

AN ACT CREATING THE PHILIPPINE BOXING COMMISSION THEREBY STRENGTHENING THE COUNTRY'S STANDING IN BOXING SPORTS, ENSURING THE WELFARE OF FILIPINO BOXERS, AND PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Over the past decades, the Philippines did not only produce World Class Boxing Champions but a number of International Boxing Champions as well. These achievements show that Filipino boxers indeed possess superior physical strength, skills and talents, which if given the proper support of the State, will ensure our promising boxers top ranks in the world boxing arena.

While giving honor and glory to our country, international Filipino boxers risk their lives and limbs in this sport. Some even met their untimely death in the bout due to the lack, if not absence, of safety and emergency medical services, while some face retirement without any kind of financial assistance or access to medical case. Most often, we hear many of our boxing legends do not have pension benefits.

The boxing sport, now under the supervision of the Games and Amusement Board, is not given the proper and appropriate attention it deserves. Considering the growing popularity of this sport and the number of champions it has produced for the country, it is about time that we give due attention and consideration to this sport and to all our professional boxing champions. Hence, this proposed bill seeks to establish the Philippine Boxing Commission to be the single agency that will focus and steer the skills and talents of the youth towards its proper direction, to provide and implement the necessary welfare incentives and benefits long overdue to all professional boxers who have brought honor and prestige to our country.


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AN ACT

CREATING THE PHILIPPINE BOXING COMMISSION THEREBY STRENGTHENING THE COUNTRY'S STANDING IN BOXING SPORTS, ENSURING THE WELFARE OF FILIPINO BOXERS, AND PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

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SECTION 1. Short Title. – This Act shall be known as the "Philippine Boxer's Welfare act of 2013".

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SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy. It is the declared policy of the State to give priority to education, science and technology, arts, culture and sports to foster patriotism and nationalism, accelerate social progress, and promote human liberation and development. The State shall promote excellence in boxing sports by establishing a national agency to create a policy to set proper directions for the development and safety of professional boxers and providing for the welfare of boxer, coaches, trainers, and support to other stakeholders competing for the country.

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SEC. 3. Definition of Terms. – For purposes of this Act, the following terms shall be defined as follows:

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a) Commission – shall refer to the Philippine Boxing Commission;

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b) **Boxer registry** – shall refer to any entity certified by the Philippine Boxing Commission for the purpose of maintaining records and identification of boxers;

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c) License – shall refer to a document issued by the Commission authorizing a
person or entity to perform duties as a privilege connected with professional
boxing;

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d) Matches – shall refer to the pairing of boxers in a contest or in a bout;

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e) Matchmaker – shall refer to a person that proposes, selects, and arranges the boxers to participate in a professional boxing promotion;

f) Permit – shall refer to a document issued by the Commission authorizing a person or entity to hold, promote or engage in the conduct or operation of professional boxing; g) Professional Boxer - shall refer to any individual athlete who is paid a sum of money and other compensation as a salary or prize money for participating in a bout or in a professional boxing contest; h) Permit – shall refer to a document issued by the Commission authorizing a person or entity to hold, promote or engage in the conduct or operation of professional boxing;

- i) **Professional Boxing Promotion** shall refer to a boxing contest held in the Philippines between individuals for financial compensation but shall not refer to a boxing contest that is regulated by an amateur sports organization;
- j) **Promoter** shall refer to a person or persons primarily responsible for organizing, promoting, and producing a professional boxing promotion. The term "promoter" does not include a hotel, casino, resort, or other commercial establishment hosting or sponsoring a professional boxing promotion unless (i) the hotel, casino, resort, or other commercial establishment is primarily responsible for organizing, promoting and producing the promotion; and (ii) there is no other person primarily responsible for organizing, promoting and producing the promotion;
- k) Sanctioning Organization shall refer to an organization that sanctions professional boxing promotions in the Philippines (i) between who are residents of different countries; or (ii) that are advertised, otherwise promoted, or broadcasted (including closed circuit television) in a country other than the Philippines

II. THE PHILIPPINE BOXING COMMISSION

- SEC. 4. Creation of the Philippine Boxing Commission. There is hereby created the Philippine Boxing Commission, hereinafter referred to as the Commission, which shall be directly under the administrative supervision of the Office of the President.
- **SEC. 5.** Objectives of the Commission. The objectives of the Commission are as follows:
 - a) To establish uniform rules and procedures related to boxing;
 - b) To set proper directions for the sports of boxing towards developing world-class professional boxers to bring honor to the country;
 - c) To provide safety procedures to protect boxers from physical and financial exploitation;

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27	SEC. 7. Functions of the Commission. – The Commission shall have the

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f) To formulate, initiate, plan and implement a comprehensive and progressive health care program, alternative livelihood program, a system of life insurance, reliable death benefits and other benefits for all boxer who competed and won in international boxing events sanctioned by the Commission;

- g) To formulate and implement an insurance system through the Social Security System (SSS) and/or private insurance companies for qualified professional boxers;
- h) To provide, supervise and ensure that emergency medical personnel and services are available in every boxing competition, local and abroad;
- i) To establish a system of registration and licensing of boxers, referees, trainer, seconds, cutman and other personnel necessary for the boxing sport;
- j) To allocate resources for the implementation of national policies related to boxers;
- k) To submit an annual report on the implementation of this Act to the President and to the Congress; and
- 1) To perform such other functions as may be necessary to effectively and efficiently carry out the provisions of this act. The functions of the Games and Amusement Board (GAB) as well as other entities related to boxing are hereby transferred to the Commission.
- SEC. 8. Membership of the Commission. The Commission shall be composed of a Chairman who (a) has extensive experience in professional boxing activities or in a field directly related to professional sports; (b) is of outstanding character and recognized integrity; and (c) is selected on the basis of training, experience and qualifications and without regard to party affiliation and six (6) Members to be appointed by the President: Provided that of the six (6) Members, there shall be one (1) representative from the Boxing Promoters' Association, one (1) representative from Boxing Managers' Association, one (1) representative from Boxing Trainers' Association, one (1) representative from retired professional boxers, one (1) General Counsel, who has extensive experience in litigation or policies directly or indirectly related to professional sports and one (1) Physician, who has extensive experience in sports medicine. The Member-Physician shall be the head of the Medical Advisory Board of the Commission.
- SEC. 9. Term of Office. The term of office of the commissioners shall be four (4) years: Provided, that no vacancy shall be filled except for the unexpired portion of any term; and provided, further, that any member of the Commission whose term of office has expired shall remain in office until his successor shall have been duly appointed and qualified. The Chairman and members of the Commission may be suspended or removed by the President of the Philippines.
- **SEC. 10.** The Secretariat. -- The Secretariat shall be headed by an Executive Director, appointed by the Commission, and such other technical and administrative staff as may be needed and as determined by the Commission, who shall be tasked to implement the policies and programs approved by the commission and to supervise all aspects of

professional boxing. Their salaries, allowances and other emoluments shall be determined by the Commission in accordance with Civil Service rules and other relevant and existing laws.

SEC 11. Meetings and Quorums. – The Commission shall meet regularly once a week and as often as the exigencies of the service may demand, upon the call of the Chairman or upon the request of three (3) members of the Commission. The vote of a majority of all the members shall be necessary for the adoption of any rule, resolution or decision of the Commission.

SEC. 12. Allowances and Per Diems. – The Chairman of the Commission shall receive a monthly allowance of eight thousand pesos and a per diem not to exceed five hundred pesos for each meeting actually attended by him: Provided, that such allowance and per diems shall not exceed twelve thousand pesos during one month.

The other members of the Commission shall receive a monthly commutable allowance of six thousand pesos and a per diem not to exceed five hundred pesos for each meeting actually attended by them: Provided, that such allowance and per diems shall not exceed ten thousand pesos during any one month for each member.

III. SAFETY STANDARD

SEC. 13. The Medical Advisory Board. – The Medical Advisory Board assists and advises the member of the Commission on issues affecting the safety and health of boxers. The Board duties include preparing and submitting to the Commission appropriate standards for the physical and mental examination of the boxers, advising the commission as to the physical and mental fitness of a boxer and recommending physicians to be licensed as ringside physicians for the Commission.

The Board shall prepare and submit recommendations for revisions in the law necessary to protect the health of the boxers.

SEC 14. Physical and Medical Examination Requirements. — No person may arrange, promote, organize, produce, or fight in a professional boxing promotion without a physical and diagnostic examination of each boxer by an accredited and licensed physician of the Philippine Boxing Commission, pursuant to existing rules and regulations, certifying whether or not the boxer is physically fit to safely compete, which shall include but not limited to the following:

a) Chest X-ray (PA view);

b) Opthalmological examination;

c) Neuro-psychological test;

d) Drug testing for THC (Marijuana) and Methamphetamine (Shabu);

- e) Hepatitis B Surface Antigen (HepBsAg) quantitative exams for all new licenses and returning boxers with previously positive results and qualitative exams for renewals:
- f) CT Scan of the Brain;
- g) Gynecological condition result for female boxers;
- h) Urinalysis;
- i) Complete Blood Count (CBC);
- j) HIV test (for licensed professional boxers fighting abroad)
- k) Magnetic Resonance Imagining (MRI), as may be needed, upon recommendation of the Commission physician.

All other personnel and staff engaged in and involved in the boxing promotion shall be subjected to such physical and medical examinations, as may be determined by the Commission. Items (a) to (i) shall be mandatory physical and medical examination requirements. Items (j), (k) and (l) shall be required in cases determined by the Commission. Expenses for the physical and medical examination, as required, shall be for the account of the Manager.

- **SEC. 15.** *Emergency Medical Services.* A professional boxing promotion may be held only if:
 - a) A licensed practicing physician, whose services are paid by the promoter and duly registered with the Commission, is continuously present at the ringside of the professional boxing promotion;
 - b) Ambulances services, including oxygen tanks and other medical personnel equipped with appropriate resuscitation equipment continuously present on the ringside;
 - c) A tertiary hospital is near the vicinity of the event: Provided, that a Memorandum of Agreement shall be executed between the promoter of the boxing promotion and said hospital to ensure the injured boxers shall be attended to in their facility with dispatch.

Absence of the aforementioned requirements shall be a cause for the cancellation of the permit to hold the scheduled boxing promotion.

SEC. 16. Mandatory Rest Period. – There shall be an interval between boxing contests which shall be referred to as the mandatory rest period. The mandatory rest period shall vary depending on the extent of damage brought about by the knockout (KO) or technical knockout, as determined by the Commission's Physician, based on the last boxing promotion's ringside physician report, which shall not be less than ninety (90) days. In cases of Kos and TKOs, there shall be physical and mental examinations to continue until one month after the event, the report of which shall be the basis for determination of whether or

not the affected boxer may still compete after the ninety (90) day mandatory rest period. In case a boxer has received a serious concussion, he shall not be able to compete again until he has been examined and has been certified to by the Commission's physician as fir to compete again.

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IV. BOXER INCENTIVES AND BENEFITS

SEC. 17. Insurance. — The Commssion, in carrying out the regulation of professional boxing promotions, shall require that a promoter provide insurance coverage, in a minimum amount of at least one hundred thousand pesos (PHP 100,000.00) for every professional boxing promotion, through a private insurance company, to cover an injury sustained while engaged in that boxing promotion.

SEC. 18. Health Care Benefits – All professional boxers shall be enrolled in the National Health Insurance Program (PhilHealth) to enable them to receive and avail of an adequate package of personal health services including, but not limited to, in-patient hospital care, out-patient care, emergency and transfer services, and other supplementary health benefits, as may be provided in the PhilHealth. The cost of premium contribution and the standard monthly contributions shall be shouldered by the Commission.

In case of hospitalization in any government hospital or clinic, any amount in excess of PhilHealth benefit shall be shouldered by the Philippine Charity Sweepstakes Office (PCSO), provided that the boxer shall comply with the requirement for qualification and grant of health care assistance to be extended by the PCSO consistent with and subject to compliance with PCSO's existing rules and guidelines.

SEC. 19. Alternative Livelihood Programs for Retired and/or Injured International Boxing Champions. — The Commission, in coordination with various stakeholders in the boxing industry, shall establish an alternative livelihood training program and referral system for retired and/or injured boxing champions.

SEC. 20. Death Benefits. – Upon the death of a professional boxer, the primary beneficiaries shall be entitled to a lump sum death benefit of Fifty thousand pesos (PHP 50,000.00) to cover funeral services and expenses: Provided, That if the primary beneficiary are absent or otherwise incapable of claiming the benefits granted them under this Section, the secondary beneficiaries shall be entitled to the same.

SEC. 21. Retirement Benefits. – Professional Filipino boxers who won any world title or championship in any international boxing competition duly sanctioned by the recognized international sporting organization and bodies shall receive a lifetime retirement pension of Fifteen thousand Pesos (PHP 15,000.00) monthly upon reaching the age of fifty (50). Retirement benefits under this Act shall be separate and distinct from the mandatory requirement benefits provided by existing laws.

The Commission is authorized to adjust the benefits provided in this section based on studies, consultations, and public hearings with relevant agencies and entities.

However, no memorandum, order, or issuance shall diminish the prescribed retirement incentive benefits.

of this Act: Provided, That copies of the formulated rules and regulations shall be submitted to the Committee on Games and Amusement of both Houses of Congress: Provided, Finally that such rules and regulations shall take effect only upon publication in a newspaper of general circulation.

SEC. 28. Repealing Clause. – Any law, presidential decree or issuance, executive orders, rules or regulations, or parts thereof not consistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

SEC. 29. Separability Clause. – If any part or provision of this Act shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, the other provisions hereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SEC. 30. *Effectivity.* This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days following its publication in the Official Gazette or in any two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
