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AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE NATIONAL REGISTRY OF DISEASES AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

According to the World Health Organization, diseases were determined as major cause of morbidity. Few years ago, it has been reported that sixty percent (60%) of all deaths in the Philippines are due to chronic diseases.

However, studies show that the burden of diseases as major cause of death has diminished due to improved health technology and health care delivery systems. But then again, much still needs to be done to better reduce the occurrence of illnesses through the application of health measures which could prevent widespread diseases. In this light, an effective and feasible intervention from the government that aims to address health problems in the country is auspiciously significant.

This bill proposes for the establishment of the National Registry of Diseases which will provide a compilation of information on the incidence of certain diseases. This compilation will serve as a basis for the direction of programs for disease prevention and control.

In view of the foregoing, the immediate approval of this bill is earnestly sought.

AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE NATIONAL REGISTRY OF DISEASES AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Be in enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

ARTICLE I

TITLE

SECTION 1. Title. - This Act shall be known as the "National Registry of Diseases 1 Act". 2 3 4 SEC. 2. Definition of Terms. - As used in this Act, the following terms shall have the 5 following definitions: 6 "Agent of the Registry" means any public officer or employee of any statutory 7 body who is appointed by the Secretary under Section 3 to be an agent of the Registry; 8 "Anonymized", used to describe information pertaining to an individual, means 9 b. 10 that the identity of that individual has been concealed or protected, whether by presenting such information in a statistical form or otherwise, such that it cannot 11 12 be readily discovered or ascertained from that information;

1	c.	"Authorized Registry Officer" means any Registry officer who is duly authorized
2		by the Registrar, in writing, to carry out any particular function or to exercise
3		any particular power under this Act;
4	d.	"Disclose", in relation to any information held by the Registry, includes to grant

2		the Registrar of the Registry and includes a Deputy Registrar and an Assistant

4	m.	"Registry" means the National Registry of Diseases established under Section 4;
5	n.	"Registry officer" means any person who is appointed by the Secretary under
6		Section 3 to be an officer of the Registry;
7	0.	"Regulations" means regulations made under Section 19;
8	p.	"Reportable Disease" means a report on the incidence of certain disease;
9	q.	"Requisite Consent", for the purposes of Section 11 or 12, means —
10		i. the consent, given in the prescribed form and manner, of the
11		person whose individually-identifiable information is to be disclosed under that
12		section; or
13		ii. where the person referred to in paragraph (i) is unable to give
14		his own consent because of his age, infirmity of mind or body or any other
15		cause, the consent, given in the prescribed form and manner, of such other
16		person who is authorized by the regulations to give such consent for and on his
17		behalf.
18	r.	"Secretary" means the Secretary of the Department of Health, for purposes of
19		Section 16, —
20		i. "body corporate" includes a limited liability partnership;
21		ii. "officer" —
22		(a) in relation to a body corporate, means any director, partner,
23		member of the committee of management, chief executive,
24		manager, secretary or other similar officer of the body

13	SEC. 3. Appointment of Registrar
14	(1) The Secretary shall appoint a Registrar who shall be responsible for the
15	administration of the Registry.
16	(2) The Secretary may appoint —
17	(a) a Deputy Registrar;
18	(b) one or more Assistant Registrars; and
19	(c) such other Registry officers as he may consider necessary, to assist the
20	Registrar in the administration of the Registry.
21	(3) The Secretary may appoint any public officer or employee of any statutory body
22	to be an agent of the Registry to assist in the collection and collation of any information
23	under this Act, subject to such conditions and limitations as the Secretary may specify.
24	(4) The Registrar, Deputy Registrar, Assistant Registrars, Registry officers and
25	agents of the Registry shall be deemed to be public servants.

1	SEC. 4. National Registry of Diseases. – There shall be a National Registry of
2	Diseases, the functions of which are —
3	(a) to collect information on reportable diseases that have been diagnosed and treated
4	in the country;
5	(b) to establish, keep and maintain for each reportable disease a register containing
6	individually-identifiable information obtained under this Act;
7	(c) to compile and publish statistics on the epidemiology, management and outcomes
8	of reportable diseases;
9	(d) to provide information for the purpose of supporting —
10	(i) health services that are being provided by healthcare institutions to the
11	patients thereof who are suffering from any reportable disease; and
12	(ii) national public health policies, initiatives, programs and related studies
13	concerning any reportable disease; and
14	(e) generally to do all such acts, matters and things as are necessary to be carried out
15	under this Act.

17	SEC. 5. Registers. –
18	(1) The Registrar shall keep and maintain for each reportable disease a register
19	containing individually-identifiable information of each person who is diagnosed with and
20	treated for that disease in the country.
21	(2) The registers kept and maintained under subsection (1) shall not be open for
22	inspection by the public.

NOTIFICATION OF REPORTABLE DISEASES 2 SEC. 6. Collection of Information. — 18 19 (1) Upon a notification being made to the Registrar under Section 6, the Registrar or 20 an authorized Registry officer may require the manager of the healthcare institution who made the notification to provide such additional information as may be prescribed concerning 21 22 the person to whom the notification relates. 23 (2) For the purpose of subsection (1), the Registrar or authorized Registry officer 24 may require the manager of the healthcare institution —

19	SEC. 8. Confidentiality. —
20	(1) Except in the case of a prosecution for an offence under this Act, the Registrar, a
21	Registry officer, an agent of the Registry or any other person who acts under the direction of
22	the Secretary or Registrar for any purpose related to the Registry shall not be compellable in
23	any proceedings to give evidence in respect of, or to produce any document containing any
24	individually-identifiable information which has been obtained under this Act.

1	(2) Except as otherwise provided by this Act, the Registrar, a Registry officer, an
2	agent of the Registry or any other person who acts under the direction of the Secretary or
3	Registrar for any purpose related to the Registry shall not disclose the contents of any register
4	or any individually-identifiable information which may have come to his knowledge in the
5	course of performing any duty or function under this Act or carrying out any act in relation to
6	the Registry.
7	(3) Any person who fails to comply with subsection (2) shall be guilty of an offence
8	and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Four Hundred Thousand Pesos
9	(P400,000.00) or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve (12) months or to both.
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11	SEC. 9. Disclosure and Publication of Anonymized Information. —
12	(1) The Registrar —
13	(a) may, on a request by any person and —
14	(i) upon payment by such person of the prescribed fee; and
15	(ii) subject to such conditions as the Registrar may impose; and
16	(b) shall, on a request by the Secretary, disclose or publish any information held by
17	the Registry in an anonymized form.

(2) Any person who fails to comply with any condition imposed under subsection (1) shall

be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Two Hundred

Thousand Pesos (P200,000.00) or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six (6) months or

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to both.

SEC. 10. National Public Health Programs. —

2	(1) The Registrar may, with the approval of the Secretary, disclose individually-
3	identifiable information held by the Registry to any public officer or any other person for the
4	purpose of conducting national public health programs concerning any reportable disease.
5	(2) In determining whether to approve such disclosure under subsection (1), the
6	Secretary shall, subject to subsection (3), have regard to —
7	(a) the aims and objectives of the national public health program, including
8	any public health benefits to the country;
9	(b) the identity of the public officers or persons involved in the program to
10	whom the individually-identifiable information held by the Registry will be
11	disclosed;
12	(c) the use to which the individually-identifiable information will or may be
13	put; and
14	(d) the measures that will be put in place under the national public health
15	program to protect the individually-identifiable information from unauthorized
16	disclosure.
17	(3) The Secretary shall not approve any disclosure under subsection (1) unless he is
18	satisfied that the national public health program cannot be carried out with anonymized
19	information.
20	(4) The Secretary may, when granting approval under subsection (1), impose such
21	conditions as he considers necessary with respect to —
22	(a) the identities of the public officers or persons, or class of public officers or
23	persons who are authorized to receive or handle the individually-identifiable
24	information;

3	(c) the measures that must be put in place under the national public health

18	(a) the medical practitioner is responsible for the treatment and care of that person;
19	(b) the disclosure is necessary for the proper treatment of that person; and
20	(c) the requisite consent has been given for such disclosure.
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22	SEC. 12. Disclosure of Individually-Identifiable Information for Public Health
23	Research. —
24	(1) A person, referred to in this section as the researcher, who requires any
25	individually-identifiable information held by the Registry for the purpose of carrying out any

(b) the use to which the individually-identifiable information is to or may be

1	medical, epidemiological or other form of public health research concerning any reportable
2	disease may apply to the Registrar in the prescribed form for the disclosure of such
3	information.
4	(2) The Registrar may, subject to such conditions as he thinks fit to impose and upon
5	the payment by the researcher of such fees as may be prescribed, disclose to the researcher
6	such individually-identifiable information if the Registrar is satisfied that —
7	(a) the research cannot be carried out with anonymized information;
8	(b) the requisite consent has been given for such individually-identifiable
9	information to be disclosed to the researcher for the purpose of the research;
10	(c) the research may —
11	(i) improve the quality of health services provided for patients
12	suffering from any reportable disease in the country; or
13	(ii) support any national public health policy, initiative or program
14	concerning any reportable disease; and
15	(d) the researcher and the research comply with such conditions as may have
16	been prescribed.
17	(3) A researcher to whom the individually-identifiable information of any person has
18	been disclosed under subsection (2) shall not —
19	(a) use such individually-identifiable information for any purpose other than
20	the purpose approved by the Registrar; or
21	(b) disclose the name or any other individually-identifiable information of that
22	person unless the requisite consent has been given for the disclosure.
23	(4) A researcher to whom the individually-identifiable information of any person has
24	been disclosed under subsection (2) shall not disclose —

- (a) the name or any other information leading to the identification of the healthcare institution in which that person has been diagnosed with, or has been or is being examined or treated for, a reportable disease unless the manager of that healthcare institution has given his consent for the disclosure in the prescribed form and manner; or
- (b) the name or any other information leading to the identification of the person who provided the individually-identifiable information to the Registrar under this Act, unless that person has given his consent for the disclosure in the prescribed form and manner.
- (5) Before making any decision on an application under subsection (2), the Registrar may refer the application to a national research advisory committee comprising not less than 3 and not more than five (5) members appointed by the Secretary and, in making his decision, the Registrar shall have regard to any report made to him by the national research advisory committee.
- (6) Where a researcher to whom any individually-identifiable information of any person has been disclosed under subsection (2) contravenes subsection (3) or (4) or any condition imposed under subsection (2), he shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Four Hundred Thousand Pesos (P400,000.00) or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve (12) months or to both.

21 ARTICLE V

ENFORCEMENT POWERS

SEC. 13. Appointment of Investigation Officers. —

(1) The Secretary may, in writing, appoint any public officer to be an investigation officer for the purpose of conducting an investigation into any offence under this Act.

(2) Every investigation officer, when exercising any of his powers under this Act, shall, if not in uniform, declare his office and shall, on demand, produce to any person affected by the exercise of that power such identification card as the Secretary may direct to be carried by the investigation officer when exercising such power.

SEC. 14. Powers of Entry, Inspection, Search, and Seizure. —

- (1) An investigation officer shall, for the purposes of investigating any offence under this Act, have power to do any or all of the following:
 - (a) to enter, inspect and search, without warrant at any reasonable time, any place which he has reason to believe contains evidence relating to or connected with an offence under this Act;
 - (b) for the purposes of paragraph (a)
 - (i) to inspect and make copies of and take extracts from, or require the occupier or any person having the management or control of any place mentioned in that paragraph to provide copies of or extracts from, any book, document, record or electronic material;
 - (ii) to inspect and make copies of and take extracts from, or require the occupier or any person having the management or control of any place mentioned in that paragraph to provide copies of or extracts from, any medical record of any person who has been or who is being treated or examined at that place, notwithstanding that the prior consent of such person has not been obtained;
 - (iii) to seize and remove from any place mentioned in that paragraph any book, record, document, material, article or thing which the

investigation officer reasonably believes to be the subject-matter of, or 1 to be connected with the commission of, an offence under this Act; and 2 (iv) to make such examination or inquiry as may be necessary to 3 ascertain whether the provisions of this Act have been complied with; 4 6

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- (c) to require any person, by way of an order in writing, to produce any book, document, record, electronic material, article or thing that the investigation officer considers is necessary or desirable for the purposes of an investigation under this Act.
- (2) The occupier or any person having the management and control of, or who is found in, any place mentioned in subsection (1) (a) shall render all necessary assistance and co-operation to the investigation officer as are necessary for an entry, inspection, examination, inquiry or otherwise for the exercise of his powers under this Act in relation to that place.

(3) Any person who —

- (a) obstructs, hinders or impedes an investigation officer in the exercise of his power under this section; or
- (b) fails to comply with any order or requirement of an investigation officer under this section or to produce any book, document, record, electronic material, article or thing which he is required by or under this Act to produce to an investigation officer, shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Two Hundred Thousand Pesos (P200,000.00) or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six (6) months or to both.

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2	(1) An investigation officer may—
3	(a) examine orally any person supposed to be acquainted with the facts and
4	circumstances of any offence or matter under this Act, and to reduce to writing
5	any statement made by the person so examined; and
6	(b) require by order in writing the attendance before himself of any person.

SEC. 15. Powers to Examine and Secure Attendance. —

1	(b) to be attributable to any neglect on his part, the officer as well as the body
2	corporate shall be guilty of the offence and shall be liable to be proceeded

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21	SEC. 17. Protection from Liability. —
22	(1) No action, suit or other legal proceedings shall lie against the government or
23	personally against the Secretary, the Registrar, a Registry officer, an agent of the Registry, an
24	investigation officer or any other person for anything which is done or omitted to be done in

good faith in the course of or in connection with —

1	(a) the exercise or purported exercise of any power under this Act;
2	(b) the performance or purported performance of any function or the discharge
3	or purported discharge of any duty under this Act; or
4	(c) the compliance or purported compliance with this Act.
5	(2) A person who makes a notification to the Registrar under Section 6 or who
6	otherwise makes available to the Registrar, a Registry officer, an agent of the Registry or an
7	investigation officer any document or other information for the purpose of complying with
8	the requirements of this Act, shall not, by virtue of doing so —
9	(a) be liable to any suit or other legal proceedings for breach of confidence; or

13	(3) Where pursuant to this Act the Registrar discloses to any person any information

22	SEC. 22. Enforcement It shall be the duty of all duly constituted law enforcement
23	agencies and officers of national, provincial, city, or municipal governments to uphold and
24	enforce the provisions of this Act and to investigate and prosecute or cause the investigation

and prosecution of any person violating the same.

SEC. 23. Implementing Rules and Regulations. – Within ninety (90) days after the
approval of this Act, the Department shall promulgate the necessary implementing rules and
regulations to implement the provisions of this Act.

SEC. 24. *Separability Clause.* – If any provision of this Act shall at any time be found to be unconstitutional or invalid, the remainder thereof not affected by such declaration shall remain in full force and effect.

- 9 SEC. 25. *Repealing Clause*. All laws, decrees, rules or regulations inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.
- SEC. 26. Effectivity Clause. This Act shall take effect after fifteen (15) days following its complete publication in the Official Gazette or in two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
