EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Constitution, Article 2, Section 15 provides:

SEC. 15. The State shall protect and promote the right to health of the people and instill health consciousness among them.

The Philippine government is reportedly spending around \$\frac{1}{2}\$.4 billion yearly on the Department of Health expanded program of immunization. Childhood immunizations are said to be an important tool in protecting children from infectious disease.

However, in the United States, the incidence of chronic, unexplained diseases such as autism, learning disabilities, and other neurological disorders reportedly appears to have increased dramatically in recent years. These disorders are somehow linked to childhood immunizations.

Thus, the proposed bill seeks to do a comprehensive study examining whether there are different health outcomes when comparing vaccinated children and unvaccinated children, including autism and chronic conditions.¹

Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "Vaccine Safety Study 6 Act." 7 SECTION 2. Study on Health Outcomes in Vaccinated and Unvaccinated 8 Populations. --9 (a) In General. — The Secretary of Health (referred to as the "Secretary") shall 10 conduct or support a comprehensive study -11 (1) to compare total health outcomes, including the incidence and risk of 12 autism, in vaccinated populations with such outcomes in unvaccinated populations 13 in the country; and 14 (2) to determine whether exposure to vaccines or vaccine components is 15 associated with autism spectrum disorders, chronic conditions, or other 16 neurological conditions. 17 (b) Rule of Construction. – Nothing in this Act shall be construed to authorize the 18 conduct or support of any study in which an individual or population is encouraged or 19 incentivized to remain unvaccinated. 20

- (e) Qualifications. With respect to each investigator carrying out the study under
 this Λet, the Secretary shall ensure that the investigator
 - (1) is objective;

- (2) is qualified to carry out such study, as evidenced by training experiences and demonstrated skill;
 - (3) is not currently employed by any government health agency;
 - (4) is not currently a member of a board, committee, or other entity responsible for formulating immunization policy on behalf of any government health agency or any component thereof;
 - (5) has no history of a strong position on the thimerosal or vaccine safety controversy; and
 - (6) is not currently an employee of, or otherwise directly or indirectly receiving funds from, a pharmaceutical company.
- (d) *Target Populations*. The Secretary shall seek to include in the study under this Act populations in the country that have traditionally remained unvaccinated for religious or other reasons, which populations members of clinical practices who choose alternative medical practices, practitioners of anthroposophic lifestyles, and others who have chosen not to be vaccinated.
- (e) *Timing*. Not later than 120 days after the date of the effectivity of this Act, the Secretary shall issue a request for proposals to conduct the study required by this Act. Not later than 120 days after receipt of any such proposal, the Secretary shall approve or disapprove the proposal. If the Secretary disapproves the proposal, the Secretary shall provide the applicant involved with a written explanation of the reasons for the disapproval.

- 1 (f) Transparency. To facilitate further research by the Secretary or others, the
- 2 Secretary shall ensure the preservation of all data, including all data sets, collected or
- 3 used for purposes of the study under this section.
- 4 SECTION 3. Separability Clause. If any provision or part hereof, is held invalid
- 5 or unconstitutional, the remainder of the law or the provision not otherwise affected shall
- 6 remain valid and subsisting.
- 7 SECTION 4. Repealing Clause. -- Any law, presidential decree or issuance,
- 8 executive order, letter of instruction, administrative order, rule or regulation contrary to
- 9 or is inconsistent with the provision of this Act is hereby repealed, modified, or amended
- 10 accordingly.
- SECTION 5. Effectivity Clause. This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after
- its publication in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
