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

RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON WOMEN, CHILDREN, FAMILY RELATIONS AND GENDER EQUALITY TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE RAMPANT PROLIFERATION AND RISING INCIDENCE OF CHILD CYBERSEX ABUSE IN THE PHILIPPINES ESPECIALLY DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC, WITH THE END IN VIEW OF PROPOSING LEGISLATIVE MEASURES AND ENSURING THAT THE WELFARE OF THE FILIPINO YOUTH AND CHILDREN ARE NOT NEGLECTED DURING A GLOBAL HEALTH CRISIS

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 13 of the 1987 Constitution provides that, "[t]he State recognizes the vital role of the youth in nation-building and shall promote and protect their physical, moral, spiritual, intellectual and social well-being";

WHEREAS, Article XV, Section 3 of the same posits that, "[t]he State shall defend the right of children to assistance, including proper care and nutrition, and special protection from all forms of neglect, abuse, cruelty, exploitation and other conditions prejudicial to their development";

WHEREAS, Presidential Decree No. 603, otherwise known as the "The Child and Youth Welfare Code", declares that "[t]he Child is one of the most important assets of the nation. Every effort should be exerted to promote his welfare and enhance his opportunities for a useful and happy life";

WHEREAS, the Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ) was implemented last 16 March 2020, and is set to continue until 15 May 2020;

WHEREAS, during this period where all are forced to stay home in order to be safe from the deadly COVID-19, some Filipinos, and worse Filipino children, are left and trapped in the hands of yet another deadly "silent pandemic" called online sexual trafficking—a pandemic that we have long been fighting and ending but still surreptitiously creeps its way to our society;

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21 22 WHEREAS, given the current state of our country, a seemingly luring and attractive easy business of online exploitation puts many Filipino families at risk to devious online sexual predators;

WHEREAS, according to the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), among the main causes of child trafficking in the Philippines are: poverty, low economic development in communities of origin, gender inequalities, limited employment opportunities, existence of and access to public infrastructure, large family sizes, inadequate awareness among families, and sex tourism²;

WHEREAS, the Philippines remains as the top global source of child pornography, having 8 out 10 Filipino children at risk of online sexual abuse³, and with the country also topping the world in terms of social media use, it is unfortunately not a surprise that even during a pandemic, these predators continue to hunt young and innocent people⁴;

WHEREAS, the 2018 Global Slavery Index reports showed an alarming spike in the number of victims of human trafficking in the Philippines amounting to more than 700,000 victims of human trafficking, who largely involve minors, and were exploited to promote child pornography. The dreadful reality is that the perpetrators are either their relatives or parents who claim that their customers are only looking at their children and not actually physically harassing them;⁵

WHEREAS, out of the thousands of reports and complaints received by the Department of Justice (DOJ) Office of Cybercrime in 2018, only 27 online sexual exploitation of children (OSEC) perpetrators were convicted⁶;

WHEREAS, last 22 April 2020, a 25-year old woman was caught engaging in cybersex trafficking of minors, including her own four (4) children. There were a total of seven (7) children, ages 3 to 14, who were rescued⁷;

WHEREAS, last 21 April 2020, a chase occurred between a Korean sex trafficker and police operatives in Angeles city. The Korean, Younsu Na, was allegedly engaged in "pimping Filipino women". It was reported that he would transact with customers who are predominantly foreigners and then bring the victims to pre-agreed hotels or chosen locations⁸;

WHEREAS, last 6 April 2020, Cebu cops arrested yet another 25-year old woman and her partner for online sex trafficking in separate locations in the city. Her victim was her underaged female cousin. The woman's live-in partner allegedly sexually abused the victim⁹;

WHEREAS, Civil Society Organizations under the Child Rights Network (CRN) reported the increasing numbers of complaints regarding online users sharing and selling child sexual abuse materials. "With the widening availability of internet connection in the Philippines, and with the ECQ prompting children to spend more time online, sexual predators can find it easier to prey on children.", the group said¹⁰;

WHEREAS, according to Ysrael Colorado Diloy, a Senior Advocacy Officer at Stairway Foundation, "Because of the ECQ, kids are online more. Predators are also at home and have more time on their hands"¹¹;

WHEREAS, the CRN likewise reports that some of these OSEC perpetrators are hiding and lurking in social media platforms such as Twitter which allegedly hosts an "alter community" consisting of various sexual abuse materials¹²;

WHEREAS, in Facebook, there are private groups which propagate the culture of posting explicit videos and photos without the consent of the involved parties.¹³ Facebook also failed to catch hundreds of cases of OSEC worldwide over the past six years¹⁴;

WHEREAS, the CRN said that with the drastic upsurge of OSEC cases in the country each day, the laws enacted to address online sexual exploitation of children in the country "failed". The group highlighted the ultimate need for an "all-encompassing" law that would cover all kinds and ranges of OSEC activities thus leaving no escape way for sexual predators¹⁵;

WHEREAS, the same group recommended that "reporting and referral lines should be widely and actively disseminated to empower victims and witnesses to report cases of abuse and exploitation."¹⁶;

WHEREAS, the State and concerned agencies need to do a comprehensive detection of gaps and loopholes in current laws and identify as to why despite the numerous legislations aimed to protect children, online sexual exploitation is still widespread and appears to be a growing industry in the country;

WHEREAS, the State must be more vigilant and aggressive in hunting and tracking down these sexual predators as it poses greater danger to the young who are not only experiencing the effects of this global pandemic but are also apparently not safe from another 'silent pandemic' and its chronic effects to families and society;

WHEREAS, the Filipino youth, especially those who are trapped and confined in their homes and have no other means of help must not be neglected during these

trying times. They, who are in dire need of the State's protection, must be rescued from the detestable, predatory and malevolent activities related to sex-trafficking;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, AS IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, to direct the Senate Committee on Women, Children, Family relations and Gender equality to conduct an inquiry, in aid of legislation, on the rampant proliferation and rising incidence of child cybersex abuse in the Philippines, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic, with the end in view of proposing legislative measures and ensuring that the welfare of the Filipino youth are not neglected during a global health crisis.
