EXPLANATORY NOTE

Almost all countries with successful human resource development programs are adopting the best practice of organizing their police academies and training schools directly placed under the heads of police forces such as the United Kingdom, United States, Singapore, South Korea, Thailand and China. However, pursuant to Sections 66 and 67 of Republic Act No. 6975, the Philippine National Police Academy (PNPA) and the Police National Training Institute (PNTI) and the National Police College (NPC) which conduct training to uniformed personnel of the Philippine National Police (PNP) are presently administered and controlled by the Philippine Public Safety College (PPSC), a separate and distinct bureau from the PNP.

The researches and studies performed by the PNP Reform Commission and the United Nations Development Programme revealed that the current set-up is ineffective and costly. The current structure allows lapses in coordination of training programs, and makes it difficult to develop a system for a well-developed plan and budget for training internal to the PNP. Further, there is mismatch between the PNP training expectations and requirements and the actual services provided by the PPSC.

Accordingly, the PPSC lacks accountability as to the quality of performance of police officers who graduated from its training institutions. The PNP remains at the receiving end of vicious criticisms and oftentimes suffering the blame for bungled and failed police operations, unsolved crimes, and many other inadequacies. The ineffectiveness and inefficiency in the structure and system frequently result in unnecessary cost and waste of resources and efforts because the PNP conducts its own re-orientation and specialization training programs thus duplicating those of the PPSC.

Considering that the training serves as a support system for the upgrading of operational capability of the PNP, the PNPA, PNTI and NPC should be placed under the administrative supervision and operational control of the PNP. The PNP is more in a position to provide its own training needs.

In view of the foregoing, its immediate passage is earnestly sought.

AN ACT

TRANSFERRING THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE ACADEMY (PNPA), AND POLICE NATIONAL TRAINING INSTITUTE (PNTI) FROM THE PHILIPPINE PUBLIC SAFETY COLLEGE TO THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE SECTIONS 66-67 OF REPUBLIC ACT NO. 6975

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. Section 66 of Republic Act No. 6975 is hereby amended to read as follows:

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"Section 66. Creation of the Philippine Public Safety College - there is hereby created the Philippine Public Safety College (PPSC), which shall be the premier educational institution for the training, human resource development and continuing education of all personnel of the Fire and Jail Bureaus. Said college shall also be

responsible in promoting advance education for PNP officers.

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Said college shall be under the direct supervision of a Board of Trustees composed of the Secretary and the TWO (2) bureau heads NAMELY: (1) CHIEF OF THE BUREAU OF FIRE PROTECTION (BFP); (2) CHIEF OF THE BUREAU OF JAIL MANAGEMENT AND PENOLOGY (BJMP); AND (3) CHIEF OF THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE (PNP).

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SEC. 2. Section 67 of Republic Act No. 6975 is hereby amended to read as follows:

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"Sec. 67. Composition, Powers and Functions – The College shall consist of the Fire Service Training Center, JAIL NATIONAL TRAINING INSTITUTE and other special training centers as may be created by the department, as follows:

- (a) Formulate and implement training programs for the personnel of the Department;
 - (b) Establish and maintain adequate physical training facilities;
- (c) Develop and implement research and development to support educational training programs;
 - (d) Conduct an assessment of the training needs of its clientele; and
- (e) Perform such other related functions as may be prescribed by the Secretary.

THE ADMINISTRATIVE AND OPERATIONAL SUPERVISION OVER THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE ACADEMY (PNPA), AND THE POLICE NATIONAL TRAINING INSTITUTE (PNTI) SHALL BE TRANSFERRED FROM THE PHILIPPINE PUBLIC SAFETY COLLEGE (PPSC) TO THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE (PNP)."

- SEC. 3. Transfer of Properties, Facilities, Personnel. There shall be complete transfer of all properties, facilities, records, equipment, funds, appropriations, choses in action, rights, functions, other assets as well as personnel of the PNPA and PNTI to the PNP.
- SEC. 4. Organizational Structure and Staffing Pattern. The Chief, PNP, within ninety (90) days from the effectivity of this Act, shall submit the revised organizational structure and

staffing pattern of PNPA, PNTI and NPC to the National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM)
and the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) for approval. The PNPA and PNTI shall
be headed by police commissioned officers with the rank of Police Chief Superintendent.
SEC. 5. Transition The Secretary of the Department of the Interior and Local
Government and Chairman, NAPOLCOM shall ensure the smooth transition of the transfer of
the PNPA, PNTI and NPC from the PPSC to the PNP within three (3) months from the
effectivity of this Act.
SEC. 6. Appropriations The amount necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act is
hereby authorized to be appropriated in the annual General Appropriations Act of the year
following its enactment into law and thereafter.
SEC. 7. Implementing Rules and Regulations Within ninety (90) days from the
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- SEC. 10. Effectivity Clause. This Act shall take effect upon its publication in at least
- 2 two (2) national newspapers of general circulation.
