EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Constitution, Article 2, Section 13 provides that:

Section 13. The State recognizes the role of the youth in nation-building and shall promote and protect their physical, moral, spiritual, intellectual and social wellbeing. It shall inculcate in the youth patriotism and nationalism, and encourage their involvement in public and civil affairs.

Service to the community is a responsibility of all Filipinos, regardless of their economic level or age. Serving other builds self-esteem and teaches teamwork, decision-making, and problem-solving.

Students, from kindergarten to college, offer a powerful and largely untapped resource for community service. The government, therefore, should encourage students to engage in productive work with visible community benefits in a natural resource or human service setting, in order to give them a mix of work experience, basic and life skills education, training, and support services.

Children who become engaged in community service early will understand better the responsibilities of citizenship and often continue to serve the community into adulthood. To this end, this bill seeks to establish a program that will expand opportunities for students to serve their communities. *

This bill was originally filed during Fourteenth Congress, First Regular Session.

AN ACT 2 ESTABLISHING A NATIONAL PROGRAM TO EXPAND OPPORTUNITIES FOR FILIPINO STUDENTS TO SERVE THEIR COMMUNITIES

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- 4 SECTION 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as the "Service to the Philippines 5 Act."
- SECTION 2. Purpose. The purposes of this Act are:
- 7 (A) To enable the call to service to begin in elementary school, to grow into sustained 8 community action in secondary schools and colleges, and to become a lifelong habit;
- 9 To provide students with service opportunities; and (B)
- To build on the existing organizational framework for community service 10 (C) provided by educational agencies, schools, institutions of higher education, and nongovernment 11 12 organizations.
- SECTION 3. *Definition of Terms.* For purposes of this Act, the term: 13
- "Community-based agency" means a private non-profit organization that is 14 (A) representative of a community or a significant segment of a community and that is engaged in 15 j meeting human, social, educational, or environmental community needs. 16
- "Education institution" means elementary or secondary school, institution of 17 (B) higher education, or a community-based agency that provides educational services. 18
- "Appropriate government agency" means a government agency that is engaged in 19 20 meeting human, social, educational, or environmental needs.

- 1 (D) "Participant" means a student or out-of-school youth who provides services
 2 pursuant to a program provided in this Act.
 - (E) "Secretary" means the Secretary of Education.

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- 4 (F) "Service opportunity" means a program or project enabling students to perform
 5 meaningful and constructive service in agencies, institutions, and situations where the
 6 application of human talent and dedication may help to meet, human, social, educational, and
 7 environmental community needs, especially those relating to poverty.
 - (G) "Student" means an individual who is enrolled full-time or part-time in an elementary or secondary school or institution of higher education.
 - SECTION 4. School- and Campus-Based Community Service. The Secretary shall, in coordination with the Commission on Higher Education, the National Youth Commission, the Department of Social Welfare and Development, and other appropriate government agencies and community-based agencies, establish a national program that shall provide service opportunities for students and out-of-school youth. Such comprehensive program shall provide productive work with visible community benefits in a natural resource or human service setting and give participants a mix of work experience, basic and life skills education, training, and support services.
 - SECTION 5. *Incorporation in the Curriculum*. Such program shall be incorporated into the curriculum as a separate subject and shall require students, before they are allowed to graduate from elementary, high school, or college, as the case may be, to render community service by participating in the program.
- *22 . SECTION 6. Program Components. The Secretary, in carrying out the program, shall
 - (A) Encourage cooperative efforts among education institutions, local government agencies, community-based agencies, business to provide service opportunities, including those that involve the participation of urban, suburban, and rural youth working together;

19	provisions ar	nd objectives of this Act are hereby appropriated from the National Treasury.			
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20	SECT	FION 9. Separability Clause. – If any provision or part thereof is held invalid or			
21	unconstitutio	nal, the remainder of the law or the provision not otherwise affected shall remain			
22	valid and sub	osisting.			
23 23	SECT	TION 10. Repealing Clause Any law, presidential decree or issuance, executive			
24 ′	order, letter	of instruction, administrative order, rule, or regulation contrary to or inconsistent			
25	with the provisions of this Act is hereby repealed, modified, or amended accordingly.				

SECTION 11. Effectivity Clause. - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its

2 publication in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
