

Introduced by Senator Miriam Defensor Santiago

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#### EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Constitution, Article 14, Section 2 (3) provides:

SEC. 12. The State shall:...

(3) Establish and maintain a system of scholarship grants, student loan programs, subsidies and other incentives which shall be available to deserving students in both public and private schools, especially to the underprivileged.

Nursing has been one of the fastest rising professions in our country. Due to the increase in opportunities to work abroad, nursing graduates have steadily increased over the past few years. Fely Marilyn Lorenzo, head of the University of the Philippines' Institute of Health Policy and Development Studies, said that in 2006, 397,195 students graduated with a nursing degree, up from 296,000 in 2005.<sup>1</sup>

Due to the increase in enrollment, our nursing education system is hard pressed to catch up with the demand. The current faculty shortage will be greatly compounded in the next few years by the retirement or migration of many of the current nurse faculty. Without sufficient nurse faculty, schools of nursing cannot expand enrollments, and the nursing shortage will continue to cripple our nation's health care delivery system.


This bill seeks to mandate the Department of Health to encourage programs that will engage the cooperation of private institutions not only in producing better nursing faculty but also in raising the level of nursing education altogether.<sup>2</sup>

1 2 3	AN ACT CREATING A PILOT PROGRAM TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF NURSE FACULTY TO MEET THE FUTURE NEED FOR QUALIFIED NURSES		
	Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:		
4	SECTION 1. Short Title This Act shall be known as the "Nurse Faculty Higher		
5	Education Act."		
6	SECTION 2. <i>Purposes</i> . – The purposes of this part are to create a pilot program:		
7	A. to provide scholarships to qualified nurses in pursuit of an advanced degree with		
8	the goal of becoming faculty members in an accredited nursing program; and		
9	B. to provide grants to partnerships between accredited schools of nursing and		
10	hospitals or health facilities to fund release time for qualified nurse employees, so that those		
11	employees can earn a salary while obtaining an advanced degree in nursing with the goal of		
12	becoming nurse faculty.		
13	SECTION 3. Definition of Terms For purposes of this Act, the term:		
14	A. "Secretary" means the Secretary of Health;		
15	B. "Health facility" means a health center, a rural health clinic, a nursing home, a		
16	home health agency, a hospice program, a public health clinic, a national or local department of		
17	public health, a skilled nursing facility, or ambulatory surgical center.		
18	SECTION 4. Competitive Grants Authorized The Secretary may, on a competitive		
19	basis, award grants to, and enter into contracts and cooperative agreements with, partnerships		

1 composed of an accredited school of nursing at an institution of higher education and a hospital 2 or health facility to establish not more than five pilot projects to enable such hospital or health 3 facility to retain its staff of experienced nurses while providing a mechanism to have these 4 individuals become, through an accelerated nursing education program, faculty members of an 5 accredited school of nursing.

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SECTION 5. Duration, Evaluation and Dissemination. -

7 A. DURATION- Grants under this part shall be awarded for a period of three to five8 years.

9 B. MANDATORY EVALUATION AND DISSEMINATION- Grants under this Act 10 shall be primarily used for evaluation, and dissemination to other institutions of higher 11 education, of the information obtained through the activities described in Section 2 (B).

SECTION 6. *Considerations in Making Awards.* – In awarding grants and entering into
 contracts and cooperative agreements under this Act, the Secretary shall consider the following:

A. GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION - Providing an equitable geographic
distribution of such grants.

B. RURAL AND URBAN AREAS - Distributing such grants to urban and rural
areas.

18 C. RANGE AND TYPE OF INSTITUTION - Ensuring that the activities to be
19 assisted are developed for a range of types and sizes of institutions of higher education.

20 D. PRIOR EXPERIENCE OR EXCEPTIONAL PROGRAMS - Institutions of 21 higher education with demonstrated prior experience in providing advanced nursing education 22 programs to prepare nurses interested in pursuing a faculty role.

23 SECTION 7. Uses of Funds. – Funds made available by grant, contract, or cooperative
24 agreement under this Act may be used:

A. to develop a new national demonstration initiative to align nursing education with
 the emerging challenges of healthcare delivery; and

1	B.	for any one or more of the following innovations in educational programs:
2		1. to develop a clinical simulation laboratory in a hospital, health facility, or
3		accredited school of nursing;
4		2. to purchase distance learning technologies;
5		3. to fund release time for qualified nurses enrolled in the graduate nursing
6		program;
7		4. to provide for faculty salaries; and
8		5. to collect and analyze data on educational outcomes.

9 SECTION 8. *Applications*. – Each partnership desiring to receive a grant, contract, or 10 cooperative agreement under this Act shall submit an application to the Secretary at such time, in 11 such manner, and accompanied by such information as the Secretary may require. Each 12 application shall include assurances that:

A. the individuals enrolled in the program will be qualified nurses in pursuit of a master's or doctoral degree in nursing and have a contractual obligation with the hospital or health facility that is in partnership with the institution of higher education;

B. the hospital or health facility of employment would be the clinical site for the
accredited school of nursing program;

18 C. individuals will also maintain their employment on a part-time basis to the 19 hospital or health facility that allowed them to participate in the program, and will receive an 20 income from the hospital or health facility, as a part-time employee, and release times or flexible 21 schedules to accommodate their class schedule.

- D. upon completion of the program, individuals agree to teach for two years in an accredited school of nursing for each year of support the individual received under this program
- SECTION 9. *Appropriations*. To carry out the provisions of this Act, such amount as
   hereby necessary is hereby authorized to be appropriated from the National Treasury.

SECTION 10. Separability Clause. - If any provision or part hereof is held invalid or
 unconstitutional, the remainder of the law or the provision not otherwise affected shall remain
 valid and subsisting.

SECTION 11. *Repealing Clause*. – Any law, presidential decree or issuance, executive order, letter of instruction, administrative order, rule, or regulation contrary to or inconsistent with the provision of this Act is hereby repealed, modified, or amended accordingly.

SECTION 12. *Effectivity Clause*. – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its
publication in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
