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AN ACT

REQUIRING LAND, AIR, AND SEA TRANSPORT PROVIDERS TO PROVIDE PRIORITY SEATING FOR THE ELDERLY, FURTHER AMENDING FOR THIS PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 7432, AS AMENDED BY REPUBLIC ACT NO. 9257 AND 9994, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE "EXPANDED SENIOR CITIZEN'S ACT OF 2010"

Explanatory Note

"Parang lata ng sardinas" is an expression used by commuters to describe the cramped conditions of public transport. It is an apt comparison. Every day, millions of Filipinos cram themselves on various modes of transportation throughout the day. In Metro Manila alone, 13.3 million trips are done through jeepney or bus, accounting for 66.7 percent of all trips taken. The MRT-3 carries around 560,0000 passengers a day, even though it was built for a maximum of 380,000.

Not all commuters bear the brunt of crowds equally. For instance, senior citizens comprise one sector commuters which suffers more than most. While no data is available on the number of senior citizens who commute, their plight is easily imaginable. One would not have to search too hard for stories of *lolos* and *lolas* who, despite generally being frailer than most, have to face the same cramped conditions as everyone else. For them, a vacant seat is brief but sweet respite.

Batas Pambansa Bilang 344, popularly known as the Accessibility Law, mandates that posters or stickers shall be used on public conveyances to generate public awareness of the rights and needs of persons with disabilities (PWDs). This obviously includes the marking of "priority seats" for them. Unfortunately, a similar provision is not found in the Expanded Senior Citizens Act (R.A. No. 7432), despite having been amended several times.

In fact, the latest iteration of the law (R.A. No. 9994) merely states that "The Department of Transportation and Communications (DOTC) shall develop a program to assist senior citizens to fully gain access to public transport facilities. It is an unfortunate oversight in an otherwise generous and expansive law.


Thus, currently, although there are seats reserved for the elderly in public land transportation vehicles, there are no hard rules mandating the reservation and designation of priority seating for the elderly in air and sea transportation vehicles. This representation has received complaints that in some instances, senior citizens are transferred, on the last minute, to seats that are either far away from their companions and do not take into account their convenience or health status.

This bill, thus, seeks to provide priority seating for the elderly on jeepneys, buses, rail services, and commercial air and sea transport providers. If enacted, this measure will ensure that the seats closest to the entrance doors will be reserved for the elderly. In addition, elderly citizens cannot be forced to transfer seats on commercial air and sea vessels without one (1) week of prior notice.

In view of the foregoing, approval of this measure is eagerly sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

Section 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as the "Priority Seating for 1 2 the Elderly Act of 2019". 3 Sec. 2. Section 5 (f) of Republic Act No. 7432 is hereby further amended to read as follows: 4 "SEC. 5. "ANY RAIL TRANSPORT OPERATOR WHO FAILS TO COMPLY WITH SECTION 5(F) THIS ACT SHALL, UPON CONVICTION, BE IMPRISONED FOR FIVE (5) MONTHS TO TWO (2) YEARS OR PAY A FINE OF THIRTY THOUSAND PESOS (PHP 30,000) TO FIFTY THOUSAND PESOS (PHP 50,000);

ANY COMMERCIAL AIR OR SEA TRANSPORT PROVIDER WHO FAILS TO COMPLY WITH SECTION 5(F) THIS ACT SHALL, UPON CONVICTION, BE IMPRISONED FOR FIVE (5) TO TEN (10) YEARS OR PAY A FINE OF ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND PESOS (PHP 100,000) TO FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND PESOS (PHP 500,000).

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Sec. 4. *Appropriations*. – Such funds necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act shall be included in annual General Appropriations Act.

Sec. 5. *Implementing Rules and Regulations*. – The DOTR, in coordination with the LTFRB, MARINA, CAAP, and three (3) representatives from reputable and concerned civil society organizations, as determined by the DOTR, shall promulgate the implementing rules and regulations of this Act within sixty (60) days from its effectivity.

Sec. 6. *Repealing Clause.* – All laws, decrees, executive orders, proclamations, rules and regulations, and other issuances, or parts thereof which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly.

Sec. 7. *Effectivity.*- This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation.
