RESOLUTION

URGING THE GOVERNMENT TO FULLY SUPPORT THE LOCAL COCOA INDUSTRY IN ORDER TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE RISING GLOBAL DEMAND FOR COCOA BEANS AND RELATED PRODUCTS, AND IN DOING SO GENERATE EMPLOYMENT AND INCOME FOR COCOA FARMERS AND THEIR FAMILIES, CONTRIBUTE TO RE-GREENING THE COUNTRYSIDE, AND PROMOTE INCLUSIVE GROWTH

WHEREAS, Section 9, Article II of the 1987 Philippine Constitution declares it a State policy to "...promote a just and dynamic social order that will ensure the prosperity and independence of the nation and free the people from poverty through policies that provide adequate social services, promote full employment, a rising standard of fiving, and an improved quality of life for all."

WHEREAS, Section 1, Article XII of the Constitution further mandates the State to promote "sound agricultural development" towards equitably distributing opportunities, income, and wealth; sustaining an increase in the amount of goods and services produced by the nation for the benefit of the people; and expanding productivity as the key to raising the quality of life for all, especially the underprivileged;

WHEREAS, pursuant to the above Constitutional mandates, Republic Act No. 7900, or the "High-Value Crops Development Act of 1995" which seeks to ensure the "all-out promotion of the production, processing, marketing, and distribution of high-value crops in suitable areas of the country";

WHEREAS, the amount of Php 2.148 billion was allocated for the High Value Crops Program and its various components under Republic Act No. 10964, or the "General Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2018",

WHEREAS, a recent news report stated that ranchers in the Amazon rainforest have started planting cocoa trees as a means to diversify their crops;

WHEREAS, the new trend of planting cocoa trees has been hailed for its potential to revive the Amazon rainforest, diversify the income sources of Brazilian farmers, and reposition Brazil as a new player in the global cocoa trade;

WHEREAS, the same reported that benchmark cocoa prices in New York are currently at around \$2,500 per ton, bouncing back from a ten-year low of \$1,756 in 2017;

WHEREAS, a report¹ by the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) also noted that global consumption of cocoa-related products has increased simultaneously with stagnation in the supply of cocoa beans;

WHEREAS, it was also recently French company Valrhona which is internationally known as a producer of high-quality chocolate products, will soon source its cocoa beans from Davao-based farmers due to their "high quality and taste";

WHEREAS, in 2016, Davao-based Malagos unsweetened chocolate won silver and two out of three stars at the Academy of Chocolate and Great Taste Awards in London;

WHEREAS, the relevant government agencies of our country should take note and take advantage of these trends in the cocoa industry, as it can help achieve the Constitutional and legal mandates and national objectives identified above;

WHEREAS, our government already has the tools to support our cocoa industry, such as the High Value Crops Program which already includes cocoa among its priority crops, and the National Greening Program, of which the expansion of the cocoa plantations was conceptualize in 2015;

WHEREAS, if the government meets these trends with decisive leadership and well-planned policies, then our country will be poised to take a bigger role in the global value chain for cocoa beans;

WHEREAS, with sufficient support from and coordination with it is even possible for the Philippines to also venture into producing high-quality finished cocoa products using locally sourced cocoa beans;

WHEREAS, as based on the Brazilian experience cited above, cocoa trees may also further re-green the country, in accordance with the people's right to a healthful and balanced ecology;

WHEREAS, supporting our local cocoa industry will also encourage crop diversification, generate employment in the agricultural sector, and create alternate sources of income for our farmers, who remain the as one of the poorest sectors;

NOW THEREFOR BE IT RESOLVED, as it is hereby resolved by the Senate of the Philippines, to urge the government to fully support the local cocoa industry in order to take advantage of the rising global demand for cocoa beans and related products, and in doing so generate employment and income for cocoa farmers and their families, contribute to re-greening the countryside, and promote inclusive growth.
