## AN ACT

## PROHIBITING THE WITHHOLDING OF MUSLIM CADAVERS IN THE CUSTODY OF ANY HOSPITAL, MEDICAL CLINIC, FUNERAL PARLOR, MORGUE, OR OTHER SIMILAR FACILITIES ON GROUNDS OF NON-PAYMENT OF HOSPITAL BILLS, MEDICAL EXPENSES, OR OTHER FEES, PROVIDING PENALTIES THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE

This bill: (1) seeks to prohibit the withholding of Muslim cadavers in the custody of any hospital, medical clinic, funeral parlor, morgue, or other similar facilities on grounds of nonpayment of hospital bills, medical expenses, or other fees, and (2) mandates their release within 24 hours from death.

In accordance with the dictates of Islam, Muslim burial rites are done as soon as possible after death and within a twenty-four hour period. This practice is rooted in the Muslim belief that the soul of the deceased is disturbed if its previous body is not laid to rest in the ground before the next call to prayer.

This bill, therefore, recognizes the right of our Muslim brothers and sisters to bury their dead in accordance with their religious customs and beliefs.

In view of the foregoing, the immediate passage of this bill is earnestly requested.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. *Declaration of Policy.* — It is hereby declared the policy of the State to recognize and respect the right of our Muslim brothers and sisters to bury their dead in accordance with their religious customs and beliefs, particularly, their practice of burying their dead before the next call to prayer.

SEC. 2. Prohibited Withholding; Immediate Release. — It shall be
unlawful for any hospital, medical clinic, funeral parlor, morgue, or
other similar facilities to withhold or to otherwise cause, directly or
indirectly, the withholding of a Muslim cadaver for reasons of non payment of hospital bills, medical expenses, or other fees.

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Within twenty-four (24) hours from death, the Muslim cadaver shall be released by the hospital, medical clinic, funeral parlor, morgue, or other similar facilities to the relatives for burial purposes upon execution of a promissory note. The promissory note may be secured by either a mortgage or a guarantee of a co- maker, to cover the unpaid

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obligation. A guarantee letter from the Social Security System (SSS), 1 Government Service Insurance System (GSIS), or Philippine Health 2 Insurance Corporation (Philhealth), if the deceased was a member 3 thereof, or from the Department of Social Welfare and Development 4 (DSWD), if the deceased was an indigent, may take the place of the 5 promissory note. The corresponding certificate of death and other 6 documents required for claiming social security benefits or instituting 7 criminal proceedings shall be promptly issued thereafter. 8

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SEC. 3. *Penal Provision.* — Any officer or employee of the hospital, medical clinic, funeral parlor, morgue, or other similar facilities who violates the provisions of this Act shall be punished with a fine of not less than Twenty thousand pesos (Php20,000.00) but not more than Fifty thousand pesos (Php50,000.00), or imprisonment of not less than one (1) month but not more than six (6) months, or both, at the discretion of the proper court.

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18 **SEC. 4.** *Rules and Regulations.* — The Department of Health 19 (DOH) shall promulgate the rules and regulations as may be necessary to 20 carry out the provisions of this Act within ninety (90) days from the 21 approval thereof.

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SEC. 5. Separability Clause. — If any provision of this Act is
declared invalid or unconstitutional, the other provisions not affected by
such declaration shall remain in full force and effect.

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SEC. 6. *Repealing Clause.* — All laws, executive and administrative orders, rules and regulations inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

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SEC. 7. *Effectivity*. — This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days
after its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general
circulation.
