arts and sciences, 8 architecture, nontraditional courses and other degree/courses within its areas of 9 specialization and according to its capabilities as the Board of Trustees may 10 deem necessary to carry out its objectives, particularly to meet the needs of the 11 Province of Camarines Sur and the Bicol Region.

The existing high school shall be transferred to the jurisdiction and 12 13 supervision of the Department of Education (DepEd): Provided, That the high 14 school shall be allowed to remain and operate within the campus of the College until the existing students shall have completed their high school education: 15 Provided, further, That the College may operate a reasonably-sized laboratory 16 17 school, if it has a College of Education: Provided, furthermore. That the 18 existing graduate school shall become an integral part of the College of Education. 19

SEC. 4. Administration. – The College shall have the general powers of a corporation set forth in Batas Pambansa Blg. 68, as amended, otherwise known as the "Corporation Code of the Philippines". The administration of the College and the exercise of its corporate powers shall be vested exclusively in the Board of Trustees and the President of the College.

SEC. 5. *The Governing Board.* – The governing board of the College
shall be the Board of Trustees, hereinafter referred to as the Board, which shall
be composed of the following:

(a) The Chairperson of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), ł 2 Chairperson; (b) The President of the College, Vice Chairperson; 3 (c) The Chairperson of the Committee on Education, Arts and Culture 4 5 of the Senate, member; (d) The Chairperson of the Committee on Higher and Technical 6 Education of the House of Representatives, member; 7 8 (e) The Regional Director of the National Economic and Development 9 Authority (NEDA), member; (f) The Regional Director of the Department of Science and 10 Technology (DOST), member; 11 12 (g) The President of the faculty association of the College, member; 13 (h) The President of the student council of the College, member; 14 (i) The President of the alumni association of the College, member; 15 and (i) Two (2) prominent citizens from the private sector who have 16 17 distinguished themselves in their profession or fields of specialization of the 18 College, members. 19 The Board shall appoint the two (2) prominent citizens from among a 20 list of at least five (5) qualified persons in the Province of Camarines Sur, as 21 recommended by the search committee constituted by the College President, in 22 consultation with the Chairperson of the CHED, based on the normal standards 23 and qualifications for the position. 24 The term of office of the President of the faculty association, the 25 President of the student council and the President of the alumni association 26 shall be coterminous with their respective terms of office, as set forth in their 27 respective constitutions and bylaws.

1 The two (2) prominent citizens shall serve for a term of two (2) years 2 from the date of appointment.

3 SEC. 6. *Promulgation and Implementation of Policies.* – The Board 4 shall promulgate and implement policies in accordance with the declared State 5 policies on education and other pertinent provisions of the Philippine 6 Constitution on education, agriculture, science and technology, as well as the 7 policies, standards and thrusts of the CHED under Republic Act No. 7722, 8 otherwise known as the "Higher Education Act of 1994".

9 SEC. 7. Powers and Duties of the Board of Trustees. – The Board 10 shall have the following specific powers and duties, in addition to its general 11 powers of administration and the exercise of all the powers granted to the 12 board of directors of a corporation under existing laws:

(a) To promulgate rules and regulations as may be necessary to carryout the purposes and functions of the College;

(b) To receive and appropriate all sums as may be provided, for the
support of the College in the manner it may determine in its discretion, to carry
out the purposes and functions of the College;

(c) To import duty-free economic, technical and cultural books and/or
publications, upon certification by the CHED that such imported books and/or
publications are for economic, technical, vocational, scientific, philosophical,
historical or cultural purposes, in accordance with the provisions of the Tariff
and Customs Code of the Philippines, as amended;

(d) To receive in trust legacies, gifts and donations of real and personal
properties of all kinds and to administer and dispose of the same when
necessary for the benefit of the College and, subject to the limitations,
directions and instructions of the donor, if any.

Such donations shall be exempt from the donor's tax and the same shallbe considered as allowable deductions from the gross income in the

computation of the income tax of the donor, in accordance with the provisions t of the National Internal Revenue Code (NIRC) of 1997, as amended: Provided, 2 That such donations shall not be disposed of, transferred or sold; 3

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To fix the tuition fees and other necessary school charges such as, (e) but not limited to, matriculation fees, graduation fees and laboratory fees, as 5 6 the Board may deem proper to impose, after due consultations with the 7 involved sectors.

Such fees and charges, including government subsidies and other 8 9 income generated by the College, shall constitute special trust funds and shall be deposited in any authorized government depository bank, and all interests 10 11 that shall accrue therefrom shall form part of the same funds for the use of the 12 College.

Any provision of existing laws, rules and regulations to the contrary 13 14 notwithstanding, any income generated by the College from tuition fees and 15 other charges, as well as from the operation of auxiliary services and land 16 grants, shall be retained by the College and may be disbursed by the Boord for instruction, research, extension or other programs/projects of the College: 17 18 Provided, That all fiduciary fees shall be disbursed for the specific purposes 19 for which these are collected.

20 If, for reasons beyond its control, the College shall not be able to pursue 21 any project for which the funds have been appropriated and allocated under its 22 approved program of expenditures, the Board may authorize the use of said funds for any reasonable purpose which, in its discretion, may be necessary 23 24 and urgent for the attainment of the objectives and goals of the College:

25 (f) To adopt and implement a socialized scheme of tuition and school 26 fees for greater access to poor but deserving students;

(g) To authorize the construction or repair of its buildings, machinery, 1 equipment and other facilities, and the purchase and acquisition of real 2 property, including necessary supplies, materials and equipment; 3

4 (h) To appoint, upon recommendation of the President of the College, Vice Presidents, deans, directors, heads of campuses, faculty members and 5 other officials and employees of the College: 6

(i) To fix and adjust salaries of faculty members and administrative 7 officials and employees, subject to the provisions of the Revised Compensation 8 and Position Classification System and other pertinent budget and 9 compensation laws governing hours of service, and such other duties and 10 conditions as it may deem proper; to grant them, at its discretion, leaves of .11 absence under such regulations as it may promulgate, any provision of existing 12 law to the contrary notwithstanding; and to remove them for cause in 13 accordance with the requirements of due process of law; 14

(i) To approve the curricula, instructional programs and rules of 15 discipline drawn by the Administrative and Academic Councils herein 16 17 provided;

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(k) To set policies on admission and graduation of students:

(1) To award honorary degrees upon persons in recognition of their 19 20 outstanding contribution in the fields of education, public service, arts, science and technology, agriculture or in any field of specialization within the 21 academic competence of the College; and to authorize the awarding of 22 certificates of completion of nondegree and nontraditional courses; 23

(m) To establish and absorb nonchartered tertiary institutions within 24 the Province of Camarines Sur as branches and centers in coordination with the 25 26 CHED, and in consultation with the Department of Budget and Management 27 (DBM), and to offer therein programs or courses, to promote and carry out equal access to educational opportunities mandated by the Constitution; 28

1 (n) To establish research and extension centers of the College where 2 such will promote the development of the latter;

3 (o) To establish professional chairs in the College and to provide 4 fellowships for qualified faculty members and scholarships to deserving 5 students;

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(p) To delegate any of its powers and duties provided hereinabove to the President and/or other officials of the College as it may deem appropriate, so as to expedite the administration of the affairs of the College;

9 (q) To authorize an external management audit of the College, to be 10 financed by the CHED, subject to the rules and regulations of the Commission 11 on Audit (COA); and to institute reforms, including academic and structural 12 changes, on the basis of the audit results and recommendations;

(r) To collaborate with other governing boards of the state colleges and
universities within the Province of Camarines Sur or the Bicol Region, under
the supervision of the CHED and in consultation with the DBM, and work
towards the restructuring of the College to become more efficient, relevant,
productive and competitive;

(s) To enter into joint ventures with business and industry for the
profitable development and management of the economic assets of the College,
the proceeds from which shall be used for the development and strengthening
of the College;

(t) To develop consortia and other economic forms of linkages with
local government units, institutions and agencies, both public and private, local
and foreign, in the furtherance of the purposes and objectives of the College;

(u) To develop academic arrangements for institutional capability
building with appropriate institutions and agencies, public and private, local
and foreign, and to appoint experts/specialists as consultants, part-time or
visiting or exchange professors, scholars or researchers, as the case may be;

- (v) To set up the adoption of modern and innovative modes of 1 transmitting knowledge such as the use of information technology, the dual 2 learning system, open or distance education and community laboratory for the 3 promotion of greater access to education; 4
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(w) To establish policy guidelines and procedures for participative 6 decision-making and transparency within the College;

(x) To privatize, where most advantageous to the College, management 7 8 of nonacademic services such as health, food, building or grounds or property 9 maintenance and such other similar activities; and

- (v) To extend the term of the President of the College beyond the age 10 11 of retirement but not beyond the age of seventy (70), whose performance has been unanimously rated by the Board as outstanding, based on the guidelines. 12 13 qualifications and/or standards set by the Board, after unanimous recommendation by the search committee. 14
- 15 SEC. 8. Meetings of the Board. – The Board shall regularly convene at least once every quarter. However, the Chairperson of the Board may, upon 16 three (3) days' prior written notice, call a maximum of two (2) special 17 18 meetings whenever necessary.

A quorum of the Board shall consist of majority of all its members 19 holding office at the time of the meeting: Provided, however, That the 20 Chairperson of the Board or the President of the College is among those 21 22 present in the meeting.

In the absence of the Chairperson of the CHED, a Commissioner of the 23 CHED, duly designated by him/her, shall represent him/her in the meeting with 24 25 all the rights and responsibilities of a regular member: Provided, however, 26 That during this meeting, the President of the College as Vice Chairperson shall be the Presiding Officer: Provided, further, That this proviso 27 notwithstanding, the Chairperson of the CHED is hereby authorized to 28

designate a CHED Commissioner as the regular Chair of the Board, in which
 case said CHED Commissioner shall act as the Presiding Officer.

In the absence of the Chairpersons of the Congressional Committees on
 Education, they may designate their respective representatives who shall attend
 the said meetings with all the rights and responsibilities of a regular member.

6 The members of the Board shall not receive any salary but shall be 7 entitled to reimbursements for actual and necessary expenses incurred, either in 8 their attendance to meetings of the Board or in connection with other official 9 business authorized by resolution of the Board, subject to existing laws and 10 regulations.

11 SEC. 9. *The College President.* – The College shall be headed by a 12 President who shall render full-time service. He/she shall be appointed by the 13 Board, upon recommendation of a duly constituted search committee. He/she 14 shall have a term of four (4) years and shall be eligible for reappointment for 15 another term.

Within six (6) months before the expiration of the term of the incumbent
President of the College, the Board shall constitute the Search Committee for
the Presidency (SCP).

In case of vacancy in the Office of the President by reason of death, compulsory retirement, resignation, removal for cause or incapacity of the President to perform the functions of his/her office, the Board shall have the authority to designate an Officer-in-Charge of the College, pending the appointment of a new President.

In case of vacancy in the Office of the President as mentioned in the
immediately preceding paragraph, his/her successor or the Officer-in-Charge
shall serve only the unexpired portion of the term.

The powers and duties of the President of the College, in addition to
 those specifically provided in this Act, shall be those usually pertaining to the
 Office of the President of similar colleges, and those delegated by the Board.

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The salary of the President of the College shall be in accordance with the Revised Compensation and Position Classification System and shall be comparable to that being received by the Presidents of similar educational institutions.

8 The President shall be assisted by a Vice President for Academic Affairs
9 who shall be appointed by the Board upon recommendation of the President.

10 SEC. 10. *The Administrative Council.* – There shall be an 11 Administrative Council consisting of the President of the College as 12 Chairperson, Vice Presidents, deans, directors and other officials of equal rank 13 as members, whose duty is to review and recommend to the Board the policies 14 governing the administration, management and development planning of the 15 College.

SEC. 11. The Academic Council. - There shall be an Academic Council
to be composed of the President of the College, who shall act as Chairperson,
and all academic staff with the rank of at least an assistant professor, as
members.

20 The Academic Council shall have the power to review and recommend the curricular offerings and rules of discipline of the College, subject to the 21 22 approval of the Board. It shall fix the requirements for the admission of students, as well as for their graduation and conferment of degrees, subject to 23 review and/or approval by the Board through the President of the College. It 24 25 shall have the disciplinary power over students of the College and shall 26 formulate academic policies and rules and regulations on discipline, subject to 27 the approval of the Board.

SEC. 12. The Secretary of the College. - The Board shall appoint a
 secretary, who shall serve as such for both the Board and the College and shall
 keep all records and proceedings of the Board. He/she shall serve upon each
 member of the Board the appropriate notice of the Board meetings.

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SEC. 13. The Treasurer of the College. – The Treasurer of the Philippines shall be the *ex officio* treasurer of the College.

SEC. 14. The Faculty. – No political beliefs, gender preference, cultural or community affiliation or ethnic origin, and religious opinion or affiliation shall be a matter of inquiry in the appointment of faculty members of the College: *Provided, however*, That said appointment shall be subject to the guidelines, qualifications and/or standards set by the Board: *Provided, further*, That no member of the faculty shall teach for or against any particular church or religious sect.

SEC. 15. Scholarship Program/Admission. – The College shall provide
a scholarship program and other affirmative action programs to assist poor but
deserving students who qualify for admission to the College.

17 No student shall be denied admission to the College by reason of sex,18 religion, cultural or community affiliation or ethnic origin.

SEC. 16. Academic Freedom and Institutional Autonomy. - The
College shall enjoy academic freedom and institutional autonomy, pursuant to
paragraph 2, Section 5 of Article XIV of the Constitution of the Republic of
the Philippines.

SEC. 17. Authority to Loan or Transfer Apparatus/Equipment/Supplies and Detail of Personnel. – The heads of the bureaus and offices of the national government are hereby authorized to loan or transfer, upon the request of the President of the College, such apparatus, equipment or supplies as may be needed by the College, and to detail employees for duty therein when, in the judgment of the head of bureau or office, such apparatus, equipment, supplies

1 or services of such employees can be spared without serious detriment to the 2 public service. The employees so detailed shall perform such duties as 3 required of them by the President of the College, and the time so employed 4 shall be counted as part of their regular services.

SEC. 18. Assets, Liabilities and Personnel. - All assets, real and 5 6 personal, personnel and records of the Camarines Sur Polytechnic College-7 Naga City Campus (formerly BCAT), as well as liabilities or obligations, are 8 hereby transferred to the College. The positions, rights and security of tenure 9 of faculty members and personnel therein employed under existing laws prior 10 to the conversion into a College shall be respected.

11 Specific parcels of land belonging to the Provincial Government of 12 Camarines Sur and occupied by the Camarines Sur Polytechnic College-Naga 13 City Campus (formerly BCAT) are hereby declared to be property of the 14 College, and shall be titled under that name: *Provided*, *further*. That should the 15 College cease to exist or be abolished, or should such parcels of land aforementioned be no longer needed by the College, the same shall revert to 16 17 the Provincial Government of Camarines Sur.

SEC. 19. Appropriations. - The amount necessary to carry out the 18 19 provisions of this Act shall be charged against the current year's appropriations 20 of the Camarines Sur Polytechnic College-Naga City Campus (formerly 21 BCAT), except the sums needed to continue the operations of the existing high 22 school. Thereafter, such sums as may be necessary for the continued operation 23 and maintenance of the Bicol State College of Applied Sciences and 24 Technology (BISCAST) shall be included in the annual General 25 Appropriations Act.

SEC. 20. Development Plan, Management Audit, Organizational/ 1 Administrative/Academic Structure. - Within the period of one hundred twenty 2 (120) days after the approval of this Act, the College shall accomplish the 3 following: 4

(a) Submit a five (5)-year development plan, including its 5 CHED. corresponding program budget to the for corresponding 6 7 recommendation to the DBM;

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(b) Undergo a management audit in cooperation with the CHED; and

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(c) Accordingly set up its organizational, administrative as well as academic structure, including the appointment of the College key officials. 10

SEC. 21. Filing of Report. - On or before the fifteenth (15<sup>th</sup>) day of the 11 second (2<sup>nd</sup>) month after the opening of the regular classes each year, the 12 Board shall file with the Office of the President of the Philippines, through the 13 14 Chairperson of the CHED, and with both Houses of Congress a detailed report 15 on the progress, conditions and needs of the College.

SEC. 22. Suppletory Application. - The provisions of Republic Act No. 16 8292, otherwise known as the "Higher Education Modernization Act of 1997". 17 shall be an integral part of this Act and shall serve as part of the governing 18 19 charter of the College.

SEC. 23. Parity Clause. - All other powers, functions and privileges, 20 responsibilities and limitations to state colleges/universities and/or their 21 officials under existing laws shall be deemed granted to or imposed upon the 22 23 College and/or its officials, whenever appropriate.

SEC. 24. Implementing Rules and Regulations. - The Board, in 24 25 consultation with the CHED, shall formulate the guidelines to fully implement 26 the provisions of this Act.

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SEC. 25. Separability Clause. - If, for any reason, any part or provision
 of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining parts or
 provisions not affected thereby shall remain in full force and effect.

SEC. 26. *Repealing Clause.* – All laws, presidential decrees, executive
orders, rules and regulations contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of
this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

SEC. 27. Effectivity. - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after
its publication in two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
