AN ACT CREATING THE PROVINCE OF WESTERN MAGUINDANAO

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The people of Maguindanao have expressed their desire for the creation of a new province since 2006 as they overwhelmingly ratified in a plebiscite the creation of the Province of Shariff Kabunsuan by ARMM through the Muslim Mindanao Act No. 201. The realization of their dream, however, was short-lived when the Supreme Court struck down the power of ARMM Regional Assembly to create province as unconstitutional.

Since then, the clamor of the *Maguindanaons* to create a new province has grown and intensified as manifested by the resolutions of thirteen (13) municipalities. These resolutions are also endorsed by the *Sangguniang Panlalawigan*, and unanimously supported by the Municipal Mayors from the Second District of Maguindanao.

In response to the public clamor, this measure is being filed consistent with the will of the people and reflective of the aspirations of the people of Maguindanao with the end in view of inspiring and hastening greater development and progress in the area.

The new province proposed in this Bill shall be named Province of Western Maguindanao to be composed of thirteen (13) municipalities – Barira, Buldon, Datu Blah Sinsuat, Datu Odin Sinsuat, Kabuntalan, Matanog, Northern Kabuntalan, Parang, Upi (North Upi), Sultan Kudarat, Sultan Mastura, and Talitay (Sultan Sumagka) South Upi.

Considering the foregoing, immediate passage of this Bill is earnestly sought.

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AN ACT CREATING THE PROVINCE OF WESTERN MAGUINDANAO

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

ARTICLE I GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. *Title.* – This Act shall be known as the "Charter of the Province of
 Western Maguindanao."

Sec. 2. Province of Western Maguindanao. - There is hereby created a new 3 province from the present Province of Maguindanao to be known as the Province of 4 Western Maguindanao, consisting of the Municipalities of Barira, Buldon, Datu Blah 5 Sinsuat, Datu Odin Sinsuat, Kabuntalan, Matanog, Northern Kabuntalan, Parang, Upi 6 (North Upi), Sultan Kudarat, Sultan Mastura, Talitay (Sultan Sumagka), and South Upi. 7 The territorial jurisdiction of the Province of Western Maguindanao shall be within the 8 present metes and bounds of all the municipalities that comprise the Western 9 Maguindanao. 10

11 The foregoing provision shall be without prejudice to the resolution by the 12 appropriate agency or forum of existing boundary disputes or cases involving 13 questions of territorial jurisdiction between the Western Maguindanao and adjoining 14 local government units (LGUs): *Provided*, That the territorial jurisdiction of the 15 disputed area or areas shall remain with the LGU, which has existing administrative 16 supervision over said area or areas until final resolution of the case.

Sec. 3. *Capital Town and Seat of Government.* – The capital town and seat of
 government of the Western Maguindanao shall be the Municipality of Datu Odin
 Sinsuat.

Sec. 4. *Corporate Powers of the Province.* – The province constitutes a political body corporate and as such is endowed with the attributes of perpetual succession and possessed of the powers which pertain to a provincial corporation to be exercised in conformity with the provision of this Charter and the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended. The province shall have the following corporate powers:

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a) To have a continuous succession in its corporate name;

- 10 b) To sue and be sued;
- 11 c) To have and use a corporate seal;
- d) To acquire, hold and convey real or personal property;
- 13 e) To enter into contracts and/or agreements; and
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f) To exercise such other powers, prerogatives or authority subject to the limitations provided in this Act or other laws.

Sec. 5. General Powers. - The province shall have a common seal and may 16 alter the same at its pleasure: *Provided*, That any change of corporate seal shall be 17 18 registered with the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG). It shall have the power to create its sources of revenue and to levy taxes, fees and charges; 19 to close and open roads, streets, alleys, parks or squares; to take, purchase, receive, 20 hold, lease, convey and dispose of real and personal property for the general interests 21 of the province; to expropriate or condemn private property for public use; to contract 22 23 and to be contracted with; to sue and be sued; to prosecute and defend by final 24 judgment and execution suits wherein the province is involved or interested in and to exercise all the powers as are granted to corporations or as hereinafter granted, 25 subject to the provisions of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended. 26

27 Sec. 6. *Liability for Damages.* — The province and its officials shall not be 28 exempt from liability for death or injury to persons or damage to property.

29 Sec. 7. *Legislative District.* —The Province of Western Maguindanao shall have 30 its own legislative district to commence in the next national and local elections after 31 the effectivity of this Charter. Henceforth, the Municipalities of Barira, Buldon, Datu

Blah Sinsuat, Datu Odin Sinsuat, Kabuntulan, Matanog, Northern Kabuntulan, Parang, 1 Upi (North Upi), Sultan Kudarat, Sultan Mastura, Talitay (Sultan Sumagka), and South 2 3 Upi including Cotabato City shall comprise the lone Legislative District of the Province 4 of Western Maguindanao and Cotabato City while the Municipalities of Ampatuan, Buluan, Datu Abdullah Sangki, Datu Anggal Midtimbang, Datu Hofer Ampatuan, Datu 5 Montawal, Datu Paglas, Datu Piang, Datu Saibo Datu Saudi Ampatuan, Datu Unsay, 6 GYen. S.K. Pendatun, Guindulungan, Mamasapano, Mangundadatu, Pagalungan, 7 8 Paglat, Pandag, Rajah Buayan, Shariff Aguak, Shariff Saydona Mustapha, Sultan Sa Barongis and Talayan, shall comprise the Lone Legislative District of the Province of 9 Maguindanao. 10

11 The incumbent Representatives of the present Province of Maguindanao shall 12 continue to represent their respective legislative districts until the expiration of their 13 term of office.

ARTICLE II PROVINCIAL OFFICIALS IN GENERAL

17 Sec. 8. Officials of the Provincial Government. —

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- a.) There shall be in the Province of Western Maguindanao: a provincial 18 governor, a provincial vice governor, the regular members of the 19 sangguniang panlalawigan, a secretary to the sangguniang panlalawigan, a 20 provincial treasurer, a provincial assessor, a provincial accountant, a 21 provincial budget officer, a provincial planning and development 22 coordinator, a provincial engineer, a provincial health officer, a provincial 23 24 administrator, a provincial legal officer, a provincial agriculturist, a provincial 25 social welfare and development officer, a provincial environment and natural resources officer, a provincial veterinarian, and a provincial general 26 services officer. 27
- b.) In addition thereto, the provincial governor may appoint a provincial
 architect, a provincial population officer, a provincial cooperatives officer
 and a provincial information officer.
- 31 c.) The *sangguniang panlalawigan* may:

- Maintain existing offices mentioned in subsections (a) and (b) hereof;
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Create such other offices as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of the provincial government; or

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3.) Consolidate the functions of any office with those of another in the interest of efficiency, economy, and public welfare.

6 Unless otherwise provided herein or in the 1991 Local Government Code, as 7 amended, the heads of departments and offices shall be appointed by the provincial 8 governor with the concurrence of a majority of all the *sangguniang panlalawigan* 9 members, subject to civil service law, rules and regulations. The *sangguniang* 10 *panlalawigan* shall act on the appointment within fifteen (15) days from the day of its 11 submission; otherwise, the same shall be deemed confirmed.

Sec. 9. *Residence and Office.* — During the incumbency of the provincial governor, he or she shall have his or her official residence and office in the capital of the province. All elective and appointive provincial officials shall hold office in the provincial capital: *Provided,* That, upon the resolution of the *sangguniang panlalawigan,* elective and appointive provincial officials may hold office in any component city or municipality within the province for a period of not more than seven (7) days for any given month.

19 Elective and appointive provincial officials shall receive such compensation, 20 allowances and other emoluments as may be determined by law or ordinance, subject 21 to the budgetary limitations on personal services prescribed under Title V, Book II of 22 the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended: *Provided,* That, no increase in 23 compensation shall take effect until after the expiration of the full term of all the 24 elective officials approving such increase.

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Sec. 10. The Provincial Governor. --

- a.) The provincial governor, as the chief executive of the provincial
 government, shall exercise such powers and perform such duties and
 functions as provided for in the Local Government Code of 1991, as
 amended, and other laws.
- b.) For efficient, effective and economical governance, the purpose of which is
 the general welfare of the province and its inhabitants pursuant to Section

1 16 of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended, the provincial 2 governor shall: 1.) Exercise general supervision and control over all programs, projects, 3 services and activities of the provincial government and, in this 4 connection, shall: 5 Determine the guidelines of provincial policies and be responsible 6 (i) to the sangguniang panlalawigan for the program of the 7 government; 8 Direct the formulation of the provincial development plan, with 9 (ii) the assistance of the provincial development council and upon 10 approval thereof by the sangguniang panlalawigan, implement 11 the same; 12 13 (iii) Present the program of government and propose policies and projects for the consideration of the sangguniang panlalawigan at 14 the opening of the regular session of the sangguniang 15 16 panlalawigan every calendar year and as often as may be deemed necessary as the general welfare of the inhabitants and the needs 17 of the provincial government may require; 18 19 (iv)Initiate and propose legislative measures to the *sangguniang* 20 *panlalawigan* and as often as may be deemed necessary, provide 21 such information and data needed or requested by said 22 sangguniang panlalawigan in the performance of its legislative 23 functions; 24 (v) Appoint all officials and employees whose salaries and wages are 25 wholly or mainly paid out of provincial funds and whose appointments are not otherwise provided for in this Act as well as 26 27 those he or she may be authorized by law to appoint; (vi)Represent the province in all its business transactions and sign in 28 29 its behalf all bonds, contracts and obligations, and such other 30 documents upon the authority of the sangguniang panlalawigan 31 or pursuant to law or ordinance;

(vii) Carry out such emergency measures as may be necessary during 1 and in the aftermath of man-made and natural disasters and 2 3 calamities; (viii) Determine the time, manner and place of payment of salaries or 4 5 wages of the provincial officials and employees, in accordance with law or ordinance: 6 Allocate and assign office space to the provincial and other 7 (ix)officials and employees who, by law or ordinance, are entitled to 8 9 such space in the provincial capitol and other buildings owned or leased by the provincial government; 10 Ensure that all executive officials and employees of the province (x)11 12 faithfully discharge their duties and functions as provided for by law and the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended, and 13 cause to be instituted administrative or judicial proceedings 14 15 against any official or employee of the province who may have committed an offense in the performance of his or her official 16 duties; 17 (xi)Examine the books, records and other documents of all offices, 18 officials, agents or employees of the province and, in aid of his or 19 20 her executive powers and authority, require all national officials 21 and employees stationed in the province to make available to him 22 or her such books, records and other documents in their custody, except those classified by law as confidential; 23 24 (xii) Furnish copies of executive orders issued by him or her to the 25 Office of the President within seventy-two (72) hours after their 26 issuance; 27 (xiii) Visit component cities and municipalities of the province at least 28 once every six (6) months to deepen his or her understanding of 29 problems and conditions, listen and give appropriate counsel to 30 local officials and inhabitants, inform the officials and inhabitants 31 of component cities and municipalities of general laws and

1ordinances which especially concern them, and otherwise conduct2visits and inspections to ensure that the governance of the3province will improve quality of life of the inhabitants;

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- (xiv) Act on leave applications of officials and employees appointed by him or her and the commutation of the monetary value of their leave credits in accordance with law;
- 7 (xv) Authorize official trips of provincial officials and employees
 8 outside of the province for a period not exceeding thirty (30)
 9 days;
- 10 (xvi) Call upon any national official and employee stationed in or 11 assigned to the province to advise him or her on matters affecting 12 the province and to make recommendations thereon; coordinate 13 with the said official or employee in the formulation and 14 implementation of plans, programs and projects; and, when 15 appropriate, initiate an administrative or judicial action against a 16 national government official or employee who may have 17 committed an offense in the performance of his or her duties 18 while stationed in or assigned to the province;
- 19(xvii) Authorize payment for medical care, necessary transportation,20subsistence, hospital or medical fees of provincial officials and21employees who are injured while in the performance of their22official duties and functions, subject to the availability of funds;
- (xviii) Represent the province in inter-provincial or regional sports
 councils or committees, and coordinate the efforts of component
 cities or municipalities in the regional or national *palaro* or sports
 development activities;
- 27(xix)Conduct an annual palarong panlalawigan, which shall feature28traditional sports and disciplines included in national and29international games in coordination with the Department of30Education (DepEd); and

- Submit to the Office of the President the following reports: an 1 (XX)annual report containing a summary of all matters pertinent to 2 the management, administration and development of the 3 province and all information and data relative to its political, social 4 and economic conditions; and supplemental reports when 5 unexpected events and situations arise at any time during the 6 year, particularly when man-made or natural disasters or 7 calamities affect the general welfare of the province, the region 8 9 or the country in general;
- 10 (2) Enforce all laws and ordinances relative to the governance of the 11 province and the exercise of the appropriate corporate powers 12 provided for in Section 22 of the Local Government Code of 1991, as 13 amended; implement all approved policies, programs, projects, 14 services and activities of the province; and, in addition to the 15 foregoing; shall:

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- Ensure that the acts of the component cities and municipalities of the province and of its officials and employees are within the scope of their prescribed powers, duties and functions;
 - (ii) Call conventions, conferences, seminars or meetings of any elective and appointive officials of the province and its component cities and municipalities, including national officials and employees stationed in or assigned to the province, at such time and place and on such subject as he or she may deem important for the promotion of the general welfare of the province and its inhabitants;
 - (iii) Issue such executive order for the faithful and appropriate enforcement and execution of laws and ordinances;
 - Be entitled to carry the necessary firearm within his or her territorial jurisdiction;

1(v)In coordination with the mayors of component cities and2municipalities and the National Police Commission,3formulate the peace and order plan of the province and4upon its approval, implement the same in accordance with5Republic Act No. 6975; and

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- (vi) Call upon the appropriate national law enforcement agencies to suppress disorder, riot, lawless violence, rebellion or sedition or to apprehend violators of the law when public interest so requires and the police forces of the component city or municipality where the disorder or violation is happening are inadequate to cope with the situation or the violators;
- (3) Initiate and maximize the generation of resources and revenues, and 13 apply the same to the implementation of development plans, 14 program objectives and priorities as provided for under Section 18 of 15 16 the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended, particularly those programmed for 17 resources and revenues agro-industrial development and countrywide growth and progress and, relative 18 19 thereto, shall;
 - Require each head of an office or department to prepare and submit an estimate of appropriations for the ensuing calendar year, in accordance with the budget preparation process under Tittle V, Book II of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended;
 - Prepare and submit to the sangguniang panlalawigan for approval the executive and supplemental budgets of the province for the ensuing calendar year in the manner provided for under Title V, Book II of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended;
- 30(iii)Ensure that all taxes and other revenues of the province31are collected, and that provincial funds are applied to the

8	Sec. 11. The Provincial Vice Governor -
9	(a) The provincial vice governor shall:
10	(1) Be the presiding officer of the sangguniang panlalawigan and sign
11	all warrants drawn on the provincial treasury for all expenditures
12	appropriated for the operation of the sangguniang panlalawigan;
13	(2) Subject to civil service law, rules and regulations, appoint all officials
14	and employees of the sangguniang panlalawigan, except those
15	whose manner of appointment is specially provided for under existing
16	laws;
17	(3) Assume the office of the provincial governor for the unexpired term
18	of the latter in the event of permanent vacancy as provided for in
19	Section 44, Book I of the Local Government Code of 1991, as
20	amended;
21	(4) Exercise the powers and perform the duties and functions of the
22	provincial governor in case of temporary vacancy as provided for in
23	Section 46, Book I of the Local Government Code of 1991, as
24	amended; and
25	(5) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and
26	functions as may be prescribed by law or ordinance.
27	(b) The provincial vice governor shall receive a monthly compensation
28	corresponding to Salary Grade Twenty-eight (28) as prescribed under Republic
29	Act No. 6758, as amended, and the implementing guidelines issued pursuant
30	thereto.
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1	ARTICLE IV
2	THE SANGGUNIANG PANLALAWIGAN
3	Sec. 12. Composition. –
4	(a) The sangguniang panlalawigan, the legislative body of the province, shall be
5	composed of the provincial vice governor as the presiding officer, the regular
6	sangguaning panlalawigan members, the president of the provincial chapter of
7	the liga ng mga barangay, the president of the panlalawigang pederasyon ng
8	mga sangguniang kabataan, the president of the provincial federation of
9	sanggunian members of municipalities and component cities and the three (3)
10	sectoral representatives, as members, who shall come from the following
11	sectors: one (1) from indigenous people and, as shall be determined by the
12	sangguniang panlalawigan within ninety (90) days prior to the holding of the
13	local elections, one (1) from the agricultural or industrial workers sector; and
14	one (1) from the other sectors, including but limited to the urban poor,
15	Overseas Filipino Workers Sector, women sector, senior citizen, or persons with
16	disability.
17	(b) The regular members of the sangguniang panlalawigan and the sectoral
18	representatives shall be elected in the manner as provided for by law, and shall
19	receive a monthly compensation corresponding to Salary Grade Twenty-seven
20	(27) as prescribed under Republic Act No. 6758, as amended, and the
21	implementing guidelines issued pursuant thereto.
22	Sec. 13. Powers, Duties, Functions and Compensation. –
23	(a) The sangguniang panlalawigan, as the legislative body of the province, shall
24	enact ordinances, approve resolutions and appropriate funds for the general
25	welfare of the province and its inhabitants pursuant to Section 16 of the Local
26	Government Code of 1991, as amended, and in the proper exercise of the
27	corporate powers of the province as provided for under Section 22 of the Local
28	Government Code of 1991, as amended, and shall:
29	(1) Approve all ordinances and pass resolutions necessary for an efficient
30	and effective provincial government and, in this connection, shall:

1(i)Review all ordinances approved by the sanggunians of2component cities and municipalities and executive orders3issued by the mayors of said component units to determine4whether these are within the scope of the prescribed powers5of the sanggunian and of the mayor;

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- Maintain peace and order by enacting measures to prevent and suppress lawlessness, disorder, riot, violence, rebellion or sedition and impose penalties for the violation of said ordinances;
- 10(iii)Approve ordinances imposing a fine not exceeding Five11thousand pesos (P5, 000.00) or an imprisonment not exceeding12one (1) year, or both, in the discretion of the court, for the13violation of a provincial ordinance;
- 14(iv)Adopt measures to protect the inhabitants of the province from15the harmful effects of man-made or natural disasters and16calamities, and to provide relief services and assistance for17victims during and in the aftermath of said disasters and18calamities and their return to productive livelihood following19said events;
- Enact ordinances intended to prevent, suppress and impose 20 (v) appropriate penalties for habitual drunkenness in public places, 21 vagrancy, mendicancy, prostitution, the establishment and 22 maintenance of houses of ill repute, gambling and other 23 prohibited games of chance, fraudulent devices and ways to 24 obtain money or property, drug addiction, maintenance of drug 25 dens, drug pushing, juvenile delinquency, the printing, 26 27 distribution or exhibition of obscene or pornographic materials or publication, and such other activities inimical to the welfare 28 and morals of the inhabitants of the province; 29
- 30(vi)Protect the environment and impose appropriate penalties for31acts which endanger the environment, such as dynamite

1fishing and other forms of destructive fishing, illegal logging2and smuggling of logs, smuggling of natural resources products3and of endangered species of flora and fauna, slash-and-burn4farming and such other activities which result in pollution,5acceleration of eutrophication of rivers and lakes, or of6ecological imbalance;

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- (vii) Subject to the provisions of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended, and to other pertinent laws, determine the powers and duties of officials and employees of the province;
- 10(viii)Determine the positions and salaries, wages, allowances and11other emoluments and benefits of officials and employees paid12wholly or mainly from provincial funds and provide for13expenditures necessary for the proper conduct of programs,14projects, services and activities of the provincial government;
- 15(ix)Authorize the payment of compensation to a qualified person16not in the government service who fills in a temporary vacancy17or grant honorarium to any qualified official or employee18designated to fill a temporary vacancy in a current capacity at19the rate authorized by law;
- Provide mechanism and the appropriate funds therefore to (X) 20 ensure the safety and protection of all provincial government 21 property, public documents or records such as those relating 22 to property inventory, land ownership, records of births, 23 marriages, deaths, assessments, taxation, accounts, business 24 permits and such other records and documents of public 25 interest in the offices and departments of the provincial 26 27 government; and
 - (xi) When the finances of the provincial government allow, provide for additional allowances and other benefits to judges, prosecutors, public elementary and high school teachers, and

other national government officials stationed or assigned to the province;

3 (2) Generate and maximize the use of resources and revenues for the 4 development plans, program objectives and priorities of the province 5 as provided for under Section 18 of the Local Government Code of 6 1991, as amended, with particular attention to agro-industrial 7 development and countrywide growth and progress and, relative 8 thereto, shall:

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- 9 (i) Enact the annual and supplemental appropriations of the 10 provincial government and appropriate funds for specific 11 programs, projects, services and activities of the province, 12 or for other purposes not contrary to law, in order to 13 promote the general welfare of the province and its 14 inhabitants;
 - (ii) Subject to the provisions of Book II of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended and applicable laws and, upon the majority vote of all the members of the *sangguniang panlalawigan*, enact ordinances levying taxes, fees and charges, prescribing the rates, thereof for general and specific purposes and granting tax exemptions, incentives or reliefs;
 - (iii) Subject to the provisions of Book II of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended and applicable laws and, upon the majority vote of all the members of the *sangguniang panlalawigan*, authorize the provincial governor to negotiate and contract loans and other forms of indebtedness;
- 28(iv)Subject to the provisions of Book II of the Local29Government Code of 1991, as amended and applicable laws30and, upon the majority vote of all the members of the31sangguniang panlalawigan, enact ordinances authorizing

1		the floating of bonds or other instruments of indebtedness,
2		for the purpose of raising funds to finance development
3		projects;
4	(v)	Appropriate funds for the construction and maintenance or
5		the rental of buildings for the use of the province and, upon
6		the majority vote of all the members of the sangguniang
7		panlalawigan, authorize the provincial governor to lease to
8		private parties such public buildings held in a proprietary
9		capacity, subject to existing laws, rules and regulation.
10	(vi)	Prescribe reasonable limits and restraints on the use of

23	general v	velfare of the inhabitants of the province and, pursuant to
24	the legisl	ative authority, shall:
25	(i)	Fix and impose reasonable fees and charges for all services
26		rendered by the provincial government to private persons
27		or entities; and
28	(ii)	Regulate and fix the license fees for such activities as
29		provided for under the Local Government Code of 1991, as
30		amended;

(4) Approve ordinances which shall ensure the efficient and effective 1 delivery of the basic services and facilities as provided in Section 17 2 of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended, and in addition 3 to said services and facilities, shall: 4

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- Adopt measures and safeguards against pollution and for (i) the preservation of the natural ecosystem in the province, inconsonance with approved standards on human 7 settlements and environmental sanitation; 8
 - (ii) Subject to applicable laws, facilitate or provide for the establishment and maintenance of a waterworks system or district waterworks for supplying water to inhabitants of component cities and municipalities;
- (iii) Subject to the availability of funds and to existing laws, 13 rules and regulations, provide for the establishment and 14 operation of vocational and technical schools and similar 15 post-secondary institutions and, with the approval of the 16 DepEd and subject to existing laws on tuition fees, fix 17 reasonable tuition fees and other school charges in 18 educational institutions supported by the provincial 19 20 government;
- Establish a scholarship fund for the poor but deserving 21 (iv)students in schools located within its jurisdiction or of 22 students residing within the province; 23
 - Approve measures and adopt guarantine regulations to (v) prevent the introduction and spread of diseases within its territorial jurisdiction;
- 27 (vi)Provide for the care of paupers, the aged, the sick, persons or unsound mind, abandoned minors, abused children, 28 29 disabled persons, juvenile delinguents], drug dependents, 30 and other needed and disadvantaged persons, particularly 31 children and youth below eighteen (18) years of age;

subject to the availability of funds, establish and support the operation centers and facilities for said needy and disadvantaged persons; and facilitate the efforts to promote the welfare of families below the poverty threshold, the disadvantaged and the exploited;

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- 6 (vii) Establish and provide for the maintenance and 7 improvement of jails and detention centers, institute a 8 sound jail management program and appropriate funds for 9 the subsistence of detainees and convicted prisoners in the 10 province;
- Establish a provincial council whose purpose is the 11 (viii) promotion of culture and the arts, coordinate with 12 government agencies and non-governmental 13 organizations and, subject to the availability of funds, 14 appropriate funds for the support and development of the 15 16 same; and
 - (ix) Establish a provincial council for the elderly which shall formulate policies and adopt measures mutually beneficial to the elderly and to the province; subject to the availability of funds, appropriate funds to support programs and projects for the elderly; and provide incentives for non-governmental agencies and entities to support the programs and projects for the elderly; and

(5) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and functions as provided for under the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended, and as may be prescribed by law or ordinance.

ARTICLE V

PROCESS OF LEGISLATION

30 Sec. 14. Internal Rules of Procedure. –

- (a) On the first regular session following the election of its members and within
 ninety (90) days thereafter, the *sangguniang panlalawigan* shall adopt or
 update its existing rules of procedure.
 - (b) The rules of procedure shall provide for the following:
- 5 (1) The organization of the *sanggunian* and the election of its officers as well 6 as the creation of standing committees which shall include, but shall not be 7 limited to, the committees on appropriations, women and family, human 8 rights, youth and sports development, environment protection, peace and 9 order and traffic, and cooperatives; the general jurisdiction of each 10 committee; and the election of the chairman and members of each 11 committee;
- (2) The order and calendar of business for each session;
- (3) The legislative process;

- (4) The parliamentary procedures which include the conduct of members during
 sessions;
- 16 (5) The discipline of members for disorderly behavior and absences without justifiable cause for four (4) consecutive sessions for which they may be 17 censured, reprimanded or excluded from the session, suspended for not 18 more than sixty (60) days, or expelled: Provided, That the penalty of 19 suspension or expulsion shall require the concurrence of at least two-thirds 20 21 (2/3) of all the sanggunian members: Provided, further, That a member 22 convicted by final judgment to imprisonment of at least one (1) year for any 23 crime involving moral turpitude shall be automatically expelled from the sanggunian; and 24
- 25 (6) Such other rules as the *sanggunian* may adopt.
- 26 Sec. 15. Full Disclosure of Financial and Business Interests of Sangguniang 27 Panlalawigan Members. –
- (a) Every *sangguniang panlalawigan* member shall, upon assumption to office,
 make a full disclosure of his or her business and financial interests. He or she
 shall also disclose any business financial, professional relationship or any
 relation by affinity or consanguinity within the fourth civil degree, which he or

she may have with any person, firm or entity affected by any ordinance or resolution under consideration by the *sanggunian* of which he or she is a member, which relationship may result in conflict of interest. Such relationship shall include:

- (1) Ownership of stocks or capital, or investment in the entity or firm to which
 the ordinance or resolution may apply; and
- 7 (2) Contracts or agreement with any person or entity which the ordinance or
 8 resolution under consideration may affect.
- 9 In the absence of a specific constitutional or statutory provisions applicable 10 to this situation, "conflict of interest" refers in general to one where it may 11 be reasonably deducted that a member of a *sangguniang panlalawigan* may 12 not act in the public interest due to some private, pecuniary or other 13 personal considerations that may tend to affect his or her judgment to the 14 prejudice of the service or the public.
- (b) The disclosure required under this Act shall be made in writing and submitted
 to the secretary of the *sanggunian* or the secretary of the committee of which
 he or she is a member. The disclosure shall, in all cases, form part of the record
 of the proceedings and shall be made in the following manner:
- (1) Disclosure shall be made before the member participates in the
 deliberations on the ordinance or resolution under consideration: *Provided*,
 That if the member did not participate during the deliberations, the
 disclosure shall be made before voting on the ordinance or resolution on
 second and third readings; and
- (2) Disclosure shall be made when a member takes a position or makes a
 privilege speech on a matter that may affect the business interest, financial
 connection or professional relationship described herein.
- 27 Sec. 16. Sessions. –
- (a) On the first day of session immediately following the election of its members,
 the *sangguniang panlalawigan* shall, by resolution, fix the day, time and place
 of its regular sessions. The minimum number of regular sessions of the
 sangguniang panlalwigan shall be once a week.

- (b) When the public interest so demands, special sessions may be called by the
 provincial governor or by a majority of the members of the *sanggunian*.
- (c) All *sanggunian* sessions shall be open to the public unless a closed-door session
 is ordered by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members present, there
 being a quorum, in the public interest or for reasons of security, decency or
 morality. No two (2) sessions, regular or special, may be held in a single day.
- (d) In the case of special sessions of the *sanggunian*, a written notice to the
 members shall be served personally at the members' usual place of residence
 at least twenty-four (24) hours before the special session is held.
- 10 Unless otherwise concurred in by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the *sanggunian* 11 members present, there being a quorum, no other matters may be considered 12 at a special session except those stated in the notice.
- (e) The *sanggunian* shall keep a journal and a record of its proceedings which may
 be published upon resolution of the *sangguniang panlalawigan*.
- 15 Sec. 17. *Quorum.* –
- (a) A majority of all the members of the *sanggunian* who have been elected and
 qualified shall constitute a quorum to transact official business. Should a
 question of quorum be raised during the session, the presiding officer shall
 immediately proceed to call the roll of the members and thereafter announce
 the results.
- (b) Where there is no quorum, the presiding officer may declare a recess until
 such time a quorum is constituted, or a majority of the members present may
 adjourn from day to day and may compel the immediate attendance of any
 member absent without justifiable cause by designating a member of the *sanggunian*, to be assisted by a member or members of the police force
 assigned in the territorial jurisdiction of the province, to arrest the absent
 member and present him or her at the session,
- (c) If there is still no quorum despite the enforcement of the immediately preceding
 subsection, no business shall be transacted. The presiding officer, upon proper
 motion duly approved by the members present, shall then declare the session
 adjourned for lack of quorum.

1 Sec. 18. Approval of Ordinances. –

- (a) Every ordinance enacted by the sangguniang panlalawigan shall be presented 2 to the provincial governor. If the provincial governor approves the same, he 3 or she shall affix his or her signature on each and every page thereof; 4 otherwise, he or she shall veto it and return the same with his or her objections 5 to the *sangguniang*, which may proceed to reconsider the same. The 6 7 sanggunian may override the veto of the provincial governor by two-thirds (2/3) 8 vote of all its members, thereby making the ordinance or resolution effective 9 for all legal intents and purposes.
- (b) The veto shall be communicated by the provincial governor to the *sangguniang panlalawigan* within fifteen (15) days; otherwise, the ordinance shall be
 deemed approved as if he or she had signed it.
- 13

14

Sec. 19. Veto Power of the Provincial Governor. -

- (a) The provincial governor may veto any ordinance of the *sangguniang panlalawigan* on the ground that it is prejudicial to the public welfare, stating
 his or her reasons thereof in writing.
- 18 (b) The provincial governor shall have the power to veto any particular item or items of an appropriation ordinance, an ordinance or resolution adopting a local 19 development plan and public investment program or an ordinance directing the 20 payment of money or creating liability. In such case, the veto shall not affect 21 22 the item or items which are not objected to. The vetoed item or items shall not take effect unless the *sangguniang panlalawigan* overrides the veto in the 23 manner herein provided; otherwise, the item or items in the appropriation 24 ordinance of the previous year corresponding to those vetoed, if any, shall be 25 deemed reenacted. 26
- (c) The provincial governor may veto an ordinance or resolution only once. The
 sanggunian may override the veto of the provincial governor by two-thirds (2/3)
 vote of all its members, thereby making the ordinance effective even without
 the approval of the provincial governor.

1	ARTICLE VI
2	SUCCESSION FOR ELECTIVE PROVINCIAL OFFICIALS
3	Sec. 20. Permanent Vacancy in the Office of the Provincial Governor. – If a
4	permanent vacancy occurs in the office of the provincial governor, the provincial vice
5	governor shall become the provincial governor. If a permanent vacancy occurs in the
6	office of the provincial vice governor, the highest ranking sangguniang panlalawigan
7	member shall become the provincial vice governor. Subsequent vacancies shall be
8	filed automatically by other sanggunian members according to their ranking as defined
9	herein:
10	(1) A tie between or among the highest ranking sangguniang panlalawigan
11	members shall be resolved by drawing of lots;
12	(2) The successors as defined herein shall serve only the unexpired terms of
13	the predecessors;
14	(3) For purposes of this Act, a permanent vacancy arises when an elective
15	official fills a higher vacant office, refuses to assume office, fails to qualify,
16	dies is removed from office, voluntarily resigns or is otherwise permanently
17	incapacitated to discharge the functions of his or her office; and
18	(4) For purposes of succession as provided for in this Act, ranking in the
19	sangguniang panlalawigan shall be determined on the basis of the
20	proportion of votes obtained by each winning candidate to the total number
21	of registered voters in the province in the immediately preceding local
22	elections.
23	Sec. 21. Permanent Vacancies in the Sangguniang Panlalawigan. –
24	(a) Permanent vacancies in the sangguniang panlalawigan where automatic
25	succession as provided does not apply shall be filled by appointment by the
26	President through the Executive Secretary.
27	(b) Only the nominee of the political party under which the sanggunian member
28	concerned had been elected and whose elevation to the position next higher in
29	rank created the last vacancy in the sanggunian shall be appointed in the
30	manner herein provided. The appointee shall come from the same political

party as that of the *sanggunian* member who caused the vacancy and shall
 serve the unexpired term of the vacant office.

- In the appointment herein mentioned, a nomination and a certificate of membership of the appointee from the highest official of the political party concerned are conditions *sine qua non,* and any appointment without such nomination and certification shall be null and void *ab initio* and shall be ground for administrative action against the official responsible therefor.
- 8 (c) In case the permanent vacancy is caused by a *sanggunian* member who does 9 not belong to any political party, the provincial governor shall, upon 10 recommendation of the *sangguniang panlalawigan,* appoint a qualified person 11 to fill in the vacancy.
- (d) In case of vacancy in the representation of the *sangguniang kabataan,* the
 sangguniang barangay and the provincial league of councilors in the
 sangguniang panlalawigan, said vacancy shall be filled in automatically by the
 official next-in-rank of the organization concerned.
- 16 Sec. 22. Temporary Vacancy in the Office of the Provincial Governor. –
- (a) When the provincial governor is temporarily incapacitated to perform his or her
 duties for physical or legal reasons such as, but not limited to, leave of absence,
 travel abroad and suspension from office, the provincial vice governor shall
 automatically exercise the powers and perform the duties and functions of the
 provincial governor, except the power to appoint, suspend or dismiss
 employees which can only be exercised if the period of temporary incapacity
 exceeds thirty (30) working days.
- (b) Said temporary incapacity shall terminate upon submission to the *sangguniang panlalawigan* of a written declaration by the provincial governor that he or she
 has reported back to office. In case where the temporary incapacity is due to
 legal cause, the provincial governor shall also submit necessary documents
 showing that the said legal cause no longer exists.
- (c) When the provincial governor is travelling within the country but outside his or
 her territorial jurisdiction for a period not exceeding three (3) consecutive days,
 he or she may designate in writing the officer-in-charge of his or her office.

1	Such authorization shall specify the powers and functions that the local official
2	concerned shall exercise in the absence of the provincial governor, except the
3	power to appoint, suspend or dismiss employees.
4	(d) In the event, however, that the provincial governor fails or refuses to issue
5	such authorization, the provincial vice governor shall have the right to assume
6	the powers, duties and functions of the said office on the fourth (4^{th}) day of
7	absence of the provincial governor, subject to the limitations provided for in
8	subsection (c) hereof.
9	(e) Except as provided above, the provincial governor shall, in no case, authorize
10	any local official to assume the powers, duties and functions of the office other
11	than the provincial vice governor.
12	
13	ARTICLE VII
14	APPOINTIVE PROVINCIAL OFFICIALS:
15	THEIR QUALIFICATIONS, POWERS, AND DUTIES
16	
17	Sec. 23. The Secretary to the Sangguniang Panlalawigan. –
18	(a) There shall be a secretary to the sangguniang panlalawigan who shall be a
19	career official with the rank and salary equal to a head of a department or
20	office.
21	(b) No person shall be appointed secretary to the sanggunian unless he or she is a
22	citizen of the Philippines, a resident of the province, of good moral character,
23	a holder of a college degree preferably in law, commerce or public
24	administration from a recognized college or university, and a first grade civil
25	service eligible or its equivalent.
26	(c) The secretary to the sanggunian shall take charge of the office of the
27	sangguniang panlalawigan, and shall:
28	(1) Attend meetings of the <i>sanggunian</i> and keep a journal or its proceedings;
29	(2) Keep the seal of the LGU and affix the same with his or her signature to all
30	ordinances, resolutions and other official acts of the sanggunian and present
31	the same to the presiding officer for his or her signature;

- (3) Forward to the provincial governor, for approval, copies of ordinances
 enacted by the *sanggunian* and duly certified by the presiding officer, in the
 manner provided for in Section 54 of the Local Government Code of 1991,
 as amended;
- (4) Forward to the *sangguniang bayan* or *sangguniang panlungsod,* as the case
 may be, copies of duly approved ordinances in the manner provided for in
 Sections 56 and 57 of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended;
- (5) Furnish, upon the request of any interested party, certified copies of records
 of public character in his or her custody, upon payment to the treasurer of
 such fees as may be prescribed by ordinance;
- (6) Record in a book kept for the purpose, all ordinances and resolutions
 enacted or adopted by the *sanggunian*, with the dates of passage and
 publication thereof;
- (7) Keep his or her office and all non-confidential records therein open to thepublic during usual business hours;
- (8) Translate into the dialect used by the majority of the inhabitants, all
 ordinances and resolutions immediately after their approval, and cause the
 publication of the same together with the original version in the manner
 provided for under the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended; and
- 20 (9) Take custody of the local archives and, where applicable, the local library
 21 and annually account for the same.
- (d) Exercise such powers and perform such other duties and functions as may be
 prescribed by law or ordinance relative to his or her position.
- 24 Sec. 24. The Provincial Treasurer. –
- (a) The provincial treasurer shall be appointed by the Secretary of Finance from a
 list of at least three (3) ranking eligible recommendees of the provincial
 governor, subject to civil service law, rules and regulations.
- (b) The provincial treasurer shall be under the administrative supervision of the
 provincial governor, to whom he or she shall report regularly on the tax
 collection efforts in the LGU.

(c) No person shall be appointed provincial treasurer unless he or she is a citizen
 of the Philippines, a resident of the province of good moral character, a holder
 of a college degree preferably in commerce, public administration or law from
 a recognized college or university, and a first grade civil service eligible or its
 equivalent. He or she must have acquired experience in treasury or accounting
 service for at least five (5) years.

The appointment of the provincial treasurer shall be mandatory.

- 8 (d) He or she shall take charge of the treasury office, and perform the duties as
 9 provided for under Book II of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended,
 10 and shall:
- (1) Advise the provincial governor or the *sanggunian,* as the case may be, and
 other local government and national officials concerned regarding
 disposition of local government funds and on such other matters relative to
 public finance;
- (2) Take custody of and exercise proper management of the funds of the LGU
 concerned;
- (3) Take charge of the disbursement of all local government funds and such
 other funds, the custody of which may be entrusted to him or her by law or
 other competent authority;
- (4) Inspect private commercial and industrial establishments within the
 jurisdiction of the province in relation to the implementation of tax
 ordinances, pursuant to the provisions under Book II of the Local
 Government Code of 1991, as amended;
- 24 (5) Maintain and update the tax information system of the LGU; and
- 25 (6) Exercise technical supervision over all treasury offices of component cities
 26 and municipalities.
- (e) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and functions as
 may be prescribed by law or ordinances.
- 29 Sec. 25. The Provincial Assessor. –
- (a) The provincial assessor shall be appointed provincial assessor unless he or she
 is a citizen of the Philippines, a resident of the province, of good moral

character, a holder of a college degree preferably in civil or mechanical engineering, commerce or any other related course from a recognized college or university, and a first grade civil service eligible or its equivalent. He or she must have acquired experience in real property assessment work or in any related field for at least five (5) years.

- 6 The appointment of the provincial assessor shall be mandatory.
- (b) The provincial assessor shall take charge of the assessor's office and perform
 the duties as provided for under Book II of the Local Government Code of 1991,
 as amended, and shall:
- (1) Ensure that all laws and policies governing the appraisal and assessment of
 real properties for taxation purposes are properly executed;
- (2) Initiate, review and recommend changes in policies and objectives, plans
 and programs, techniques, procedures and practices in the valuation and
 assessment of real properties for taxation purposes;
- (3) Establish a systematic method of real property assessment;
- 16 (4) Install and maintain a real property identification and accounting system;
- (5) Prepare, install and maintain a system of tax mapping, showing graphically
 all property subject to assessment and gather all data concerning the same;
- (6) Conduct frequent physical surveys to verify and determine whether all real
 properties within the province are properly listed in the assessment rolls;
- (7) Exercise the functions of appraisal and assessment primarily for taxation
 purposes of all real properties in the province;
- (8) Prepare a schedule of the fair market value for the different classes of real
 properties in accordance with Title 2, Book II of the Local Government Code
 of 1991, as amended;
- (9) Issue, upon request of any interested party, certified copies of assessment
 records of real properties and all other records relative to its assessment,
 upon payment of a service charge or fee to the provincial treasurer;
- (10) Submit every semester a report of all assessments, as well as
 cancellations and modifications of assessments to the provincial governor
 and the *sangguniang panlalawigan;* and

- (11) Exercise technical supervision and visitorial functions over all component 1 2 city and municipal assessors, coordinate with component city or municipal 3 assessors in the conduct of tax mapping operations and all other assessment activities, and provide all forms of assistance therefor: Provided, 4 5 *however;* That, upon full provision by the component city or municipality concerned to its assessor's office of the minimum personnel, equipment and 6 7 funding requirements as may be prescribed by the Secretary of Finance, 8 such functions shall be delegated to the said municipal assessor.
- 9 (c) Exercise shall other powers and perform such other duties and functions as
 10 may be prescribed by law or ordinance.
- 11 Sec. 26. The Provincial Accountant. –
- (a) No person shall be appointed provincial accountant unless he or she is a citizen
 of the Philippines, a resident of the province, of good moral character and a
 certified public accountant. He or she must have acquired experience in the
 treasury or accounting service for at least five (5) years.
- 16 The appointment of a provincial accountant is mandatory.
- (b) The provincial accountant shall take charge of both the accounting and internalaudit services of the province, and shall:
- 19 (1) Install and maintain an internal audit system in the province;
- (2) Prepare and submit financial statements to the provincial governor and to
 the *sangguniang panlalawigan;*
- (3) Apprise the *sanggunian* and other local government officials on the financial
 condition and operations of the provincial government;
- 24 (4) Certify to the availability of budgetary allotment from which expenditures
 25 and obligations may be properly charged;
- 26 (5) Review supporting documents before the preparation of vouchers to
 27 determine completeness of requirements;
- (6) Prepare statements of cash advances, liquidations, salaries, allowances,
 reimbursements and remittances pertaining to the provincial government;
- 30 (7) Prepare statements of journal vouchers and liquidations of the same and
 31 other adjustments related thereto;

2 (9) Maintain individual ledgers for officials and employees of the provincial 3 government pertaining to payrolls and deductions; Record and post in index cards details of purchased furniture, fixtures 4 (10)and equipment, including disposal thereof, if any; 5 (11) Account for all issued requests for obligations and maintain and keep all 6 records and reports related thereto; 7 (12) Prepare journals and the analysis of obligations and maintain and keep 8 all records and reports related thereto; and 9 (13) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and functions 10 as may be provided by law or ordinance. 11 Sec. 27. The Provincial Budget Officer. – 12 (a) No person shall be appointed provincial budget officer unless he or she is a 13 citizen of the Philippines, a resident of the province, of good moral character, 14 a holder of a college degree preferably in accounting, economics, public 15 administration or any related course from a recognized college or university, 16 and a first grade civil service eligible or its equivalent. He or she must have 17 acquired experience in government budgeting or in any related field for at least 18 19 five (5) years. The appointment of the provincial budget officer shall be mandatory. 20 (b) The provincial budget officer shall take charge of the budget office, and shall: 21

(8) Post individual disbursements to subsidiary ledgers and index cards;

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- (1) Prepare forms, orders and circulars embodying instructions on budgetary
 and appropriation matters for the signature of the provincial governor;
- (2) Review and consolidate the budget proposals of different departments and
 officials of the province;
- 26 (3) Assist the provincial governor in the preparation of the budget and during
 27 the budget hearings;
- (4) Study and evaluate budgetary implications of proposed legislation and
 submit comments and recommendations thereon;
- 30 (5) Submit periodic budgetary reports to the Department of Budget and
 31 Management (DBM);

(6) Coordinate with the provincial treasurer, the provincial accountant and the 1 2 provincial planning and development coordinator for the purpose of budgeting; 3 (7) Assist the sangguniang panlalawigan in reviewing the approved budgets of 4 the component cities and municipalities; and 5 (8) Coordinate with the provincial planning and development coordinator in the 6 formulation of the provincial development plan. 7 (c) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and functions as 8 may be prescribed by law or ordinance. 9 (d) The appropriations for personal services of the budget officer shall be provided 10 for in full in the annual budget of the provincial government. 11 12 Sec. 28. The Provincial Planning and Development Coordinator. -13 (a) No person shall be appointed provincial planning and development coordinator 14 unless he or she is a citizen of the Philippines; a resident of the province; of 15 good moral character; a holder of a college degree preferably in urban 16 planning, development studies, economics, public administration or in any 17 related course from a recognized college or university, and a first grade civil 18 service eligible or its equivalent. - (iii) Assist cooperatives in establishing linkages with government
 agencies and non-governmental organizations involved in the
 promotion and integration of the concept of cooperatives in the
 livelihood of the people and other community activities;
- (4) Be in the frontline of cooperatives organization, rehabilitation or viability
 enhancement, particularly during and in the aftermath of man-made and
 natural disasters or calamities, to aid in their survival and, if necessary,
 subsequent rehabilitation; and
- (5) Recommend to the *sanggunian* and advise the provincial governor on all
 other matters relative to cooperatives development and viability
 enhancement which will improve the livelihood and the quality of life of the
 inhabitants.
- (c) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and functions as
 may be prescribed by law or ordinance.
- 27 Sec. 39. The Provincial Architect. –
- (a) No person shall be appointed provincial architect unless he or she is a citizen
 of the Philippines, a resident of the province, of good moral character and a
 duly licensed architect. He or she must have practiced his or her profession for
 at least five (5) years.

- 1 The appointment of a provincial architect shall be optional.
- (b) The provincial architect shall take charge of the office on architectural planning
 and design, and shall:
- 4 (1) Formulate measures for the consideration of the *sanggunian* and provide 5 technical assistance and support to the provincial governor in carrying out 6 measures to ensure the delivery of basic services and the provision of 7 adequate facilities relative to architectural planning and design as provided 8 for under Section 17 of the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended;
- 9 (2) Develop plans and strategies and, upon approval thereof by the provincial 10 governor, implement the same, particularly those which have to do with 11 architectural planning and design programs and projects which the 12 provincial governor is empowered to implement and which the *sanggunian* 13 is empowered to provide for under the Local Government Code of 1991, as 14 amended;
- (3) In addition to the foregoing duties and functions, the provincial architectshall:
- 17 (i) Prepare and recommend for consideration of the *sanggunian* the
 18 architectural plan and design for the province or a part thereof,
 19 including the renewal of slums and blighted areas, land reclamation
 20 activities, the greening of land and the appropriate planning of
 21 marine and foreshore areas;
- (ii) Review and recommend for appropriate action of the *sanggunian* and
 the provincial governor, the architectural plan and design submitted
 by governmental and non-governmental entities or individuals,
 particularly those for undeveloped, underdeveloped and poorly designed areas; and
- (iii) Coordinate with government agencies and non-governmental entities
 and individuals involved in the aesthetics and the maximum
 utilization of the land and water within the jurisdiction of the
 province, compatible with environmental integrity and ecological
 balance;

- 1 (4) Be in the frontline of the delivery of basic services involving architectural 2 planning and design, particularly those related to the redesigning of spatial 3 distribution of basic facilities and physical structures during and in the 4 aftermath of man-made and natural calamities or disasters; and
- 5 (5) Recommend to the *sanggunian* and advise the provincial governor on all 6 other matters related to the architectural planning and design as it relates 7 to the total socioeconomic development of the province.
- 8 (c) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and functions as
 9 may be prescribed by law or ordinance.
- 10 Sec. 40. The Provincial Population Officer. –
- (a) No person shall be appointed provincial population officer unless he or she is a
 citizen of the Philippines, a resident of the province, of good moral character,
 a holder of a college degree with specialized training in population development
 from a recognized college or university, and first grade civil service eligible or
 its equivalent. He or she must have experience in the implementation of
 programs on population development or responsible parenthood for at least
 five (5) years.

18 The appointment of a provincial population officer shall be optional.

(b) The provincial population officer shall take charge of the office on populationdevelopment, and shall:

- (1) Formulate measures for the consideration of the *sanggunian* and provide
 technical assistance and support to the provincial governor in carrying out
 measures to ensure the delivery of basic services and the provision of
 adequate facilities relative to the integration of the population development
 principles and in providing access to said services and facilities;
- (2) Develop plans and strategies and, upon approval thereof by the provincial
 governor, implement the same, particularly those which have to do with the
 integration of population development principles and methods in programs
 and projects which the provincial governor is empowered to implement and
 which the *sanggunian* is empowered to provide for under the Local
 Government Code of 1991, as amended; and

- (3) In addition to the foregoing duties and functions, the provincial population
 officer shall:
- 3 (i) Assist the provincial governor in the implementation of the
 4 constitutional provisions relative to population development and the
 5 promotion of responsible parenthood;
- 6 (ii) Establish and maintain an updated data bank for program 7 operations, development planning and an educational program to 8 ensure the people's participation in and undertaking of population 9 development; and
- 10(iii)Implement appropriate training programs responsive to the cultural11heritage of the inhabitants.
- (c) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and functions asmay be prescribed by law or ordinance.
- 14 Sec. 41. The Provincial Information Officer. –
- (a) No person shall be appointed provincial information officer unless he or she is
 a citizen of the Philippines, a resident of the province, of good moral character,
 a holder of a college degree preferably in journalism, mass communication or
 any related course from a recognized college or university, and a first grade
 civil service eligible or its equivalent. He or she must have acquired experience
 in writing articles and research papers, or in writing for print, television or
 broadcast media for at least three (3) years.
- The term of the provincial information officer is co-terminous with that of his or her appointing authority.
- 24 The appointment of a provincial information officer shall be optional.
- (b) The provincial information officer shall take charge of the office on public
 information, and shall:
- (1) Formulate measures for the consideration of the *sanggunian* and provide
 technical assistance and support to the provincial governor in providing the
 information and research data required for the delivery of basic services and
 the provision of adequate facilities so that the public becomes aware of the
 said service and may fully avail of the same;

- 1 (2) Develop plans and strategies and, upon approval thereof by the provincial 2 governor, implement the same, particularly those which have to do with 3 public information and research data to support the programs and projects 4 which the provincial governor is empowered to implement and which the 5 *sanggunian* is empowered to provide for under the Local Government Code 6 of 1991, as amended;
 - (3) In addition to the foregoing duties and functions, the information officer shall:
- 9 (i) Provide relevant, adequate and timely information to the provincial 10 government and its residents;

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- 11 (ii) Maintain effective liaison with the various sectors of the community 12 on matters and issues that affect the livelihood and the quality of life 13 of the inhabitants and encourage support for programs of the local 14 and national governments; and
- 15(iii)Furnish information and data on the province to government16agencies or offices as may be required by law or ordinance;
- (4) Be in the frontline of providing information during and in the aftermath of
 man-made and natural disasters or calamities, with special attention to the
 victims thereof, to help minimize injuries and casualties during and after
 emergency, and accelerate relief and rehabilitation; and
- (5) Recommend to the *sanggunian* and advise the provincial governor on all
 other matters relative to public information and research data as it relates
 to the total socioeconomic development of the province.
- (c) Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties and functions as
 may be prescribed by law or ordinance.

ARTICLE VIII

 THE PROVINCIAL FIRE STATION, THE PROVINCIAL JAIL,

 THE PROVINCIAL SCHOOL DIVISION, AND

 THE PROVINCIAL PROSECUTION SERVICE
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- 1 Sec. 42. The Provincial Fire Station Service. –
- (a) There shall be established in the province at least five (5) fire stations with
 adequate personnel, firefighting facilities and equipment by the DILG, within
 two (2) months upon the commencement of the corporate existence of the new
 province. The provincial government shall provide the necessary land or site of
 the provincial fire stations.
- (b) The provincial fire station service shall be headed by a provincial fire marshal
 whose qualification shall be as those provided for under Republic Act No. 9263,
 as amended, otherwise known as the "Bureau of Fire Protection and Bureau of
 Jail Management and Penology Professionalization Act of 2004".
- (c) The provincial fire stations shall be responsible for the protection of various
 emergency services such as the rescue and evacuation of injured people at fire related incidents and, in general, fire prevention and suppression measures to
 secure the safety of life and property of the citizenry.
- 15 Sec. 43. The Provincial Jail Service. –
- (a) There shall be established and maintained in the province, within two (2) 16 months upon the commencement of the corporate existence of the new 17 province by the DILG, a secured, clean, adequately equipped and sanitary jail 18 facility for the custody and safekeeping of prisoners, any fugitive from justice, 19 or person detained awaiting investigation or trial and/or transfer to the national 20 penitentiary, and/or violent mentally ill person who endangers himself or the 21 safety of others, duly certified as such by the proper medical health officer, 22 pending the transfer to a mental institution. 23
- (b) The provincial jail service shall be headed by a provincial jail warden whose 24 qualifications shall be as those provided for under Republic Act No. 9263, as 25 amended, otherwise known as the "Bureau of Fire Protection and Bureau of Jail 26 Management and Penology Professionalization Act of 2004". He or she shall 27 assist in the immediate rehabilitation of individuals or detention of prisoners. 28 Great care must be exercised so that human rights of these prisoners are 29 respected and protected, and their spiritual and physical well-being are properly 30 31 and promptly attended to.

Sec. 44. The Provincial Schools Division. -

- (a) The DepEd shall, within two (2) months upon the commencement of the
 corporate existence of the province herein created, establish and maintain a
 separate schools division in the province whose jurisdiction shall cover all the
 municipalities of the new province.
- (b) The provincial schools division shall be headed by a division superintendent
 who must possess the necessary qualifications required by the DepEd.
- 8 Sec. 45. The Provincial Prosecution Service. –
- (a) There shall be stablished and maintained a prosecution service by the 9 Department of Justice (DOJ), within two (2) months upon the commencement 10 of the corporate existence of the province herein created, who shall be headed 11 12 by a provincial prosecutor and such number of assistant prosecutors as may be necessary, who shall be organizationally part of the DOJ, and under the 13 supervision and control of the Secretary of the DOJ, and whose qualifications, 14 manner of appointment, rank, salary and benefits shall be governed by existing 15 laws covering prosecutors in the DOJ. 16
- (b) The provincial prosecutor shall handle the criminal prosecution in the municipal
 trial courts in the province as well as the regional trial courts for criminal cases
 originating in the territory of the new province and shall render to and for the
 province such other services as are required by law or regulation of the DOJ.

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ARTICLE IX TRANSITORY AND FINAL PROVISIONS

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Sec. 46. *Plebiscite.* – The Province of Western Maguindanao shall be created, as provided for in this Charter, upon approval by the majority of the votes cast by the voters of the affected areas in a plebiscite to be conducted and supervised by the Commission on Elections (COMELEC) within sixty (60) days from the date of the effectivity of this Charter.

The amount necessary for the conduct of the plebiscite shall be borne by theProvince of Maguindanao.

Sec. 47. *Commencement of Corporate Existence.* – The Province of Western Maguindanao shall commence corporate existence upon the composition, qualification and assumption of the provincial governor, provincial vice-governor and majority of the members of the *sangguniang panlalawigan*.

5 Sec. 48. *Officials of the Province of Western Maguindanao.* – The elective 6 officials of the Province of Western Maguindanao shall be elected in the next national 7 and local elections following the effectivity of this charter.

8 However, if this charter is ratified more than six (6) months prior to the next 9 national or local elections following its approval and effectivity, the highest ranking 10 elective provincial official of the Province of Maguindanao who is a resident of the new 11 province shall assume as its acting provincial governor, and shall continue in office 12 until his or her successor shall have been elected and qualified.

- (a) The Vice-Governor and other members of the *sangguniang panlalawigan* shall 13 be appointed by the President of the Republic of the Philippines from among 14 the qualified residents of the new province at the recommendation of the 15 provincial governor: Provided, that the incumbent elected members of the 16 sangguniang panlalawigan from the First Legislative District of Maguindanao 17 shall be entitled to retain their respective positions and finish their terms of 18 office in the new Province of the Western Maguindanao without need of 19 appointment. 20
- (b) All vacant elective provincial positions in the present Province of Maguindanao
 arising as the consequence of the approval of this charter shall be filled up
 through appointments by the President of the Republic of the Philippines from
 among its qualified residents upon the recommendation of the Provincial
 Governor. They shall continue in office until their successors shall have been
 elected and qualified.
- 27 Sec. 49. *Organization of the Provincial Government.* All provincial appointive 28 positions in the Province of Western Maguindanao shall be filled within sixty (60) days 29 upon commencement of it corporate existence.

Sec. 50. *Suspension of Increase in the Rates of Local Taxes.* – No increase in the rates of local taxes shall be imposed by the new province within the period of five (5) years from its acquisition of corporate existence.

Sec. 51. *Present Provincial Properties.* – Upon the effectivity of this Act, the ownership of real properties and infrastructure projects of each LGU situated in the present Province of Maguindanao shall belong to the province where it is situated.

Sec. 52. *Applicability of Laws.* – The provisions of Republic Act No. 7160, otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991, as amended, Republic Act No. 11054, otherwise known as the Organic Law for the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao, and other laws as are applicable to provinces shall govern the herein created province insofar as they are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act.

13 Sec. 53. *Separability Clause.* – In any part of this Act is declared invalid or 14 unconstitutional, the other parts or provisions hereof shall remain valid and effective.

15 Sec. 54. *Effectivity.* – This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its 16 publication in at least two (2) newspaper of general and local circulation.
