AN ACT CONVERTING THE NORTHERN BUKIDNON COMMUNITY COLLEGE IN THE MUNICIPALITY OF MANOLO FORTICH, PROVINCE OF BUKIDNON, INTO A STATE COLLEGE TO BE KNOWN AS THE NORTHERN BUKIDNON STATE COLLEGE, AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR

## Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1 SECTION 1. Conversion. - The Northern Bukidnon 2 Community College in the Municipality of Manolo Fortich, Province 3 of Bukidnon, is hereby converted into a state college to be known 4 as the Northern Bukidnon State College, and hereinafter referred 5 to as the College. Its main campus shall be in the Municipality 6 of Manolo Fortich.

7 SEC. 2. General Mandate. – The College shall primarily 8 provide advance studies and research, higher professional and 9 technical instructions and training in science and technology, and 10 other related fields. It shall also undertake research and extension services, and provide progressive leadership in its areas of
 specialization in the Province of Bukidnon and in Region X.

3 SEC. 3. Curricular Offerings. - The College shall offer 4 undergraduate, graduate and short-term technical courses within 5 its areas of competence and specialization, as the Board of Trustees 6 may deem necessary to carry out its objectives, and for the human 7 resource development needs of the Province of Bukidnon and 8 Region X.

9 The College, if it has a College of Education, may adopt public 10 elementary and secondary schools in the Province of Bukidnon to 11 serve as pilot centers for innovative teaching and learning 12 strategies and approaches.

13 SEC. 4. Administration. - The College shall have the 14 general powers of a corporation set forth in Batas Pambansa 15 Blg. 68, as amended, otherwise known as "The Corporation Code 16 of the Philippines". The administration of the College and the 17 exercise of its corporate powers shall be vested exclusively in 18 the Board of Trustees, and in the President of the College, insofar 19 as authorized by the Board.

20 SEC. 5. *The Governing Board.* – The governing board of the 21 College shall be the Board of Trustees, hereinafter referred to 22 as the Board, which shall be chaired and co-chaired by the 23 Chairperson of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) 24 and the President of the College, respectively, and with the 25 following, as members:

26 (a) Chairperson of the Committee on Education, Arts and27 Culture of the Senate;

- (b) Chairperson of the Committee on Higher and Technical
   Education of the House of Representatives;
- 3 (c) Regional Director of the National Economic and
  4 Development Authority (NEDA);
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(d) Regional Director of the Department of Science and Technology (DOST);

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(e) Regional Director of the Department of Agriculture (DA);

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(f) President of the faculty associations of the College;(g) President of the student councils of the College;

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(h) President of the alumni associations of the College:

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(i) Two (2) prominent citizens from the private sector who have distinguished themselves in their professions or fields of

13 specialization.

14 The two (2) prominent citizens shall be chosen from the list 15 of at least five (5) qualified persons in the Province of Bukidnon, 16 as recommended by the search committee constituted by the 17 College President, and in consultation with the Chairperson of 18 the CHED, and the other members of the Board, based on the 19 normal standards and qualifications for the position.

20 The two (2) prominent citizens shall serve for a term of two (2)
21 years from the date of appointment.

22 Membership in the governing board of the President of the 23 faculty association, the President of the student council and the 24 President of the alumni association shall be coterminous with 25 their terms of office as provided under their respective terms of 26 office as set forth in their respective constitutions and bylaws. 1 SEC. 6. Promulgation and Implementation of Policies. – 2 The Board shall promulgate and implement policies in accordance 3 with the declared State policies on education and other pertinent 4 provisions of the Philippine Constitution on education, agriculture, 5 science and technology, as well as the policies, standards and 6 thrusts of the CHED under Republic Act No. 7722, otherwise 7 known as the "Higher Education Act of 1994".

8 SEC. 7. Powers and Duties of the Board of Trustees. -9 In addition to its general powers of administration and the 10 exercise of all powers granted to the board of directors of 11 a corporation under existing laws, the Board shall have the 12 following specific powers and duties:

(a) Promulgate rules and regulations as may be necessaryto carry out the purposes and functions of the College;

(b) Approve the curricula, instructional programs, and rules
of discipline drawn by the Administrative and the Academic
Councils herein provided;

(c) Appoint, upon the recommendation of the President of
the College, the vice presidents, deans, directors, heads of the
campuses, faculty members and other officials and employees
of the College;

(d) Fix and adjust the salaries of faculty members and administrative officials and employees, subject to the provisions of the Revised Compensation and Position Classification System and other pertinent budget and compensation laws governing hours of service and such other duties and conditions as it may deem proper; grant them, at its discretion, leaves of absence under such regulations as it may promulgate, any provision of existing
 law to the contrary notwithstanding; and remove them for cause
 in accordance with the requirements of due process of law;

(e) Fix the tuition fees and other necessary school charges, 4 such as matriculation fees, graduation fees, and laboratory fees, 5 6 as the Board may deem proper to impose, after due consultation with the concerned sectors. The fees and charges, including 7 government subsidies and other income generated by the College, 8 9 shall constitute its special trust funds, and shall be deposited in any authorized government depository bank, all interests that 10 11 shall accrue therefrom shall form part of the same funds for 12 the use of the College. Any provision of existing law, rules or 13 regulations to the contrary notwithstanding, any income generated by the College from tuition fees and other charges, as well as 14 15 from the operation of auxiliary services and land grants, shall be retained by the College, and may be disbursed by the Board for 16 instruction, research, extension services or other programs and 17 projects of the College: Provided, That all fiduciary fees shall be 18 disbursed for the specific purposes for which these are collected: 19 Provided, however, That if, for reasons beyond its control, the 20 College shall not be able to pursue any project for which the 21 22 funds have been appropriated and allocated under its approved program of expenditures, the Board may authorize the use of 23 24 said funds for any reasonable purpose which, in its discretion, 25 may be necessary and urgent for the attainment of the objectives 26 and goals of the College;

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1 (f) Adopt and implement a socialized scheme of tuition and 2 other school fees for greater access of poor but deserving students in accordance with Republic Act No. 10931 or the "Universal Access 3 4 to Quality Tertiary Education Act";

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(g) Establish professorial chairs in the College and provide 6 fellowships for qualified faculty members, and scholarships to 7 deserving students;

8 (h) Receive and appropriate all sums as may be provided 9 for the support of the College in the manner it may determine, 10 in its discretion, in order to carry out the purposes and functions 11 of the College:

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(i) Set the policies on admission and graduation of students;

13 (j) Award honorary degrees upon persons in recognition of their outstanding contribution in the fields of education, public 14 service, arts, science and technology, agriculture or any field of 15 16 specialization within the academic competence of the College, and authorize the awarding of certificates of completion of nondegree 17 and nontraditional courses: 18

19 (k) Establish research and extension centers to promote 20 the development of the College:

(l) Develop 21 academic arrangements for institutional capability-building with appropriate public, private, local or foreign 22 institutions and agencies, and appoint experts/specialists as 23 consultants, part-time/visiting/exchange professors, scholars or 24 researchers, as the case may be; 25

(m) Adopt modern and innovative modes of transmitting 26 knowledge for the promotion of greater access to education such 27

as the use of information technology, dual training system, open
 distance learning, and community laboratory;

3 (n) Collaborate with the governing boards of the state 4 universities and colleges (SUCs) within the Province of Bukidnon 5 and in Region X, under the supervision of the CHED and in 6 consultation with the Department of Budget and Management 7 (DBM), in restructuring the College to make it more efficient, 8 relevant, productive and competitive;

9 (o) Absorb non-chartered tertiary institutions within the 10 Province of Bukidnon and in Region X as branches and 11 extension/external centers, in coordination with the CHED, 12 and in consultation with the DBM, and offer therein programs 13 or courses to promote and carry out equal access to educational 14 opportunities, as mandated by the Constitution;

(p) Authorize an external management audit of the College, to be financed by the CHED, subject to the rules and regulations of the Commission on Audit (COA), and institute reforms, including academic and structural changes, on the basis of the audit results and recommendations;

(q) Develop consortia and other economic forms of linkages
with local government units (LGUs), public, private, local and
foreign institutions and agencies in the furtherance of the purposes
and objectives of the College;

(r) Import economic, technical and cultural books andpublications;

(s) Enter into joint ventures with business and industry forthe profitable development and management of the economic

assets of the College, the proceeds from which shall be used for
 the development and strengthening of the College;

3 (t) Receive, in trust, legacies, gifts and donations of real 4 and personal properties of all kinds and to administer and dispose 5 of the same, when necessary, for the benefit of the College, and 6 subject to the limitations, directions and instructions of the donor, 7 if any;

8 (u) Authorize the construction or repair of its buildings, 9 machinery, equipment and other facilities, and the purchase 10 and acquisition of real property, including the necessary supplies, 11 materials and equipment;

12 (v) Extend the term of the President of the College beyond 13 the age of retirement, but not beyond the age of seventy (70), 14 based on the guidelines, qualifications and standards set by 15 the Board: *Provided*, That the President's performance has been 16 rated by the Board as outstanding and unanimous recommendation 17 has been decided by the search committee;

(w) Delegate any of its powers and duties provided to the
President and other officials of the College, as it may deem
appropriate, so as to expedite the administration of the affairs of the
College;

(x) Establish policy guidelines and procedures forparticipative decision-making and transparency within the College;

(y) Where most advantageous to the College, privatize the
management of nonacademic services such as health, food,
building or grounds or property maintenance, and such other
similar activities; and

(z) Promulgate rules and regulations, as may be necessary,
 to carry out the purposes and functions of the College.

3 SEC. 8. *Meetings of the Board.* - The Board shall regularly 4 convene once every quarter. The Chairperson of the Board may, 5 however, upon three (3) days' prior written notice, call a maximum 6 of two (2) special meetings whenever necessary within the year.

A quorum of the Board shall consist of a majority of all its
members holding office at the time of the meeting: *Provided*, *however*, That the Chairperson of the Board or the President of the
College is among those present in the meeting.

In the absence of the Chairperson of the CHED, a 11 Commissioner of the CHED, duly designated by the CHED 12 Chairperson as representative in the meeting, shall have all 13 the rights and responsibilities of a regular member: Provided, 14 That during this meeting, the President of the College, as 15 Vice - Chairperson, shall be the presiding officer: Provided, further, 16 That this proviso notwithstanding, the Chairperson of the CHED 17 is hereby authorized to designate a CHED Commissioner as the 18 regular Chairperson of the Board, in which case said CHED 19 Commissioner shall act as the Presiding Officer. 20

In case the Chairpersons of the Congressional Committees on Education shall not be able to attend the meeting, they may designate their respective representatives who shall have the same rights and responsibilities as the regular members of the Board.

The members of the Board shall not receive any salary, but shall be entitled to reimbursements for actual and necessary expenses incurred, either in their attendance to the meetings of the

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Board or in connection with other official business authorized by resolutions of the Board, subject to existing laws and regulations.

3 SEC. 9. The College President. - The College shall be 4 headed by a President who shall render full-time service. 5 The President shall be appointed by the Board, subject to the 6 guidelines, qualifications and standards set by the Board, upon 7 the recommendation of a duly constituted search committee.

The College President shall have a term of four (4) years 8 9 and shall be eligible for reappointment to another term: Provided, That this proviso notwithstanding, and in order to effect a 10 smooth transition to a state college, the incumbent administrator 11 of the Northern Bukidnon Community College, if qualified, shall 12 serve as the first president of the College. The remaining term of 13 the incumbent administrator of the Northern Bukidnon Community 14 College shall be considered as the first term as College President. 15

Within six (6) months before the expiration of the term of
office of the incumbent President of the College, the Board shall
constitute the Search Committee for the Presidency.

19 In case of vacancy in the Office of the President, by reason 20 of death, compulsory retirement, resignation, removal for cause 21 or incapacity of the President to perform the functions of the office, 22 the Board shall designate an Officer-in-Charge (OIC) of the College 23 within six (6) months from the date of vacancy, pending the 24 appointment of a new President.

In case of vacancy in the Office of the President, as mentioned
in the immediately preceding paragraph, the successor or the
OIC shall serve only during the unexpired portion of the term.

1 The powers and duties of the President of the College, in 2 addition to those specifically provided in this Act, shall be those 3 usually pertaining to the Office of the President of similar colleges 4 and those delegated by the Board.

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5 The salary of the President of the College shall be in 6 accordance with the Revised Compensation and Position 7 Classification System, as modified by Joint Resolution No. 4 8 dated June 17, 2009, and by such other laws amendatory thereto, 9 which may hereinafter be enacted, and shall be comparable to that 10 being received by the Presidents of similar educational institutions.

11 The President of the College shall be assisted by a Vice 12 President for Academic Affairs and a Vice President for 13 Administration, who shall be appointed by the Board upon the 14 recommendation of the President.

15 SEC. 10. Administrative Council. – There shall be an 16 Administrative Council consisting of the President of the College, 17 as Chairperson, and the vice presidents, deans, directors, and 18 other officials of equal rank as members, whose duty is to 19 implement the policies governing the administration, management, 20 and development of the College, as approved by the Board.

SEC. 11. Academic Council. - There shall be an Academic
Council composed of the President of the College, who shall act
as Chairperson, and all members of the academic staff with the
rank of not lower than assistant professor, as members.

The Academic Council shall have the power to review and recommend the curricular offerings and rules of discipline of the College, subject to the appropriate action by the Board. It shall

fix the requirements for the admission of students, as well as for their graduation and conferment of degrees, subject to review and approval by the Board through the President of the College. It shall also have disciplinary powers over students of the College and shall formulate academic policies and rules and regulations on discipline, subject to the approval of the Board.

7 SEC. 12. The Secretary of the College. – The Board shall 8 appoint a Secretary who shall serve as such for both the Board 9 and College, and shall keep all records and proceedings of 10 the Board in addition to other duties and responsibilities. 11 The Secretary shall serve upon each member of the Board the 12 appropriate notice of Board meetings.

13 SEC. 13. The Treasurer of the College. - The Treasurer of
 14 the Philippines shall be the ex officio treasurer of the College.

15 SEC. 14. Faculty. - No political belief, gender preference, cultural or community affiliation or ethnic origin, nor religious 16 opinion or affiliation shall be the matter of inquiry in the 17 18 appointment of faculty members of the College: Provided, however, 19 That said appointment shall be subject to the qualifications 20 and standards set by the Board: Provided, further, That no member 21 of the faculty shall teach for or against any particular church or 22 religious sect.

SEC. 15. Academic Freedom and Institutional Autonomy. –
The College shall enjoy academic freedom and institutional
autonomy pursuant to paragraph 2, Section 5 of Article XIV of the
Constitution.

1 SEC. 16. Scholarship Programs/Admission. - The College 2 shall provide scholarship programs and other affirmative action 3 programs to assist poor but deserving students who qualify for 4 admission to the College.

5 No student shall be denied admission to the College by reason 6 of sex, nationality, religion, cultural or community affiliation or 7 ethnic origin.

SEC. 17. Authority to Lend or 8 Transfer Apparatus/ Equipment/Supplies and Detail of Personnel. - The heads of the 9 bureaus and offices of the national government are hereby 10 authorized to lend and/or transfer, upon the request of the 11 12 President of the College, such apparatus, equipment or supplies as may be needed by the College, and detail employees for duty therein 13 when, in the judgment of the head of bureau or office, such 14 apparatus, equipment, supplies or services of such employees 15 can be spared without serious detriment to public service. The 16 17 employees so detailed shall perform such duties as required of 18 them by the President of the College and the time so employed shall be counted as part of their regular service. 19

SEC. 18. Assets, Liabilities and Personnel. – All assets, real and personal, personnel and records of the Northern Bukidnon Community College, as well as its liabilities or obligations, are hereby transferred to the College: *Provided*, That the positions, rights and security of tenure of the academic staff and personnel therein employed under existing laws prior to the conversion of the Northern Bukidnon Community College into a State College shall

1 be respected: Provided, finally, That the College shall also 2 accordingly upgrade or increase its human resource component.

All parcels of land belonging to the government occupied 3 by the Northern Bukidnon Community College are hereby declared 4 5 the property of the College and shall be titled under its name: Provided, That should the College cease to exist or be abolished 6 7 or would no longer need such aforementioned parcels of land, 8 the title to said parcels of land shall be transferred to the local 9 government of Manolo Fortich, Province of Bukidnon,

10 SEC 19. Tax Exemption. - The importation of economic. technical and cultural books or publications, which are for 11 economic, technical, vocational, scientific, philosophical, historical 12 13 or cultural purposes, made by the College upon certification by 14 the CHED, shall be exempt from customs duties in accordance 15 with the provisions of Republic Act No. 10863, otherwise known as 16 the "Customs Modernization and Tariff Act (CMTA)".

17 All grants, bequests, endowments, donations and contributions made to the College and used actually, directly 18 19 and exclusively by it, shall be exempt from the donor's tax and the same shall be considered as allowable deduction from the 20 21 gross income of the donor, in accordance with the provisions of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997, as amended. 22

23 SEC. 20. Compliance with CHED Requirements. - The provisions of this Act notwithstanding, the conversion of the 24 institution into a state college shall become effective only upon 25 the determination and declaration by the CHED based on the 26 recommendation of a panel of experts it shall constitute for 27

the purpose, that the institution has complied with the 1 requirements for a college status based on CHED Memorandum 2 Order No. 46, series of 2012 (Policy-Standard to Enhance 3 Quality Assurance in Philippine Higher Education Through 4 an Outcomes-Based and Typology-Based Quality Assurance): 5 Provided. That the panel may issue such recommendation when 6 the institution has substantially complied with the requirements 7 8 for the grant of college status.

9 The following requirements for a college, as established by 10 the CHED, shall be complied with:

(a) The College shall possess full-time permanent faculty
members who have the relevant degrees as required by the
CHED and experience in the subject areas they handle;

(b) The College shall offer degree programs characterized
by a core curriculum that holistically develops thinking, problem
solving, decision-making, communication, technical, and social
skills in line with the mission of the College;

(c) The College shall possess comprehensive learning
resources and support structures that are appropriate for
developing knowledge and skills in the specific natural science,
social science, humanities, and professional disciplines offered
by the College, including laboratories, books and journals, etc.;

23 (d) The College shall maintain links with the community
24 that would ensure the development of relevant academic and
25 extension programs as well as the application of their learning
26 outcomes; and

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1 (e) The College shall conduct outreach programs involving 2 students in social-development oriented experiences that allow 3 them to contextualize their knowledge within actual social and 4 human experiences.

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The CHED, through its regional office, shall regularly provide technical assistance to the institution and monitor compliance with the requirements of the Commission.

8 The institution shall retain its status prior to the effectivity 9 of this Act until it is able to comply with the requirements provided 10 herein.

SEC. 21. Development Plan, Management Audit,
 Organizational/Administrative/Academic Structure. - Within a
 period of one hundred twenty (120) days after the approval of
 this Act, the College shall accomplish the following:

(a) Submit a five (5)-year development plan, including its
program budget to the CHED, for corresponding recommendation
to the DBM;

(b) Undergo a management audit in cooperation with theCHED;

20 (c) Set up its organizational, administrative, as well as
21 academic structure, including the appointment of key officials
22 of the College; and

(d) Set in motion the establishment of at least four (4)
separate degree-granting units, one of which is in the arts and
sciences, and another unit for nondegree technical-vocational
education and training.

SEC. 22. Filing of Report. - On or before the fifteenth (15<sup>th</sup>)
 day of the second month after the opening of the regular classes
 each year, the Board shall file with the Office of the President of the
 Philippines, through the Chairperson of the CHED, and with both
 Houses of Congress, a detailed report on the progress, conditions
 and needs of the College.

SEC. 23. Suppletory Application. - The provisions of Republic
Act No. 8292, otherwise known as the "Higher Education
Modernization Act of 1997", shall be an integral part of this Act
and shall serve as part of the governing charter of the College.

SEC. 24. Parity Clause. - All other powers, functions and privileges, responsibilities and limitations to state colleges and their officials under existing laws shall be deemed granted to or imposed upon the College and its officials whenever appropriate.

15 SEC. 25. Appropriations. - The amount necessary to carry 16 out the initial implementation of this Act shall be charged against the current year's funding of the Northern Bukidnon 17 18 Community College provided by the Municipality of Manolo 19 Fortich, Province of Bukidnon. The municipality shall continue to 20 provide the same funding to the Northern Bukidnon Community 21 College corresponding to the funding given before the same is converted into the Northern Bukidnon State College until such time 22 that the full funding requirement of the Northern Bukidnon State 23 24 College is included in the annual General Appropriations Act.

25 26 SEC. 26. Implementing Rules and Regulations. – Within sixty (60) days after the effectivity of this Act, the Board shall,

in consultation with the CHED, formulate the guidelines to fully
 implement the provisions of this Act.

3 SEC. 27. Separability Clause. - If, for any reason, any part
4 or provision of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional,
5 the remaining parts or provisions not affected shall remain in full
6 force and effect.

SEC. 28. Repealing Clause. - All laws, presidential decrees,
executive orders, and rules and regulations contrary to or
inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed
or modified accordingly.

SEC. 29. Effectivity. - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15)
 days after its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper
 of general circulation.
