WHEREAS, the honor earned by our Filipino beauty queen deserves to be commended for the pride and recognition that she brought our country.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as it is hereby resolved by the Senate of the Philippines, To congratulate and commend Megan Lynne Young for honoring the Philippines with the prestigious Miss World 2013 title, and for showing the world the beauty and intelligence of the Filipina.

SPONSORSHIP SPEECH OF SENATOR POE

True to her word to treasure the core value of humanity, Ms. Megan Young embodies the best Filipino woman—simple, confident, intelligent, determined.

In fact, in one media interview, she charmed audiences with stories about how, when she was still a child growing up in Sta. Maria, they would catch grasshoppers and beetles for subsistence.

Mutya did not allow her underprivileged background to stifle her ambition and dampen her zest for life. On the contrary, poverty has only seemed to make her stronger and more determined in pursuing her dreams and aspirations. Soon, this "barrio lass" of uncommon beauty and poise started winning in beauty contests, first in her native Isabela province and eventually in the national level.

In closing, I would like to say that Mutya's victory is made all the more remarkable because of the problems and difficulties she encountered along the way. She is a personality that can be emulated by our youth that she can triumph over adversity and she can represent and give honor to our country.

And so, please join me in commending and congratulating Miss Mutya Johanna Datul for winning the 2013 Miss Supranational title and for being a beautiful human being.

PRIVILEGE SPEECH OF SENATOR LEGARDA

Availing herself of the privilege hour, Senator Legarda spoke of the International Day for Disaster Risk Reduction which was observed last October 13, 2013.

The full text of Senator Legarda's privilege speech follows:

As our nation strives for equitable socioeconomic development amid many recurring calamities, it is essential that we preserve our development gains through disaster risk reduction.

My advocacies through the years have been founded on this — to protect the environment, to reduce disaster risk, and to adapt to climate change towards a more resilient Philippines.

However, with the unabated rise in disaster losses — about 18-fold increase in economic losses since the 1970s — all sectors of our society must come together now and respond as one against disaster risk.

Congress has done its crucial work: new laws on disaster risk reduction and climate change, which the United Nations has hailed as model legislation, now prevail. And the mainstreaming of disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation into our development processes is now a national policy.

Yet much remains to be done to realize the benefits these laws ought to bring, especially to the poor and the vulnerable who are most in need of help and protection against disasters and most deserving of participation in resilience-building. The persons with disabilities are among them.

When typhoon *Pablo* ravaged several provinces in Mindanao in December 2012, about ten percent (10%) of the families affected had members with disabilities. In the town of Maragusan, Compostela Valley alone, 69 persons with disabilities suffered from the impact of the typhoon.

In Japan, the great earthquake and tsunami of 2011 killed tens of thousands of people, more than a thousand of them were persons with disabilities.

This neglected vulnerability conveys an important message to policy- and lawmakers like us: Our grand yearning for inclusive growth is meaningless when the humble yearning of the marginalized persons with disabilities remains unheard and unheeded.

This social exclusion that keeps the disabled person weak and vulnerable in times of disaster should come to an end.

We must reach out to them: In the Philippines, there are about one million Filipinos living with disability. All over the world, there are about a billion of them.

It is in this regard that the world observes this year's International Day for Disaster Reduction on October 13, with the theme, "Living with Disability and Disasters." The observance highlights the importance of involving persons with disabilities (PWDs) in the efforts to reduce risk and build resilient communities.

The recent survey by the United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNISDR) among persons with disabilities revealed that 86% of them have never participated in disaster risk reduction (DRR) planning; 73% do not have any personal disaster protection plan; while only 27.5% feel that their needs are addressed in local and community DRR plans.

In the same survey, some Filipino respondents shared that the national risk reduction plan is just for normal functioning individuals, that persons with disabilities are never invited to any consultations or initiatives pertaining to the issues they encounter during disasters and emergency situations, and that disaster risk reduction and management plans are prepared for the general public while there are no details on how to address the specific needs of persons with disabilities.

The persons with disabilities have spoken through this survey. We must continue to listen more and know more about their needs, about their challenges and about their abilities to cope with and to take part in disaster risk reduction efforts.

Although they are twice more likely to lose their lives or be injured than any other person, their disability does not mean inability. Actually, they can be and should be active partners in making communities safer and more resilient.

In the Philippines, the Handicap International helps local governments promote disaster risk management that is disability-inclusive. It has helped communities like Barangay Pagsangahan in San Miguel, Catanduanes, where barangay officials encourage persons with disabilities to take part in disaster preparedness programs. It also helped build an evacuation center that is accessible to persons with disabilities. We wish to see more of these good practices at the community level.

Advancing the cause for the disabled can be done more effectively. We have the laws that support the cause. These include:

- The Accessibility Law (R.A. 344), which requires that certain buildings, establishments and public utilities must be made accessible to PWDs;
- The Magna Carta for Disabled People (R.A. 7277), which ensures that PWDs enjoy the same rights as other citizens; and

The Philippine Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Act (R.A. 10121), which mandates that vulnerable and marginalized groups, including persons with disabilities, should be capacitated to be able to avert, prepare for and respond to the effects of disasters.

Let us engage the persons with disabilities in reducing disaster risk. Let us engage them in assessing vulnerabilities, and in establishing effective early warning systems in the communities, together with civil society groups concerned.

I believe that good practices in reducing disaster risk and adapting to climate change abound in our country. They should be known and shared to other communities if we are to build a resilient society.

In this connection, I would also like to take this opportunity to announce the start of a yearlong search for the first recipients of the Philippine Resilience Award — a joint undertaking of the UNISDR, the Senate Committee on Climate Change, and the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council, that will recognize exemplary champions of disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation in the country. This includes individuals and local government units.

This recognition system shall showcase local best practices on DRR and CCA, including the successful and exemplary implementation by the LGUs of the various related laws like the Solid Waste Management Act, the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Act, and the Climate Change Act. It is hoped that the award will inspire and encourage our local communities to strengthen further their resilience.

Through the UNISDR, I also wish to call on other nations to create their own resilience awards. Time is of the essence. We need to scale up our efforts in building our defenses against the effects of disasters and climate change. The Resilience Awards will be an effective tool to encourage national and local governments to take immediate action in reducing disaster risk.

In closing, I wish to re-emphasize that disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation are fundamental prerequisites of inclusive, resilient, and sustainable development that our nation strives for. Thus, they equally deserve our commitment.

To preserve our gains, to remain focused, and to advance the cause of building the resilience of communities is the only path forward.

With faith in God and our people, we must take this path and face squarely the many challenges ahead for the benefit of our generation today and tomorrow.

INTERPELLATION OF SENATOR CAYETANO (P)

At the outset, Senator Cayetano (P) commended Senator Legarda for raising the issue of disaster risk management as it relates to the rights of the differently-abled sector. She said that it is the duty of the members of Congress who work on the budget to craft laws that ensure the best use of limited resources. She lamented, however, that Congress usually fails to consider the negative impact or the cost of not empowering the marginalized sectors. including women, differently-abled and senior citizens. In fact, she said, the differently-abled sector was never represented in the consultation process, as well as the youth and senior citizens which comprise majority of the victims. She suggested the inclusion of marginalized sectors in the training for disaster risk management that could save the government so much in costs. Senator Legarda acknowledged the proposal to include the differently-abled in the consultation process as she agreed that the indigenous people, the women and children, the poor and the marginalized are almost always the most vulnerable and most adversely affected during times of disasters and calamities.

Adding to the laws earlier presented by Senator Legarda, Senator Cayetano (P) sought to include other relevant laws concerning the differently-abled sector, namely, Republic Act No. 10070, which requires every LGU to have a person-with-disability (PWD) office. She presumed that each LGU should have its own PWD but under the supervision of the DILG.

Senator Legarda said that the DILG should be asked during the budget deliberations whether it has complied with the law and whether the law was being implemented. Senator Cayetano (P) concurred, stating that the law was passed following the request of various organizations. She explained that some LGUs must have a focal person, if not a PWD affairs office, depending on their size and class, as some LGUs, like the fourth- and fifth-class municipalities, could not afford to have one. Senator Legarda opined that a PWD focal person could be utilized so that the government can be reminded of their needs.

Senator Cayetano (P) also pointed out Section 5 of R.A. No. 7277 (Magna Carta of Disabled Persons) which mandates the DSWD, Department of Health, DepEd and other government agencies, offices or corporations to employ PWDs to comprise at least 5% of their staff, whether in casual, emergency or contractual capacity. She said that the law requires PWDs to be incorporated in the system, and if possible to give them the opportunity to be trained. She recalled having a lady intern who was hearingimpaired, and that dealing with her gave her staff members the opportunity to learn basic sign language in the span of three months. She said that she would file a bill seeking to adopt one of the international sign language systems and, hopefully, those involved in disaster risk management could also learn basic knowledge in coordinating and communicating properly with PWDs.

Replying thereto, Senator Legarda stated that the UNISDR recently launched its resilience campaign which included PWDs. She said that the reason for her privilege speech, in fact, was to help UNISDR in its campaign to include PWDs in policy-making and training in disaster risk reduction.

Senator Cayetano (P) expressed her commitment to support the initiative, while Senator Legarda proposed to work with Senator Binay, who chairs the Committee on Social Justice, Welfare and Rural Development to which the PWD sector belongs, and with Senator Cayetano (P), the author of the PWD law, in establishing a socially inclusive regime.

INTERPELLATION OF SENATOR PIMENTEL

Senator Pimentel also lauded Senator Legarda for the launching of the first ever Philippine Resilience Awards. Asked on the parameters needed to qualify for the awards, Senator Legarda replied that there would be a formal launching of the contest among the agencies concerned and that the criteria for the awards would fall under the 10 bullet points of the Hyogo Framework for Action (HFA). She added that the award is meant for local communities, LGUs, individuals and people's organizations that have built their resilience through technology by making sure that their communities are prepared for disasters, for instance, the institution of an early warning device or the cleaning up of drainage and canals. She cited a recent newspaper article which reported zero-casualty in Batanes despite being hit by a strong typhoon because the province has been very resilient. She also mentioned the municipality of San Francisco in Camotes Island that instituted a major *purok* system to implement DRR and solid waste management program.

At this juncture, Senator Legarda presented the 10-point essentials for making cities or communities resilient, to wit:

- By putting in place organization and coordination, a basic understanding of what DRR is, and ensuring that all departments in their localities are prepared;
- By putting an incentive system in the local level for those who have assigned a budget for DRR and for those who have incentives for people who abide by DRR;
- Those who have updated data on their hazards, their vulnerabilities, those who have risk assessment and land use plans or Comprehensive Land Use Plans (CLUPS);
- Those who invest and maintain infrastructure that reduce risks; those who have built flood control, those who properly maintained their drainage and those that implemented solid waste management;
- 5. Those that assess the safety of their schools, their health facilities, their barangay halls;
- Those who enforce risk-compliant building regulations and land use planning principles such as CLUPS; those who identify safe areas for their citizens to be resettled;
- 7. Those who have education programs and training on DRR;
- Those who protect ecosystems, those who plant mangroves which are natural buffers to mitigate storm surges;
- Those who install early warning systems and emergency management capacities; and
- Those who are good in reconstruction and who have designed their homes into more disasterresilient homes.

Senator Legarda assured that she would be working with the other agencies and with the UNISDR on how the entries can be ably judged.

Asked whether all the ten essentials bear the same weight in the judgment, Senator Legarda admitted that such has not been decided yet.

As regards the *Tagalog* translation of the word "resilience," Senator Pimentel said that based on the research of Senator Sotto, resilience has the Spanish equivalent of the word "elastiko," which translates to "kabanatan" in Tagalog. He believed that translating the concept is important for the people to understand and be familiar with it.

Regarding the prohibition of the use of plastic bags which is an initiative of the LGUs through their local ordinances, Senator Pimentel asked if it is about time to pursue the issue through a national law. Senator Legarda said that there is a pending bill, but she noted that even without such a law, it has been observed that there have been improvements in flood control in areas that segregated plastic wastes. She pointed out that there are various sectors to consider, and she agreed that the issue should be talked about and studies should be made if it could be done nationwide since more private establishments have started to use eco-bags or "no-plastic" system and there are innovations in reprocessing plastics into usable objects.

Senator Pimentel pointed out that the law does not necessarily have to totally prohibit the use of plastic since biodegradable plastic has already been developed. He said that the time will come when the technology would be available to the country at a reasonable price.

Asked if there is an international agency or body which ranks the preparedness of a country, Senator Legarda cited the UNISDR, as well as other agencies, which measures countries' sense of preparedness and even vulnerabilities. She noted that the Philippines has been ranked as number one in terms of the number of deaths or losses due to natural hazards which became disasters in 2012. She noted that various agencies differ in the measurement of preparedness. She said that the country has been lauded in terms of policy-making, citing the Climate Change Act and the NDRRMC Law which have been regarded by the UN Assistant Secretary General as the two best laws in the world. However, she stated that there is a challenge in terms of implementation. Despite being good in disaster response, she admitted that the country needs to improve to increase the level of preparedness so that there are less disasters to respond to.

Senator Pimentel believed that the pursuit for disaster preparedness is a never-ending endeavor because the country faces different types of calamities in different areas. He commended Senator Legarda for frequently reminding and educating the Body about the subject matter by pointing out and celebrating some concepts and ideas like the International Day of Disaster Risk Reduction the previous day, and the Disaster Risk Awareness week last month.

INTERPELLATION OF SENATOR VILLAR

At the outset, Senator Villar informed the Body that there is a waste plastic factory in Las Piñas City which produces school chairs out of plastic. She stated that a chair is produced out of 15 kilos of waste plastic, or two trucks of plastic for 15 chairs. She said that plastic need not be banned because it could be recycled and used for good purposes. She informed the Body that she learned the technology from a young man in Davao City from whom she bought the machineries that are being used in Las Piñas.

Senator Legarda asked Senator Villar to bring a sample product for the Members to see. She also suggested that the design center could help in designing the plastic chairs for commercial use.

Asked if the plastic wastes from other cities and municipalities could be gathered as well, Senator Villar replied that she built the factory so that the other LGUs could use it as their model and build something for themselves. She mentioned that the LLDA has agreed to build one for Laguna and Rizal.

Senator Legarda also lauded a project of Senator Villar – the making of recycled paper from hyacinth which is another form of water lily. Senator Villar said that she learned it from a cooperative in Misamis Oriental, the Salay Handmade Paper Factory.

Senator Legarda also mentioned that the Philippine Textile Research Institute recently gave her a fabric made of hyacinth with piña. She pointed out that hyacinth, which is considered a water pollutant, is being used to make recycled paper and fabric.

Senator Villar added that a livelihood project, jointly undertaken with the DSWD, is being conducted

for the women in the barangays along Laguna Lake to teach them how to make mats out of the hyacinth from the lake.

Senator Legarda noted that the city of Las Piñas could qualify or even win the Philippine Resilience Awards.

Regarding the training for disaster preparedness, Senator Villar said that it should not be limited to people with disabilities. She recalled that in one of her visits in an evacuation center in Muntinlupa in the aftermath of typhoon Ondoy, she was told that the evacuees have already been there two months prior to the calamity. She said that the children and senior citizens practically live in the evacuation center and only the able-bodied men are left in their area because it is flooded five months in a year. She suggested that apart from the disabled, the children and senior citizens should also be trained to be prepared for disasters since they are the most vulnerable among the population. Senator Legarda agreed and said that the disaster preparedness programs should be socially inclusive.

REFERRAL OF SPEECH TO COMMITTEE

Upon motion of Senator Cayetano (A), there being no objection, the Chair referred the speech of Senator Legarda and the interpellations thereon to the Committee on Climate Change.

PROPOSED SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 99

Upon motion of Senator Cayetano (A), there being no objection, the Body considered Proposed Senate Resolution No. 99, entitled

RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING AND COMMENDING GRANDMASTER WESLEY SO FOR BRINGING HONOR AND DISTINCTION TO THE COUNTRY BY WINNING THE GOLD MEDAL IN THE MEN'S CHESS COMPETITION OF THE RECENTLY CONCLUDED 27TH SUMMER UNIVERSIADE (WORLD UNIVERSITY GAMES) AT THE KAZAN EQUESTRIAN COMPLEX IN KAZAN, RUSSIE THIS JULY 2013.

Deputy Secretary Bellen read the text of the resolution, to wit:

WHEREAS, on 17 July 2013, the 27th Summer *Universiade* formally closed after twelve (12) days of competition in Kazan, Russia;

WHEREAS, the *Universiade*, also known as the World University Games, is an international biennial sports events organized for university athletes by the *Federation Internationale du Sport Universitaire* (FISU);

WHEREAS, during the recently concluded 17th Summer *Universiade*, which shall be remembered as the edition with the highest number of participants since its start in 1959 in Turin, Italy, and the second biggest sports competition in the world next only to the Olympic Games, the Philippines made history by bringing home its first-ever gold medal when Chess Grandmaster Wesley So won the Chess title by a triple tie-break;

WHEREAS, chess, which debuted in the 2011 Summer *Universiade* in Shenzhen as an

optional sports, was participated this year by veteran chess players from 46 countries;

WHEREAS, GM So outwitted former world junior champion Grandmaster Zaven Andriasian of Armenia; and beat 23 grandmasters and a string of university top chess players of the world;

WHEREAS, during the tournament, GM So tied with GM Andriasian and GM Li Chao of China in the first tiebreak but emerged with a higher Buccholz and performance score, such that outright, he could have copped the gold medal and claim the first-ever gold for the Philippines;

WHEREAS, however, Russian officials came up with a new rule to resolve the tie — the Armageddon style play-off — which would give time odds to whoever won the toss, and which GM So gallantly fought to soundly beat GM Andriasian and win the most coveted title:

WHEREAS, GM So was invited to represent the country by the Federation of School Sports Association of the Philippines (FESSAP), headed by President David Ong and Secretary-General Graham Lim;

WHEREAS, with GM So's gold medal, the Philippines becomes one of only 40 countries to win at least one gold medal; and finished in 40th place in the 12-day competition which attracted more than 10,000 university athletes from a record 162 countries, ahead of its Southeast Asian Games rivals Indonesia, which has only one silver, and Malaysia, which has three bronzes and other SEA countries – Vietnam, Singapore, Laos and Brunei – which failed to win medals;

WHEREAS, 19-year old GM So has brought honors to the country and hence, merits the government's acknowledgment and recognition;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as it is hereby resolved. That the Senate of the Philippines congratulate and commend Wesley So for bringing honor and distinction to the country by winning gold medal in the men's chess competition of the recently concluded 27th Summer *Universiade* at the Kazan Equestrian Complex in Kazan, Russia, this July 2013.

Thereupon, the Chair recognized Senator Trillanes for the sponsorship.

SPONSORSHIP SPEECH OF SENATOR TRILLANES

Senator Trillanes presented to the Body Proposed Senate Resolution No. 99, congratulating and commending Grandmaster Wesley So for winning the gold medal in the men's chess competition in the 17th Summer *Universiade* in Kazan, Russia.

The full text of Senator Trillanes' sponsorship speech follows:

The *Universiade* or the World University Games, the biggest sports competition in the world, next to the Olympic Games, was held last July of this year.

This year's event has been the most participated edition since its inception in 1959, along with this record-breaking participation of 462 countries in this competition.

The Philippines also made history by bringing home the first-ever gold medal won by our country when chess Grandmaster Wesley So won the men's chess title.

Grandmaster So, who is only 19 years old, managed to win the title against 46 countries that participated in the chess event. He outwitted former World Champion Grandmaster Zaven Andriasian of Armenia, and beat 23 grandmasters and a string of university top chess players of the world.

This unparalleled performance of GM So placed the Philippines as one of the 40 countries that won at least one gold medal in this year's *Universiade* ahead of other Southeast Asian rivals such as Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore, Laos and Brunei.

This success which showcases our worldclass talent in sports and is a landmark in the history of Philippine sports warrants outmost recognition of our government.

GM So deserves the highest commendation for the honor, pride and recognition he has brought to our country and our people. He is a symbol of the untiring and indomitable spirit of the Filipino nation.

In view of the foregoing, I formally move for the consideration and adoption of Proposed Senate Resolution No. 99.

Castillo, and the nineteen (19) other soldiers wounded during the encounter of the government forces with the Abu Sayyaf in Indanan, Sulu on 16 March 2009, three (3) other soldiers wounded in action (WIA) and fifteen (15) others fought valiantly in order to defend and uphold the peace and order situation in Mindanao;

WHEREAS, Sgt. Freddie Demacotak, Private First Class Reynante D. Sobremonte, and Private Randy A. Ayson who were wounded in action and 2Lt. Rostum C. Delasa, Sgt. Freddie G. Demacotac, Jr., Cpl. Noly T. Capillano, Pfc. Carlos G. Dalisay, Pfc. Ramil G. Lopez, Cpl. Israel T. Briguera, SSgt. Abelardo P. Palomero, Pfc. Rovrando R. Romero, Pvt. Manuel T. Bunagan, Jr., Cpl. Erwin B. Pili, Pfc. - 9. Cpl. Erwin B. Pili;
- 10. Pfc. Joseph R. Villanueva;
- 11. Pfc. Pablito D. Endaya, Jr.; and
- 12. Pvt. Jeffrey B. Doctolero.

Needless to say, these soldiers also deserve to be honored and recognized for their bravery and dedication to the service, together with other members of the Marine Battalion Landing Team 3 who were earlier honored and recognized through Resolution No. 168.

This resolution is but a small token that the government can offer when compared to the unparalleled dedication and incalculable sacrifices they have displayed in their service to our country and our people. It is my fervent hope that this resolution can now be acted upon by this august Chamber.

In this light, I formally move for the consideration and adoption of Proposed Senate Resolution No. 284.
