ESTABLISHING THE ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE FOUNDATION TO PROMOTE ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE IN PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Article XIV, Section 1 of the 1987 Constitution provides that the State shall protect and promote the right of all the citizens of our country to quality education at all levels. However, despite this provision and numerous other laws that seek to promote good quality education, our country still lags behind our neighbors in Asia when it comes to providing good quality education.

Recent surveys indicate that there has been a decline in the academic performance of Filipino school children particularly in the field of science and mathematics. This decline may be due to the high teacher-student ratio, poor facilities, lack of textbooks, or lack of expertise or knowledge of teachers with the subjects they are teaching.

In line with our Constitutional provision on good quality education, this bill seeks to create an Academic Excellence Foundation which shall promote academic excellence in public and private schools all over the country through public-private entity partnerships. The Foundation shall develop programs that shall push for the advancement of the concept of academic excellence.

In view of the foregoing, immediate approval of this measure is earnestly sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

 SECTION 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "Academic Excellence Act of 2016."

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4 SEC. 2. *The Academic Excellence Foundation.* - There is hereby created the 5 Philippine Academic Excellence Foundation whose purpose shall be to promote academic 6 excellence in public and private schools all over the country through public-private entity 7 partnerships. The foundation shall be a non-profit organization. The board of directors of the 8 foundation and foundation activities shall be under the direction of the Department of 9 Education (DepEd).

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11 SEC. 3. Board of Directors of the Foundation. - The board of directors of the foundation shall consist of the Secretary of DepEd and twenty (20) other members to be 12 appointed by the President. Of the twenty (20) members appointed by the President, eight (8) 13 shall represent a variety of education groups and twelve (12) shall represent a variety of 14 business groups. The members of the board of directors shall select one member to serve as 15 chair. The DepEd Secretary shall serve as secretary for the board of directors and provide 16 administrative support to the foundation. An executive committee of the foundation board, 17 18 composed of the board officers and chairs of board committees, may only advise and make recommendations to the foundation board. 19

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SEC. 4. *Programs of the Foundation.* - The foundation may develop programs that will advance the concept of educational excellence. These may include, but are not limited to:

Private Sources of Funds. - The foundation shall seek private resources to supplement the available public money. Individuals, businesses, and other organizations may 8 contribute to the foundation in any manner specified by the board of directors. All money 9 received shall be administered by the board of directors. 10 11 12 SEC. 9. Report. - The board of directors of the foundation shall submit an annual report to the Secretary of the Department of Education on the progress of its activities. The 13 annual report shall contain a financial report for the preceding year, including all receipts and 14 15 expenditures of the foundation. 16 SEC. 10. Separability Clause. - If any provisions or part hereof, is held invalid or unconstitutional, the remainder of the law of the provision not otherwise affected shall remain 18 valid and subsisting. 19 20 SEC. 11. Repealing Clause. - All laws, decrees, executive orders, rules and 21 22 regulations inconsistent with this Act, are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly. 23

SEC. 12. Effectivity Clause. - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days following its 24 25 complete publication in the Official Gazette or in two (2) national newspapers of general circulation. 26
