RESOLUTION DIRECTING THE PROPER SENATE COMMITTEES TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE POST-TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER AMONG MILITARY PERSONNEL IN THE PHILIPPINES WITH THE INTENTION OF BETTER UNDERSTANDING THE MENTAL HEALTH RISKS FACING FILIPINO SOLDIERS IN THE PERFORMANCE OF THEIR DUTIES

WHEREAS, in the line of duty, the country's armed forces are exposed to
the ravages of war and war-zone trauma, which make them vulnerable to PostTraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD);

WHEREAS, according to the American Psychological Association, PTSD is an
anxiety problem that develops in some people after extremely traumatic events,
such as combat, crime, an accident or natural disaster¹;

7 **WHEREAS,** in addition to problems directly attributable to PTSD symptoms 8 per se, individuals with this disorder frequently suffer from other comorbid 9 psychiatric disorders, such as depression, other anxiety disorders, and alcohol or 10 substance abuse/dependence. The resulting constellation of psychiatric symptoms 11 frequently impairs marital, vocational, and social function²;

WHEREAS, the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) acknowledges PTSD
 among soldiers, especially those who have survived brutal encounters with groups
 like the Abu Sayyaf in Mindanao³;

WHEREAS, on April 21,2020, retired Army Corporal Winston Ragos died after
 he was shot twice by Police Master Sergeant Daniel Florendo Jr., near a quarantine
 checkpoint in Barangay Pasong Putik in Quezon City⁴;

WHEREAS, according to AFP Spokesperson, Lt. Col. Ramon P. Zagala, battle scarred Cpl. Winston Ragos suffered from PTSD⁵;

20 **WHEREAS**, Lt. Col. Zagala added that Cpl. Winston Ragos was first 21 diagnosed with PTSD in 2010, after he had been confined at the V. Luna Hospital in 22 Quezon City after an armed engagement with the New People's Army⁶;

WHEREAS, Cpl. Winston Ragos was given a Certificate of Disability
 Discharge in December 2016. It took effect on January 16, 2017⁷;

WHEREAS, for years now, the military has held stress debriefing programs for soldiers in an effort to reduce the risk of PTSD. The condition, while avoidable if detected early, can occur as long as soldiers are sent to combat zones⁸;

28 **WHEREAS,** The AFP Medical Center, more commonly known as the V. Luna 29 General Hospital in Quezon City, handles the more serious cases of PTSD⁹;

WHEREAS, according to the AFP, the wounds of war are not just physical but also mental and their scars are not always seen¹⁰;

WHEREAS, Senate, in consultation with the Department of Health and other concerned agencies, should look into existing legislation providing support mechanism for armed personnel diagnosed with PTSD;

WHEREAS, members of the AFP are no ordinary public servants. While not belittling the efforts of our corps of civilian public servants, the dedication of our armed forces is unique, in the sense that, they are always ready to sacrifice their lives in defense of the nation. Such unique dedication or commitment to serve at the cost of one's life must also be rewarded by providing support and better understanding the effects of deployment in their mental health;

41 **BE IT RESOLVED, AS IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED,** by the proper Senate 42 Committees to conduct an inquiry, in aid legislation, on the Post-Traumatic Stress 43 Disorder among military personnel in the Philippines, with the intention of better 44 understanding the mental health risks facing Filipino soldiers in the performance of 45 their duties.
