## **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

The Constitution, Article 2, Section 15, provides:

The State shall protect and promote the right to health of the people and instill health consciousness among them.

Hazardous chemicals and substances that can threaten the health and safety of workers are being transported out of industries on workers' clothing and persons. These chemicals and substances have the potential to pose an additional threat and welfare of workers and their families.

Hence, this bill seeks to prevent or mitigate future incidents of home contamination that could adversely affect the health and safety of workers and their families, by providing information concerning issues related to employee transported contaminant releases and formulating regulations in order to prevent future releases of this type.<sup>1</sup>

7	Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:
8	SECTION 1. Short TitleThis Act shall be known as the "Workers' Family Protection
9	Act."
0	SECTION 2. Purpose It is the purpose of this Act to -
1	(A) increase understanding and awareness concerning the extent and possible health
2	impacts of the problems and incidents described in this Act;
13	(B) prevent or mitigate future incidents of home contamination that could adversely
14	affect the health and safety of workers and their families;
15	(C) clarify regulatory authority for preventing and responding to such incidents; and
16	(D) assist workers in redressing and responding to such incidents when they occur.
17	SECTION 3. Evaluation of Employee Transported Contaminant Releases
18	(A) STUDY -
19	(1) IN GENERAL - Not later than eighteen (18) months after the date of
20	enactment of this Act, the Secretary of the Department of Health (hereinafter in this Act
21	referred to as the "Secretary"), in coordination with the Secretary of the Department of
22	Labor and Secretary of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, shall
23	conduct a study to evaluate the potential for, the prevalence of, and the issues related to
24	the contamination or workers' homes with hazardous and substances, including infectious

agents, transported from the workplaces of such workers."

1	(2) MATTERS TO BE EVALUATED - In conducting the study and evaluation
2	under subsection (A), the Secretary shall -
3	a) Conduct an interview of past incidents of home contamination through the
4	utilization of literature and records concerning past investigations and
5	enforcement actions undertaken by any government and non-governmental
6	organizations, including educational institutions;
7	b) Evaluate current statutory, regulatory, and voluntary industrial hygiene or
8	other measures used by small, medium, and large employers to prevent or
9	remedy home contamination;
10	c) Compile a summary of existing research and case histories conducted on
11	incidents of employee transported contaminant releases including -
12	(i) the effectiveness of workplace housekeeping practices and personal
13	protective equipment in preventing such incidents;
14	(ii) the health effects, if any, of the resulting exposure on workers and
15	their families;
16	(iii) the effectiveness of normal house cleaning and laundry procedures for
17	removing hazardous materials and agents from workers' homes and personal
18	clothing;
19	(iv)indoor air quality, as the research Concerning such pertains to the fate
20	of chemicals transported from a workplace into the home environment; and
21	(v) methods for differentiating exposure health effects and relative risks
22	associated with specific agents from other sources of exposure inside and outside
23	the home;
24	d) Prepare and submit to the Task Force established under subsection (B) and to
25	the appropriate committees of Congress, a report concerning the results of the
26	matters studied or evaluated under subparagraphs (i) through (iii); and
27	e) Study home contamination incidents and issues and worker and family
28	protection policies and practices related to the special circumstances of

1	firefighters and prepare and submit to the appropriate committees of Congress
2	a report concerning the findings with respect to such study.
3	(3) DEVELOPMENT OF INVESTIGATIVE STRATEGY -
4	(a) TASK FORCE - Not later than twelve (12) months after the date of enactment
5	of this Act, the Secretary shall establish a working group, to be known as the Workers'
6	Family Protection Task Force. The Task Force shall -
7	(i) Be composed of not more than fifteen (15) individuals to be appointed
8	by the Secretary from among individuals who are representative of workers,
9-	industry, scientists, industrial hygienists, and government agencies, except that
10	not more than one (1) such individual shall be from each appropriate government
11	agency and the number of individuals appointed to represent industry and workers
12	shall be equal in number;
13	(ii) Review the report submitted under subsection (A)(2)(d);
14	(iii)Determine, with respect to such report, the additional date needed, if
15	any, and the need for additional data; and
16	(iv) if additional data are determined by the Task Force to be needed,
17	develop a recommended investigative strategy for use in obtaining such
18	information.
19	(b) INVESTIGATIVE STRATEGY -
20	(i) CONTENT - The investigative strategy developed under subparagraph
21	(A)(4) shall identify data gaps that can and cannot be filled, assumptions and
22	uncertainties associated with various components such strategy, a timetable for
23	the implementation of such strategy, and methodologies used to gather any
24	required data.
25	(ii) PEER REVIEW - The Secretary shall publish the proposed
26	investigative strategy under subparagraph (A)(4) shall identify for public
27	comment and utilize other method; including technical conferences or seminars,
28	for the purpose of obtaining comments concerning the proposed strategy.

	(iii)FINAL STRATEGY - After the peer review and public comment is

2	conducted under subparagraph (b), the Secretary, in consultation with the heads of
3	other government agencies, shall propose a final strategy for investigating issues
4	related to home contamination that shall be implemented by concerned agencies
5	for the period of time necessary to enable such agencies to obtain the information
6	identified under paragraph (1)(c).
7	(B) CONSTRUCTION - Nothing in this section shall be construed as precluding any
8	government agency from investigating issues related to home contamination using existing
9	procedures until such time as a final strategy is developed or from taking actions in addition to
10	those proposed in the strategy after its completion.
11	(C) IMPLEMENTATION OF INVESTIGATIVE STRATEGY - Upon completion of the
12	investigative strategy under paragraph (B)(iii), each agency or department shall fulfill the role
13	assigned to it by the strategy.
14	SECTION 4. Regulations
15	(A)IN GENERAL - Not later than four (4) years after that date of enactment of this Act,
16	and periodically thereafter, the Secretary of Labor, based on the information developed under
17	Section 3 and on other information available to the Secretary, shall -
18	(1) determine if additional education about, emphasis on, or if additional
19	regulations or standards is needed and will be sufficient, or if additional regulations or
20	standards are needed to protect workers and their families from employee transported
21	releases of hazardous materials; and
22	(2) prepare and submit to the appropriate committees of Congress a report
23	concerning the results of such determination.
24	(B)ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS OR STANDARDS - If the Secretary of Labor
25	determines that additional regulations or standards are needed under subsection (A), the
26	Secretary shall promulgate such regulations or standards as determined to be appropriate not
27	later than three (3) years after such determination.
28	SECTION 5. Authorization of Appropriations There are authorized to be appropriated
29	or each fiscal year such sums as may be necessary to carry out this Act.

SECTION 6. Separability Clause. - If any provision or part thereof, is held invalid or unconstitutional, the remainder of the law of the provision not otherwise affected shall remain valid and subsisting.

SECTION 7. Repealing Clause. - Any law, presidential decree or issuance, executive order, letter of instruction, administrative order, rule or regulation contrary to, or inconsistent with, the provisions of this Act is hereby repealed, modified, or amended accordingly.

SECTION 8. Effectivity Clause. - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
