RESOLUTION

URGING THE NATIONAL DISASTER COORDINATING COUNCIL AND OTHER ALLIED AGENCIES TO FORMULATE A COMPREHENSIVE DISASTER DEBRIS MANAGEMENT PLAN TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC FROM HEALTH HAZARDS POSED BY MOUNDS OF UNCOLLECTED GARBAGE AS A RESULT OF NATURAL CALAMITIES

Whereas, tropical storm Ondoy, which struck the country last 26 September, has left in its wake an overwhelming amount of garbage that remains uncollected to this day;

Whereas, many communities and residents are exposed to potentially hazardous elements because disaster debris and waste are mixed, mud-filled and not easy to segregate;

Whereas, disaster debris includes household debris (appliances, furniture, household goods), building debris (wood, concrete, metal, drywall), and vegetative debris (tree limbs, garden and farm wastes);

Whereas, according to Eco-Waste Coalition, some components of the waste stream require a different mode of retrieval and management to prevent the exposure of residents and waste workers, especially child waste pickers, to toxins that can harm human health and pollute the environment;

Whereas, the usual practice of merely hauling disaster debris and waste altogether to a dumpsite or landfill is totally ineffective in safeguarding the people and environment from harmful bacteria and chemicals;

Whereas, rubbish and wreckage from disasters contain "problem waste streams" such as asbestos, treated wood, putrescibles, electronics, fuels, lubricants, refrigerants and chemicals that require special handling and disposal;

Whereas, electronic waste such as computer and television sets, washing machines, compact fluorescent lamps and other common electrical devices and appliances contain a range of toxic chemicals such as heavy metals (cadmium, lead, mercury), persistent organic pollutants (brominated flame retardants, polychlorinated biphenyls) and other chemicals of concern;

Whereas, in addition, "the improper retrieval of copper wires, metal scraps and other recyclables can expose waste workers to a cocktail of toxic chemicals during the manual processing that can damage human health and also pollute the air, soil, and the surface and groundwater";

Whereas, the National Disaster Coordinating Council (NDCC), which is tasked to coordinate disaster prevention, preparedness and mitigation activities, must also endeavor to devise a plan to manage disaster debris and waste to avoid health and environmental contamination from haphazard dumping and improper recycling: Now therefore be it

RESOLVED, as it is hereby resolved, to urge the National Disaster Coordinating Council and other allied agencies to formulate a comprehensive disaster debris management plan to protect the public from health hazards posed by mounds of uncollected garbage as a result of natural calamities.
