EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Constitution, Article 2, Section 20 provides that:

SEC. 20. The State recognizes the indispensable role of the private sector, encourages private enterprise and provides incentives to needed investments.

Information technology is one of the fastest rising industries in our country. In many countries around the world they have started using and encouraging the use of this technology to improve the quality and efficiency of their education system. It is clear that the Internet is one of the most fashionable areas of computing. It is affecting all subjects in Higher Education, not only altering teaching opportunities because of its new perspectives on communication and dissemination, but also opening up exciting new resources for students and lecturers alike. The Internet provides academics with an opportunity to make their teaching better, to allow them to teach in different ways to the standard one-to-many lecture, and to reach more students. Simply put, it allows for the "maximization" of learning.

This bill mandates the Department of Education to work with private institutions to accelerate the development of information technology to assist and improve the methods of teaching and our education system in general. By providing grants to eligible consortia, the government can not only promote the development of this technology but also encourage private sector participation.^{*}

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SECTION 4. *Duration.* – A grant, contract, or cooperative agreement under this Act shall
 be for a three (3)-year period, and may be renewed for one (1) additional year.

SECTION 5. Non-Government Share Requirement. – The government share of the cost
of any project funded under this Act shall not exceed seventy-five percent (75%). The nongovernment share of the cost of such project may be provided in cash or in kind, fairly evaluated,
including services.

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8 SECTION 6. Use of Funds. – An eligible consortium that receives a grant or enters into a 9 contract or cooperative agreement under this Act shall use funds made available under this Act to 10 carry out a project that:

11 A. develops long-term partnerships among members of the consortium that are 12 focused on effective teaching with modern digital tools and content that substantially connect 13 pre-service preparation of teacher candidates with high-needs schools; or

B. transforms the way departments, schools, and colleges of education teach classroom technology integration, including the principles of universal design, to teacher candidates.

SECTION 7. Uses of Funds for Partnership Grants. – In carrying out a project under
Section 7 (A), an eligible consortium shall:

A. provide teacher candidates, early in their preparation, with field experiences in
educational settings with technology;

B. build the skills of teacher candidates to support technology-rich instruction, assessment and learning management in content areas, technology literacy, an understanding of the principles of universal design, and the development of other skills for success in higher education and for entering the workforce;

C. provide professional development in the use of technology for teachers,
administrators, and content specialists who participate in field placement;

D. provide professional development of technology pedagogical skills for faculty of
 departments, schools, and colleges of education and arts and sciences;

3 E. implement strategies for the mentoring of teacher candidates with respect to
4 technology implementation by members of the consortium;

5 F. evaluate teacher candidates during the first years of teaching to fully assess
6 outcomes of the project;

G. build collaborative learning communities for technology integration within the .
consortium to sustain meaningful applications of technology in the classroom during teacher
preparation and early career practice; and

10 H. evaluate the effectiveness of the project.

SECTION 8. Uses of Funds for Transformation Grants. – In carrying out a project under
 Section 7 (B), an eligible consortium shall:

A. redesign curriculum to require collaboration between the department, school, or college of education faculty and the department, school, or college of arts and sciences faculty who teach content or methods courses for training teacher candidates;

B. collaborate between the department, school, or college of education faculty and the department, school, or college of arts and science faculty and academic content specialists at the local educational agency to educate pre-service teachers who can integrate technology and pedagogical skills in content areas;

20 C. collaborate between the department, school, or college of education faculty and 21 the department, school, or college of arts and sciences faculty who teach courses to pre-service 22 teachers to--

develop and implement a plan for pre-service teachers and continuing
 educators that demonstrates effective instructional strategies and
 application of such strategies in the use of digital tools to transform the
 teaching and learning process; and

2. better reach underrepresented pre-service teacher populations with programs that connect such pre-service teacher populations with applications of technology;

D. collaborate among faculty and students to create and disseminate case studies of technology applications in classroom settings with a goal of improving student achievement in high-need schools;

7 E. provide additional technology resources for pre-service teachers to plan and 8 implement technology applications in classroom settings that provide evidence of student 9 learning; and

F. bring together expertise from departments, schools, or colleges of education, arts and science faculty, and academic content specialists at the local educational agency to share and disseminate technology applications in the classroom through teacher preparation and into early career practice.

- 14 SECTION 9. *Application Requirements*. To be eligible to receive a grant or enter into a 15 contract or cooperative agreement under this Act, an eligible consortium shall submit an 16 application to the Secretary at such time, in such manner, and containing such information as the 17 Secretary may require. Such application shall include the following:
- 18 A. A description of the project to be carried out with the grant, including how the
 19 project will--
- develop a long-term partnership focused on effective teaching with
 modern digital tools and content that substantially connects pre-service
 preparation of teacher candidates with high-need schools; or
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 2. transform the way departments, schools, and colleges of education teach
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26 B. A demonstration of--

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1. the commitment, including the financial commitment, of each of the
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members of the consortium for the proposed project; and

1		2. the support of the leadership of each organization that is a member of the
