## AMENDING CERTAIN SECTIONS OF PRESIDENTIAL DECREE NUMBERED NINETY-SEVEN, AS AMENDED, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS "THE MERCHANT MARINE OFFICERS LAW"

### **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

During the last two decades, the rapid development of the marine profession as well as the marine industry, both in the academic and technological aspects, has made the requirements of future marine officers, per P.D. No. 97, quite obsolete. The advances in the international field have been more phenomenal among the Western countries who are members of the International Marine Organization (IMO), with the Philippines lagging behind.

Of utmost concern to the country is the state of affairs of its domestic or coastwise shipping industry where there are numerous vessels with lower than 200 gross tons capacity that are manned by unqualified seafarers. Based from the reports of sea disasters, these accidents may just have been due to human errors/negligence, which is primarily due to the lack of sound and solid education on the field despite the years of actual sailing.

The age of computerization and automation only heightens the problem. Procedures and equipment of modern merchant vessels have not only increased in complexities but have been constantly improving by the adoption of new developments in science and technology further promoting efficiency and safety of operations. We cannot be caught flat-footed. We, therefore, have to upgrade not just the techniques, but most of all, the basic academic and hands-on experience qualifications.

Stiffer competition with our Asian neighbors and Eastern European countries only emphasizes our lack of these essential pre-requisites. For this reason, we need to use our naval vessels when they are not engaged in emergencies for the training of our future deck officer, engineers and crewmen apart from the traditional vessels that lend them apprenticeship training.

In view of the foregoing, the immediate approval of this bill is earnestly sought.

### AN ACT

## AMENDING CERTAIN SECTIONS OF PRESIDENTIAL DECREE NUMBERED NINETY-SEVEN, AS AMENDED, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS "THE MERCHANT MARINE OFFICERS LAW"

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1 SECTION 1. Section 15 of the Presidential Decree Numbered Ninety-Seven, as amended, otherwise known as the Philippine Merchant Marine Officers Law is hereby 2 3 amended to read as follows: 4 "Sec. 15. Admission Requirements for Examination. - No person shall

- 5 be qualified for examination as a marine officer unless he/she is: "[ (a) male; ] 6
- 7 "[ (b) ] (A) Citizen of the Philippines;
- 8 "[ (c) ] (B) At least twenty-one years of age;
- "[ (d) ] (C) Mentally-sound and physically fit with normal vision perception, 9
- 10 as certified by a competent physician; and

"[(e)](D) Of good moral character." 11

13 SECTION 2. Paragraphs (d), (e) and (f) of Section 16 of the Decree are hereby 14 amended as follows:

"SEC. 16, Requirements of Deck Officers. -

"(d) Third Mate. - Applicant must be a holder of a degree of Bachelor 17 18 of Science in Marine Transportation, major in Navigation and Seamanship, after completion of a nautical curriculum of academic and theoretical studies, 19 and twelve months of practical apprenticeship which must be served on 20 21 [merchant marine] BOARD SEAGOING VESSELS of not less than two 22 hundred [fifty] gross tons registered for foreign or coastwise trade to qualify 23 for third mate license. A LOGBOOK SHALL HAVE BEEN ACCOMPLISHED AND [the] certification of service issued by the Master 24 25 and Chief Mate of the vessel. The apprenticeship shall be under the 26 supervision of a permanent staff of the institution assigned solely for such 27 purpose.

28 "(e) Major Patron - An applicant for Patron in major coastwise trade shall be at least twenty-[five] ONE years of age and shall produce a certificate 29 30 showing that he/she has COMPLETED TWO YEARS IN NAUTICAL 31 SCIENCE or its equivalent in an officially recognized school and he/SHE has 32 navigated on a coastwise or a [high sea] SEA-GOING vessel as boatswain,

1	quartermaster, [sailor] ABLE SEAMAN or apprentice mate [on a merchant
2	marine vessel] of not less than two hundred [fifty] gross tons for a period of at
3	least [ten] <b>TWO</b> (2) years [or that he has navigated as minor patron for at least
4	five years].
5	"(f) Minor Patron - An applicant for certificate for patron in [the]
6	Minor coastwise trade shall not be less than twenty-[five] ONE years of age
7	and shall produce satisfactory evidence showing that he/SHE has passed [high
8	school] THE ONE YEAR BASIC MERCHANT SEAMAN'S COURSE of
9	its equivalent in an officially-recognized school and that he has [navigated]
10	SERVED AS APPRENTICE OR SEAMEN FOR ONE YEAR ON
11	<b>BOARD</b> a coastwise vessel of <b>NOT LESS</b> than thirty (30) gross tons [of over
12	a period of not less than five years] AND ONE (1) YEAR ON BOARD
13	COASTWISE VESSEL OF NOT LESS THAN ONE HUNDRED GROSS
14	TONS as boatswain, quartermaster, [or sailor] ABLE SEAMAN."

16	SEC. 3. Paragraphs (d) and (e) of Section 17 of the same Decree are hereby amended
17	to read as follows:
18	"SEC. 17. Engine Officers. –

20	"(d) Fourth Marine Engineer An applicant must be at least a [second
21	year high school] GRADUATE OF THE FOUR-YEAR BACHELOR OF
22	SCIENCE IN MARINE ENGINEERING IN A SCHOOL recognized by
23	the government, having served for at least SIX MONTHS as apprentice IN A
24	SHIPYARD AND SIX MONTHS AND/OR ONE YEAR CONTINIOUS
25	<b>ON BOARD VESSEL AS APPRENTICE</b> , engineer, oiler, or machinist on
26	vessels propelled by motor or steam engineers of not less than two hundred
27	fifty BHP [Under this category, he must pass through a review class before
28	admitted to take examinations]: Provided, however, That [if the applicant is a
29	marine engineer graduate, of a recognized school, he must have at least served
30	two years as apprentice engineer, oiler, or machinist: Provided, further, That a
31	certificate of service is issued] AN ENGINEER MUST BE
32	ACCOMPLISHED AND DULY SIGNED by the Chief Engineer and
33	Master of the vessel and duly authenticated by the ship owner or by the ship
34	representative of the vessel.
35	"(e) Motor Engineer An applicant shall be at least twenty-one years
36	of age, a graduate [of elementary school] IN ASSOCIATE IN MARINE
37	ENGINEERING OR ITS EQUIVALENT RECOGNIZED BY THE
38	GOVERNMENT, and shall produce satisfactory evidence showing that he
39	has served as APPRENTICE ENGINEER, WIPER, oiler, machinist or
40	apprentice motor engineer FOR SIX MONTHS IN A SHIPYARD AND SIX
41	MONTHS ON BOARD A motor vessel OR CRAFT PROPELLED [for at
42	least five years] WITH NOT LESS THAN TWO HUNDRED FIFTY BHP
43	OR ONE YEAR OF CONTINOUS SERVICE."

45	<b>SEC. 4.</b> This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
