- AN ACT ESTABLISHING A COMPREHENSIVE NATIONAL FEEDING PROGRAM TO COMBAT HUNGER AND UNDERNUTRITION AMONG FILIPINO CHILDREN, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES
- Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:
- 1 SECTION 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as
- 2 "Masustansyang Pagkain para sa Batang Pilipino Act".
- 3 SEC. 2. Declaration of Policies. The State recognizes
- 4 the vital role of the youth in nation-building and shall
- 5 promote and protect their physical, moral, spiritual,
- 6 intellectual, and social well-being. In recognition of the

1 demonstrated relationship between food and nutrition, and 2 the capacity of students to develop and learn, the State 3 shall establish a comprehensive national feeding program that will address the problem of hunger and undernutrition among 4 5 Filipino children. SEC. 3. National Feeding Program. - The National 6 Feeding Program, hereinafter referred to as the Program, 7 is hereby established to address hunger and undernutrition 8 9 among Filipino children. 10 The Program shall have the following components 11 and coverage: 12 (a) Supplemental Feeding Program for Day Care 13 Children. - The Department of Social Welfare and 14 Development (DSWD), in coordination with the local 15 government units (LGUs) concerned shall implement a 16 supplemental feeding program for undernourished children 17 with ages three (3) to five (5) years. The Program shall be 18 administered in day care centers or in any other facility 19 which can be used for such purpose: Provided, That the

Program shall include the provision of one (1) healthy meal

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- for a period of not less than one hundred twenty (120) days
- 2 in a year: Provided, further, That in the preparation of
- 3 children's meals, the DSWD shall work in collaboration
- 4 with recognized parents' organizations.
- 5 (b) School-Based Feeding Program. The Department
- 6 of Education (DepED) with the Health and Nutrition
- 7 Center shall implement a school-based feeding program for
- 8 undernourished public school children from kindergarten
- 9 to grade six (6): Provided, That the Program shall include
- 10 the provision of one (1) healthy meal to all undernourished
- 11 public elementary school children for a period of not less
- 12 than one hundred twenty (120) days in a year.
- To assess the efficacy of the Programs, the national
- 14 government agencies (NGAs) concerned shall monitor the
- 15 weight, height and other relevant health indicators of the
- 16 children prior to and after the feeding cycle. Health and
- 17 nutrition assessments shall be undertaken by the NGAs
- 18 concerned to track the health and nutrition progress of the
- 19 Program beneficiaries. The NGAs concerned shall also

- 1 ensure the compliance of its implementing units to the
- 2 Program guidelines and the procurement process adopted.
- 3 SEC. 4. Creation of a National Nutrition and Poverty
- 4 Information System. The National Nutrition Council (NNC)
- 5 shall harmonize all existing national and local nutrition and
- 6 poverty databases that identify individuals, groups, and/or
- 7 localities that have the highest magnitude of hunger,
- 8 undernutrition, and poverty. This system shall be utilized
- 9 in monitoring the health and nutrition of children covered
- 10 by the Program.
- 11 SEC. 5. Cycle Menu. The DSWD and DepED, in
- 12 coordination with NNC and the Food and Nutrition Research
- 13 Institute (FNRI), shall prepare several standardized menus to
- 14 be served to all Program beneficiaries. The menus shall be
- 15 contextualized and drawn up according to age range, type of
- 16 school, and local cultural eating preferences, within
- 17 recommended standards. At least one third (1/3) of the daily
- 18 requirement shall be provided based on the Philippine
- 19 Dietary Reference Intake (PDRI).

1	SEC. 6. Gulayan sa Paaralan The schools shall be
2	encouraged to devote a portion of land or space for the
3	cultivation of vegetables and other nutrient-rich plants as
4	identified by the members of the NNC. Schools lacking in
5	land shall adopt modern gardening technologies with the
6	assistance of the Department of Science and Technology
7	(DOST) and the city or municipal agricultural officers.
8	Parents shall also be encouraged to maintain a similar
9	Program in their own households.
10	SEC. 7. Milk Feeding Program and the Use of Locally
11	$\label{eq:conditional} Produced\ Milk The\ DepED\ shall\ collaborate\ with\ the\ DSWD,$
12	the Philippine Carabao Center, Cooperative Development
13	Authority (CDA) and the National Dairy Authority for the
14	incorporation of a milk feeding program into the national
15	feeding program provided under this Act.
16	The use of locally produced milk in the cycle menus
17	under the Program, shall be encouraged and developed in
18	order to enhance the nutritional content of the food and at
19	the same time help in boosting livelihood opportunities of

- 1 our local dairy farmers and the local dairy industry of the
- 2 Philippines.
- 3 SEC. 8. Nutrition Promotive Programs. –
- 4 (a) Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH). The
  5 Department of Health (DOH), day care centers and public
- 6 elementary education institutions shall establish and
- 7 maintain water and sanitation facilities, promote good
- 8 hygiene and safe food preparation, and conduct deworming
- 9 of Program beneficiaries twice during the school year.
- 10 (b) Micronutrient Supplementation. To address
- 11 micronutrient deficiency, the DOH, the day care centers
- 12 and public elementary education institutions shall provide
- 13 for micronutrient supplementation among its Program
- 14 beneficiaries in the form of micronutrient powder, iron
- 15 supplementation, and iodized salt utilization and other
- 16 extra nutrients necessary.
- 17 SEC. 9. Prioritization in the Program Implementation. –
- 18 The DSWD and DepED shall create a five (5)-year plan to
- 19 fully implement the Program: Provided, That the NGAs
- 20 concerned shall prioritize the implementation of the

- 1 Program in the LGUs and public elementary schools that
- 2 meet any of the following criteria:
- 3 (a) With the highest prevalence of undernutrition and
- 4 nutrient-deficiency among children aged three (3) years up
- 5 to grade six (6) level;
- 6 (b) With available facilities or capability to implement
- 7 the Program: and
- 8 (c) Which prioritize such Program in their locality
- 9 and are willing to provide counterpart resources for its
- 10 implementation.
- 11 SEC. 10. Integrated Nutrition Education, Behavioral
- 12 Transformation, and Social Mobilization. The Program
- 13 shall be complemented by public health, nutrition, and
- 14 values transformation campaign to promote a holistic and
- 15 integrated approach to health and nutrition education.
- 16 Orientation-training on the objectives and mechanics of
- 17 the Program shall be held among personnel of NGAs and
- 18 LGUs concerned, parent volunteers, and the parent-
- 19 teachers associations (PTAs) to generate support for the
- 20 Program. The NGAs concerned shall also endeavor to mobilize

- 1 community organizations to continue nutrition education
  2 outside of the school.
- 3 SEC. 11. Monitoring, Review and Assessment of the
- 4 Program. The NGAs and LGUs concerned shall regularly
- 5 monitor, review and assess the impact and effectivity of
- 6 the Program in consultation with their stakeholders.
- 7 SEC. 12. Procurement of Goods and Services. The
- 8 provisions of Republic Act No. 9184, notwithstanding, the
- 9 government agencies concerned are hereby mandated to
- 10 establish a liberalized mode of procurement for this
- 11 Program, subject to the approval of the government
- 12 procurement policy board.
- 13 The public procurement for this Program shall
- 14 encourage the participation of local and community-based
- 15 producers, suppliers and/or service contractors.
- 16 SEC. 13. Annual Report. The agencies concerned
- 17 shall prepare and submit an annual report on the status of
- 18 the Program implementation to the Office of the President
- 19 and both Houses of Congress.

1	SEC. 14. Appropriations The amount necessary to
2	carry out the initial implementation of this Act shall be
3	sourced from the current appropriations of the DSWD and
4	DepED.
5	Thereafter, such sums as may be necessary for the
6	continuous implementation of this Act shall be included in
7	the annual General Appropriations Act under the
8	respective budgets of the DSWD and DepED.
9	SEC. 15. Local Government Assistance A portion of
10	the Special Education Fund may be used to augment the
11	appropriations available for the implementation of the
12	school-based feeding program provided under Section 3(b)
13	of this Act.
14	SEC. 16. Implementing Rules and Regulations
15	Within sixty (60) days from the effectivity of this Act, the
16	DSWD and the DepED, in coordination with the DBM
17	NNC, FNRI, and other relevant government agencies
18	nongovernment organizations, and development partners
19	shall promulgate the necessary rules and regulations for

the effective implementation of this Act.

1	SEC. 17. Separability Clause If any provision or
2	part hereof is held invalid or unconstitutional, remainder
3	of the law or the provision not otherwise affected shall
4	remain valid and subsisting.
5	SEC. 18. Repealing Clause All laws, decrees,
6	orders, rules, and regulations or other issuances or parts
7	inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby
8	repealed or modified accordingly.
9	SEC. 19. Effectivity This Act shall take effect
10	fifteen (15) days after its publication in the Official Gazette

or in at least two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
