## RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE PROPER SENATE COMMITTEES, TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY AND ASSESSMENT, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE VISA UPON ARRIVAL POLICY FOR CHINESE NATIONALS WITH THE END IN VIEW OF ENSURING THAT THE VISA UPON ARRIVAL SCHEME WOULD NOT POSE HEALTH RISKS AND FACILITATE THE PROLIFERATION OF SEX TRAFFICKING AND PROSTITUTION IN THE COUNTRY

WHEREAS, under Department Circular 041 issued by then Justice Secretary Vitaliano Aguirre II, landed visas or Visa Upon Arrival (VUA) are issued to nationals from the People's Republic of China (PROC). The VUA allows a Chinese national to stay in the Philippines for 30 days and may apply for an extension of up to a maximum period of six months<sup>1</sup>;

WHEREAS, this is in line with the government's thrust to increase tourism and foreign investment, and to better facilitate the expeditious entry and admission of PROC Nationals into the country<sup>2</sup>;

WHEREAS, nearly 300 Chinese sex workers and their clients were rounded up in raids by the National Bureau of Investigation and the Philippine National Police on 12 brothels in six cities in the second half of 2019<sup>3</sup>;

WHEREAS, the sudden proliferation of Chinese prostitution is tied to the explosive growth of Philippine Offshore Gaming Operators, or POGOS, online

gambling companies based in the Philippines that cater to players in China, where gambling is illegal<sup>4</sup>;

WHEREAS, clients of Chinese operated sex dens in the country book appointments in advance through cellphone applications<sup>5</sup>;

WHEREAS, Health Secretary Francisco Duque III said the Chinese man from Wuhan, China the epicenter of the nCoV acute respiratory disease outbreak was recorded as the second confirmed case of the potentially deadly infection in the country<sup>6</sup>;

WHEREAS, according to Port Operations Division chief Grifton Medina, Immigration officials screen Chinese nationals entering the Philippines, checking not just their documents but also for signs that they may be victims of human trafficking<sup>7</sup>;

WHEREAS, it is imperative to inquire and assess the current Visa application process for Chinese nationals, taking into consideration the outbreak of the Novel Corona Virus and the rise of Chinese operated sex dens in the country, and which calls for a more vigilant and tougher government regulation;

BE IT RESOLVED, AS IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, directing the proper Senate committees, to conduct an inquiry and assessment, in aid of legislation, on the Visa Upon Arrival Program for Chinese nationals, with the end in view of ensuring that the Visa Upon Arrival Scheme would not pose health risks and facilitate proliferation of sex trafficking and prostitution in the country.
