RESOLUTION

URGING THE APPROPRIATE SENATE COMMITTEE TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE REPORTED ALARMING STATE OF WIDESPREAD CORRUPTION AND MISMANAGEMENT IN THE PHILIPPINE HEALTH INSURANCE CORPORATION (PHILHEALTH) LEADING TO LOSSES AMOUNTING TO BILLIONS OF PESOS TO THE PREJUDICE OF OUR NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE AND UNIVERSAL HEALTH CARE PROGRAMS

WHEREAS, the 1987 Constitution, Article XIII, Section 11, states that "[t]he State shall adopt an integrated and comprehensive approach to health development which shall endeavor to make essential goods, health and other social services available to all people at affordable cost. There shall be priority for the needs of the underprivileged sick, elderly, disabled, women, and children. The State shall endeavor to provide free medical care to paupers";

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 27 of the same states that, "[t]he State shall maintain honesty and integrity in the public service and take positive and effective measures against graft and corruption";

WHEREAS, in Section 5 of Republic Act 7875, otherwise known as the "National Health Insurance Act of 1995", the National Health Insurance Program shall include "a sustainable system of funds constitution, collection, management and disbursement for financing the availment of a basic minimum package and other supplementary packages of health insurance benefits by a progressively expanding proportion of the population";

WHEREAS, according to the Commission on Audit (COA) 2017 Annual Audit Report, Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) incurred a net loss of

1 ₱4.75 billion for FY 2017, negatively affecting the efficient implementation of its 2 programs and projects¹;

WHEREAS, the aforementioned report also disclosed that the annual increase in the Benefit Claims and Operating Expenses averaging 20 percent and 10 percent, respectively, "outpaced the increase in the Premium Contributions with 19 percent average increase from CYs 2013-2017." Thus, the increase in premium contributions will not be sufficient to cover all current and future PhilHealth claims²;

WHEREAS, the report also revealed that "[a]dding to PhilHealth's woes was its inability to avail of the government[`s] ₱37.06 billion 2017 allocation for indigents premium contributions, which was targeted as the agency's third major source of income for CY 2017,"3.

WHEREAS, as a result, PhilHealth incurred losses by way of foregone income of \$\mathbb{P}_3.2\$ billion because the agency failed to enroll targeted "indigents/beneficiaries" who were included in the National Household Targeting System identified by the Department of Social Welfare and Development⁴;

WHEREAS, the report stated that "[t]he Premium Contributions under the current contribution rate will not be sufficient to cover all current PhilHealth claims and the future benefit availments, thus reduction in the actuarial life of the agency is imminent"5, raising a critical warning for the company's financial performance and its sustainability to provide its mandated services to the public in the coming years;

WHEREAS, the COA uncovered illegal bonuses and "perks" given to various PhilHealth officials and offices and ordered the return of ₱34 millions of disallowed bonuses from Philhealth regional offices in Metro Manila and Soccsksargen. In August

2018, the COA affirmed its decision that PhilHealth distributed ₱164 million in unauthorized perks to officials and personnel in fiscal years 2009, 2010, and 2014⁶;

WHEREAS, recent news reports disclosed that PhilHealth continues to face serious leakages and operation losses amounting to \$\mathbb{P}\$154 billion since fiscal year 2013. Of said reported "losses" in the past six years, \$\mathbb{P}\$102.5 billion was due to overpayment;

WHEREAS, one of the reasons of this overpayment that gravely depletes PhilHealth's funds are the reported upcasing problems, such as claims for pneumonia even if patients may have had only cough or cold, and other overpayments for medical procedures such as hemodialysis where PhilHealth paid Capitol University Medical City Foundation the maximum ₱4,000 for hemodialysis when the hospital charged its patient only ₱5008;

WHEREAS, it was also widely reported that PhilHealth was involved in falsified claims for payment for dialysis treatments, as in the case of WellMed Dialysis & Laboratory Center Corp (WellMed)⁹;

WHEREAS, it is imperative that government continues to deliver an effective health insurance program and social protection mitigating mechanisms helping individuals and their households reduce the impact of future risky events, such as illnesses, especially for the marginalized and vulnerable members of society;

WHEREAS, as the primary institution involved in the implementation of the National Health Insurance and Universal Health Care programs, PhilHealth cannot continue operating with this level of corruption and incompetence, lest they continue to incur losses which will continue to prejudice our national health services to the detriment of our countrymen;

WHEREAS, there is need to determine and address the root causes of the incurred losses, provide policy and structural reforms, as well as the possible accountability of the PhilHealth leadership in all levels;

WHEREAS, there is also need to establish a clear roadmap towards financial stability, transparency and higher accountability to ensure that PhilHealth will be able to provide credible and reliable services to its members;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE, as it is hereby Resolved, to direct the appropriate Senate committee, to conduct an inquiry, in aid of legislation, on the reported alarming state of widespread corruption and mismanagement in the Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) leading to losses amounting to billions of pesos to the prejudice of our National Health Insurance and Universal Health Care programs.
