## "AN ACT

TRANSFERRING THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE ACADEMY (PNPA) AND NATIONAL POLICE TRAINING INSTITUTE (NPTI) FROM THE PHILIPPINE PUBLIC SAFETY COLLEGE (PPSC) TO THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE (PNP), AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE SECTION 67 OF REPUBLIC ACT NO. 6975 AS AMENDED BY REPUBLIC ACT NO. 8551"

# **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

"To serve and protect", the motto which our Police force must uphold and live by as true public servants for the people of our country.

The Philippine National Police or PNP was formed on 29 January, 1991 as the merged product of the now defunct Philippine Constabulary (PC) and Integrated National Police (INP) pursuant to Republic Act No. 6975, otherwise known as an "ACT ESTABLISHING THE PHILIPPINE NATIONAL POLICE UNDER A REORGANIZED DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES"

Also under the said law, the Philippine Public Safety College (PPSC) was established as the premier training institution for three public safety services, namely; the Bureau of Fire Protection, Bureau of Jail Management and Penology, and the Philippine National Police. The establishment of the PPSC was aimed to demilitarize law enforcement in the Philippines assuring civilian administration over the reorganized police force and integrate the Philippine Constabulary and Integrated National Police because of internal corruption and a number of abuses during the time of its function.

It has been long since the enactment of this law and the context of the country has changed and continuously adapts to changes. The Philippine National Police has also improved and expanded since then and in order to properly reorganize and address the problems regarding police personnel specifically the ineptness and breakdown of discipline involving the pool of newly appointed police officers, both commissioned and non-commissioned. Addressing this problem would greatly impact the quality of police officers to render public service and security for the people and raise the standard that the PNP upholds.

Hence, this bill proposes the transfer of the administration and supervision of the Philippine National Police Academy (PNPA) and National Police Training Institute (NPTI) from the PPSC to the PNP.


The transfer of both the PNPA and NPTI to the PNP will see advantages of having the actual practitioner manage and oversee the training of its future personnel; to facilitate planning and recalibration of modules and programs and hasten human resource.

RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED

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Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. The administrative and operational supervision and control of the Philippine National Police Academy (PNPA) and the National Police Training Institute (NPTI) as well as the personnel and all the properties, facilities, record, equipment, funds, choses in action, appropriations, rights, functions and other assets thereof, are hereby transferred from the Philippine Public Safety College to the Philippine National Police.

SECTION 2. Within ninety (90) days from the effectivity of this Act, the Chief PNP shall submit the revised organizational structure and staffing pattern of the PNPA and NPTI to the National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM) and the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) for approval. Said revised organizational Structure and staffing pattern may include reorganization and renaming of existing PNP offices and units, renaming of the training and learning bodies transferred form PPSC, and realignment of functions as may be necessary.

SECTION 3. The Secretary of the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG)/Chairman of the NAPOLCOM shall ensure the smooth transition of the transfer of the PNPA and NPTI from the PPSC to the PNP within four (4) months from the effectivity of this Act.

SECTION 4. The amounts necessary to carry out the provisions of the Act is hereby authorized to be appropriated in the annual General Appropriations Act (GAA) of the year following the enactment of the Act into law and thereafter.

SECTION 5. Within one hundred twenty (120) days from the effectivity of the Act, the NAPOLCOM, in coordination with the PNP and the DILG shall promulgate the necessary rules and regulations to implement the provisions of this Act.

SECTION 6. Section 67 of Republic Act No. 6975 is hereby amended. All laws, decrees, executive orders, rules and regulations, and other issuances or parts thereof which are inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed, amended, or modified accordingly.

SECTION 9. In case any provision of this Act or any portion hereof is declared unconstitutional, the remaining provisions shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect after 15 days from its publication in at least two
